FOR THE RECORD

Celtic's first encounter with Waterford was thirty-four and a half years ago on the 29th April, 1936, when Celtic played in Kilcohan Park in Waterford. This was the first time the clubs had played against each other.

Guesting for Waterford that night was one of the Irish greats of all time, Paddy Moore, who had Scottish connections as he played for a spell with Aberdeen and his goal scoring feats are still talked about. In Waterford 34 years ago Paddy Moore was held scoreless against the Celtic side that contained several current Scottish Internationalists. In fact Waterford failed to score at all but they managed to put up a first class show holding Celtic to a scoreless first half before losing by the only goal of the match scored by inside-left McDonald.

Bobby Ancell was the Celtic guest that night and played at left back. Ancell is well known for his managerial connections with Motherwell and Dundee.

FIVE ASTONISHING YEARS

Like Celtic, Waterford have achieved five years of astonishing success and Waterford folk feel, rightly so, that the last five seasons have been kind to them. During that time, a club that laboured so long in the doldrums, reeled off one record after another until success has become accepted almost as a matter of fact.

In this five-year spell Waterford won the League Championship four times, the Top-4 (League Cup) three times, the League of Ireland Shield, and a Munster Senior Cup. They were beaten Cup finalists in 1968, and last year also reached the Shield Final, the Dublin City Cup Final, and the Munster Senior Cup Final.

In 1965/66 Waterford created an all-time record by winning thirteen League games on the trot, to beat a record that had stood since 1937. Their attractive football brought record crowds to every ground in the country, and in 1968 against Manchester United at Lansdowne Road they broke all records for attendance and gate receipts at a soccer match in Ireland, records which were only broken a fortnight ago when Celtic visited the same stadium.

Waterford's players are among the most travelled in Ireland, for they have played in England, East Germany, Turkey, Poland, Belgium, Holland and Spain.

Truly the last five years have been very kind to both Waterford and to Celtic and the supporters of both clubs are sincerely hoping that it is not all over for a long time yet.

Trainer Johnny Barnes is the most unique member of the staff at Kilcohan Park.

For though he has been connected with Waterford since 1934 he has never received a single pay packet. He flatly refuses to accept payment.

Barnes is the proud possessor of a League of Ireland championship medal, although he never kicked a ball to earn it.

Docker Johnny won a medal with local junior team Hibernians in 1947. But he never made the big time as a winger.

Instead he became team trainer and general factotum at Kilcohan. Four nights a week he rubs aching limbs, and if a temporary stand needs building Johnny is the man for the job. He is the biggest season ticket seller in the club, a tough little man who will turn his hands to just about anything.

How does one reward such a man? Even the odd trip abroad cannot really show gratitude.

John O'Neill found the solution. When the centre-forward accepted his League medal he duly handed it to a stunned Barnes as a memento. O'Neill had already had the medal inscribed with the trainer's name!

Now John Barnes has something more than the memories of triumphs and tragedies to remind him of a lifetime devoted to Waterford . . . he has his own special League Champions medal.

"It is my proudest possession. I would not part with it for the world," says the enthusiastic "backroom" boy who is one of Waterford's proudest assets.

The next round of the European Cup will be drawn in Paris on November 18th, but these quarter-final ties are not played until the spring (10th/24th March).

Undoubtedly the hardest tie in the second round was between Cagliari, of Italy, and Atletico Madrid, of Spain, and from Continental press coverage it was quite a match.

The Italians won 2-1 in a bitter, bruising battle but the Spaniards weren't slow to predict that it would be their team that would go through into the next round of the European Cup.

Cagliari's brilliant striker Luigi Riva was, according to the press, stopped at all cost by an unscrupulous Spanish defence.

The rage of the Italian crowd was obvious from the blanket of booing, jeering and whistling at the Spanish team as they made their way to the dressing room.

In these circumstances a one goal advantage is a very slender lead to take to Madrid but in Madrid they may have a referee strong enough to allow both teams to play with their undoubted ability.

Shay Brennan, the Manager of Waterford, was freed by Manchester United in August to take on this managerial post and return with pleasure to his home land to play and look after the team which has for the last three seasons carried off the Irish League Championship.

Like our Irish visitors we were delighted with this draw in the European Cup at this very busy time of the football season as it has saved us travelling to far-away places. Waterford were delighted because it meant a sell-out at Dublin's Landsdowne Road and the creation of an all-time cash return for this match. Waterford's own ground is at Kilchohan Park.

Six of the Waterford team played for the League of Ireland against the Scottish League at Parkhead on 2nd September and they will, in consequence, not feel strangers to the surroundings when they run on to the Park tonight. The players representing Ireland on that night were goalkeeper Thomas, full-backs Bryan and Brennan, outside-right McGough, centre-forward Hale and outside-left Matthews. You will remember the result that night was only 1-0 for Scotland.

When one speaks of Waterford one may think of many things but it is in the manufacture of high quality Crystal that Waterford has made its name in the world.

At a dinner given in the Shelburne Hotel in Dublin with the usual profuse Irish hospitality the gift to the Club was a large piece of Crystal which will have an honoured place in the Board Room at Celtic Park.

One of the astonishing results in the first round was indeed that of U.T. Arad of Rumania who knocked out the European and World Champions, Feyenoord. You will remember that Feyenoord had just beaten Estudiantes of Argentine for the World Championship and I do not doubt that their defeat in the first round of the European Cup was a reaction of these two very tough matches. We remember only too well Celtic's reaction after returning from South America.

We very much regret their defeat as we should have liked the chance to revenge last year's defeat in Milan in the same competition.

Football in Switzerland has had a most enthusiastic revival since their champions Basle beat the Russian team Spartak Moscou. They beat their closest challengers in the League, Zurich, four goals to two after being two goals down and before 40,000 of their enthusiastic supporters. Although beaten 3-0 by Ajax in Amsterdam they still do not consider themselves out of the European Cup.

After a bad start in the League, Saint-Etienne of France have regained their usual place at the top of the French League. This year Saint-Etienne were again unfortunate in drawing one of the top teams in the competition, Cagliari of Italy. Having dominated French football for so long the Stephanois, as they are nicknamed, feel rather bitter about making so little impact on the European scene.

Introducing Waterford

The team will be chosen from the following players:—

PETER THOMAS (Goalkeeper). Age 24, 5' 9", weighs 11 st. 2 lb. Started with Coventry Schools as centre-forward, did not play in goal until he had left school, and went between the posts because of a thigh injury. Coventry-born, his brilliant form soon attracted the attention of Coventry City.

SHAY BRENNAN (Full-back). Age 32, 5' 11", weighs 11 st. 2lb. Born Manchester and was eighteen years with Manchester United, with whom he won European Cup and English League medals. Has been a regular member of the Irish team for some years and was selected for the League of Ireland against the Scottish League a few weeks ago.

PAUL MORRISSEY (Full-back). Age 23, 5' 10½", weighs 11 st. Graduate of the local Crusaders, whom he captained when they brought the national under-15 trophy, the Evans Cup, to Waterford for the first time, in 1959. He is now in his fifth season of League of Ireland football, and has played all of them with Waterford.

PETER BRYAN (Full-back). Age 24, 5' 10½", weighs 11 st. 2 lb. Oxford-born, captain of Oxford boys' under-13 and under-14. Went to Botley Minors, then had eight seasons with Oxford United, six of them as a full-time professional, playing mostly at right-half. Won an F.A. Youth International Cup medal in 1962; holds the F.A. Preliminary Coaching Certificate.

VINNY MAGUIRE (Half-back). Age 29, 5' 10", weighs 11 st. Dublin-born, his first club was Bulfin United, from whom he went to Bohemians. Became professional with Ballymena United, then went to Ards, before spending a couple of seasons with East Rand United in South Africa. Returned to Ireland to join Waterford five years ago, and was appointed player-manager last year.

JACKIE MORLEY (Half-back). Age 32, 6' 0", weighs 12 st. 7 lb. Started with Evergreen United, from whom he went to West Ham at 18 for two seasons. Returned to his native Cork to spend ten seasons with Cork Hibernians, most of them as captain. Captained the League of Ireland twice in a run of 11 inter-League appearances. Transferred to Waterford in the middle of the season 1967/68.

JIMMY McGEOUGH (Half-back). Age 25, 5' 7", weighs 11 st. Belfast-born, holder of Inter-League honours, North and South, and an I.F.A. Cup medal with Derry City. Went to Sheffield Wednesday at 16 and had five seasons with them. Joined Waterford in December, 1965.

ALFIE HALE (Inside-forward). Age 27, 5' 7", weighs 10 st. 10 lb. Learned his football with St. Joseph's. Transferred to Aston Villa 1960 and went from there to Doncaster Rovers and Newport County. Holder of six Irish caps, three of them against Spain, and rejoined Waterford in August, 1966.

JOHN O'NEILL (Inside-forward). Age 25, 5' 7", weighs 10 st. 2 lb. A graduate of the Waterford Bohemians' Nursery, with whom he once held the individual goal-scoring record for any grade of football in the area and has been playing for League of Ireland since he was 16.

PHILIP BUCK (Centre-forward). Age 20, 5' 11", weighs 10 st. 6 lb. An apprentice professional with Oxford United at 15, and a member of the Oxford team that reached the semi-finals of the English Schools' Shield in 1964. Signed professional forms at 17, and last year turned down an offer to go to America with Detroit Cougars.

AL CASEY (Outside-right). Age 25, 5' 6", weighs 10st. 12lb. Plays in any position in attack. Joined Waterford from youth ranks, and had a spell with Cork Celtic before returning home in 1966. Won an amateur International Cap against Scotland in 1964, and is a printer.

JOHNNY MATTHEWS (Outside-left). Age 22, 5' 7", weighs 10 st. 3 lb. Coventry-born, learned his football with Coventry Youths' Club, and followed the footsteps of his father, Horace Matthews, who played for Coventry City in 1947 on the left wing. Received Inter-League honours this year against the Scottish League in Dublin.

Although he will be 33 years of age, Pele has promised the Brazilian Association that he will be a member of their squad when they travel to Munich to defend the World Cup in 1974.

The 1974 tournament would be Pele's fifth World Cup, equalling the record set up by the Mexican Goal-keeper, Antonio Carbajal, and establishing a new one for an outfield player.

However, the world may see Pele on television again before 1974 as Brazil are determined to stage a great international competition in 1972 as part of the country's celebrations of their 150 years of independence.

Brazil intend inviting 18 top football countries to participate in this tournament which would be divided into six groups of three.

The six group winners would play off against each other and Brazil would join the three victors in the semi-final of the tournament.

Dynamo Kiev, the Russian team who until recently dominated football in the U.S.S.R., has had an unfortunate season and fallen seven points behind the leaders, CSKA Moscow and Dynamo Moscow, who are jointly top with only four matches still to play.

The Russian League ends at the end of November.

Eusebio of Benfica had a fantastic game against Olympia Ljubljana in the first round of their European Cup Winners Cup-tie scoring five goals in the match which Benfica eventually won 8-1. Three of his goals were scored within five minutes, on the 27th, 30th and 32nd minute of the match.

Standard Liege are leading the Belgian League at the moment with Anderlecht, both with 13 points for 8 matches, but Standard Liege might lose two points of that total. These points were easily gained at Antwerp, but may be lost due to an incredible error of their trainer, Rene Hauss.

The Belgian Association allow Belgian Clubs to play in any one match three foreign players. A player who has stayed in Belgium more than five years is no longer classed as a foreign player.

On the 25th October, Standard played Cvelter, Takac and Kostedde as their foreign players. Loue Piote from Luxemburg, who has stayed in Belgium for a number of years, was not classified as a foreigner.

Five minutes from the end of the match which Standard were leading easily by 2-0 at Antwerp, Housse, their trainer, replaced Kostedde, one of their foreign players, by the Yugoslav Petrovic. "I though I was in order," explained the trainer, "since I replaced one of my three foreign players by another."

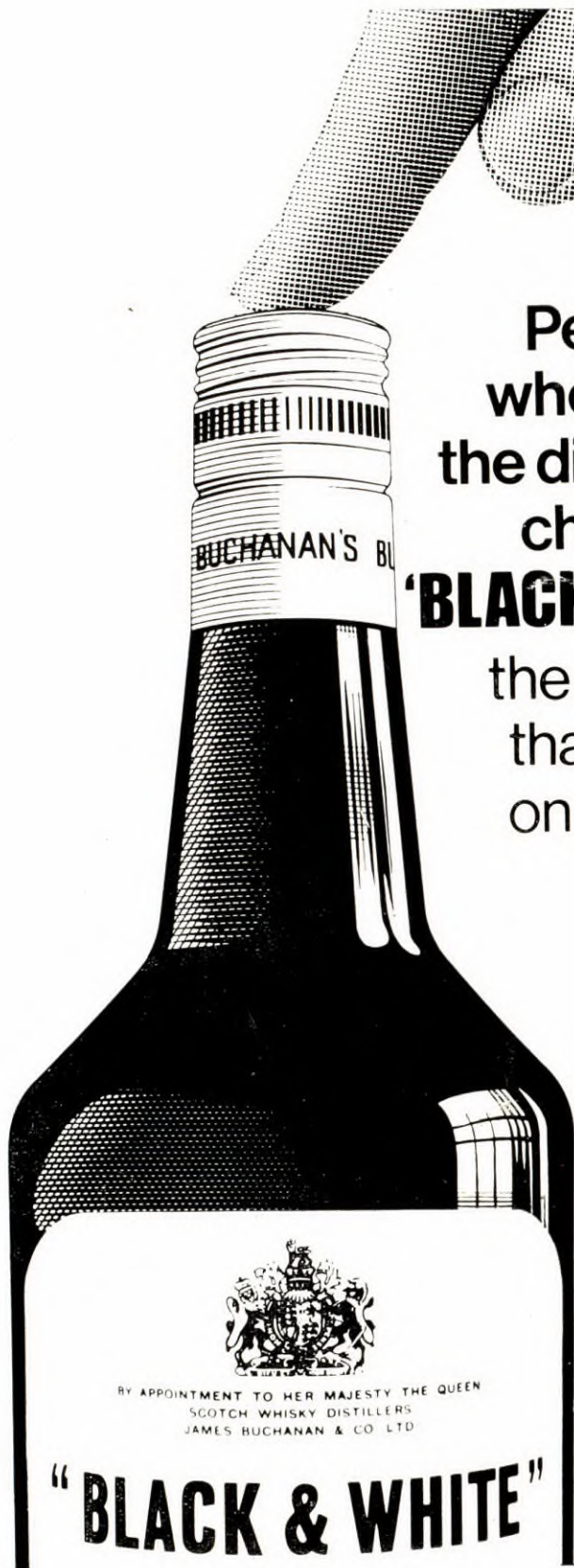
The actual rules state that one can only play three foreign players in any one match.

Antwerp, who are near the bottom of the Belgian League, protested as the points, if awarded to them, may save them from being relegated.

The whole thing has presented quite a problem for the Belgian Association.

Lev Yachine has announced that he will definitely be going into retirement in the month of May next year at the age of 42 after having played for 16 years in the Soviet International team.
