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'The injury is behind me'

— says Murdo MacLeod



SO far this season has been a disappointing one for me as I seem to have spent so much time on the treatment table. For about five and a half months I've been unable to shake off a pelvic injury and have been a regular visitor to Brian Scott. During part of the season it was hard to even kick a ball let alone shoot.

Thankfully the worst of the problem seems to be behind me and I feel fitter than I have for a while.

My goalscoring record for this season reflects the frustrating time I've had as my goal against Rangers was only the second I've notched in a year. In fact this has been the longest spell since I came to Celtic Park of not scoring regularly for the club.

Although scoring against Rangers is always pleasant, that goal at Ibrox was a bit more significant to me as it was my

fiftieth league goal.

The first goal for a new club is important and my first goal for Celtic was scored at Easter Road in my third game. The ball was knocked out after a corner and I managed to hit it into the top left hand corner with my left foot. Obviously my goal in the 4-2 league title decider with Rangers is also extremely special and I'm always being reminded about it. Love Street has also been a special ground for me as I've notched some of my favourite efforts there.

The game against Rangers a week last Saturday, being so full of goals, reminded me of a 3-3 draw we played at Celtic Park five years ago. It's funny but I always seem to score the last goal in games with Rangers, the last game being the fourth time I'd done so.

A PREVIOUS MEETING

WHEN Celtic and Dundee met in the league on April 13, 1968 at Celtic Park the home side were on top of the league while the visitors were tenth in the old style 18-team First Division.

Celtic had scored 97 goals in 31 games and had 57 points, while Dundee's total was 56 goals and 28 points from 29 games. For the contest the teams lined up: CELTIC Simpson, Craig, Gemmell, Murdoch, McNeill, Brogan, Johnstone, Lennox, Wallace, Gallagher, Hughes, Sub. McBride (not used). DUNDEE Donaldson, R. Wilson, Swan, Murray, Easton, Stewart, Campbell, J. McLean, S. Wilson, G. McLean, Scott.

During the 90 minutes, Celtic managed to take their goals total in the league, past the hundred mark, scoring five times through Lennox (2), Hughes (2) and an own goal by George Stewart. Unfortunately for the Dundee man, his was Celtic's one hundredth in the league.

That was the tenth match in a row in which Bobby Lennox had scored for Celtic and took his total to 38, so far in that season. The visitors hit back twice, but the points helped Celtic to the league championship which they clinched two weeks later for the third year in a row.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF DUNDEE F.C.

THE club was formed in 1893 when two local clubs, East End and Our Boys, amalgamated. In 1895 the club suffered the record defeat of the Scottish First Division history — 11-0 at the hands of Celtic. In 1897-98 Dundee finished at the bottom of the league with only four points and almost the whole team packed up and left.

In December 1898 after playing four friendly games the club was forced to go into liquidation. The crisis brought out a number of old hands and a plan of campaign was drawn out and on December, 20th, 1898 the start of the present Dundee. At the end of season 1898/99 the club moved from Carolina Port to their present location, the agricultural land bordering Provost Road and Dens Road. The Grand Stand at Carolina Port was dismantled and transferred to the south side of the pitch at Dens Park.

The club's first real success came in

1910 in the Scottish Cup. In the final against Clyde they were two goals down with four minutes of the game left and equalised 30 seconds from the whistle. In a second replay they won the cup for the only time in their history with a score of 2-1.

In 1919 the club heard that a neighbouring Works were trying to buy part of the ground on the North side and although the club had nine years of their lease to run, they decided to purchase the whole place outright. The cost of the ground and the stand was in the region of £60,000 and the stadium was opened in September, 1921.

The following December, the old stand was burned down. In season 1937/38 Dundee were relegated and with football stopping on September, 1939 it was a long time until they regained their position in the top division.

PARKS OF HAMILTON
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In 1951/52 Dundee won a thrilling League Cup final against Rangers and the following year beat Kilmarnock in the final of the same competition. George Anderson brought Jack Cowan from Canada and Gordon Frew and Ken Zeising from South Africa. In 1954 Anderson decided it was time he should drop the reins and Willie Thornton was appointed manager following a line which started in 1903 with Willie Wallace who was followed by Sandy McFarlane, Alec McNair (ex Celtic) Jimmy Bisset, Billy McCandless, Rangers Irish Internationalist and Andy Cunningham.

In more recent years Bob Shankly, Bobby Ancell, John Prentice, David White, Lisbon Lion Tommy Gemmell, and Donald Mackay have followed Willy Thornton. Archie Knox took over as boss in December 1983.

Perhaps the most impressive time in the history of the club was the 1960's when in 1961/62 the league championship was won for the only time in the club's history. This was the result of team work as only 15 players were used in the first team, including such players as Alex Hamilton, Bobby Cox, Ian Ure, Andy Penman, Alan Cousin, Alan Gilzean and Hugh Robertson who all joined the club from the juniors or from school.

In 1962/63 Dundee United turned out to be a shock team in Europe beating such teams as Colgne, Sporting Lisbon and Anderlecht before falling to AC Milan in the semi-final of the European Cup. In 1964/65 they played in the Cup Winners' Cup, qualifying when they were runners-up to Rangers who had already won the league. In 1968 Leeds United beat them by one goal on aggregate in the semi-final of the Fair Cities Cup.

Also in 1968 Dundee were runners-up to Celtic in the League Cup and under the guidance of David White went on to win that trophy in 1973, when they beat Celtic by 1-0.

Dundee were relegated from the newly formed Premier Division at the end of season 1975/76 on goal difference, being pipped by Dundee United and Aberdeen who were equal on points. The club were reasonably successful in the First Division finishing in third place in 1976/77 and

1977/78 before winning the Championship in 1978/79 and being promoted to the Premier Division.

In season 1979/80 they were again relegated and Donald Mackay was appointed manager at the start of season 1980/81. Despite a poor start in the league they gained promotion and reached the final of the League Cup being beaten by Dundee United in a historic game at Dens Park.

In 1980 Ian Redford was transferred to Rangers for the club record fee of £210,000 and Cammy Fraser was purchased for the then record fee of £61,000, then Albert Kidd was purchased for £80,000.

1983/84 saw Dundee involved with the transfer tribunal when Ian Ferguson and Cammy Fraser left for Rangers at the end of their contracts; their respective fees fixed at £200,000 and £160,000. Archie Knox went into the transfer market and purchased John Brown (Hamilton Accles) for £50,000, Robert Connor (Ayr United) for £47,000, Tom Carson (Dumbarton) for £50,000, Stuart Rafferty (Motherwell) for £25,000 and Stewart Forsyth (Arbroath)* for £18,000.

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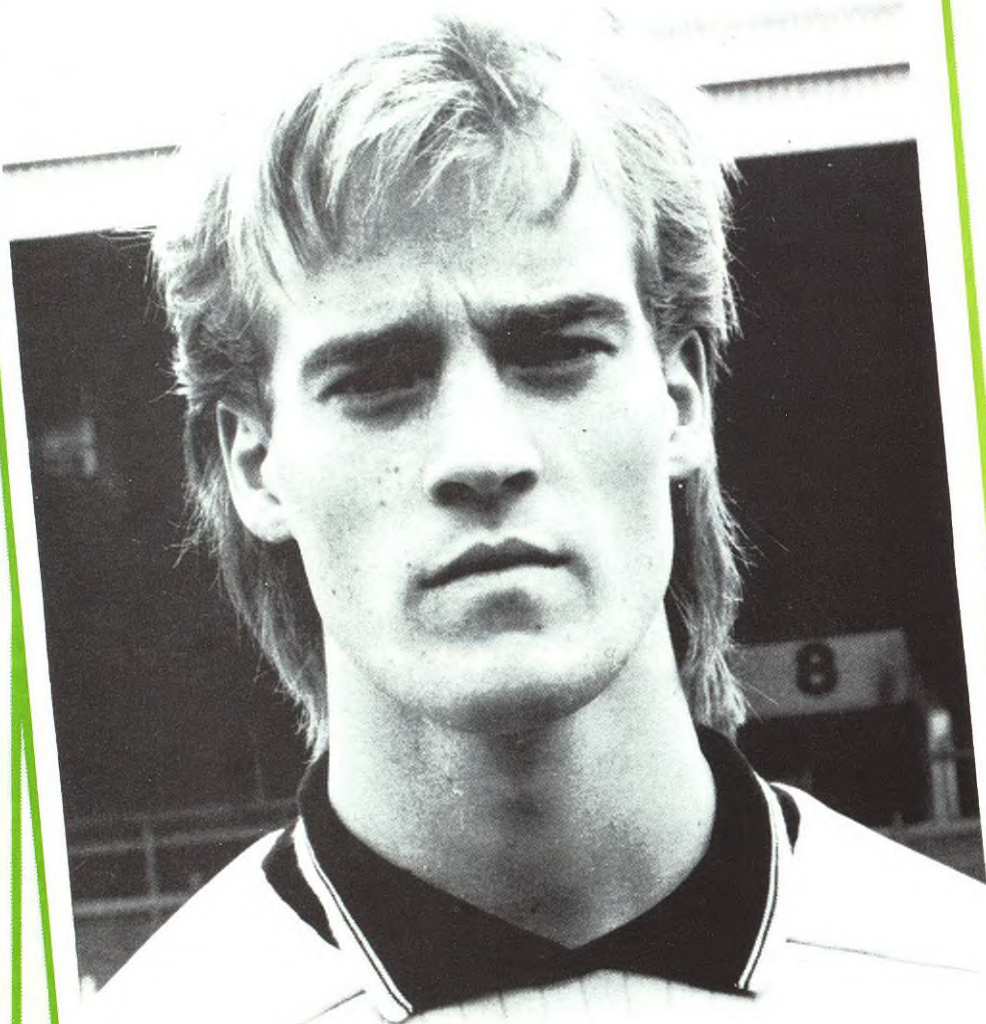
DAVIE MOYES and George McCluskey, both now playing their football in England, are seen in our top picture bearing in on the Dundee goal at Dens Park a few season ago.
