## A PREVIOUS MEETING

WHEN Hearts visited Celtic Park on League duty on October 9, 1965, the teams lined up as follows: CELTIC: Simpson, Young, Gemmell, Murdoch, McNeill, Clark, Johnstone, Gallagher, McBride, Lennox, Hughes. HEARTS: Cruikshank, Ferguson, Shevlane, Pollard, Anderson, Cumming, Jensen, Barry, Wallace, Gordon, Traynor.

It was Celtic's fifth league match of the season, they had previously beaten Dundee United 4-0, Clyde 2-1 and Aberdeen 7-1 and had gone down 2-1 to Rangers.

The previous Wednesday the Bhoys had beaten Go-ahead Deventer of Holland to bring their aggregate total to 7-0 in the preliminary round of the European Cup Winners' Cup.

The recent high scoring habit continued into this game and Celtic won 5-2. Gordon scored both goals for the visitors, while Bobby Lennox and Joe McBride each scored twice for Celtic and Charlie Gallagher, playing his first game of the season at Celtic Park, added the other.

Joe McBride was actually very unlucky not to complete his hat-trick when he beat the 'keeper, but had his shot stopped on the line by Hearts full back Danny Ferguson.

# From the Manager ...

**THE importance we are putting on today's match has been stressed in the way we prepared for the game.**

On Thursday we set off for Seamill, our Ayrshire training centre for preparation before cup finals and European matches. This could be the most important game we have played this season.

The points situation, with Hearts having done very well recently, makes it imperative that we win. Only a victory will be of any worth to us.

As we travelled to the coast it was impossible for us to choose a team because of the long list of injuries which have put so many of our players into the doubtful category.

The two youngsters, Tony Shepherd and Derek Whyte, who came into the 13 man pool last Saturday travelled with us and could feature today.

We could be short of players today, but the men who take the field will be fully aware of what is expected of them. They are all able players and if they play as they can, two points is certainly within our capabilities.

We had a 'behind-closed-doors' practice match against Middlesbrough on Wednesday afternoon which was valuable in so much as it gave some of our players on the way back from injury match practice that was much needed.

Today, though, is the real thing and I want to see a marked improvement on our recent form.

WE would ask supporters who are sitting at the very back of the upper stand to leave via the exits at the top of the stand and thereby lessen the number of people leaving through the mid-stand exits.

# The season so far for Hearts

**HEARTS** are currently enjoying their best season since the inception of the Premier League, in fact it could be argued that they are going through their best league campaign since they won the championship in 1959-60.

They have not been beaten, in any competition, since they went down 1-0 to Clydebank on September 28, 1985. Their unbeaten run so far stands at 20 matches. In those twenty games they have only failed to find the net once when they drew 0-0 with Hibs on November 9.

The season started for Hearts on August 10 when Celtic visited Tynecastle and ex-Celt John Colquhoun scored for the home side as the points were shared in a 1-1 draw. Colquhoun scored again the following week and John Robertson added another for Hearts, but these two goals were only consolations as the home side, St. Mirren, hit the net six times.

Three days later Montrose fell to the Tynecastle men in the League Cup, but the following Saturday a Robertson goal was all Hearts could produce at Ibrox and that earned them no points as Rangers scored three times.

Two 2-1 victories followed to end August. Both games were played on Hearts' home ground, firstly Stirling Albion went out of the League Cup, after extra time, then city rivals Hibernian were beaten in the league.

September 4 and Pittodrie Stadium saw the end of Hearts' League Cup bid as they went out to eventual winners, Aberdeen, by one goal. Four days later Hearts travelled to Pittodrie again, this time on league duty. Again Aberdeen were victorious, this time by three goals to nil.

On September 14, Hearts hosted a match with Dundee United in the league and lifted full points with a 2-0 victory, but the see-saw continued and took a downward dip the next week with a 2-1 defeat at the hands, and ground, of Motherwell.

That defeat at Clydebank came the following week, then the see-saw went

upwards, and as Hearts went to the top of the Premier League, they have stayed on a high.

The month of October provided a home draw with Dundee, a 1-0 victory here at Celtic Park, 1 3-0 victory over St. Mirren at Tynecastle, then a 1-0 victory at home over Aberdeen.

While many Premier League sides missed at least one league game during November because of Scotland's trip to Australia, Hearts didn't and made a successful bid to reach the top of the championship ladder.

An Ian Jardine goal gave them a 1-1 draw with Dundee United at Tynecastle on November 2. There were to be no goals the following week in a 0-0 draw with Hibernian, then follow three consecutive victories by three clear goals all at Tynecastle.

Rangers fell to a 3-0 scoreline on November 16, with former light blue, Sandy Clark scoring twice and John Robertson adding the other. Clark scored twice again the following week when Motherwell were on the receiving end of a 3-0 thrashing.

Clydebank were the next visitors and they managed to score, but Hearts were more than a match and goals by Berry,

Clark, Robertson and Black gave them a convincing 4-1 victory.

Two single goal draws followed, with Dundee away from home, then Celtic at Tynecastle. Then the year closed with two victories. A Kenny Black goal was good enough to beat St. Mirren at Love Street. At Ibrox on December 28, John Colquhoun found the net twice to give Hearts a 2-0 victory and full points.

The new year started well for Hearts with a 3-1 win in the Edinburgh derby on January 1. Ian Jardine, John Robertson and Sandy Clark grabbed the goals. The scoreline was 3-1 again the following Saturday when Hearts claimed two points at Fir Park.

Gary MacKay was Hearts' only scorer on January 11 when Dundee United visited Tannadice and they shared the points in a 1-1 draw. Seven days later John Colquhoun was the hero of a visit to Pittodrie when his goal gave Hearts a 1-0 victory.

On January 25, Hearts started their campaign in the Scottish Cup with the glamour tie of the third round. At home

to Premier League rivals, Rangers, the Tynecastle men fought to win 3-2 through goals by Colin McAdam, Gary MacKay and John Robertson.

So far in February Hearts have played two league games, picking up one point from a visit to Kilbowie Park, Clydebank, when each team managed one goal. A week later Dundee visited Tynecastle and goals by Colquhoun, Robertson and MacKay gave the home side full points.

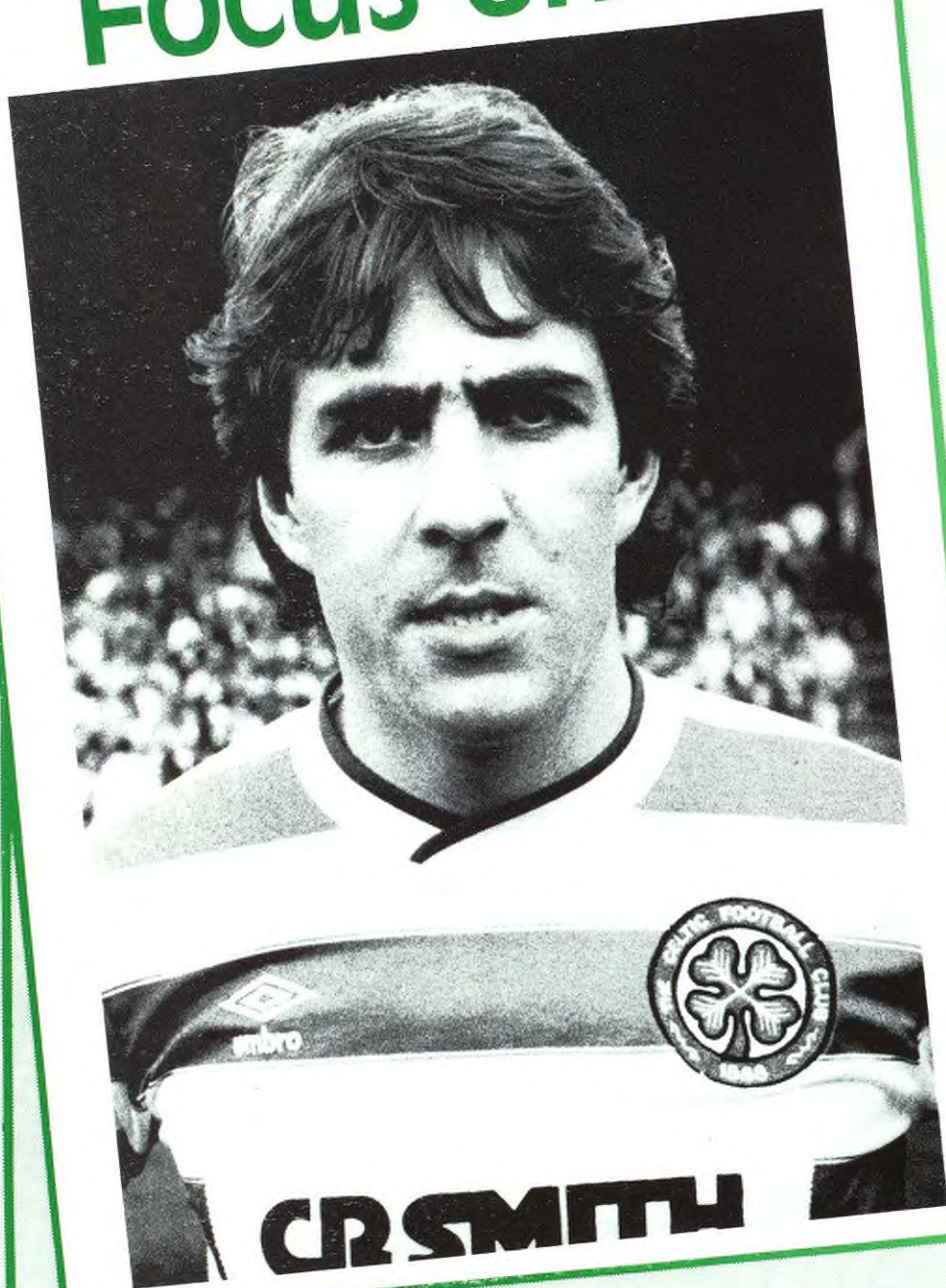
