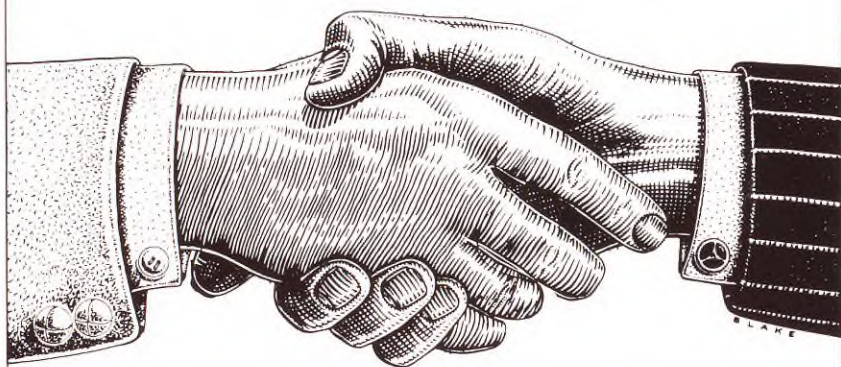

It was a funny old day last Saturday in the Premier League.

There were Celts struggling to a rock-bottom performance against rock-bottom Morton and yet still managing to pull a further point clear of Rangers in the race for the title. The Ibrox men travelled to Tayside to face Dundee United in a game they knew they had to avoid losing to keep their faint championship chances alive. United traditionally fare badly against Rangers but last Saturday they were unlucky not to have taken both points. Paatalainen had given them the lead just before half time. Then Mark Walters proved his ability once again to equalise with magnificent hook-shot. But the Dundee side should have sewn it up when they missed two great chances to score in the last five minutes. But they won't be too displeased at having managed to take four points from the Ibrox men this season.

But hats off to Morton. They hadn't won a match in their last 22 and had seen their three Danish imports disappear back across the North Sea to Scandinavia after a short but effective time at Cappielow where they managed to shore up Morton's leaky defence. In addition to this Morton came to Glasgow in the knowledge that they had

been comprehensively defeated by Celtic in their previous three Premier League encounters this season. But what a fight they made of it. I doubt if even Celtic fans would have begrudged them a point.

Keeper David Wylie showed just why Andy Roxburgh is looking at him closely. And their back four never put a foot wrong for the entire game. I almost felt sorry for some of the Morton fans in the stand as they saw the chance to celebrate for a change, slip quietly away.

Falkirk look as though they are poised for another great escape. Any more results like their 2-0 win over Hearts last Saturday and Motherwell and St Mirren will be sweating. It was a disastrous result for the Edinburgh club and rubbed salt into the gaping wound left by the John Robertson wrangle.

Hibs continued their consistent run with a solid 2-0 win over Dunfermline. It was ex-Celt George McCluskey who hit the glory trail making one and scoring a great second. Hibs have now only lost two of their last 13 matches — both against Celtic — and now they are looking very threatening in the mini race for a UEFA Cup slot with both Dundee sides. And they will have been boosted by the news that John Collins has decided to

tie himself to the club for another while at least.

Motherwell and St Mirren's 0-0 draw will have satisfied both clubs; Motherwell because it's a precious point gained to keep alive their hopes of avoiding the drop and St Mirren because it halted a recent dismal sequence of defeats.

Davie Dodds, the bravest centre forward in the league gave Aberdeen the points in a dour 1-0 victory over Dundee. And Tommy Coyne re-discovered his goal touch to score both of Dundee's goals in the 2-1 win over St Mirren at Dens on Tuesday night. Now Tommy is a good bet for the Golden Boot award.

Back In The Driving Seat With a Great Team.

the manager has his say



IN the last seven days Celtic have shown that they can win games while they are not playing well and that they can also win matches with style.

The former was the case when they played Morton at Celtic Park last Saturday. They took the points in a most unsatisfactory manner, possibly they suffered a backlash from the two gruelling Hibs Cup ties.

It has to be pointed out that after working so hard at psyching themselves up for the Easter Road replay, it was difficult for the players to be re-motivated for the match against Morton without intending any disrespect to the Greenock side. The match became a bit flat for us and the same could be said for our performance.

Perhaps the best thing that can be said about the game was that we grabbed both points, even if it did take a Roy Aitken penalty in the last minute.

But to be fair, the team are always going to encounter games like this when it becomes obvious long before the end that they are playing without inspiration. The players though, never stop battling away and I think that our win was deserved in the end.

It is to their credit that having taken criticism, they bounced back just 4 days later to deliver a quite stunning performance against Dunfermline at East End Park. Against the Fife side, they showed just how well they can play. Some of the football they produced was quite magnificent. The players showed they can encompass all that is good about Celtic — fast football was the accent on attacking, skilful play.

I am also pleased to report that there were no injuries from either match and that I have a full squad to choose from for this afternoon's game against Falkirk.

I took off Andy Walker against Dunfermline because he was slightly tired, not having played for a while, but his outing in Fife was like a week's training and he showed that he hasn't lost his ability to snap up opportunities around goal.

Billy Stark came off near the end simply because I wanted to give Tommy Burns a piece of the action.

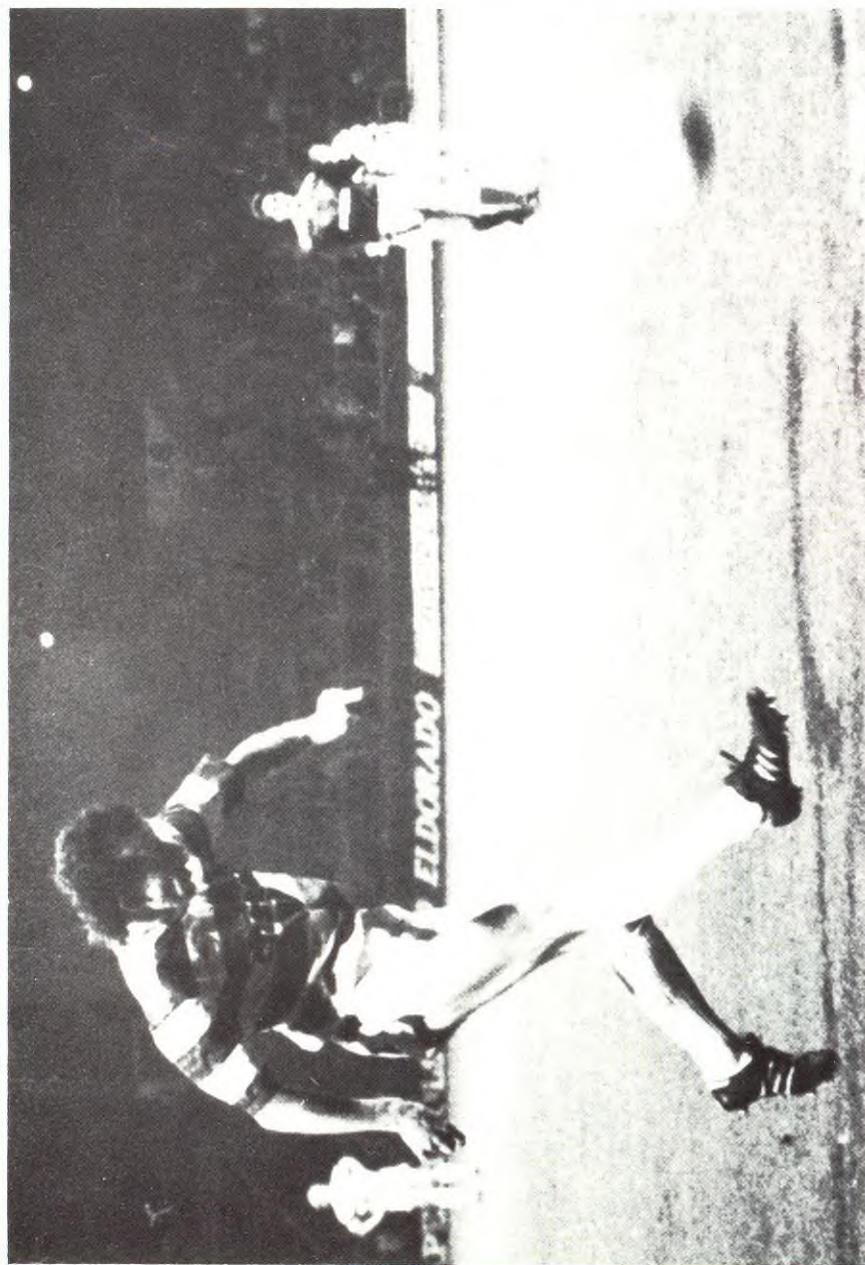


We couldn't find ourselves in finer fettle for the Falkirk game, but in saying that I am well aware that Falkirk have been putting together some fine results recently, not least of which was a great 2-0 win over Hearts last week. They are a very determined outfit who have made us work very hard for our wins against them this season.

I don't expect this afternoon to be any different, for while we are engaged in a battle to lift the Premier League title, Falkirk are involved in their own little league at the bottom of the table. The prize for the winners of this contest will retain their Premier League status. So Falkirk have as much incentive to win as ourselves. It should be a great game.

BILLY Stark's late winner against Hibs last week was his 11th goal of the season. And its doubtful if he'll score a more important one in the remainder of the year — unless, of course, it happens to be at Hampden Park on May 14th.

The only person who doesn't seem surprised at the big midfielder's success with Celtic is his boss, Billy McNeill who has often rued the fact that he didn't sign him five years earlier.

And its not hard to see why McNeill thinks like this. Stark epitomises the model professional — rarely flustered on the park and with a private life that has always remained the sole concern of himself and his family.

Indeed Stark at 31 and almost half-way through a two-year contract with Celtic, is a good bet for another few years. He has kept himself relatively free from serious injury in a career that has seen him at Paisley with St. Mirren, Aberdeen and now Glasgow.

He admits that he hopes to be around for another few years: "I am happier at Celtic Park than I ever have been at previous residences," he said. "Here the footballing philosophy is an attractive and wholesome one and happily co-incides with the way I like to see this game being played," he explained.

"And playing in front of so many fans who passionately want you to succeed is a great experience. I'm glad to be playing in Glasgow — this is truly a football city."

Stark has always prided himself in getting into forward positions to grab goals and during his spell with Aberdeen he was often second top

scorer, eclipsed only by the goal-scoring prowess of Frank McDougall. Last season he finished as the Pittodrie side's top scorer.

The most telling aspect of the midfielder's game is his deceptiveness. He is faster than most people give him credit for and for such a tall player has a fair degree of close control which has seen him wriggle free of many a congested midfield. And of course he appears in places in the opposing penalty area where he is least expected, if the looks on defenders faces are anything to go by.

And before anyone can do anything about his unwelcome presence, the ball is usually in the back of the net. Says Stark: "I don't worry so much if I haven't scored during a game. When I do start to fret is when I have played 90 minutes without having had the opportunity to take up a threatening position. Each time I take the field I aim to get my name on the score-sheet."

What the papers say...

THE league meeting with Morton was very nearly a stumbling block for Celtic's championship hopes. It was one of those games when supporters had that awful feeling that even if the goals were 100 yards wide and high we still wouldn't score.

This was due mainly to the fact that goalkeeper Wylie was in superb form. **Chick Young** of the **PEOPLE** gave his summing up of the game: "Celtic tightened their grip on the title race after getting through by the skin of their teeth. They stole the points off Morton with a dramatic last minute penalty after producing their most disappointing league performance of the season."

Jack McQueen of **THE OBSERVER** took a calmer look at the match to start his quote: "If Celtic looked more purposeful forcing a succession of corners, they proved unable to breach the Greenock defence until that penalty in the final minute which brought immense relief to 23,000 frustrated watchers."

The penalty was of course a very tense moment and the pressure on the one to take it would be immense. **Alan Herron** of the

SUNDAY MAIL felt the drama of the scene: "Decision Time — who takes the kick? Skipper Roy Aitken didn't hesitate. He grabbed the ball, spotted it and drove it low into the net. A possible weekend of agony for manager McNeill was thus averted with the only direct shot Celtic had on target all day."

The **SUNDAY MIRROR** reporter saw the significance of the score: "It was a vital goal for the championship favourites particularly since key rivals Rangers and Hearts both lost ground in the chase for the crown."

For their match report, the **SUNDAY POST** had, as a guest writer, new boxing star **Stevie Boyle**, who said: "Celtic set themselves up for a quick K.O. then proceeded to fall over their boot-laces in a bid to land the killer punch."

Stevie was asked for his men of the match and his reply showed that he is a man of taste: "The Parkhead fans — with a support like this behind me I'd soon be world champion."

Congratulations on your win Steve, and hopefully the next time you're at Celtic Park you'll be a champion watching champions.



CELTIC made it 21 points out of a possible 24 since the start of the league campaign with this competent 2-0 victory over Falkirk at Celtic Park.

And the game was a personal triumph for Billy McNeill. Just two weeks previously he had put through his own goal to give Aberdeen a crucial share of the points in a 1-1 draw at Celtic Park in a match which attracted 64,000.

But like the professional he was, he refused to let it get him down and was Celtic's outstanding performer in this match against Falkirk. In fact he capped a flawless display with a fine headed goal just a minute after the re-start.

Celtic started the game as though they

intended to blow Falkirk away. And when Dalglish scored in five minutes the fans had memories of the previous week's 5-1 drubbing of Dundee United at Tannadice. But it was not to be as Falkirk defended in depth. But for all that it was a good display from Celts who played very attractive soccer on the hard winter ground. McNeill's goal after the break was no more than Celts deserved.

This was the seventh game in a run for Celtic that saw them go eventually 27 games in the league without defeat to bag them the title a full 10 points in front of Aberdeen.

Brockville Bairns

ALREADY Falkirk have given warning that they could be set to repeat their Houdini escape act of last season.

Only a victory against Celtic at Parkhead for the Bairns would ensure their Premier League survival. And as the Brockville side hadn't achieved that since 1958 no-one was giving them any chance of avoiding relegation.

It was the second last game of the season and Celtic's chances in the league were gone but nothing could have prepared their fans for their 2-1 defeat by Falkirk which kept the Bairns up and sent Clydebank to first division oblivion. Bankies fans still haven't forgiven Celtic for that one.

And this season Falkirk could beat the drop again. They are only two points behind Motherwell courtesy of a great 2-0 victory over Hearts at Brockville last Saturday. This is the latest in a series of good results against top sides including their 4-1 victory over Dundee United last year.

Since the last meeting with Falkirk they have had some personnel changes. Gone are midfielder Brian Scrimgeour to Partick Thistle, defender Jim Kerr to Hamilton and forward Jimmy Gilmour to Kilmarnock.

Keeper is Gordon Marshall who hasn't lost a goal in his last three league outings. The back four of Burgess, McLeod, Manley and McNair could be in action this afternoon. Right back McLeod has been at Brockville for two years.

Burgess and Manley are the central defensive pairing. Burgess in his first season, after his signing from East Fife, is a strong and fit player who is strong in the tackle.

Roddy Manley is an ex-Knightswood Juveniles player who has been with Falkirk since 1984. Left back McNair has only recently established himself in the side.

With an experienced midfield of Sammy Conn, Hugh Hill and Lex Grant, Falkirk fancy their chances of putting up the shutters this afternoon.

Conn and Grant came from Clydebank within a few months of each other and are hard and fast players. They have contributed much to Falkirk's recent revival. Hugh Hill joined from East Fife at the start of the season. Andy Nicol is a left sided middle player and is the longest serving player on the Falkirk side's books having joined in 1979 from Gairdoch United.

Rab Stuart is another who will come into contention for a place in a four-man Falkirk midfield. He has also operated as a striker and the Bairns could be looking to him to supplement the two-man attack.

The exotically-named Stuart Romaines has become a midfield favourite with the Brockville fans with some exciting displays in the crunch games.

The front two of McGivern and McWilliams will need a close match. Both are strong and skilful and have worked well together this season. McGivern arrived from Kilmarnock in 1986 while McWilliams came from Dundee last year.

THE last 10 games of the season are crucial to Falkirk's hopes of staying up this season. And as our league table shows they have every chance of doing so. But Celtic will be going all out today to ensure that it isn't at the expense of them. They will be hoping to gain revenge for the result of last year's fixture when the Bairns triumphed 2-1.

A CERTAIN amount of mystery seems to have surrounded Celtic's taking part in the West Reserve League.

In the match-day programme of Hamilton Accies in their recent cup tie with Aberdeen it was reported that Celtic had taken the place of Motherwell in this league and were fulfilling their fixtures.

This however, is only partly true.

The Scottish League granted Celtic permission late last year to join this league even although the other clubs had by that time played at least 15 games more than Celtic by this stage.

CHALLENGE

Celtic conceded that they obviously would not be able to make a challenge for the league. But in the eyes of Billy McNeill it provided a great opportunity to keep his players match-fit during December, January and February. For, that is when the Premier Reserve League had its winter shut-down.

At the point that Celtic were entering this league the Motherwell 'B' side had decided to pull out. But this was done after Celtic had been given permission to take part.

So far Celtic have played six games in the West Reserve League with mixed results. It seems surprising that having finished the Premier Reserve League in a strong second position they should find difficulty against the reserve sides of teams from the lower divisions. But Celtic, in most of these matches, have

played several members of their excellent but inexperienced youth side.

Below is a record of Celtic's statistics in the West Reserve League:

CELTIC v FALKIRK

THE GREAT PLAYERS JOCKY SIMPSON

THROUGHOUT its 112-year history Falkirk Football Club have produced many excellent players. Despite the claims of such as John White, Alex Parker and Bert Slater the man possibly looked upon by most 'Bairns' supporters as their finest, was an Englishman called John Simpson.

'Jocky' as he was nicknamed played for Falkirk in the early part of this century and although in today's climate of cross-border transfers it might not seem unusual, he was one of the earliest examples of a player being selected to play for England while playing his football in Scotland.

ENGLAND

Jocky Simpson was born in England but his family moved north while he was still a youngster. As a teenager he played with Laurieston Juniors and his goalscoring exploits from the wing brought him to the attention of Falkirk.

Although the Falkirk committee men were pleased with their shrewd signing there is little doubt that even they didn't realise that in signing John Simpson they were recruiting a player who was to become one of the most exciting personalities the Scottish game has produced.

Simpson was an outside right of exceptional talent with the ability to win matches on his own. His breathtaking runs down the touchline brought large crowds to Brockville and also were responsible for putting smiles on the faces of the treasurers of clubs throughout Scotland when Falkirk were the visitors.

Another of Simpson's specialities was the inswinging corner kick. This play brought about a lot of goals and even the most experienced goalkeepers despite being aware of his ability could be deceived by the winger.

The game most often associated with Jocky Simpson was a Scottish Cup tie Falkirk played against Motherwell at Fir Park. With a large travelling support behind them 'the Bairns' took the field full of confidence, but with only fifteen minutes remaining and the visitors losing 2-0 it seemed that a Cup exit was inevitable.

It was then that the versatility and ability of Jocky Simpson came to the fore. The winger moved to centre forward and within a quarter of an hour had notched a superb hat-trick to win the cup tie for his club single-handedly. Goalscoring was a vital part of Simpson's game and in 1908/09 he scored almost a third of his club's tremendous total of 103 goals: such figures are a measure of both the quality of the club and the player.

In 1910 while at Brockville, Simpson played for the Scottish League against the English League and was subsequently chosen to play in an England international debut on the strength of his impressive display in the trial, Simpson was inevitably transferred south of the border.

IMPOSSIBLE

A transfer fee of £1,850 took him to Blackburn Rovers and although the Falkirk supporters were extremely disappointed at his departure it was economically impossible for the Brockville club to resist such a large transfer fee. In two of his first three seasons the Lancashire side were English League champions and as it had been in Scotland his name became revered south of the border.

Jocky Simpson earned eight caps for England playing against Scotland on three occasions. During the war he again donned the familiar navy blue colours while guesting for Falkirk. On his retirement from the game the Englishman returned to his adopted town where he became a popular publican.



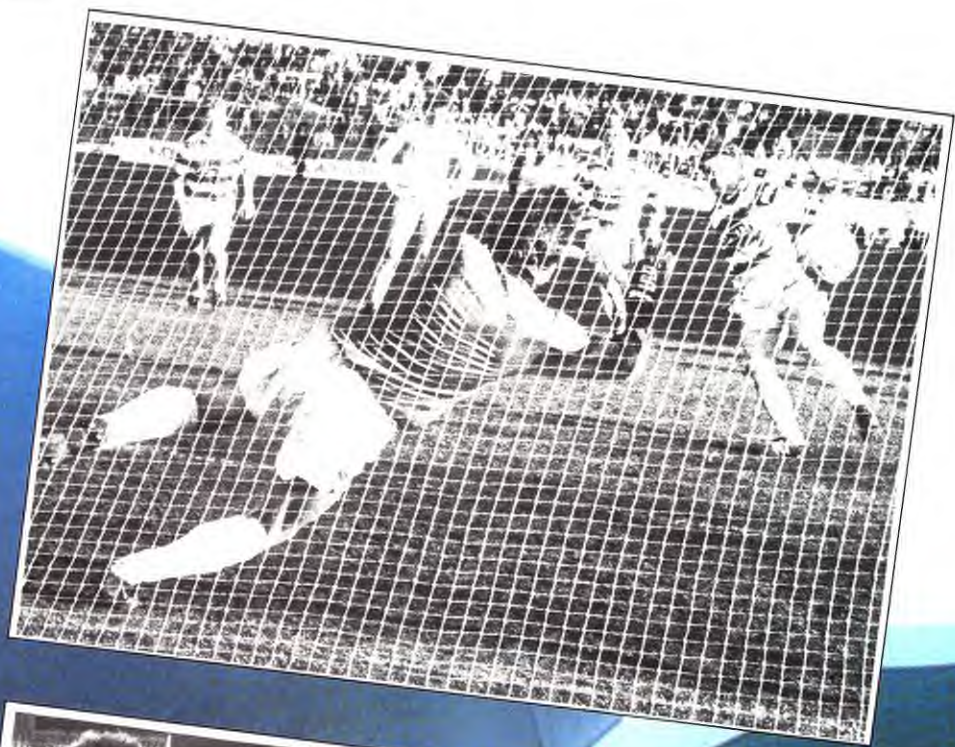
