THE cancellation of the match with Berwick Rangers on Saturday, February 17, 1979 made it eight weeks since Celtic had played with the exception of the cup-tie at Montrose on Wednesday, January 31.

Since controversy raged with regard to an extension of the season *The Celtic View* checked back to the end of the 1962-63 term to see how the fixture backlog was cleared up then.

Celtic played three Scottish Cup ties in March on their way to the Scottish Cup final and then finished the season with a hectic seven games in just over two weeks.

Celtic's programme in the closing days of that season was as follows: April 27, Dunfermline (a) 1-1; April 29, Hearts (a) 3-4; May 4, Rangers (SCF) 1-1; May 6, Clyde (h) 2-0; May 11, Dundee United (a) 0-3; May 13, Motherwell (h) 6-0; May 15, Rangers (SCF) 0-3. Celtic scores first.

AMONG the 40,000 fans who saw Celtic's league clash with Dundee on Saturday, February 10, 1974, was Basle boss Helmut Benthaus. And when he left Parkhead to travel back to Switzerland he took with him a notebook packed with information on his European opponents.

Despite Celtic's shock 2-1 defeat, the West German coach wasn't too optimistic about his side's chances in the European Cup quarter-finals. "Celtic will be far too fast for us. After 30 minutes of their fantastic pace we'll be finished," he told the *View*.

Of course, no one at Parkhead will be fooled by this pessimistic forecast. The Basle boss went on: "This was a really tremendous game. Fast, exciting and furious. The fans really got their money's worth. We rarely see games like these on the continent. Although it wasn't a good result for Celtic, I was very impressed with them. They're strong and fast and have plenty of good players."

THE Scottish Cup tie with Clyde was ruled out by the weather on Saturday, February 8, but it was played on the following Wednesday afternoon at Shawfield. Details of the game were: Clyde 0; Celtic 0.

Celtic: Simpson; Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill and Brogan; Johnstone and Lennox; Wallace; Callaghan and Chalmers. Twelfth man: Auld. Celtic seemed to be in trouble after 15 minutes when Ronnie Simpson was injured in a clash with Jimmy Quinn (on loan to Clyde from Celtic) and had to be stretchered off the park.

Tommy Gemmell took over the goalkeeping job and the revised Celtic team had Jim Brogan at left back, Steve Chalmers in the middle and Bertie Auld at outside left.

However, Celtic had most of the game although they failed to score and Tommy Gemmell gave a competent performance between the sticks.

For the replay the crowd was down a bit, to 98,579.

This time Celtic won 4-2 through two goals each by McGrory and Thomson (R.).

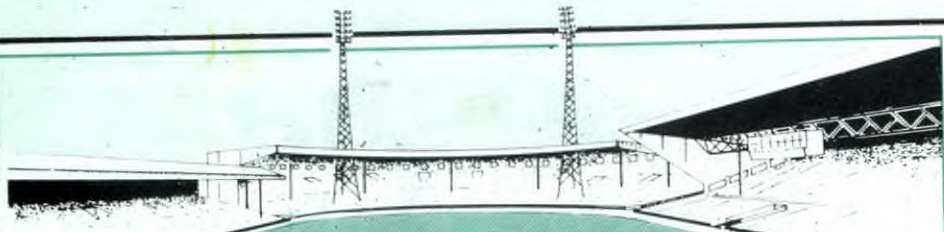

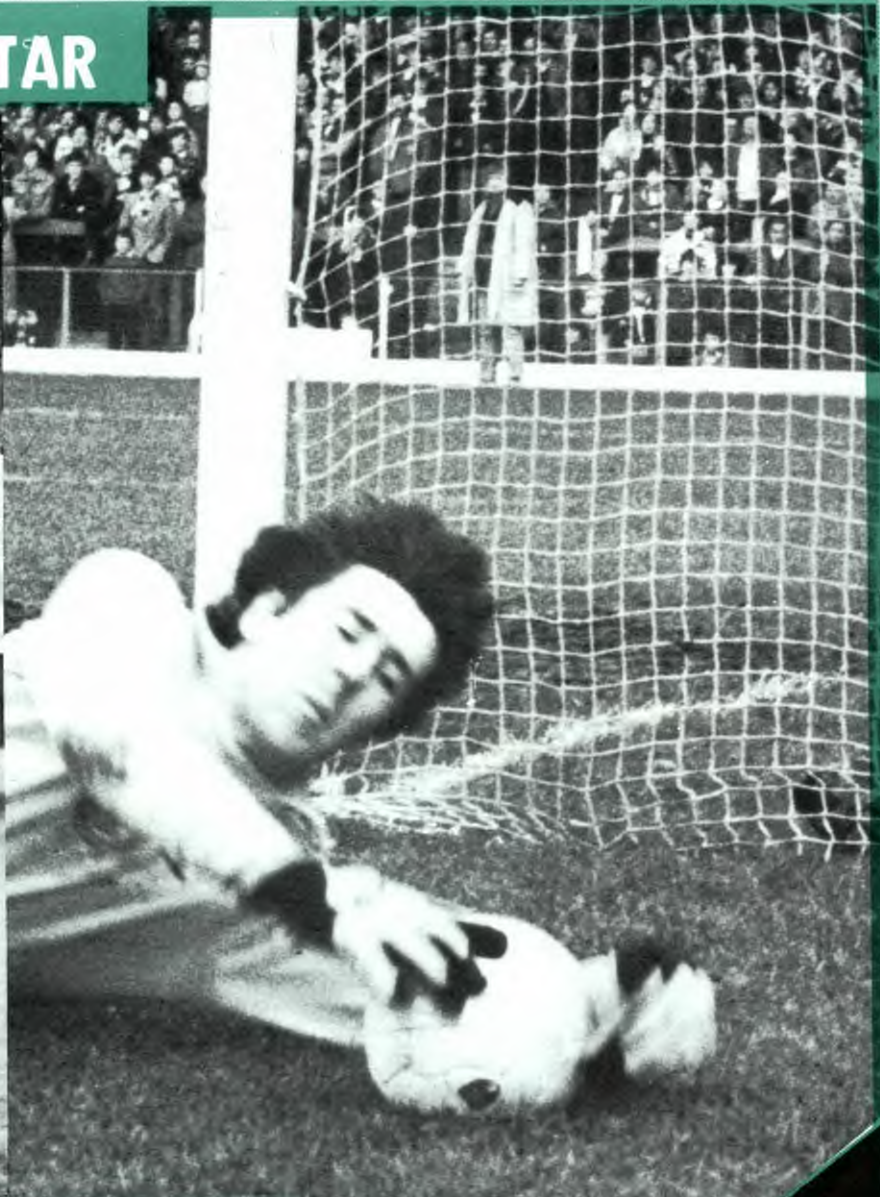
