JOCK STEIN says...

There is an immediate objective for the Celtic team today—a place in the semi-finals of the Scottish Cup. The draw has favoured us in that we are at home to a second division club and we shall have the great advantage of having the vast bulk of the spectators behind us.

We must, of course, remember—and remember well—the exploits of Raith Rovers in earlier rounds; the victories over first division clubs in St. Johnstone and Clyde prove that the Fife club have a lot of ability and also the will to win.

LOOKING AHEAD

None of us can be satisfied with the recent play of our team. I have wondered for some time if too many minds are not on apparently more important things to come—such as the European Cup match against Ajax. I do not blame the players if they have this outlook. Rather do I think that the absence of top-class opposition in the European Cup has been unfortunate in that the players are aware that what they have to meet in Ajax will be a really new tough experience for them.

We have tried by bringing Feyenoord to Glasgow to give the team a chance to test themselves against world-class opposition but nothing is equal to the proper competitive game.



While, as I have indicated, nothing matters this afternoon except the Scottish Cup I hope that we can get from this match an inspiration for the Ajax tie on Wednesday in Amsterdam. One way or the other nobody at Celtic Park is in any doubt about the significance of the match with Raith Rovers.

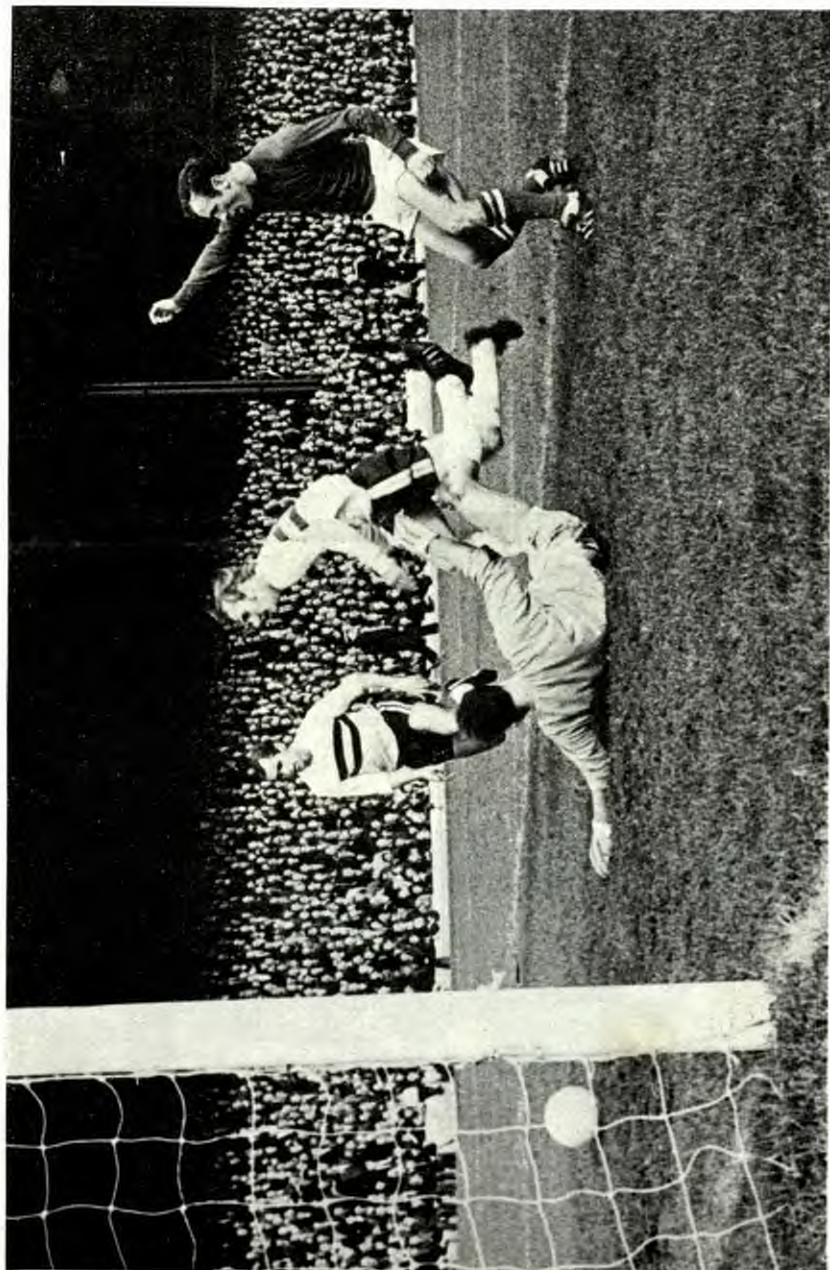

LAST CELTIC-RAITH ROVERS GAME

Bobby Lennox scores the third goal in the last Celtic-Raith Rovers match. The occasion was a league game at Celtic Park on October 4, 1969 and Celtic won 7-1 (A picture of another goal, the fourth, scored by Willie Wallace, is on page 6).



CELTIC AND RAITH ROVERS IN THE SCOTTISH CUP

The quarter-final tie this afternoon at Celtic Park will be the sixth Scottish Cup match between the clubs. Celtic have won all five of the previous ties, and each time they have met Raith Rovers they have gone on to the final. The five matches have resulted:—

1908—Celtic 3-0 Kirkcaldy Third Rd.
1923—Celtic 1-0 Celtic Park Fourth Rd.
1951—Celtic 3-2 Hampden Semi-final
1961—Celtic 4-1 Kirkcaldy Third Rd.
1963—Celtic 5-2 Ibrox Semi-final

Duncan MacKay (2, both penalty-kicks), John Divers, Steve Chalmers, and Frank Brogan scored for Celtic and Tommy McDonald and Bobby Giffillan for Rovers.

PROTEST

In the first three of those five years Celtic won the trophy; in the two other years they lost the final after a replay. Celtic have won the Scottish Cup 20 times; Raith's best performance in the competition was reaching the final in 1913 (when they lost 0-2 to Falkirk at Celtic Park).

The other Celtic-Raith semi-final was much more closely contested. Indeed when Charlie Tully scored the decisive goal in the 1951 match Raith protested strongly, alleging that John McPhail had impeded their goalkeeper. The teams were:—

Celtic—Hunter; Fallon, Rollo; Evans, Boden, Baillie; Weir, Collins, McPhail, Peacock, Tully.

Raith Rovers—Johnstone; McLure, McNaught; McLaughlin, Colville, Leigh; Maule, Young, Penman, Murray, Brander.

Referee—G. Mitchell (Falkirk).

The scorers were—Jock Weir, McPhail, and Tully for Celtic and Alec Boden (own goal) and Willie Penman (in 80 minutes—a minute before the winning goal) for Rovers.

Raith have been "giant-killers" this season. They beat St. Johnstone 4-3 at Stark's Park (Colin Sinclair scored all four of Raith's goals) after a 2-2 draw at Perth, where the visiting side were two goals down with only 13 minutes left. Then they drew 1-1 with Clyde at Kirkcaldy and won the replay 2-0.

TAKE CARE!

A NEW EXPERIENCE

I have been able to score quite a few goals in recent weeks for the reserve side, and though I have already got to know that playing in the second team is very different from playing in the first team I hope I can maintain my scoring form.

In my three years at Celtic Park I have been given the task of playing right up in front of the attack and also of playing a little behind the main striker. If I have a preference it is for playing a little behind, so that I can run on to the scoring chance. But whatever the boss outlines for me this afternoon I shall attempt to do to the best of my ability. I know I shall receive the full backing of the more experienced players in the team and I hope I can justify my selection and also please the supporters.

The last Celtic-Raith match in any competition was in the league on October 1969 when Celtic won 7-1. The teams were:—

Celtic—Simpson; Hay, Gemmell; Dalgleish, McNeill, Clark; Johnstone, Lennox, Wallace, Callaghan, Hughes (sub., Hood).

Raith Rovers—Reid; Gray, Lindsay; Millar (D.), Pollard, Cooper; Miller (A.), Falconer, Sinclair, Brand, Gillespie (sub., Bolton).

Referee—J. W. Paterson (Bothwell).

Jimmy Johnstone (2), Bobby Lennox (2), Willie Wallace (the second of whose four senior clubs was Raith Rovers), Tommy Callaghan, and John Hughes scored for Celtic and Colin Sinclair for Rovers.

Raith's last win over Celtic in any competition was on April 21, 1962, and it was a shock result. In winning 1-0 they inflicted on Celtic their first and only home league defeat of the season. The attendance was only 11,000—attributable partly to the fact that it was Scottish Cup final day.
