Around the League

ALTHOUGH the battle for the league flag has almost been put beyond doubt there has been no shortage of drama as other important battles in the division have unfolded.

Chief among these has been the fight for the extra European place between Dundee United, Dundee and, to a lesser extent Hibs. Celtic, by virtue of their 2-0 win at Easter Road have virtually put paid to Hibs' hopes of playing on the continent next season.

But really I doubt if any other result would have adversely affected Dundee United's late Euro push.

Suddenly McLean's men have come good at the most important stage of the season. At one point they were a gaping seven points behind Dundee. Recently however, the Tannadice outfit have moved into overdrive with a series of excellent displays when the pressure was on.

They drew 0-0 with Celtic at Celtic Park in a game they may have won. And they followed this up with a fine 5-1 victory over St. Mirren in midweek.

As well as this they slammed the unfortunate Dundee side 3-0 at Dens to progress to the semis of the Scottish Cup. And on Saturday they completed a miserable week for their

neighbours by beating them 1-0 at Tannadice.

They are now three points clear of a demoralised Dundee whose morale has been shattered in recent weeks with a series of injuries and suspensions.

What I beg to ask might have happened if they had been able to hang onto John Brown who they transferred to Rangers at an important point in the season?

Down in the nether regions of the Premier League a real battle royal has been taking place. Motherwell look to be the side who have managed to beat the drop this year. But it looked bleak for them after an hour of their match last Saturday against Dunfermline.

They were 2-0 down and staring relegation straight in

the face. But 'Well somehow recovered and won 3-2.

Apparently Tommy McLean played on the players' emotions when he said that for the sake of their livelihoods and the livelihood of their families, they had to win.

I don't doubt the accuracy of McLean's sombre reflections but surely the game shouldn't be as cut-throat as this.

Not that Hamilton Accies are complaining. They look to be favourites to emerge from the first division.

Meanwhile the Premier League looks set to lose one of its most colourful and lucrative clubs this season, Dunfermline.

Perhaps they paid the price for being too adventurous but they entertained a lot of people on the way.

the manager has his say



TONIGHT we seek another two points in the race for the league title. I stress the mundane aspect of points gathering at this match rather than the more spectacular possibilities in us winning the flag.

Everyone knows that we only need three more points to put ourselves beyond reach but we will not get them unless we display the same attitude that has taken us through games such as the victories at Ibrox, Easter Road and Pittodrie.

St Mirren will be no push-overs. They have had a very traumatic time of it this season but recent indications seem to suggest that they are regaining a semblance of equilibrium. They will be nothing other than tough opponents tonight as they seek a win which will help disperse some of the gloom which has formed around Love Street in recent months. But once again I am confident that my players will do themselves justice tonight. How can I think anything else after the way they have played in recent weeks?

The attitude shown by them has been tremendous. Matches like the ones we have won recently make physical and emotional demands on players. So attitude as well as physical fitness is a pre-requisite for games such as these.

The players realise they are on the brink of something marvellous this season. But to be fair to them, they also are looking no further ahead than the next match. Each has a healthy respect for our opponents and in a league such as ours it would be foolish to do otherwise.

Some of the individual contributions in recent weeks are worth especially noting. In a match like the one at Aberdeen its fair to point out that everyone played superbly. Perhaps though I can mention Pat Bonner. The big fellow has had a magnificent season and he has played his part at instilling confidence in the back four by his professionalism under pressure.

Paul McStay has underlined once again that he genuinely does have the necessary qualities to progress to the ranks of those who have been described as world class.

And Anton Rogan has come into the side at a very important stage of the season to play a telling part in important victories by contributing to a series of winning goals. His attitude is indicative of that which exists at the park. Having lost his place earlier in the season he refused to sulk but got on with the job of working at his game and winning his place back.

So enjoy the game tonight and continue to back us in the same magnificent fashion as you have done recently. We really do appreciate it.

And by the way, with reference to certain after match events at Pittodrie last Wednesday.

You can be sure that myself and the players share your disappointment at being prevented from acknowledging your excellent support and impeccable behaviour at the match.

Let me stress that we had no choice in the matter but had been ordered not to go on to the pitch after the game by the Grampian Police.

Attitude is the name of the game for Derek

INDICATIVE of the good atmosphere which exists in the current Celtic first team was the reaction of young defender Derek Whyte when he was left out of the team for a couple of games recently.

Said the Scottish international defender: "I've never thought that I was ever guaranteed a permanent first team place and when you look at the strength of our squad then it almost safe to say that no-one is guaranteed their place.

"This I feel is one of the major reasons why we have done so well thus far into the season. There are no prima donnas at Celtic Park. There was little to be gained by me sulking when I was left out. It just made me all the more determined to win back my place.

It's a refreshing attitude from one of Scotland's best young players and certainly does not reflect the current trend of highly paid players telling all and sundry why the manager was wrong when he decided to leave them out of his plans of a Saturday.

Whyte has played his part in Celtic's iron defence this year with several exciting displays at left back, none more so than his performances in the recent victories against Rangers and Aberdeen.

And his defensive abilities mixed with a fair degree of close ball control led to him becoming Scotland's fourth youngest international when he was chosen to face Belgium at Hampden late last year. On top of that he opened his scoring account with Celtic with a home winner against Borussia Dortmund.

Since then he's netted crucial goals against St. Mirren at Love St. (the winner) Morton at Celtic Park and a

superb 20 yard effort Motherwell at Fir Park last November.

If Celtic can lift the Scottish League and Cup double then it's safe to say that this year will be marked down in the Whyte archives as one of the most significant in what promises to be a very rewarding career for Derek and Celtic.

But typically he plays down his role in Celtic's version of the Iron Curtain this season:

"I've been fortunate that I've had the benefit of playing alongside such Roy Aitken and Mick McCarthy. You can only benefit from playing alongside them in the first team. Their experience is phenomenal. And with Chris Morris, Lex Bailie and Anton Rogan all playing out of their skin it's not hard to see why we currently have the best defensive record in the league. It also means none of us can relax for a minute even when it looks as though we're home and dry in a match because we know whoever isn't playing in the defence that day is more than capable of doing a great job when their opportunity comes along."

If Celtic do win the premier league this year it will be Derek's second championship medal despite yet having to reach his 20th birthday.

Added to this there's the expectancy of him making his first appearance in a Scottish Cup final as Celtic can overcome Hearts on Saturday.

Naturally I'm looking forward to the semi. I've never reached this stage with Celtic before. Hearts will be worthy opponents but we have shown this season time and time again that we can handle the pressures of a crunch game."

PARADISE AT PITTODRIE

THE national sportswriters waxed lyrical last Thursday morning about Celtic's fine 1-0 victory over Aberdeen the previous evening.

Although Billy McNeill was taking each match as it comes, the sportswriters seem to have already wrapped up the flag for Celtic.

Ken Gallagher of **THE SUN** wrote: "Andy Walker kept Celtic on course for a championship win in their Centenary Year. Walker's strike gave Celtic a Premier League double over the Dons at Pittodrie. Victory was twice as sweet for Celtic as they set a record run of 28 unbeaten matches, one more than the previous best by Aberdeen."

Meanwhile **Ian Broadley** was impressed with the whole tenor of the game: "Celtic took another giant stride towards the Premier League title with a superb victory at Pittodrie. It was Andy Walker who got the vital goal, leaving his side to get just six points from their six remaining games to clinch the flag.

"Celtic certainly had their moments in a match which paid a glowing tribute to the competitiveness and the commitment to attack from two of the country's leading sides."

Jim Reynolds of the **GLASGOW HERALD** had few doubts that the victory virtually clinched the title. He wrote: "Celtic shot themselves ahead on the hour mark when a Miller corner on the right was headed on brilliantly by Rogan and Walker came in behind him to volley a drive high into the net.

"It was obviously a well-rehearsed move and it left Aberdeen looking bewildered.

"Billy McNeill's men had to lose this one to give any of the chasing pack a glimmer of hope, but apart from a rather nervous opening spell, Celtic looked every inch the champions as they outfought Aberdeen and showed a lot of skill in the process."

And **Alan Davidson** of the **EVENING TIMES** highlighted the magnanimous praise heaped on Celtic by Dons boss Ian Porterfield: "Since I came to this club we have never been turned over by anybody to the extent Celtic managed during last night's second half. They are quite brilliant and they are a young team full of energy, ideas and talent and they can only get better."

The second half was evenly balanced until Celtic stunned Hibs with 3 goals in the last 15 minutes. It was Mo Johnston who made it 2-1 with a neat finish and 3 minutes later Paul McStay sealed the points with a third. In the 88th minute Brian McClair made the final score 4-1.

HAVING disposed of Berwick Rangers, East Fife, and Motherwell, all away from home, scoring fourteen goals and losing none, Celtic approached the semi-final quietly confident of defeating St. Mirren and reaching their 42nd Scottish Cup final.

Celtic started the game in the customary manner with an assault on the St. Mirren goal and after only two minutes Murdo MacLeod, in front of an empty net, shot over from only five yards.

It took the Celts, by now coming on to a game, to the 29th minute before opening the scoring. The Paisley defence had managed to scramble the ball clear when Willie McStay picked up the ball in his own half and strode forward down the right wing before releasing the ball into the box where Brian McClair was waiting to sweep the ball high into the net (above).

St. Mirren equalised in the 38th minute when Frank McAvennie passed a good ball to Frank McDowall on the edge of the box and he finished the move well, shooting past Pat Bonner to tie the game at half-time.

In the second half, however, there was only going to be one winner, but Celtic had to wait until the 81st minute to convert their superiority into a goal.

Tommy Burns left the keeper helpless with a low shot which rebounded off the post to the chest of Paul McStay who lobbed the ball over Thomson to score the goal which was to take Celtic into the final against Aberdeen.

The swirling wind did not keep the flow of this game to which both teams contributed but Celtic always looked the likelier winners.

DESPITE St. Mirren's present position not far from the foot of the Premier League and the relegation noose that some people have been ready to hang over them, few people seriously believe that Saints will go down. For a start they have too many quality players.

Nevertheless it's been a horrific season for the Love Street men. And all in stark contrast to last season's glorious achievement in taking the Scottish Cup back to Paisley for the first time since 1959.

It seems that everything that could have gone wrong for Alex Smith has done so.

After a promising start to the league campaign reinforced by some solid displays in Europe the roof seemed to cave in on St. Mirren.

Of course the much-publicised wrangle over the will he-won't he transfer of star midfielder Iain Ferguson did little to help matters.

As St. Mirren's dirty washing became public (through no fault of their own) the team's form slumped. Eventually Ferguson made his inevitable way to Ibrox but not before untold damage had been done to the St. Mirren cause.

Out of Europe although admittedly to the accomplished Belgian side Mechelen who have gone on to skip a few of Europe's bigger names since then, and then out of the Scottish Cup, courtesy of an embarrassing 3-0 home defeat by first division Clydebank. This was the legacy of Saints' problems off the park.

And just to prove that problems never come in ones and twos, but in nines and tens, there was the unsavoury Frank McGarvey-Jimmy Bone affair which left a bad taste in everyone's mouth, and left McGarvey out of the side for a crucial period. An affair most at Love Street will want to forget ended

with the recent departure of Bone to Dundee United as assistant coach.

On top of all this was a bad injury list. So few would have blamed Smith if he had taken the easy way out and resigned. But throughout it all he has refused to be down-hearted. Nor has he thrown accusation about or felt sorry for himself. In fact he has come out of these trials and tribulations with a great degree of dignity and with his reputation enhanced. In the long run these experiences could benefit his manager-ship and by association, St. Mirren.

Campbell Money has been boosted by the faith shown in him by the Scotland under-21 selectors as they preferred to remember what he is capable of rather than call to mind some indifferent recent displays.

The Dundee United defeat apart, confidence seems to be wafting back into the side and its a safe bet to assume that once they have relaxed away from it all in the close season they will once more present a formidable obstacle next season.

That's not to say of course that they will not be anything other than tough opponents tonight. In the three previous matches between the sides this season, there has been little to choose.

A solitary Derek Whyte goal was all that separated the sides when they met last September.

And in November a Peter Grant goal gained the points for Celtic at Celtic Park in a tightly-contested game.

On January 9th, St. Mirren took only one of two points Celtic have conceded this year in the league thus far.

A McDowall 20-yarder equalising a freak Celtic opener when keeper Money was deceived in the treacherous weather conditions at Love Street that day.



TAKE a look at any match report involving St. Mirren and the name of one Frank McGarvey invariably crops up.

He's not infrequently the star of most of Saints' performances these days with his non-stop running and aggression allied with no little amount of skill.

Many thought they'd heard the last of him when he was given a shock transfer to St. Mirren in 1986. But, yet again he's proved his critics wrong as he played a magnificent part in the Scottish Cup returning to Love Street last year.

Frank's still a great favourite with the Celtic fans and among the cheers for Celtic tonight there may be a few reserved for him.

This is the third time this season that United have defeated us and the latest defeat has just about buried any hopes we may have had of winning the title.

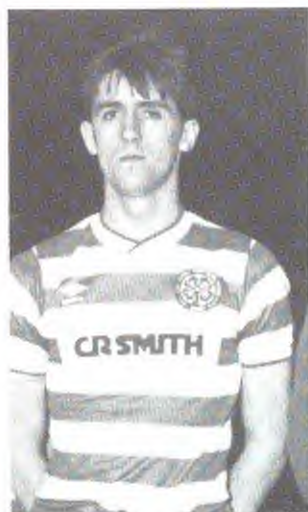
Of course where there's life there's hope, but ours appear to be slim indeed. Although United deserved their victory the score-line does tend to flatter them more than just a little.
