Some of our Russian guests will not be strangers to Glasgow because our clubs have been paired together twice in European Cup contests in the last six years.

Considering the two previous games in Glasgow resulted in a win for each club, tonight's Challenge Match should be a very interesting and exciting encounter.

I would also like to congratulate our visitors who have recently won the Russian championship for the fifth time since 1961 and in so doing qualifying for the 1972-73 European Cup tournament.

It is to be hoped that our visitors will enjoy their brief visit to Glasgow and that the game will prove to be a memorable one.

Some Facts About Our Visitors

Capital of the Ukraine province, Kiev is the third largest city in Russia, and has a population of just under a million. Founded in the 1920's Dynamo is Kiev's only major soccer club.

Dynamo come to Glasgow tonight, having completed their season, as part of a keep-playing tour during the enforced winter shut-down of Russian football.

Most of the Dynamo players have joined the club from junior teams in the city guided by coaches who are attached to the senior club.

Like all Russian clubs, Dynamo Kiev is part of a massive sports organisation with a membership of thousands participating in every kind of sport. Kiev Dynamo's stadium holds 35,000 spectators, but important matches are staged in the National Stadium which has a capacity of 75,000.

Dynamo players are given unlimited time off work for training and playing but they are paid by their employers.

The only salaried men in Soviet football are the full-time coaches who are paid by the sports organisation out of membership fees.

THE SOCCER MEN OF KIEV

Dynamo Kiev have won the Russian football championship this season for the fifth time since 1961, but the club had a long period in the soccer wilderness before success came their way. Formed in 1927, the closest Dynamo came to winning a major competition before the war was in 1936 when they were runners-up in the league championship.

In the immediate post-war years they seemed no nearer the breakthrough, but everything was forgiven by their supporters in 1954 when they won the "All Union Soccer Cup" or Russian Cup as we would describe it.

It's worth mentioning that Kiev's 1954 cup win was the only occasion between 1950 and 1960 that the cup or league championship had been wrested from the monopoly of the Moscow teams.

Dynamo's next success wasn't until seven years later when they won the Russian league championship for the first time.

Since the advent of the 'sixties, however, the fortunes of the Kiev side have changed dramatically. They followed their 1961 title win with further cup successes in 1964 and 1966 and followed this with league championship triumphs in 1966, '67 and '68. Their cup and league "double" success of 1966 was the first clean sweep since 1960 (Moscow Torpedo) and it hasn't been achieved again since.

Previous Encounters with Dynamo

This meeting between Celtic and Dynamo Kiev will be a "rubber" match with both teams going all out to win.

They have met four times with each team winning at Parkhead and both matches in Russia being drawn.

An interesting scoring line shows that Tommy Gemmell scored in both games in the Cup Winners' Cup in 1966, and Bobby Lennox did likewise in the European cup clashes in 1967.

First that Cup Winners' match on January 12, 1966, at Parkhead.

The teams were:—

Celtic—Simpson, Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, Cushley and Clark; Johnstone and Gallagher, McBride, Chalmers and Hughes.

Kiev—Bannikov, Shchenikov, Sosnikhin; Ostrovsky, Myrdeid, and Turyanchik; Brazilevitch, Syerychryenkov, Puzach, Biba and Khmelnitski.

This was a match the Russians were determined to hold level at all costs.

Their dour defenders gave little away as Celtic tried everything in their power to score.

Eventually, in the 27th minute, Tommy Gemmell, that European match specialist, opened the scoring from all of 35 yards.

The goalkeeper appeared to have the shot covered as he moved across goal but suddenly it seemed to come alive off the turf and edged in at the post.

This was the breakthrough that was needed, but even then Celtic struggled to find a way past this resolute defence.

All the forwards tried in vain to get through but their shooting was off-target and even when it was "on" they failed to beat Bannikov.

Even a penalty award went abegging when John Hughes blasted high over the bar from the 12 yard spot.

Then Bobby Murdoch took a hand in the shooting proceedings.

In the 64th minute he took a pass from Gemmell to squeeze the ball in at the post.

Six minutes later he rammed the bar with a great shot and with six minutes to go he got a third goal after Johnstone and Gallagher had made the opening.

This game marked Celts 24th consecutive match without defeat.

As we know now Celtic went on to be eliminated by Liverpool who lost to Borussia Dortmund 2-1 in the final.

Now to the European Cup match on September 20, 1967.

Kiev—Rudakov, Shchenikov, and Sosnikhin; Lavchenko, Krulikowski, and Turianchik; Byshovets and Sabo; Medvid, Serebraninkov and Puzach.

Three of Dynamo Kiev's forwards, Anatol Byshovets, Vitali Khmelnitski and Anatoli Puzach, were in the Russian World Cup squad in Mexico and, in fact all three played in the tournament before being eliminated by Uruguay in the quarter-final.

Soviet football experts think that the present Kiev side is stronger than the team which won three successive Russian League championships in the mid-sixties.

With a defence that has lost only 17 goals in 30 games to back up their outstanding forwards, Dynamo Kiev could be a team to watch in next season's European Cup.

Football enthusiasts who remember the first visit of a Russian team to Scotland, when Moscow Dynamo played Rangers in 1945, still talk about one player in particular—goalkeeper "Tiger" Khomich. More recently the name of Lev Yashin would be mentioned in any discussion about the best 'keepers in the world.

A third name, that of Evgeni Rudakov, has emerged to replace these giants of the past as the top goalkeeper in Russia. The brilliant Kiev 'keeper has become established as the last line of defence in the 'National team and he has recently been voted Russia's "Player of the Year".

Some players and officials of the Dynamo Kiev party visiting Celtic Park tonight will have difficulty recognising the place.

The three massive developments at the ground, i.e. the reconstructed stand, the new enclosure and the covering of the east terracing have all taken place since the first visit of the Russian side in 1966.
