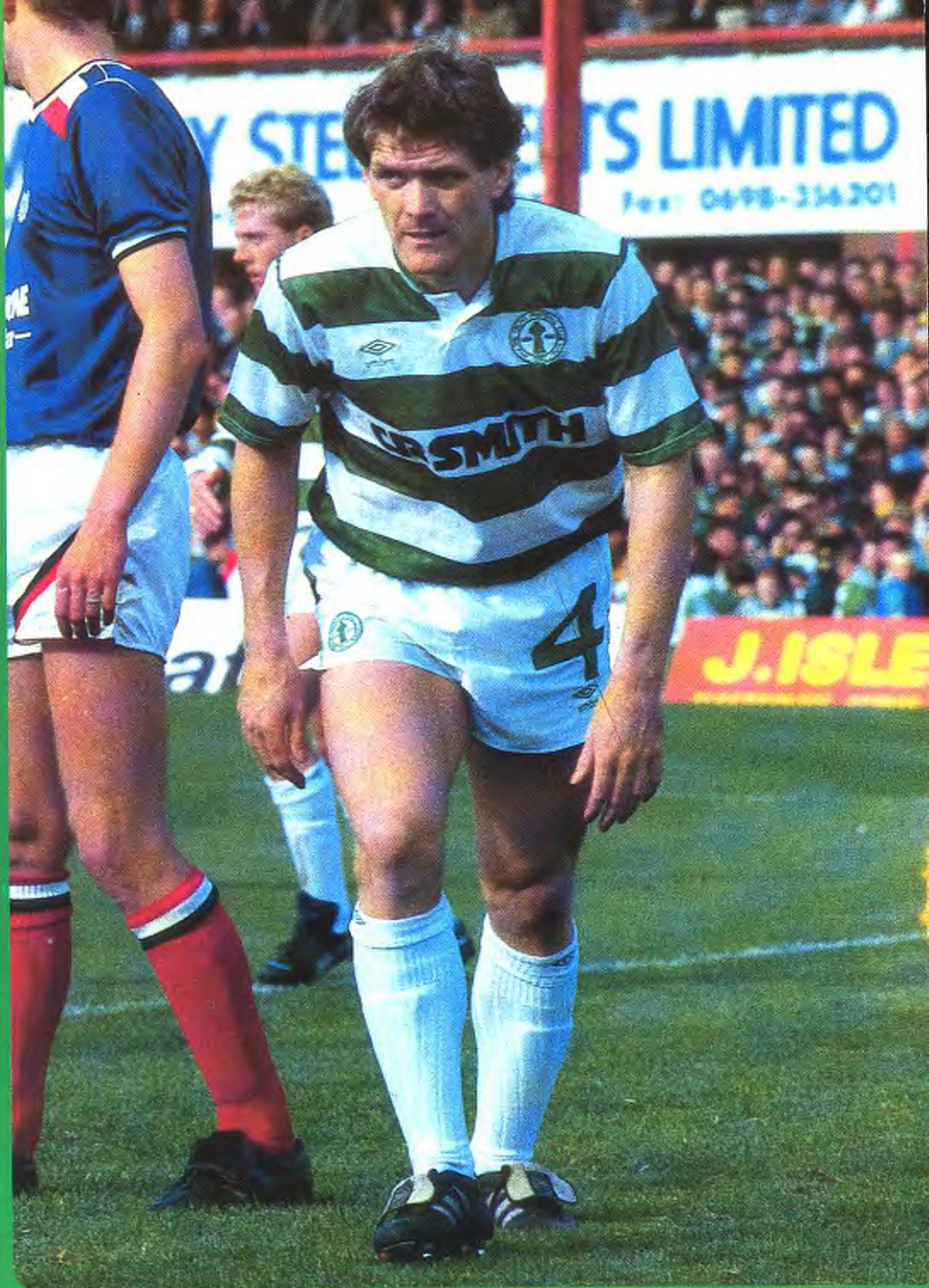

THE CELTIC BOSS SPEAKS OUT

‘ LAST week’s result against Hibs was one of our best of the season thus far. The display was first class and proved that the players have the appetite to put pressure on the two sides above us in the race for the title.

Today, though we turn out minds to Scottish Cup business and the visit of Dumbarton. Already some have suggested that we only need to turn up to be certain of a place in tomorrow’s draw for the fourth round, but that would be a foolish assumption.

We only need to recall events at this time last season when we were extremely fortunate to overcome a battling Stranraer side who did their division a great deal of credit. So it can be seen readily why I’ll be urging my players to give Dumbarton respect and not to think they’ll get through without some effort.

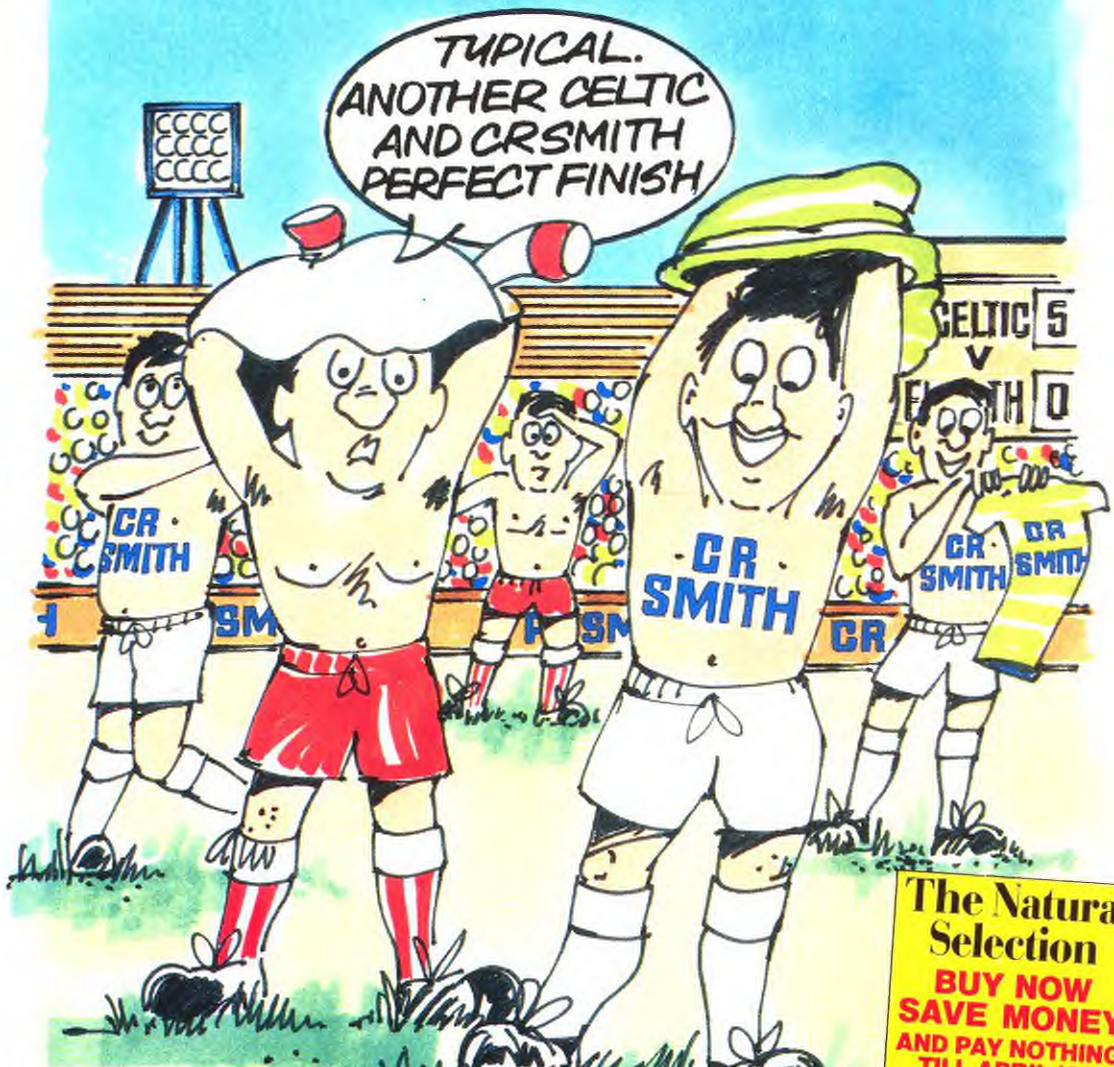
And it’s worth noting that they are the only club in the Scottish second division with Premier league experience.

NEWS BEAT

A WEEK on Tuesday, 7th February, Celtic face Rangers in the final of the Glasgow Cup at Ibrox.

Kick-off is 7.30 p.m. as Celtic try to prevent Rangers making it three Old Firm successes in the final of this competition in succession.

In May, 1986, just after Celtic had won the league at Love Street, the sides faced each other in a thrilling match at Ibrox. Further spice was added to the clash when it became clear that this would be Graeme Souness' first chance of seeing his side in action. With much of the pressure which usually characterises these matches, both sides played all out attacking football and Rangers eventually triumphed 3-2 after extra time before a crowd of 44,000.

The following season they defeated Celtic 2-1 at Celtic Park in a game made special for the fact that it was Peter Latchford's last for Celtic. He was made captain for the evening.

The February 7th clash should be an exciting affair with both sides fielding a crop of their best young players in their selections. Celtic's squad for the match will be announced in Wednesday's edition of the Celtic View.

Prices for the game are £2.00 for adults and £1.00 for children. The Ibrox enclosure will not be open but the Broomloan Road stand will be open for Celtic supporters. The match will be played under the auspices of the Glasgow Football Association.

EXCITING developments are ahead for the ever-popular Celtic Fan Club. The fan-club, one of the best value for money outfits of its kind in Britain, will be dramatically re-structured and a new package will soon be available in conjunction with the family enclosure in the front

stand Celtic are currently working on.

EURO SPOTLIGHT

Lothar Matthaus

IN recent years despite the talent of 'foreign' players such as Karl Heinz Rummenigge, Liam Brady and Daniel Passarella, Internazionale of Milan have not been regarded as a major force either in domestic or European competition.

Having so long been in the shadows of neighbours A.C. Milan, Napoli and Juventus, their unexpected appearance four points clear of their rivals at the half way stage of the Italian Championship has been a source of great surprise.

For many Inter supporters the resurgence of their club owes a great deal to the 2.4 million pound transfer that took Lothar Matthaus from Bayern Munich last summer.

If Celtic's former European adversaries succeed in winning their first league title for nine years, the transfer fee for the talented German will seem cheap in the extreme.

Matthaus was born in Bavaria twenty seven years ago, and began his football career with Borussia Munchengladbach. A hard working midfielder, he began to make his name in the Bundesliga not only for his obvious football ability but for his outspoken opinions.

His rebellious streak did not prevent Bayern Munich paying a German record of \$650,000 for his services in 1980 immediately after they had defeated his former club Borussia on penalties in the national cup final. The fact that Matthaus missed the decisive penalty was not the farewell present he wanted to give the supporters of Borussia.

With Bayern Matthaus gained all the domestic honours and played for his club in the



Champions Cup final of 1987 against F.C. Porto.

Two late goals took the trophy to Portugal although he had played in the most entertaining European Cup finals for almost a decade.

In the international arena, the German was first capped at the age of nineteen during the 1980 European Championships in Italy.

Such was the fierce competition for places in the midfield that he only earned intermittent selection in the following two years before eventually establishing himself as an indispensable member of the national side.

Despite appearing in another European Championships in 1984 and in the World Cup tournament of 1983, he really only established his reputation outwith Germany in the Mexico finals of 1986.

Prior to the tournament he



has been one of the fiercest critics of those who advocated a return to the fold for the controversial Bernd Schuster and as if to prove his point, Matthaus displayed a high level of play throughout the competition.

The midfielder struck the second round winner with a tremendous free kick against Morocco and was then appointed, despite a broken wrist, to put the shackles on Diego Maradona in the final. Although Matthaus was able to subdue the Argentinian captain it was not enough to prevent his country losing by the odd goal in five.

For Franz Beckenbauer, Lothar Matthaus remains a very important figure as the Germans strive to qualify for the World Cup finals in Italy.

He is now looked upon as the playmaker rather than the destroyer in the engine room of the national side.

It is a role he is comfortable in, as, despite elimination at the semi-final stage Matthaus enjoyed a marvellous European Championships last summer and noticeably improved as the tournament went on.

It is certain in the next 12 months that those attacking qualities that he displayed for his country will need to be in great abundance if both West German and Milanese ambitions are to be satisfied.
