STATURE OF ROTTERDAM CLUB

FEYENOORD, founded on July 19, 1908, are one of the many clubs on the Continent who do not concentrate entirely on football. Baseball is their other chief concern. Yet they have a very fine football record. So popular are they that last season they played to an average home attendance of 50,000.

The club have about 15,000 members and donors. They run no fewer than 38 football teams. Two are professional and 10 are senior amateurs. There are 18 youth teams (age 12 to 18) and 8 schoolboy teams (age 8 to 12).

Feyenoord have been champions of Holland nine times. Professional football in the country did not start until season 1954-55. Since then Feyenoord have been champions four times—in 1961, 1962, 1965, and 1969. In the last six seasons they have had stirring duels with Ajax for the national championship. Ajax won the title in 1966, 1967, 1968, and 1970. This season the two clubs are again in close rivalry for the championship.

EUROPEAN CUP

Feyenoord's greatest year has undoubtedly been 1970. As national champions of 1968-69 they played in the European Champions' Cup in the following season. That was their fourth entry in the tournament. They beat Celtic in the final at Milan and qualified for a tilt at the South American league champions, Estudiantes, for the Inter-Continental (World) Club Cup. Feyenoord drew the first match in Buenos Aires 2-2 and took the trophy with a 1-0 victory in Rotterdam.

So they became only the third European club to win the Inter-Continental Cup, the others having been Real Madrid (1960) and Internazionale Milan in 1964 and 1965.

Celtic were the first Scottish club—and the second British club—to have played Feyenoord in the European Cup. The results of Feyenoord in the five tournaments in which they have competed are:—

1961-62—Gothenburg (a) 3-0, (h) 8-2; Tottenham Hotspur (h) 1-3, (a) 1-1.

1962-63—Servette (a) 3-1, (h) 1-3, play-off (Dusseldorf) 3-1; Vasas (h) 1-1, (a) 2-2, play-off (Antwerp) 1-0; Stade de Reims (a) 1-0, (h) 1-1; Benfica (h) 0-0, (a) 1-3.

The first-round defeat in this season's competition was most unexpected. The opposition, from a textile town in Roumania, qualified for the second round by reason of the rule that a goal scored in an away match counts double. They were easily eliminated in the second round.

47,000 SEATS

Feyenoord's stadium in Rotterdam has a capacity of nearly 67,000. There are approximately 47,000 seats in the stands which are of the double-decker type and go right round the ground.

TAKE CARE!

Spectators are requested not to run in any section of Hampden Park and to refrain especially from running or hurrying at the end of the match. It will be in the interests of everyone to move to the exits in an orderly, unhurried manner.

The manager of Feyenoord is Mr. P. G. Brox, the trainer-coach E. Happel, the masseur G. G. Meyer, and the club doctor M. F. W. Abarbanel. The members of the board are A. A. Couwenberg (chairman), I. Groeneweg (secretary), J. Visser (treasurer), and F. K. Blankemeyer, D. Kardux, G. G. Kerkum, and L. P. A. van Zandvliet

Ernst Happel was a member of the very good Austrian International side of the early 1950's, the team of such talented players as Hanappi and Ocwirk. The Roeckl-Happel full-back partnership played against Scotland more than once, notably at Hampden Park in 1950 when Austria won 1-0 and in Vienna in 1951 when Austria won 4-0. Happel's immediate opponent in the Hampden march was Celtic's Bobby Collins, who was in his first season of International football, and in the Vienna game, Willie Waddell (Rangers).

Feyenoord's World Cup Victory

NO club knows better than Celtic the value of Feyenoord's magnificent victory in the 1970 Inter-Continental (or World Club) Cup. After all, it was only two years before Feyenoord's great success that Celtic failed by the closest of margins to win the trophy.

Perhaps the sad experience of Celtic when they played Racing Club of Argentina and lost in a third, deciding match in Montevideo, Uruguay, was not to the disadvantage of our friends from Holland when they met Estudiantes, also of Argentina, in last year's final match between the champions of Europe and South America.

QUICK GOALS

After 10 minutes of the first Feyenoord-Estudiantes game in Buenos Aires the Argentine team must have thought victory was certain because they were two goals up. It was considered generally that Eddy Treytel, the Feyenoord goalkeeper, had not been without blame for the two goals. European visitors also reckoned that Estudiantes showed few if any signs during the early play—or even later in the game—of the bad sportsmanship that has marred many matches in which teams of Argentina have been concerned.

Feyenoord's famous Swedish Internationalist centre forward, Ove Kindvall, gave his side fresh hope with a goal in 22 minutes and Wim Van Hanegem, the tall, shrewd inside man who had played an outstanding part in the defeat of Celtic in the European Champions' Cup final in Milan earlier in the year, equalised in 66 minutes. In the end Feyenoord deserved—and were well pleased with—their 2-2 draw. Their team was:—Treytel; Romeyn, Israel, Laseroms, Van Duivenbode; Hasil, Jansen, Van Hanegem (Boskamp); Wery, Kindvall, Moulijn.

The match had been televised to Holland and the Dutch viewers were pleasantly surprised by the apparently sporting manner in which Estudiantes had played. Those who saw the second game in Rotterdam had a vastly different experience. The visitors tried

every trick of the trade to upset Feyenoord and to influence the Chilean referee.

The Argentinians went almost berserk when Joop Van Deale, who went on as substitute for the veteran Moulijn, scored midway through the second half. They suddenly decided that Van Deale should not have been playing at all because he wears glasses! The Argentinian skulduggery afterwards included breaking Van Deale's spectacles.

Perhaps the most pleased Feyenoord player was Treytel, who justified coach Ernst Happel's confidence in him by making several wonderful saves. Feyenoord won 1-0, and Happel made no secret after the match of his view that if a third game had been necessary (it was scheduled for Madrid) his club would not have taken part. Many Celtic "fans" will recall that it was only after a great deal of deliberation that Celtic decided to play a deciding game with Racing Club—a game which brought football into dire disrepute.

IN MILAN

We do not wish to detract from the merit of Feyenoord's 2-1 victory over us in Milan—it was thoroughly deserved—when we say that Celtic did not play anything like so well as they can. Feyenoord captain Rinus Israel headed his side's first goal which equalised Tommy Gemmill's opening score. Four minutes from the end of half an hour's extra time Kindvall scored the winning goal. AJAX TIE

Celtic meet great rivals of Feyenoord, Ajax, in Amsterdam on March 10 in the first leg of the European Champions' Cup third round tie. The match will be played in the Olympic Stadium before an all-ticket attendance of 65,000. Ajax's ground takes only 25,000 spectators and it has no floodlights.

The second game will be played at Hampden on March 24. Arrangements have been completed to play on Queen's Park's ground in order not to disappoint those who might have been "locked out" at Celtic Park. Ajax think that up to 5,000 supporters will come to Glasgow.

The tie with Ajax is almost certainly unique in one respect—neither club is using its own ground.

PEN PICTURES OF OUR VISITORS

TREYTEL, Eddy (Goalkeeper). Age 24. Joined Feyenoord from Xerxes/D.H.C. two seasons ago. Has played three times for Holland's national team.

GELMAN, Bram (Goalkeeper). Age 26. Joined club when he was 12. In 1968 loaned to Excelsior, another Rotterdam club; returned to Feyenoord at start of this season.

SCHNEIDER, Dick (Right back). Age 23. Transferred from Go Ahead (Deventer) in July of last year.

LASEROMS, Theo (Defender). Age 30. Played for Sparta (Rotterdam) and Pittsburg Phantoms (United States) before joining Feyenoord in 1968. Can play on right and left. Six full caps for Holland.

ISRAEL, Rinus (Central Defender). Age 29. Captain of team. Signed from D.W.S. (Amsterdam) in 1966. Thirty-six full Internationals for Holland. Scored first goal against Celtic in European Cup final in Milan.

VAN DUIVENBODE, Theo (Left-back). Signed from Ajax in season 1969-70. Nine Holland caps.

HASIL, Franz (Right-half). Age 26. Played several years for Rapid Vienna and Schalke IV (West Germany) before transfer to Feyenoord at start of 1969-70 season. Very good shot. Has played 26 times for Austria.

JANSEN, Wim (Left-half or Inside-left). Age 24. Local boy who joined the club's junior section when he was only 10. Professional at 17. Youth internationalist and now 16 full caps.

BOSKAMP, Jan (Forward). Age 25. Has several youth caps for Holland: like Jansen came to the junior section of Feyenoord as a boy. Strong shot in both feet.

VAN DAELE, Joop (Forward). Age 23. Wears spectacles during play. The man who scored the goal which beat Estudiantes in Rotterdam in the second game of the Inter-Continental Cup.

MAIWALD, Matthias (Centre-forward). Age 23. Transferred from D.O.S. (Utrecht) in summer of last year. Broke an arm in a car accident before this season started. Probable successor to Ove Kindvall.

WERY, Henk (Outside-right). Age 27. Formerly with D.O.S. (Utrecht). Joined Feyenoord in June 1968. Six Holland caps.

KINDVALL, Ove (Centre-forward). Age 27. Signed from Norrkoping (Sweden) in 1967. Has played 17 times for Sweden's national side, including World Cup in Mexico last summer. Consistent scorer; over 100 goals for Feyenoord. Shot the winning goal against Celtic in 1970 European Cup final. Is thinking of returning to Sweden at end of present season.

VAN HANEGEM, Wim (Inside-left). Age 26. One of tallest players in side. Transferred from Xerxes/D.H.C. in 1968. Strategist in attack. Scored equalising goal in the 2-2 draw with Eustudiantes in Buenos Aires in first game of 1970 Inter-Continental Cup. Twelve full caps for Holland.

MOULIJN, Coen (Outside-left). The veteran of the side at 33. Brilliant dribbler, slight build. Thirty-eight International caps for Holland.
