JOCK STEIN says...

Fourteen days ago we played Dunfermline in a league match at Celtic Park, and there is no doubt that it wasn't a match to the liking of many of us with Celtic leanings. What we must realise, however, is that Dunfermline came to Parkhead in a desperate position in the league and that teams in such a position are almost forced into adopting desperate tactics.

Our opponents this afternoon are the same Dunfermline—not necessarily the same personnel but a team who made a very close match of the league fixture. They are a bit easier now, so far as league prospects are concerned, and I don't think they will adopt the same tactics in a cup-tie. Let's not forget that they are now a far better side than their position in the league table suggests. I won't be at all surprised if they have a much more venturesome, attacking policy today. Whatever they do I can't visualise us having other than a very hard game; it will be no less difficult for us than the league match was. Remember also that Dunfermline have been worthy cup opponents of Celtic on every occasion they have met us in recent years.

FEYENOORD SAME

I think our midweek game against Feyenoord will help us today, even though the match was arranged with the primary intention of preparing for the European Cup tie with another Dutch club, Ajax. I think Tuesday night's game will prove to have been of great value for our Euro-



pean commitment, but I have more than a slight feeling that it will have put our players in the correct frame of mind also for today's Scottish Cup tie.

I am happy too that from all accounts all who saw the Hampden game were pleased with the quality of the play and the entertainment.

One thing we shall have to get out of our system is the tendency to chuck away goals. By the time of this afternoon's kick-off everything that we can do behind the scenes to try to stop giving opponents presents will have been done.

TAKE CARE!

However exciting the football may be this afternoon spectators should remember the not distant past and refrain from rushing or even hurrying from the ground. Take care, look after yourselves, and your neighbours—especially the elderly and the very young.

Does the Camera Lie?

CELTIC AND DUNFERMLINE IN THE SCOTTISH CUP

It has been said frequently but unwisely that a club in the troubled section of the league table is better off without Scottish Cup commitment. Indeed officials of clubs in the relegation zone which have been knocked out of the Cup have been known to say: "It's just as well; now we can concentrate on saving our first-division status" or words to that effect.

We can be quite sure that Dunfermline Athletic won't go into today's cup-tie with any thoughts about relegation intruding. They will be all out to win, believing that continued success in the Cup will help and not hinder their effort to avoid relegation.

Dunfermline have proved doughty Cup men in recent years. In the last 10 seasons they have won the Scottish Cup twice and once been beaten finalists. Only Celtic and Rangers have a better record than that over the period, with Celtic having been in seven finals and won three and Rangers having been in five and won four.

In two of their three finals Dunfermline have played Celtic—in 1961 when they won the trophy for the first time and in 1965 when Celtic won 3-2 after having been twice a goal down. In their third and last final the Pars beat Hearts 3-1.

JOCK STEIN

Jock Stein was Dunfermline's manager in their first final, which went to a replay. After a 0-0 draw Dunfermline won 2-0, the goals being scored by Davie Thomson and Charlie Dickson. These were the teams in the replay:—

Dunfermline—Connachan; Fraser, Cunningham; Mailer, Miller, Sweeney; Peebles, Smith, Thomson, Dickson, Melrose.

Celtic—Haffey; MacKay, O'Neill; Crendan, McNeill, Clark; Gallagher, Fernie, Hughes, Chalmers, Byrne.

The 1961 final was notable for the players who missed playing as well as for those who took part. Just before the first game Dunfermline's outside-right, Tommy McDonald, took ill and he missed both games. Then by strange coincidence Celtic's left-back Jim Kennedy, who played in the first match, fell a victim of the same ailment, appendicitis, on the eve of the replay. George Miller, a deputy centre-half for Dunfermline—his position in those days was left-half—is now Falkirk's regular centre-half.

In 1965 and less than two months after Jock Stein had become Celtic's manager Celtic won the Cup for the eighteenth time. Bertie Auld twice equalised goals by Harry Melrose and John McLaughlin, and Billy McNeill headed a magnificent winning goal near the end. The teams were:—

Celtic—Fallon; Young, Gemmill; Murdoch, McNeill, Clark; Chalmers, Gallagher, Hughes, Lennox, Auld.

Dunfermline—Herriot; Callaghan (W.), Lunn; Thomson, McLean, Callaghan (T.); Edwards, Smith, McLaughlin, Melrose, Sinclair.

All the Celtic players, except Ian Young and Charlie Gallagher, are still with the club, but only Willie Callaghan, John Lunn, Jim Thomson, and Alec Edwards remain on the Dunfermline staff.

The Dunfermline team who won the trophy in 1968—Celtic were their first victims on the way to the final—was:—

Martin; Callaghan (W.), Lunn; McGarty, Barry, Callaghan (T.); Lister, Paton, Gardner, Edwards, Robertson (sub. Thomson).

Pat Gardner (2) and Ian Lister (now with St. Mirren) from a penalty-kick scored their goals in the 3-1 victory over Hearts.

SEVEN PREVIOUS TIES

There have been seven Scottish Cup ties between Celtic and Dunfermline, the first 60 years ago and no fewer than five of the ties in the last 10 years. The results have been (Celtic score first):—

BERTIE AULD AND DUNFERMLINE

Whenever the name of Dunfermline Athletic is mentioned I become even a little bit more interested in football than I am. My most memorable match against Dunfermline was the Scottish Cup final of 1965 when I managed to score twice in Celtic's 3-2 victory. So now that we are

How rewarding it is to be back in the big-time atmosphere, to be enjoying good health and freedom from serious injury (touch wood!) and to be doing something of value for our great club. I am grateful for the chance of a new lease of football life and to the supporters for their help and encouragement.
