JOCK STEIN says...

Celtic have had lots of fine matches with Dunfermline Athletic in recent years and I am fairly certain that there will be another one this afternoon. We meet them again, of course, in the Scottish Cup in a fortnight's time but that's the last of our concern—at the moment.

I have tried to impress on our players that they must strive might and main for every point from now on. Not only that, they must go for every goal they can score.

It is far from impossible that the league championship will be decided on goal difference, so every goal we score is of vital importance.

Dunfermline have never visited Parkhead in modern times in so lowly a league position. But they too have a great deal to play for. After this afternoon they will have our best wishes for league success!

We shall be meeting former colleagues, John Cushley and Joe McBride. Last time Joe played against us it was for Hibs, and not only did they win 2-0 but Joe scored both of the goals. I shall be very displeased indeed if he gets similar room and chances today.

IN MIDWEEK

I feel I must make reference to the mid-week game at Hampden and to say how glad we at Parkhead are that the public supported a good cause so generously. I hope that the Scotland victory will help the country towards success in the European Nations Cup.

But I am very sad at the reaction of a



not insignificant section of the supporters who cannot seem to be able to put first things first even on an occasion such as Wednesday's match was. Even before a ball was kicked, players—and one in particular—were being treated disgracefully.

I wonder if we shall ever have a real national eleven; I wonder too if we even deserve one.

DUNFERMLINE FIGHT FOR FIRST-LEAGUE PLACE

Dunfermline Athletic come to Celtic Park today in an unusually lowly league position—third-bottom club. Several weeks ago, however, they were in much more serious plight and looking certain to be relegated. Now they have at least a fair chance of maintaining their place in the first division in which they have played for the last 12 seasons—their longest first-division run.

The team now managed by Alec Wright have given Celtic a great deal of trouble in recent years both in the league championship and in the Scottish Cup. Not once, for instance, in the last 10 years have they failed to score in a league match at Parkhead.

CLOSE MARGINS

They have won only one and drawn one of those 10 games; on the other hand, they have lost five of them by only a single goal. Celtic have won three of the 10 matches by 2-1, three by 3-1, and two by 3-2.

Last season—exactly a year ago to the day—Celtic won 3-1 with goals by Willie Wallace, Lou Macari, and Bobby Lennox to one from Jim Gillespie. The teams were:—

Celtic—Williams; Craig, Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill, Brogan; Macari, Hay, Wallace, Lennox, Hughes.

Dunfermline—Arrol; Callaghan, Lunn; McNicoll, McGarty, Gardner; McKimmie, McLaren, Mitchell, McLean, Gillespie.

It is not unlikely in view of the changes at East End Park in recent months that only John Lunn of the 1970 team who visited Celtic Park will retain his position today.

SIX YEARS AGO

Dunfermline's last league win at Parkhead was by 2-1 in season 1964-65—a season in which they achieved a league double over Celtic. The last Dunfermline win in any competition on Celtic's ground was in 1968 when they knocked Celtic out of the Scottish Cup. Hugh Robertson and Pat Gardner scored the goals in a 2-0 victory which was the more merited because one of the Dunfermline players, Jim Fraser was badly injured. The teams were:—

TRANSFERS

Joe McBride is now, of course, a Dunfermline player after joining Hibernian from Celtic. By contrast Tommy Callaghan now wears the Celtic No. 10 shirt.

John Cushley (from West Ham United) and Ernie McGarr (from Aberdeen) as well as McBride have all been bought by transfer this season.

Sixteen in Succession

A fortnight ago Aberdeen's splendid run of victories in the league was ended by Hibernian at Easter Road. Dons had won their previous 15 league fixtures. This was not, however a record for the Scottish League. The longest winning run in the 18-club first division, which began in season 1955-56, was achieved by Celtic three seasons ago when they won the last 16 games of their league programme, having scored 54 goals and conceded only 7. The sixteenth victory was by 2-1 over Dunfermline at East End Park.

That win against Dunfermline enabled Celtic, who had earlier won the championship, to beat the previous 18-club league aggregate of points. Hearts had won the championship in 1958 with 62 points. Celtic's aggregate in 1968 was 63.

That figure will remain a record for at least another season, because both Aberdeen and Celtic, the only two clubs who can win the 1970-71 title, have already dropped a point more than Celtic did in season 1967-68.

DUNFERMLINE IN THE LEAGUE

Dunfermline Athletic have been in existence since 1907 and members of the Scottish League since 1921. They won the second division championship in 1926 and entered the first division in the following season. They have been relegated three times, but since they regained first-division status in 1958 they have kept their place.

Their best league season has undoubtedly been 1964-65 when they finished third, only a point behind the champions, Kilmarnock, who won the title, through superior goal average, from Hearts. Dunfermline's pointage was 49 to the 50 of Kilmarnock and Hearts; they won 22 and drew 5 of their 34 league games.

Dunfermline were also third two seasons ago with 45 points compared with the winning total of Celtic, 54.

Dunfermline's league placing since 1958 have been:—1958-59—Fifteenth; 1959-60—Thirteenth; 1960-61—Twelfth; 1961-62—Fourth; 1962-63—Eighth; 1963-64—Fifth; 1964-65—Third; 1965-66—Fourth; 1966-67—Eighth; 1967-68—Fourth; 1968-69—Third; 1969-70—Tenth.

They have won the Scottish Cup twice in 1961 (when Jock Stein was their manager and they defeated Celtic 2-0 in the final after a 0-0 draw) and in 1968 (when they beat Hearts 3-1 in the final). In addition they were beaten finalists in 1965 (when Celtic won 3-2).
