THE Premier League meeting with Dundee United on March 4, 1978, was a vitally important one for Celtic who badly needed points to improve on their lowly League position.

United, playing in their usual composed fashion created only occasional problems for the Celtic defence but, by the same token, the Celtic attack didn't give the home defence too many headaches. However when Frank Munro was injured and looking in trouble the situation looked bad for Celtic. Frank didn't come out for the second half and Johannes Edvaldsson teamed up with Roddie MacDonald in the heart of the defence.

The only goal of the game was a tragedy for United defender David Narey who had played exceptionally well for the home side. Under pressure from Tom McAdam he lofted a high pass back to his goalkeeper unaware of the fact that McAlpine had started to run from his goal. The ball sailed over the keeper's head and carried high into the net to give Celtic two very valuable points.

As well as finishing top goalscorer John's control and one-touch football had the crowd buzzing every time he was in possession.

So well did the boys play, that on this occasion, substitute John McGoldrick did not get a chance to play, but his turn will come in the future.

Celtic won that match 2-0 in this way:

In the 39th minute Davie Provan was tripped and a penalty was awarded. Charlie Nicholas was given the duty of converting the award and he did so to take his scoring tally for the season to 22.

Five minutes later a Davie Provan cross was back-headed by Charlie Nicholas into the path of Frank McGarvey, who volleyed the ball into the net.
