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Attack ... and maintain the flow of goals



FIVE GOALS at Fir Park and three at Tannadice has pleased everyone at Celtic Park. They've come as the result of the hard work that players have put into their training . . . and the aim is to keep up the scoring rate.

As manager of Celtic I want to maintain our attacking style. Our type of football — and the goals — will always be attractive to the fans.

Recently a section of the support came under justified criticism. I was one of the critics. Now I have to say that the fan behaviour has improved and is now the type that we are pleased to associate with Celtic.

I expect that this will be continued in today's match against Dundee United. If our midweek joust is anything to go by everyone in the stadium is in for a real treat.

Our Wednesday match was as good as anybody has seen. We tend to underrate our game at times, but Wednesday showed the high level of Scottish football.

United will be stern opponents this afternoon. They have a lot of talented young players and only our best play will allow us to build on our one goal lead to keep going the club's long and honourable record in the League Cup.

Whether or not we have Alfie Conn in action for this one will depend on a late fitness test. The position about another of our casualties, Ronnie Glavin, is more optimistic.

Next Saturday we meet Rangers and we welcome the fact that we don't have a midweek engagement before tackling them. It will allow players time to get fully tuned up.

One player who will be in action next midweek is Jo Edvaldsson. He turns out with Iceland's international side.

I did a bit of travelling myself early this week — to see Burnley in action. They are our next opponents in the Anglo Scottish Cup. It was a useful exercise.

UNITED AIM TO END CELTIC'S GREAT CUP RUN

DOWN 2—3 after the first leg at Tannadice of their League Cup second round tie with Celtic, manager Jim McLeod led a very determined squad to Parkhead this afternoon for the "second half" of the action.

The "first half" was a sparkling affair with well-taken goals, a missed penalty and near things galore.

In short, this afternoon's game looks like another one to boost the quality of Scottish football.

"A great game" was how manager McLean summed up the mid-week show. "The fans got their money's worth all right. Mark you the United fans weren't too happy about the scoreline.

"It is the case that we missed a lot of chances, including a penalty kick, as well as giving away a couple of daft goals.

"That you cannot do against any side — and particularly Celtic. Having said that there is just one goal between us and our position is quite clear.

"My players are determined to have a real go. It is our only course. There is nothing to be gained by playing it tight at the back or playing possession football across the park.

"We all feel — and genuinely so — that we have the chance to end Celtic's great run in the League Cup,

It's a splendid record, but it has to end some time. I feel United is the team to do it."

With Celtic manager Billy McNeill committed to an attacking policy the outlook is that the sides will continue the exciting fare served up in midweek — and again give the fans value for money.

The United players manager McLean selects from are:

Hamish McAlpine. Longest serving member of the present squad, he joined the club in 1966 and became the regular goalkeeper three seasons ago. Was team skipper last year and also took the penalty kicks.

Andy Graham. In his second season at Tannadice having stepped up from Johnstone Burgh. A tall and agile 20-year-old keeper with a bright future.

Derek Stark. This 18-year-old won his way into first team contention only in the last six months. Played almost exclusively at centre half with the reserves after stepping up from Junior football. When a vacancy occurred at full back early this season the youngster adapted himself well to the challenge.

Raymond Stewart. Another youngster who has arrived on the

United first team scene in the last few months. Former skipper of the Scotland Professional Youth team. A central defender, he grabbed his chance at left back late last season.

Paul Hegarty. One of the best central defenders in Scotland. Started his career as a striker with Hamilton. United paid £40,000 for his transfer four years ago to take the place of Andy Gray. Manager Jim McLean switched him with great success to his present role.

Dave Narey. Another product of manager Jim McLean's nursery. He is a fine reader of the game and his play has brought numerous offers from English clubs. Has played at Under 21 and Under 23 level for Scotland. Like his defensive partner Paul Hegarty he looks set for future international honours.

Alex Rennie. An experienced defender, he joined United on a free transfer from St. Johnstone. A handyman. He can play in midfield as well. Now fully recovered following injury late last season.

Frank Kopel. Another player of vast experience. Played in Manchester United's ranks alongside Pat Crerand and Denis Law before moving to Blackburn. Came to United in 1972 and was a regular first team full back until late last season.

Paul Sturrock. Another from United's group of young local talent who have made the grade in recent years. Capped at Under 21 level he has been a regular for the last three years.

Graeme Payne. Like many of the top Scottish forwards of the past he is on the small side, but makes up for the lack of inches with high ability. Has been a target for top English clubs and was one of the young United men who just missed out making a World Cup trip with Scotland to Argentina.

Bobby Robinson. Joined from near neighbours Dundee. Started the season in midfield and defensive roles.

Derek Addison. Joined from local Junior side, Lochee Harp, and is one of several players to make good with his home-town team.

John Holt. Another youngster heading for the top. A regular for three seasons he came to Tannadice from local under-age football.

Billy Kirkwood. Product of West of Scotland under-age football. He stepped up two years ago and made an immediate impact. Used mainly in a striking role he can also play in midfield.

Derek Frye. Since Andy Gray's departure United have struggled to find a regular marksman. Manager Jim McLean paid Stranraer £15,000 last month for Frye and hopes he can maintain his scoring touch in the Premier League.

Ralph Milne. This 17-year-old made a big impact in United's pre-season preparations and was brought into first team pool.
