JOCK STEIN says...

We start today a spell of three matches in eight days which can be as important as any previous run of three in the history of Celtic. If we can beat Dundee United this afternoon, Motherwell on Monday night, and Aberdeen a week today we shall win the league championship—of that I am very confident. Maybe that is a tall order. Nevertheless I see no reason why we can't take at least five points from those games.

But let's take first things first. In Dundee United we meet a side that have vastly improved in recent weeks. They have won their last four league games and have scored 13 goals in the process. In midweek they defeated Dundee in a local Derby at Dens Park and I am reliably informed that in that game they were very good. So we must be wary of Jerry Kerr's men, who have struck their best form. Being wary, however, doesn't mean being ultra-careful; we shall go all out to win and at the same time play attractively.

All of us at Celtic Park are delighted that we have reached the Scottish Cup final and that the two semi-final games with Airdrie provided such good clean entertainment. In the second match we had the odd controversial decision to face but to their credit our players overcame the "breaks" that went against them.

ADVICE TO SUPPORTERS

Now I have a special request to make to our supporters. I should very much like those among them who favour the "Celtic End" (or the city end) of the ground to take up their stance at the opposite end (the Parkhead end) in our two remaining



games at Celtic Park (Note—the two other home fixtures, against Clyde and Ayr United, will be played at Hampden).

I can promise you that it will be to Celtic supporters' advantage in the long run to congregate at the Parkhead (new covered terracing) end of the ground, as shall be explained in the not distant future in our club newspaper, "The Celtic View".

DUNDEE UNITED'S BID FOR CUP PLACE

Dundee United visit Celtic Park for the second time this season with their thoughts very much on the special reward that success against Celtic in a league game could bring. Marked improvement in United's form in recent weeks has given them much more than a sporting chance of playing in the Fairs Cup next season, and the alternative prize of taking part in the Texaco Cup can be theirs for the taking.

Having drawn twice with Celtic in the League Cup sectional tournament at the start of the season and having lost at Tannadice in the league only by 2-1, United come to Parkhead in good heart. They will remember too that though they have not a good record in the league at Celtic Park they won there as recently as 1967.

That was a victory that delayed Celtic's ultimate victory in the championship. United will recall, too, that it was achieved only weeks before Celtic won the European Cup in Lisbon.

It also gave United a league double over Celtic for at Tannadice they had won by the same score, 3-2.

Only one of the winning side of May 3, 1967, remains a regular member of United's first team. He is Doug Smith, the centre-half and captain, and one of the most consistent footballers in Scotland over several years. Indeed it is surprising that he has not even one league representative honour. The sides on that Wednesday were:—

Hainey, Gillespie, and Graham scored for United; Gemmell (penalty-kick) and Wallace scored Celtic's goals.

That has been the only league win of United at Celtic Park in the 10 seasons in which they have been in the first division since the Second World War. Celtic have won six of the nine other games and drawn three. One of those victories was last season's 7-2. Celtic's display that night in floodlight led United's manager, Jerry Kerr to describe them as "the finest club side in the world". Jimmy Johnstone was in brilliant form and it was to the great credit of United that they took the roasting Johnstone gave them without resorting to unsportsmanlike tactics. The teams were:—

THE LEAGUE-WINNING AGGREGATE?

If Celtic win the league title this season and thereby equal the club and country record of six championships in succession in 1905-1910 few will bother about the winning margin or the aggregate of points.

It is, however, worth noting that in a season in which not even their most enthusiastic followers would claim that Celtic are as good a team as they were in the recent past they are in a position to reach a points total that will be the second highest in the club's history in a sixteen-club league.

RECORD NUMBER

Three seasons ago Celtic won the league with an aggregate of 63 points,

which is the record for the 16-club competition. Their second best total is 58 in the 1966-67 season.

If Celtic win their last six league games (including, of course, today's) they will finish with 59 points—two points more than their winning aggregate of last season.

The remaining games are—St. Mirren and Aberdeen (away), Motherwell, Ayr United and Clyde (home).

DUNDEE UNITED IN THE SCOTTISH LEAGUE

Dundee United have been members of the Scottish League since 1921, though in that year, as for 12 years before, the club was known as Dundee Hibs. In 1923 they changed the name from Hibs to United.

They joined the second division of the league in 1921 and they played in the first division for the first time in season 1925-26. Relegated three times (1927, 1930, and 1932), United regained first-division status in 1960 and have held their place in the top league ever since.

In the ten seasons 1960-61 to 1969-70 United's final league placings have been:

Ninth, tenth, seventh, eighth, ninth, fifth, ninth, eleventh, fifth, and fifth.

Their highest pointage in the 18-club league has been 43 in 1965-66 and in 1968-69, in the latter season 11 points behind Celtic's championship winning total.
