JOCK STEIN says...

The finding of real form by so many players at Dens Park last Saturday couldn't have happened at a better time, because this is the period of the season in which we have to make an all-out effort in three major competitions—the league championship, the Scottish Cup, and the European Cup.

I knew that this kind of form was still there and such experts as were inclined to write Celtic off in the championship must admit that it is. I do not wish to sound boastful about my club, but there is nothing comparable in football with the sight of Celtic in full cry.

I congratulate the men who did so well at Dundee, and though it may not be quite right to single out any particular player I must mention Bertie Auld because he had the most difficult task of them all, having been out of the side for so long.

If I have one regret it is the very small one that a big number of our supporters did not see the match at Dundee. I recall too that it was at Dens Park earlier in the season in the League Cup quarter-final that we played brilliantly for an hour. Perhaps our next display at home against tough opposition will give our "fans" a real treat. I do not treat our Scottish Cup opponents of today in any way lightly, but we must measure the worth of our successes by the recognised standard of the opposition.

HAMPDEN ON WEDNESDAY

I wish to commend to our supporters the Ibrox Disaster Fund match at Hampden



on Wednesday night. It offers all of us a chance to show our sympathy with the victims of the disaster. It also gives all supporters the opportunity to show that they can support for football's sake and not just for the sake of one team. My main concern is how Celtic supporters conduct themselves. Let us see them and Rangers supporters combine at Hampden in enjoying a game played for a good cause.

A SAVE THAT SAVED CELTIC

Queen of the South Cup-tie of 1927

Celtic and Queen of the South have been drawn only once before in the Scottish Cup. That was away back in 1927 when Celtic won 4-1 at Parkhead after a goalless draw at Dumfries. Then, as now, Queen of the South were a second-division club.

Perhaps some of the veteran followers of both clubs will recall that only a last-minute save by Celtic's goalkeeper Peter Shevlin gave his side a second chance.

Saturday, 30th January, 1971

Peter Wilson for Jimmy McStay was the only change in the teams who met in the replay four days later. This time Celtic won easily, Jimmy McGrory (2), Adam McLean and Alec Thomson having scored before McCall got Queen of the South's goal 10 minutes from time.

The replay took place in very unpleasant weather conditions, the wind being of near gale force. Indeed a section of the Grand Stand roof was blown down during the match. Fortunately no one was hurt.

VICTORY CUP

Nineteen years later the clubs met at Celtic Park in the first round of the Victory Cup and Celtic won 3-0. The teams on May 4, 1946 were:—

Celtic—Miller; Hogg, Milne; McPhail, Corbett, Paterson; Lynch, Kiernan, Gallacher, Sirrell, O'Sullivan.

Queen of the South—Anderson; Savage, Anderson; Fitzsimmons, Denmark, Haxton; Houlston, Armstrong, Dempsey, Law, Oakes.

Jackie Gallacher headed a goal in each half and Tommy Kiernan scored three minutes from time.

BILLY HOULISTON MEMORY

The young man who was Queen of the South's outside-right in that Victory Cup match was to become the club's most famous player and, when his playing career ended, a director of the club. He is Billy Houlston, who played three times for Scotland and four times for the Scottish League in the period 1948 to 1950 and who has the distinction of being the

only Queen of the South player who has been "capped" by Scotland.

His greatest International day was at Wembley in 1949 when Scotland beat England 3-1 and won the British International championship. Billy's strength, speed, and unbounded enthusiasm upset the English defence and played an impor-

QUEEN OF THE SOUTH IN THE LEAGUE

Queen of the South Football Club started in 1919 when Arrol-Johnston F.C., Dumfries F.C. and King's Own Scottish Borderers amalgamated and chose the fine-sounding and apposite title, Queen of the South.

They were elected to the third division of the Scottish League in 1923 and via the second division reached the top league in season 1933-34, having won promotion along with Hibernian, the second division champions, in the spring of 1933.

Queens made a surprisingly fine start in the first division by finishing fourth of the 20 clubs with a total of 45 points compared with Rangers' 66, Motherwell's 62, and Celtic's 47. Never since have they done so well.

LAST GAME WITH CELTIC

They held their place in the first division until 1950 when they were relegated. In the following season, however, they won the second division championship (on goal average from Stirling Albion) and stayed in the first league until 1959. Promotion followed in 1962, when they went up along with Clyde, but they were relegated again in 1964 and have been a Division II club ever since.

Their last league game—indeed their

last game of any kind—with Celtic was at Dumfries in 1964 when Celtic won 2-0. Earlier in the season Celtic had won 4-0 at Celtic Park.

In November of the previous season Queens gained their last win over Celtic and a most unexpected victory it was. In their two previous league games Celtic had scored 13 goals—they had beaten Airdrieonians 6-1 at Broomfield and St. Mirren 7-0 at Paisley—but they lost 0-1 to Queens at Parkhead. The teams were:—

Queen of the South—Farm; Morrison, Kerr; Irving, Rugg, Anderson; Hannigan, Martin, Frye, Murphy, Murray.

Referee—R. H. Davidson (Airdrie).

Murphy scored from a penalty kick in 42 minutes and player-manager George Farm and 6 ft. 2 in. centre-half Rugg inspired Queens in a stand against great Celtic pressure in the second half.
