IF ever there was a players' manager it is surely John Hagart of Hearts who has taken the Tynecastle team to their first-ever Scottish League Cup semi-final against Celtic at Hampden Park this evening.

Hagart, a 38-year-old family man from Edinburgh, was chief coach with Hearts for two years before he applied for the job as manager in November 1974, when Bobby Seith resigned, and got it.

Hearts have never really looked back. There is a whole new wave of enthusiasm throughout the club and Hagart, with his almost schoolboy enthusiasm for the game must take all the credit.

To see him run on to the field to hug and congratulate his players in success; to see him punch holes in the sky when a goal is scored; is surely great encouragement to his players. They know he is behind them in whatever they do, so long as it is in the best interests of Hearts.

FLANK MEN

A qualified S.F.A. coach, with playing experience with Armadale Thistle Juniors, Brentford and Berwick Rangers, Hagart believes in attacking football with orthodox wing play. In little Kenny Aird and the ball-

playing Bobby Prentice, he has two of the best flank men in the Premier Division.

Quite remarkably Hearts have never before met Celtic in the quarter-finals, semi-finals or final of the Scottish League Cup in its 31-year-old history, so victory this evening would be something special for John Hagart.

The clubs, indeed, have met only 12 times before in the League Cup, having been drawn in the same section on six occasions. Celtic have returned eight wins, Hearts four.

EARLY RETURN

They last met in the League Cup sections last season when goals from Ford and Hancock gave Hearts a 2-0 victory at Tynecastle, but Celtic won the return tie 3-1 at Celtic Park when goals from Lynch, Edvaldsson and Glavin were decisive. Celtic won the section by two points from Hearts.

This is an early return to Hampden for Hearts as they reached the final of the Scottish Cup last season, when they went down 3-1 to Rangers. They have not won a major trophy since their League Cup win over Kilmarnock in 1962 when Norrie Davidson scored the only goal of the match.

So Hearts have all to play for, encouraged by one of the game's gentlemen, happy John Hagart.

Referee Hugh Gets His Second Hampden Tie

WHEN you do well they always ask you back, and that's why Kilmarnock referee Hugh Alexander handles his second League Cup semi-final on the Queen's Park ground this evening.

Hugh, a 41-year-old sales manager with a builders' merchant in Glasgow, made his Hampden break-through last season when he was in charge of the Montrose-Rangers semi-final.

CONSISTENT REFEREE

Now a fully-fledged F.I.F.A. official, there is no reason why this firm and consistent referee should not handle some of the major games in Europe in the years ahead. The players this evening will have no problems with a referee who believes in letting a game flow.

Success has not dimmed the ambitions of this man Stein

● Celtic manager Jock Stein has seen it all before. Since he took over from Jimmy McGrory on March 9, 1965, Stein and his players have set up a second home at Hampden Park.

Stein, the most successful manager in the history of the Scottish game, has taken Celtic to 11 successive League Cup finals, ten Scottish Cup finals, two European Cup finals and nine Championships.

This match with Hearts is the 136th successive League Cup tie played by Celtic, as they have been involved in every round since August 1964. So if Hearts win this evening it will end a run that will surely never ever be equalled.



Away from the roar of the crowd the work has to be done, and here at the Celtic training ground Danny McGrain and Paul Wilson find little to smile about as they lead their teammates on some conditioning work. Trainer Neilly Mochan is there to push them on.



The glory days recalled
by two great teams
who have never met
in a final

CELTIC 8 HEARTS 4

● WILLIE BAULD . . . scored three goals in his first final.

CELTIC have a record eight wins in the Scottish League Cup series—a figure equalled by Rangers last season—while Hearts have won it on four occasions, during a nine year period from 1954 to 1962.

Remarkably they have never met in the final of this lucrative tournament, which began in 1946, nor have they ever met in the semi-finals.

Their winning teams recall the glory days of Billy McPhail of Celtic, who had three goals in a 7-1 win over Rangers in 1957, and those of Willie Bauld who had three goals against Motherwell in a 4-2 win in 1954. Full statistics are:
