JOCK STEIN says...

The Scottish Cup attraction is with us again and I am certainly very glad to have Dundee as our fourth-round opponents at Celtic Park. That is not another way of saying that we shall beat Dundee, though, of course, I am more than hopeful that we shall.

Dundee are one of the clubs against whom Celtic seem to play more than averagely well. I am sure that the main reason for that is that they do not rely on defensive strength and tactics when they meet us. It is my impression that they know they have a big number of players who like to attack and who have been raised on a diet of constructive methods.

So although one cannot guarantee a great deal in football nowadays especially when one is dealing with opposing clubs I am confident that we shall see a fine, open match this afternoon.

THE DUNFERMLINE GAME

It should be a vastly different type of game from what we had last Saturday. I have no wish to criticise Dunfermline for trying to make sure of a league point; after all they were (and are) in a perilous position. I cannot agree, however, with the critics who did a great deal more than condone our visitors' defensive tactics.

ONLY ONCE

Dundee have been drawn to play Celtic in the Scottish Cup at Parkhead only once before. Was it 5, 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60 years ago? (see page 6).



Some of them actually seemed to go out of their way to saddle Celtic with the blame for an admittedly disappointing match.

Some of our fellows did not play well, but in defence of them I am bound to say that once we scored it was not our responsibility to increase the entertainment value for our supporters. It was Celtic's job once they were in the lead to make certain

CELTIC APPROACHING 300th SCOTTISH CUP TIE

The Record against Dundee

If Celtic reach the semifinal stage of this season's Scottish Cup—and to do that they have to win another tie as well as beat Dundee in the fourth round—they will play in their 300th tie in the national knock-out competition.

This afternoon Dundee are Celtic's 298th Scottish Cup opponents (we exclude replayed ties). Of the 297 ties Celtic have played—the first against Shettleston in season 1888-89, the last against Albion Rovers three weeks ago—10 have been against Dundee. Celtic have won eight (two in replays); Dundee have won two.

THE FIRST

It is interesting to note that the first Scottish tie between the clubs—in the third round in 1895—was won by Dundee by 1-0 on their own ground. Only a few months afterwards Celtic thrashed a Dundee side seriously handicapped through injury by 11-0 in a league match at Parkhead. That score remains a Scottish League record margin.

The captain of the Celtic team of the day was James Kelly, later to become chairman of the club and father of Sir Robert Kelly, who after many years as chairman became first president of Celtic shortly before his death last September.

John Thomson's start at Dundee

Speaking of goalkeepers and their initiation in top-class football, we remember that the greatest Celtic goalkeeper of all, John Thomson, played his first match for the club on Dundee's ground. Celtic lost 0-1. On the following Saturday the young Thomson was again in goal at Dens Park in a third round Scottish Cup tie. He played splendidly, and Celtic went on to win the Cup.

The last Celtic-Dundee tie was in March, 1970 when goals by Lou Macari and Bobby Lennox to one by Gordon Wallace took Celtic into the final. The teams were:—

Celtic—Williams; Hay, Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill, Brogan; Johnstone, Macari, Wallace, Callaghan, Lennox. (Twelfth man, Auld).

Dundee—Donaldson; Selway, Houston; Steele, Easton, Stewart; Bruce, Kinninmonth, Wallace, Scott (J), Campbell. (Twelfth man, Georgeson).

Referee—W. J. Mullan (Dalkeith).

MEMORABLE

The 1925 final is memorable for several reasons. One was the extraordinary brilliant individualist goal by Patsy Gallacher. Another is that the winning goal was scored in his first final by Jimmy McGrory, now Celtic's public relations officer. A former Celtic player, Davie McLean, scored the Dundee goal—the first of the match.

Dundee's second and only other Scottish Cup victory over Celtic was gained in January, 1947 when these teams competed at Dens Park:—

Dundee—Bennett; Follon, Ancell; McKenzie, Gray, Smith; Gunn, Pattillo, Turnbull, Ewen, Juliusen.

Celtic—Miller; Hogg, Mallan; Lynch, Corbett, Milne; Docherty, Kiernan, Rae, McAloon, Evans.

Referee—J. M. Martin (Ladybank).

Erich Ewen and Ronnie Turnbull scored for Dundee; Gerry McAloon scored Celtic's goal.

The second of the three ties since the Second World War, in February, 1966, was won by a Celtic eleven all of whom have played for Scotland's full International team but only four of whom still play for Celtic. The teams were:—

Dundee—Arrol; Hamilton, Ryden; Cooke, Easton, Stuart; Penman, Murray, Bertelsen, McLean, Cameron.

Celtic—Simpson; Craig, Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill, Clark; Johnstone, McBride, Chalmers, Auld, Hughes.

Joe McBride and Steve Chalmers were the scorers. Playing his first game for Dundee that Wednesday was John Arrol, who only last Saturday was a first-class goalkeeper for Dunfermline Athletic in the league match at Parkhead.

The Luck of the Draw

This seems a most appropriate time to correct several inaccurate statements in recent weeks concerning Celtic's luck in ballots for the Scottish Cup.

Here are some of the facts.

The last time Celtic were drawn away from home was in the second round in season 1968-69 when they played Clyde. Since then Celtic have been nine times in the ballot (exclusive of semifinals) and Dundee are the ninth club in succession to visit Celtic Park.

Since the 1969 ballot which took Celtic to Shawfield Celtic have played in 18 Scottish Cup matches (including four replays and eight games on neutral ground).

The only occasion on which Celtic have played a Scottish Cup match outside of Glasgow since they drew with Hearts at Tynecastle in the third round in 1966 was last season's second round replay at Dunfermline.

Today's game will be Jock Stein's 39th Scottish Cup game as manager of Celtic. His first was a semifinal against Motherwell

at Hampden in 1965. Next season Celtic were away to Dundee and Hearts in successive rounds. The only other away ballots since have been at Firhill and Shawfield in successive rounds in 1969.

So of the 38 Scottish Cup matches (nine of them replays) no fewer than 35 have been played in Glasgow.

AS A PLAYER

In contrast is Mr. Stein's Scottish Cup experience as a player in season 1953-54 when he captained the Celtic side who won the trophy. In that season Celtic did not play a single Cup match at Celtic Park and none in Glasgow until they reached the semifinal. They had a bye in the first round and then played at Falkirk, Stirling, and Hamilton before the semifinal.

That is the only instance of Celtic reaching the final without playing once on their own ground—and they have been in 35 finals!
