**CELTIC'S** title hic-cup against Hearts last Saturday preserved an enviable record for the Tynecastle side against Celtic in the previous three years. They, along with Dundee United, are the only side to get the better of Celtic over-all in league and cup meetings during that period.

Hearts victory on Saturday was their fifth against Celtic in those three years while Celtic have managed to win only three with six having been drawn.

The secret of Hearts success against Celtic lies in their all round determination to work hard for each other. They also possess three nippy front men in John Robertson, John Cluquhoun and Wayne Foster who do not stick to set positions but wander all over the forward line. Hence Billy McNeill's decision against Hearts in the Scottish Cup to field Derek Whyte in in the central defensive position. The manager was relying on the agility of his young defender to combat the menace of these three whose speed on the ground has often got the better of big defences. Speaking about the Hearts front men its sad to see John Robertson go to Newcastle for \$750,000 in midweek. This has temporarily reversed the trend of the big name English stars travelling to Scotland.

Robertson who, I'm told, is a life-long Hibs fan, is currently one of Scotland's best forwards and one of the cleanest strikers of a ball in the land. He'll do well for Newcastle and it will be interest-

ing to see how he'll team up with Brazilian Mirandinha.

Incidentally, according to a recent Clyde programme Newcastle's South American import has been slowly overcoming a personal battle to master the nuances of the English language.

It seems that in a recent game Mirandinha went down injured. On came the Newcastle trainer who said to the Brazilian: "How are you?" to which Mirandinha replied, "I'm well, how are you . . .?"

### DANGER ZONE

In Scotland it looks as though Motherwell have won their battle to remain in the Premier League. St Mirren, however, after their 2-1 away defeat at Dunfermline last week are too close to the danger zone for comfort. They are currently only four points in front of Falkirk who have a game in hand over the Saints.

Brave Dunfermline just couldn't quite make it. Their last chance was against Hearts at Tynecastle a week ago on Wednesday. They looked to be heading for a shock win which would have served the dual purpose of keeping alive their Premier League hopes and handing the championship to Celtic.

Sadly it wasn't to be as Hearts scored twice in the last three minutes to regain some pride after their Scottish Cup defeat.

Interesting to see our old friend Emyln Hughes sounding

off in a newspaper recently about various Scottish football personalities. As well as stating that Charlie Nicholas was too slow to be a good forward he also had a shy go at Billy McNeill. According to the failed sports quiz pundit, Billy knew little about finances and players when he was with Manchester City. Once again the facts prove Emyln wrong.

When McNeill took over at Manchester City they were an ailing second division club who had just been milked dry by the wanton profligacy of Malcolm Allison and John Bond. McNeill's task therefore, was to get City to Division One without having a penny to spend.

This he achieved in under two years. And, contrary to common opinion these days, McNeill did not take City back down again. When he left them to go to Aston Villa, the Manchester side were several places above the relegation zone.

**DURING** my not inconsiderable association with Celtic both as player and manager I have been involved in several memorable games and have experienced a fair amount of dramatic moments. Few though, could compare with the dramatic last few minutes of the Cup semi against Hearts a couple of weeks ago. Honestly, this side never ceases to amaze me. Just when you think they have exhausted their resources they produce yet another spur.

Of course, all that is recent history now and its to the Premier League challenge that we must channel our energies. Obviously last Saturday was a real sickener for many connected with the club. Not only did the lads fail to hit anything remotely approaching form, this occurred in one of the biggest matches of the season in front of thousands of our expectant fans. Perhaps though, too much had been made of this match; too much been written. Our unbeaten run had to end some time and, in retrospect, I'm glad it has done so before the cup final at the end of the season. Finally let me thank you, the fans, for your tremendous support all season. Numerous games have there been when your vocal support has pulled us through some difficult encounters. I'm sure that this afternoon will be no different. I'm equally confident that we can rely on your positive encouragement should things fail to immediately materialise today.

# Rogans re-emergence

**IF you've ever taken part in the bruising sport of Gaelic football, among other things needed is the endurance to keep on playing no matter how many bone-jangling tackles have assailed you throughout the match. And if you've had a taste of this sport you can be sure there will be many of those.**

Perhaps it's this hardness which has prepared Anton Rogan for a season such as this when he's taken some cruel knocks both on and off the field yet, as Sinatra would put it, brushed himself down and started all over again.

### ADVERSITY

The big Irishman whose thatch of fair hair was once a familiar sight on the Irish Gaelic football fields, is no stranger to adversity.

He had already suffered two broken legs before his football career had taken off the ground, yet didn't let this stand in the way of his desire to become a top level football player.

Signed from Irish club Distillery just over two years ago, Rogan made his debut against Hibs last January when he scored the only goal of the game. For several weeks he made the number three spot his own with some thrilling displays at left back. Then he was inexplicably dropped against Dundee before re-gaining his place towards the end of last season.

He played the first 16 games of this season before having to make way for Derek Whyte. His confidence seemed to have taken a knock and this wasn't helped by some of the boo-boys in the stand who began to subject him to their own special brand of "support."

Then came a substitute's appear-

ance at a crucial time of the match against Hearts in December. Celtic, chasing an equaliser were caught cold with minutes remaining when Anton failed to control a simple pass and allowed Galloway in to score. It seemed as if this likeable young man had hit rock bottom as he held his head in his arms in despair. It was then that he showed a hardness and maturity which belied his youth. He shrugged off that error and his strong running was instrumental in bringing about Celtic's first goal a few minutes later quickly followed by Paul McStay's late, late equaliser.

Since then he's slowly begun to chip away at the block preventing his regular appearances in the first team. And recently he reached his goal when Billy McNeill decided he could no longer leave him on the bench after he'd produced some outstanding performances as a substitute. Chief among these was his match-winning contribution to the recent Old Firm match when his second half appearance changed the course of the game.

### PERSUADED

He has pace, heading ability, is a ferocious tackler and is supremely fit, as witness by those lung-bursting charges up the left. Recently he has been 'persuaded' to carry the ball round the outside of his opposite number before preparing to cross. It's a lesson he's learnt and which has already yielded several goals in recent matches.

His attitude seems to epitomise what Billy McNeill talks about when describing the spirit which exists in his squad: "They work hard, they're prepared to listen and they're prepared to learn."

## What the papers say...

CELTIC'S first defeat in 32 games, a run that stretched back to October 24th last year, had the sportswriters looking for explanations as to why it all went flat for Celtic at Tynecastle.

**Alan Davidson** of the **EVENING TIMES** thought the game hinged on the personal midfield tussle between Hearts' Neil Berry and Celtic's Paul McStay:

"Undoubtedly Paul McStay has been the most significant on-field performer in the Parkhead club's drive towards the double of league title and Scottish Cup, but at Tynecastle he discovered the shackles placed on him by Berry impossible to shake off.

"Indeed, so effective was the big defender or midfielder, that Houdini himself would have found it difficult to escape his clutches."



**Glen Gibbons** of the **OBSERVER** highlighted the true grit of Hearts in bouncing back so soon after such a devastating Cup defeat:

"A match of almost unbearable tension resulted in Hearts maintaining their proud unbeaten home record, Celtic losing for the first time in 32 competitive matches and the Premier Division Championship remaining at Ibrox for at least another week.

"Celtic's failure to secure the one point needed to claim the title was due entirely to the home side's imperishable self-belief and commitment."

**Ian Archer** of the **MAIL ON SUNDAY** seemed a bit disappointed that Hearts had spoiled a party he was going to:

"Hearts yesterday ruined an enormous party which was due to start at 4.40pm in Edinburgh and rage on all weekend in Glasgow.

"They halted Celtic's unbeaten run of 31 matches and made Billy McNeill's side wait at least another week before they claim the championship.

"That left 11,000 Celtic supporters in Tynecastle's 29,000 crowd to postpone the celebrations as Hearts collected their first win of the season over the champions-elect."

The **SUNDAY MAIL'S Don Morrison** noted the scenes at the Tynecastle dug-outs which were in stark contrast to those at Hampden the previous week:

"The tables were turned in the dug-outs too. Last week it was Alex MacDonald who kept his dignity in congratulating his opposite number Billy McNeill.

"This week McNeill was equally sporting as he shook hands with the delighted men on the Hearts bench."

And **Doug Baillie** of the **SUNDAY POST** summed up the match thus:

"The ladies and gents of Scotland's capital city were a bit naughty really. They threw down the welcome mat for their visitors to celebrate the clinching of the Premier League title, then proceeded to pull the rug from under their feet.

"Celts, however, had only themselves to blame for the seven days' delay in wrapping things up. They didn't put as much into the game as their hosts and didn't deserve to take as much out of it."

But gradually they settled and that man Dixie Deans sent the Celtic legions into ecstasy in 22 minutes with the opening goal.

Celtic proceeded to control the match but it wasn't until the 71st minute that they made sure of the title when Dalglish made it two. Celtic weren't yet finished and Deans made it three in the 80th minute.

This capped a tremendous week for Celtic and George Connelly in particular. The big Fifer had been named Scotland's player of the year just five days previously.

Brian's and Celtic's second came 7 minutes later direct from a free kick, and this was Celtic's 900th Premier League goal.**

**In the 54th minute Maurice Johnston headed in number 3 from close range to clinch the points, but Cup finalists St. Mirren pulled one back in the 70th minute through Frank McGarvey who scored with a well taken left foot shot.**

### It's a fact

*Celtic have not conceded a goal at Celtic Park since the 12th of December 1987 when Mike Galloway scored for Hearts in a 2-2 draw. Since then Celtic have played 10 matches here and therefore a clean sheet today would take us over a 1,000 minutes of football without losing a single goal.*



further goals by George McCluskey (3) and Tom McAdam (2) completed the rout.

Celtic fired on all cylinders in this game and delighted the crowd with their best display for some time but there was to be disappointment for Celtic in the next round however as they fell to a McDicken goal in the replay against Kilmarnock at Rugby Park.

# The men from Dens

**DUNDEE** come to Celtic Park charged with the unenviable task of trying to spoil the biggest party in Britain. For, while everyone fully expects Celtic to clinch the Premier League title against Jocky Scott's men today, they will be doing their hardest to leave Glasgow with two points to bolster their European claims for next season.

Not for them going through the motions of a meaningless end of season fixture. For, as Scott has warned the Celtic fans: "This game means as much to us as it does to you".

And it is not difficult to understand the Dundee manager's determination. Up until several weeks ago his side were poised to clinch fifth spot in the Premier League and thus secure a place in Europe for the first time in 14 years.

And for a club whose fans remember without much difficulty the days of Ure, Gilzean and Penman and their subsequent European jaunts of the early sixties, the absence of continental football has hurt almost as much as having to sit back and watch near neighbours United earn plaudits from around the globe for their breathtaking performances on the European front.

Dundee only some weeks ago were a staggering seven points in front of United for the coveted Euro spot. But a succession of injuries and suspensions in a devastating 10-day spell just three weeks ago seemed to have put the kybosh on Dundee's hopes of at last eclipsing United.

As well as being tumbled out of the marathon Scottish Cup quarter final with United in March, the Tannadice side then proceeded to defeat Dundee in the league the following week to pull clear of them.

But events last week have tilted the balance towards Dens Park again. While a depleted United side were stumbling to a 4-2 defeat by re-juvenated Motherwell, Dundee were triumphing by the same margin over Falkirk. Now just one point separates the sides although United have a game in hand.

Despite losing such as John Brown to Rangers midway through the season Dundee have not ceased to play exciting, attacking football at all times. Tommy Coyne is out in front in the race to win the European Golden Boot with an incredible 37 goals so far.

He is three goals ahead of his nearest continental rivals. And last week's hat trick by striking partner Keith Wright has shown to the world that the dark blues currently possess one of the most lethal striker forces in the land.

It has been in defence that most of their problems have arisen but recent signs have shown that big English stopper Wes Saunders has settled at the heart of the Dens Park defence in front of that 'keeper of fortune Tom Carson, at last enjoying a lengthy run in somebody's first team. Carson is an agile and athletic goalkeeper and certainly one of the most under-rated in the Premier League today.

Even after the sale of John Brown to Rangers, the Dens Park side have only just recently emerged from the red at their local bank. So all the more reason why Scott has been pleased at the sight of several of his excellent youth team performing in this season's BP Youth Cup.

The Dundee Colts have won through to the final of this prestigious tourney where they will play Dunfermline.

# THE GREAT PLAYERS ALAN GILZEAN

**FOR the older sharp-eyed supporters of Dundee Football Club the addition of the name Gilzean to the recent Scottish youth side must have brought about a strong sense of nostalgia. Ian Gilzean is the son of one of the finest centre forwards ever to wear both the dark blue shirt of Dundee and Scotland and today his father Alan Gilzean remains a very popular figure in the eyes of the Tayside club's support.**

Alan Gilzean was a native of Perthshire and he played his early football with Coupar Angus Juniors before progressing to junior football with Dundee Violet. His potential was spotted by Dundee and he signed for the Dens Park club in 1956. At that time Dundee had a formidable team and the youngster went on loan to Aldershot in 1959 to gain experience before returning to claim a first team place in 1960. The manager of Dundee Bob Shankley had brought together some fine players such as Alex Hamilton, Bobby Cox, Andy Penman, Ian Ure and Alan Consin and his team was to enjoy some tremendous success not only in domestic competition but also in Europe.

On his introduction to the first team Gilzean began to score freely and along with Alan Carson formed a dynamic partnership that would eventually be extremely instrumental in bringing the league championship to Dens Park for the first and only time.

The team played in a fluent, direct manner which exploited the strong front running of their two forwards. To win the Scottish league title, provincial clubs have to overcome the might of the Old Firm and in November 1961 Dundee demonstrated their championship potential by recording one of the greatest victories in their history. They defeated Rangers 5-1 at Ibrox and Alan Gilzean scored four goals.

Later in his career with the Dark Blues 'Gillie' improved on this performance, scor-

ing seven times in a match with Queen of the South in 1962.

During his career Alan Gilzean usually played at centre forward or inside forward and his game was based on subtlety and elegance. He was supreme in the air and was extremely adept at the glancing header.

In just over four seasons at Dens Park the popular forward scored 122 league goals and was also able to transfer his goalscoring talent to the semi-finals of the European Cup. He played in his club's famous 8-1 victory over German side Cologne before they were defeated by eventual competition winners A.C. Milan.

In 1964 Alan Gilzean made his international debut for Scotland against Wales and he formed an immediately successful partnership with Denis Law. He was not on a losing side until his seventh international and during that run he headed in Davie Wilson's corner for the only goal of the 1964 match with England.

Gilzean won 22 caps for his country, the last one being earned in a European Championship match with Portugal in 1971. He scored ten goals within this period and is still looked upon as one of the more successful Scotland centre forwards of this era.

In December 1964 Gilzean joined Tottenham Hotspur for £72,500 and enjoyed ten years of glory with the White Hart Lane club. His partnership with Jimmy Greaves was as effective as the one he had enjoyed with Alan Carson at Dundee and the Scot narrowly failed to score a century of league goals with the club.

As late as 1971 Gilzean was still an important figure in the Tottenham attack creating chances for Martin Chivers.

In July 1974 the centre forward moved to South Africa to play football
