This week five of our players have been named in Scottish international squads, Roy Aitken being called into the full squad and Mark Reid, Paul McStay, Charlie Nicholas and Danny Crainie all being listed at Under-21 level, and Pat Bonner was named in the Eire pool.

Today we are hosts to Alex Ferguson's Aberdeen, who also figured highly in the international lists this week. As always we can expect a real thriller of a match between two of Scotland's most successful teams.

THE Celtic View of October 12, 1977, had two first team results to announce. The previous Wednesday in the League Cup, third round, first leg Celtic beat Stirling Albion 2-1 away from home. Doyle and Aitken were the scorers. In the League on Saturday, October 8, Celtic visited Firhill and lost both points in a 1-0 defeat.

On the reserve front the match against Partick Thistle had been cancelled but to keep in practice, the second team, under John Clark, travelled through to Stirling to play the University team. Alfie Conn was recovering from a knee operation and played for over 70 minutes of this match. He scored and was joined on the scoresheet by others Celts Willie Temperley and Bernie Godzik. Tom McAdam was ineligible to play in the League Cup tie so this provided some match practice for him, too.

YEARS
AGO

ON Saturday, October 7, 1972, Celtic were at home to Airdrie. Despite a Bobby Lennox goal, the teams shared the points, the final result being 1-1.

The previous Wednesday they had been at home for a second round, second leg tie in the League Cup. They won the tie 7-3 on aggregate, the score that evening being 5-2 in their favour. Celtic's scorers were Lennox (2), Deans, Davidson and Macari.

The reserves also had two matches around this time ten years ago. Both away, both in the League and both wins.

On Friday, October 6, Hancock, Wilson and O'Hara gave them a 3-1 win over Airdrie. Goals from Deans and Davidson provided a 2-0 victory over Motherwell on Tuesday, October 10.

In the Celtic View of that week, it was announced that the Glenties Club in the Gorbals were to change their name to honour a local hero who had been awarded a posthumous V.C. for acts of bravery in Germany shortly before the end of the war. They remain a very active club to this day under his name — James Stokes V.C.

On the front page we saw Jimmy Johnstone receiving a "Golden Boot Award" for being chosen in the best eleven in Britain.

YEARS
AGO

THE Celtic View of 15 years ago carried results of two games played in the previous week — one a European Cup tie and the other a League match.

In the European Cup Celtic travelled to Russia to play against Dynamo Kiev trailing 2-1 from the first leg at Celtic Park. The final score was 1-1, Bobby Lennox scoring for Celtic.

Celtic, having tried and failed to make up for their disappointing defeat at Celtic Park returned from their match in Russia to face Hibs in a First Division match and won 4-0, thanks to goals by Murdoch (2), Johnstone and Wallace.

On the same day Celtic Reserves travelled to Easter Road and goals from Chris Shevlane and Pat McMahon gave them a 2-1 victory against the Hibs colts.

Writing in the Celtic View manager Jock Stein said: "We are out of the European Cup, disappointed but not dejected. We are more disappointed in the manner of our exit than by the fact that we are out of the competition.

"Continuous stoppages for the most petty things never allowed us to get going at a fast pace and this suited our opponents who were content merely to hang on the 2-1 lead gained in Glasgow.

AS everyone will no doubt know by now, Celtic travel to San Sebastian to play Real Sociedad on October 20 in the first leg of the European Cup second round.

Experience tells us how unpleasant trips to see football in Spain can be, so we would like to reprint this message first seen in the "Celtic View".

Chairman Desmond White and the directors of the club are making a strong recommendation to the Celtic supporters to think twice about going with the club to San Sebastian this month.

This view has been expressed reluctantly, but with the best interests of the supporters in mind.

Last week Celtic had an incident-free visit to Holland but everybody who was in Amsterdam realises that the Dutch police were magnificent in their tolerance, good humour and understanding of the travel weary Celtic fans. Can any of us be sure of the same police approach in Spain?

The stadium in San Sebastian holds only 27,000 people and early talks with the Spanish club indicate that we will receive a very small allocation of tickets for the match.

Celtic are not putting a total ban on the fans but anyone who decides to travel will be VERY THOROUGHLY vetted by the club.

With memories of Manchester United's visit to Valencia last week still fresh in our minds, it is vitally important that nothing be permitted to happen that will cause embarrassment to anybody and particularly to the Celtic Football Club.

If you are having a fund raising night for Charity or just a social get together an excellent method of boosting attendances is to invite along a projection crew from Celtic Films.

The top prize is £1,000 and agents get a 10% commission on all the money they collect, with special agents prize money for wins of £100 or more.

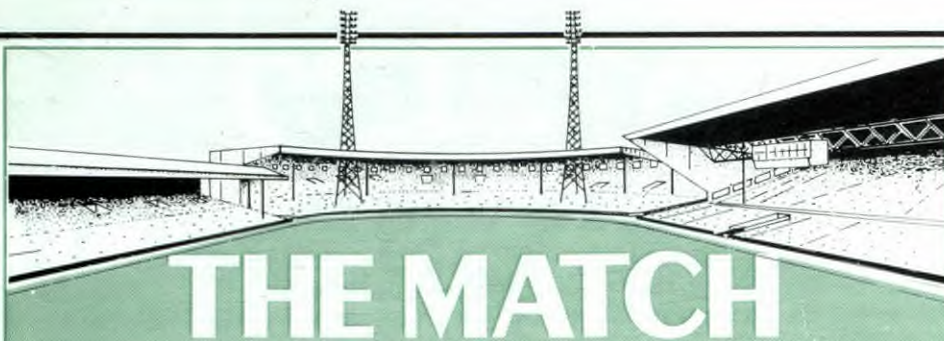

It was, of course, Aberdeen who put Celtic out of that same competition by a 1-0 result at Pittodrie last year. In the league however Celtic took six out of eight points winning 3-1 twice at Pittodrie and 2-1 at Celtic Park. Aberdeen won the other match 1-0.
