Some interesting facts about records

THE gramophone record was first conceived by a French poet and scientist called Charles Cros who described his idea in sealed papers which he deposited in the French Academy of Sciences on April 30, 1877.

The practical device, however, was not achieved until December 1877. Thomas Alva Edison developed the idea and his mechanic John Kruesi built the first successful machine which was demonstrated on December 7, 1877 and patented on February 19, 1878.

The first practical hand cranked, wax coated cylinder phonograph was made in America by Chichester Bell and Charles Tainter in 1886.

The fore runner of the modern disc gramophone patented in 1887 by Emile Berliner, a German living in America.

The BBC record library contains over 750,000 records, including 5,250 with no serial number. An Edison solid wax cylinder, recorded in Edison's laboratory and dated June 26, 1888, is the oldest record in the library

THE League Cup final which should have been played in December but was postponed because of the weather, took place at Hampden on Saturday, March 18, 1978. The game was heavily punctuated with a variety of fouls and this also contributed to the lack of cohesive and attractive football.

In the 18th minute the Celtic end erupted prematurely when a cracking Roy Aitken shot from 20 yards looked a certain scorer until 'keeper Kennedy finger tipped the ball inches round his right hand post.

Rangers took the lead when Gordon Smith managed to get in a cross which was crashed high into the net by Davie Cooper.

With just six minutes remaining, Celtic scored to level the score. George McCluskey pushed the ball through for Alan Sneddon to cross high to the far post and when Stewart Kennedy failed to divert the ball Jo Edvaldsson headed the ball into the net off the underside of the bar.

Extra time looked like failing to produce a goal until following a Miller cross MacDonald clashed with Peter Latchford and Smith dived to head the loose ball into the empty net.

THE 'Celtic View' of March 21, 1973, carried a front page headline of 'Two Doubts Tonight' followed by this story:

Kenny Dalglish and Jimmy Johnstone are the two Celtic stars with question marks against their names for the cup-tie at Pittodrie tonight. Kenny got a severe ankle knock in the Parkhead clash and a last minute decision will be made on the young forward who had a brilliant match against the Dons.

There is nothing physically wrong with wee Jimmy Johnstone but manager Jock Stein has the very difficult task of deciding if the mood and the atmosphere are going to be right for Johnstone tonight. That controversial ordering off decision may have left its mark on Jimmy who has been striving to find his true form and found it against the Dons before that tragic moment.

The result in the replay was Aberdeen 0, Celtic 1, Billy McNeill being the scorer.

IN the 'Celtic View' of March 20, 1968, were the details of two league victories as Celtic kept up the pressure on Rangers at the top of the League. The first of these, played on Wednesday, March 19, resulted as follows:

Celtic 4 (Wallace 3, Lennox), Airdrieonians 0 — Celtic: Simpson; Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill and Brogan; Johnstone and Lennox; Wallace; Gallagher and Hughes. Twelfth man: Chalmers.

The result, team and scorers of the next match, at Brockville Park three days later was: Falkirk 0, Celtic 3 (Gemmell, Wallace, Lennox) — Celtic: Simpson; Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeill and Brogan; Johnstone and Lennox; Wallace; Gallagher and Hughes. Twelfth man: Chalmers.

Manager Jock Stein wrote in the 'View': "Celtic have rarely played in worse conditions than those they experienced at Falkirk. Though we had the gale behind us in the first half we had no advantage of it. So, though we had only a Tommy Gemmell penalty-kick to show for our efforts.

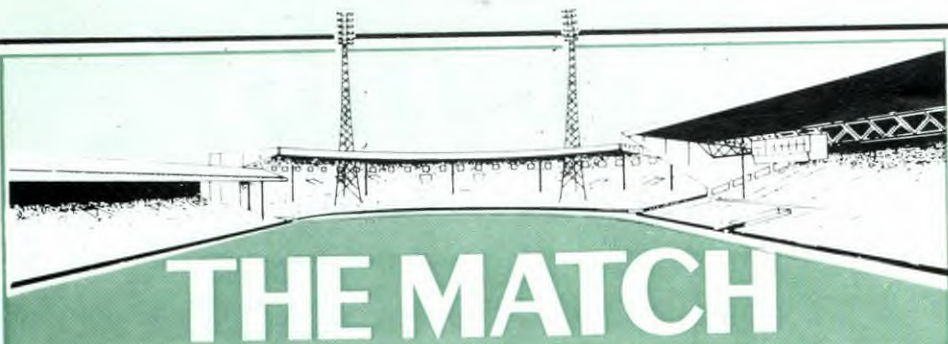

FLASHBACK

RANGERS have been to Celtic Park once this season. Here is how that match went.

The match started evenly and just as Celtic looked to be pushing forward on the 15 minute mark, things changed. Rangers broke forward and won a corner. Robert Prytz stepped up to take it and his cross made its way into the goal.

Two minutes later Paul McStay scored the equaliser in his first Old Firm match. Paul, himself, had left the defence helpless with a through pass to Murdo MacLeod. Murdo's shot was slowed down, but not stopped, by Jim Stewart and there was Paul to help it across the line.

In the 40th minute Davie Cooper headed past Pat Bonner to give Rangers the lead again.

In the 67th minute Paul McStay sent another of his telling passes through to Frank McGarvey on the edge of the box. Frank took his time and show low into the net.

With just three minutes remaining Murdo MacLeod scored the winner for Celtic.
