JOCK STEIN says . . .

CELTIC and Dundee United generally provide a first-class football match whenever or wherever they meet. I am not swayed to this opinion by the result of our last match with United, the league game at Celtic Park in December in which Celtic struck peak form and our visitors were heavily defeated by 7-2.

I can recall other games at Parkhead and at Tannadice in which the standard of entertainment has been high—and I include matches which have not ended in Celtic's favour.

ATTACKING FOOTBALL

The reason for Celtic and United playing as they do when they meet is, I feel sure, that both clubs always try to play attacking football. There is not so much tight marking as there is in other matches and therefore there is a flowing, free type of game in which the players get the chance to express their skill.

A cup-tie is different from a league match, of course, in that there is greater likelihood of teams going out for goals because the tie has to be won sooner or later; you can't be content with a draw, though you will be fairly happy if it has been gained on your opponents' ground.

United must have learned a great deal from the league match at Celtic Park. I am sure they will be in better fettle this afternoon in the cup-tie; before they came here in the league they had had a very hard programme on difficult pitches.

We in our turn will not be paying any attention to the fact that we won so easily in December. One or two of our players have not been pushed hard in recent weeks because they were not just 100 per cent fit. A rest will surely have done them a lot of good, and I am looking forward to



a return to fine form of the whole team.

In welcoming Manager Jerry Kerr, his directors and players to Celtic Park today I should emphasise to them that many Celtic supporters were full of praise for the manner in which the United players took their league defeat.

I would also like to ask our supporters to show their appreciation of United's sportsmanship when the visiting players take the field today. We should not expect an easy victory despite the league result, but I think we can reasonably expect a very good match played in the best spirit.

Dundee United's First Parkhead Cup Tie

DUNDEE UNITED have played many times at Celtic Park in league games but they visit us here this afternoon on Scottish Cup duty for the first time.

They and the other United from Ayr are the only first division clubs who have not played a Scottish Cup tie at Celtic Park.

This will be only the third Scottish Cup tie between Celtic and Dundee United, for the clubs have met only twice at Tannadice Park in the national knock-out competition.

21 YEARS AGO

It is only in recent years that United have made much impact in the Scottish Cup, though older Celtic supporters will consider that they made impact enough 21 years ago

this month when they knocked Celtic out in the first round.

The first Dundee United-Celtic Scottish Cup tie was played at Tannadice on Wednesday, February 4, 1931. It was one of several second-round ties that had been postponed four days earlier because snow and ice had made pitches unplayable.

Celtic won the match—a very well contested one—3-2, the winning goal against their second-division opponents coming from a free kick taken by Charlie Napier 15 minutes from time.

The teams were:

DUNDEE UNITED — McCallum (W); Taylor and Penson; Milne, Gardiner and Harley; McCallum (D) and Williamson; Bennett; Kay and Cameron.

CELTIC—Thomson (J); Cook and McGonagle; Wilson, McStay and Geatons; Thomson (R) and Thomson (A); Hughes; Scarff and Napier.

Referee—P. Craigmyle (Aberdeen).
The other goals were scored by Kay (14 minutes) and Bennett (20) for United and Scarff (16 and 67) for Celtic. On a pitch which was churned up badly Celtic had a slight

Improvement In Recent Years

AS has been mentioned it is only in recent years that Dundee United have done even reasonably well in the Scottish Cup. Since the competition was resumed in 1946-47 after the Second World War until 1961-62 inclusive they were knocked out in the first round (or in their first tie) nine times and in the second round (or the equivalent) five times. So only twice in 16 attempts did they get through as far as the third round (or the equivalent).

Starting in season 1962-63, however, they have made considerable improvement. In that season they reached the semi-final, in which at Hampden they lost 5-2 to Rangers. Doug Smith, Denis Gillespie and Ian Mitchell of the beaten side are still regular first-team players for United. Their centre forward that day was Neilly Mochan, who had joined them from Celtic and who is now Celtic's trainer.

Only once since have they been eliminated in the first round. They again reached the semi-final in 1967 but were beaten 1-0 by Aberdeen at Dens Park. Last season they went out 2-3 to Morton at home in a quarter-final tie.

DUNDEE UNITED'S manager, with the full support of his directors, paid Celtic a handsome tribute after this season's league match between the clubs at Celtic Park. Celtic won 7-2 and were described by Mr. Kerr as being that night (December 17) "the finest club side in the world."

Celtic's officials in their turn complimented the United players for their having taken the heavy defeat in most sportsmanlike fashion.

The man of the match was Jimmy Johnstone, though he did not score. The Celtic goals came from Wallace (2), Auld, Hood, Hughes, Murdoch and Gemmell (penalty). United's scorers were Mitchell (penalty) and Gordon.

advantage in stamina, even though Willie Hughes, dazed through a head injury suffered in the first half, played all of the second 45 minutes on the left wing.

At the end of that season United won promotion but they remained in the first division only one season.

From 1932 onward they were in the second division, so their defeat of Celtic in the first round on January 22, 1949, was most unexpected, even though the game was at Tannadice and Celtic were at that time no world-beaters.

United not only won 4-3 but they had 3 goals disallowed — McKay (2, one from a penalty kick), Dickson and Cruickshank scored the home side's goals and Gallacher (2) and Tully scored for Celtic. The teams were:
