In June I was among those lucky enough to be in Germany and see for myself the three marvellous performances by Scotland's footballers which made us all so proud of our country. Season 1974/75 promises to be one of the most exciting seasons we have had for some time with teams competing against each other in matches, the results of which could decide matters of much importance. I refer, of course, to the new League set up for season 1975/76 when the clubs will be grouped into three Leagues namely Premier, First and Second Divisions, comprising 10, 14 and 14 clubs respectively. Every match could be of vital importance to the supporters of the thirty-eight clubs and that is how it should be. Scottish legislators have never been afraid to go it alone; the Experimentation with the Offside Law is ample evidence of this. Many have pre-judged it whilst claiming that defensive football is driving spectators away. With the support of F.I.F.A., further experimentation is to take place this season. Our sponsors today, Drybrough & Co. Ltd., have agreed to cooperate and play their competition, as requested by the Scottish League, under the Experimental Offside Law. In looking forward to an exciting season, how better to start it off than with the Drybrough Cup which places the accent on goal scoring to qualify.

I would like to add my congratulations to Willie Ormond and his players for a first class performance in the World Cup, and sincerely hope that by their performances they will have won back a new enthusiasm for the forthcoming domestic competitions.

BOBBY LENNOX (Forward) Joined the club 13 years ago and it has been hinted he is a veteran. But his performance at Airdrie last week proves he has lost none of his speed and sharpness.

HARRY HOOD (Forward) Like others in the Parkhead pool, Harry is called upon on specific occasions and his clever ball-work and shooting seems to pay off at just the right time.

JACKIE McNAMARA (Forward) One of Celtic's bright young reserve stars last season, Jackie seems set to break through this season. Signed from Cumbernauld United in 1971.

STEWART KENNEDY (Goal-keeper) Injury unfortunately hampered Stewart's progress last term, but on the pre-season tour of Sweden showed that his class will be very much in evidence this term.

SANDY JARDINE (Full back) On his club and international displays last season, Sandy showed that few defenders in the world can match his ability. Strong in the tackle and fast on the break he was a World Cup standout.

WILLIE MATHIESON (Full back) A fast dependable full back in the modern mould, Willie delights in breaking from the back giving extra support to his forwards.

ALEX O'HARA (Midfield) Given his chance at Ibrox amazingly early in his career, Alex ably justified all predictions of his ability. A strong but creative player, the best is yet to come.

DEREK JOHNSTONE (Centre back) Since scoring the only goal in a League Cup final against Celtic at the age of 16, Derek has matured into one of the best defenders in the country. Cool under pressure, he has exceptional ability in the air.

Lochgelly win Drybrough Junior Trophy



A NEW NAME appeared on the Drybrough Junior Trophy when Lochgelly Albert defeated Petershill by 3 goals to 1 after extra time in an exciting final at Greenfield Park, Shettleston, on Saturday 1st June.

Previous winners of the Trophy, which now brings the winning club £400, have been Irvine Meadow (1973), Larkhall Thistle (1972), and Cambuslang Rangers (1971).

This season the Trophy took a new form when the qualifiers were changed, except in Fife which will fall into line next year, from the regional league champions to the six winners of the regional cups, now renamed as Drybrough Cups, plus the season's Scottish Junior Cup Winners and Central League Champions.
