It's a fact . . .

- ◆ THE first time Celtic met Clydebank was in the two leg League Cup quarter final in season 1971-72 winning 5-0 at Kilbowie and 6-2 at Celtic Park, Celtic progressed to the next round.
- ◆ BEFORE this season Kilbowie was the only ground where Celtic had played in the Premier League and failed to win.
- ◆ CLYDEBANK'S biggest ever win is a Division Two 8-1 victory over Arbroath in season 1975-76.
- ◆ THE first season today's two teams met in the league was 1977-78 when Clydebank reached the top flight for the first time. At home Celtic won 1-0 and 5-2 at Kilbowie Clydebank won 3-2 and the teams tied 1-1.
- ◆ TODAY'S visitors were founded in 1965 and have no connection with the club, disbanded in the early 30's, that great Celt Jimmy McGrory once played for.

JAMES GIVEN — Has had a new lease of life since going back to full-back. Jim is a great favourite with the Bankies fans who loves to go forward to supply crosses. Signed from Johnstone Burgh.

MICHAEL CONROY — Young Michael returned from a spell with Coventry to help clinch Bankies promotion bid last term. He scored several vital goals late in the season to finish top scorer.

MARTIN HUGHES — Another regular last season. Signed seven years ago from Clydebank Boys' Club. A creative midfield player.

STUART AULD — Signed during the close season from Pollock Juniors. He suffered a setback on his debut against Raith Rovers in the League Cup with a bad foot gash.

VINCENT MOORE — A prolific scorer with Campsie Black Watch last year. Suffered a setback earlier in his career when sustaining a broken leg on trial with Dundee United. This led to a delay in Vinnie turning pro.

MIKE LARNACH — Another experienced player. Was transferred to Newcastle for £100,000 during Bankies spell in the Premier League. Returned two years ago.

DAVID LLOYD — Signed during the close season from Alloa and made an early impact with two goals in his debut against Raith Rovers. Had been Alloa's top scorer for several seasons.

CHARLES GIBSON — Signed last season from East Stirling. A local lad who is hoping to push his way into the side.

Suspension and injury might force Clydebank to include some youngsters like **John Maher** (defender), **Colin Brodie** (goalkeeper), **John Davies** (midfield) and **Alan Bain** (forward).

WHEN I first came to the Celtic staff I often used to look around me and feel a bit overawed thinking of the great players who had trained and played in the same stadium.

Being on the groundstaff and a reserve player, I worked closely with two former players who could certainly be given the tag "great". They are Nell Mochan and Bobby Lennox, both of these men have already given me great help in my career which I hope will lead to me being a Celtic player. To follow the distinguished paths these two took would be too much to ask for.

I spent some time "farmed out" to my local junior side in Cumbernauld last season. That meant working on the Celtic groundstaff and training with the reserves during the week, then playing in the Junior league at the weekends.

This year, manager Davie Hay has called me up to be a full time Celtic player and I hope I can justify this confidence.

After an indifferent start to the season, the reserves seem to be getting back on course with league victories over Aberdeen and Rangers, then Tuesday night's great fightback to beat Aberdeen 5-3 and move into the last four of the Reserve League Cup competition.

Of the three competitions that the reserves enter, the League Cup is the only one that Celtic didn't put their name on last season. Let's hope we can claim it this year and I hope I can be part of the winning team.

Having felt overawed in my early days at Celtic Park, I now feel totally at home here. All the players are good friends and there is a firm feeling among us all that we should never let the jersey down.

What we really hope for is success for Celtic at every level, for the fans' sake — after all we are all fans too.

The Old Bhoys . . .

JOHN THOMSON

September 5, 1931. John Thomson's fatal accident.

EVEN though it is over 50 years since the death of John Thomson, his standing in the history of Celtic Football Club remains as high as ever. This is evident in the fact that many of today's fans still find the time to pay passing respects to his memory at Bowhill Cemetery in Fife.

Unfortunately John Thomson has a unique place in the history of Scottish football as he lost his life defending his goal in an Old Firm match in 1931. Sir Robert Kelly was to refer to this incident as one of the direst hours in the history of Celtic Football Club.

John Thomson was born in 1909 in Cardenden, Fife and started working in the mines as a young teenager. As a boy he played football with the local side Wellesley Juniors and caught the eye of Celtic chief scout Steve Callaghan, who was also responsible for signing Jimmy McGrory. Callaghan eventually persuaded Thomson to sign for the club and he did so in 1926 for the princely sum of £10.

Thomson made his debut for the club in the same year at the age of 19 at Dens Park. That initial season saw him establish himself firmly as goalkeeper and he collected his first Scottish Cup medal against East Fife. As a goalkeeper he had a great belief in himself and some of his reflex

saves were regarded as beyond belief. During his five years at Celtic Park he also established himself as the national goalkeeper winning eight caps and earning the nickname 'the Prince of Goalkeepers'.

Those who attended the Old Firm match at Ibrox on September 5, 1931 were unfortunate enough to witness the greatest, on the field, tragedy in the history of the Scottish game. Within five minutes of the start of the second half there was an accidental clash between Thomson and the Rangers centre forward. Although the goalkeeper had diverted the shot, preventing a goal, it had been at a terrible price. Thomson was carried from the field his head swathed in bandages and sadly died later that night as a result of the severe head injuries.

The funeral sparked off amazing scenes. It was estimated that 30,000 attended it with many people having walked from Glasgow to Fife. Today in the main hallway of Celtic Park there is a memorial to John Thomson and many school-boys play for a trophy dedicated to his name. In Fife his graveside memorial states he died 'While engaged in his employment . . . in an attempt to save a goal'. It is surely the most fitting epitaph for John Thomson 'the Prince of Goalkeepers'.

HEARTS 1 · CELTIC 5

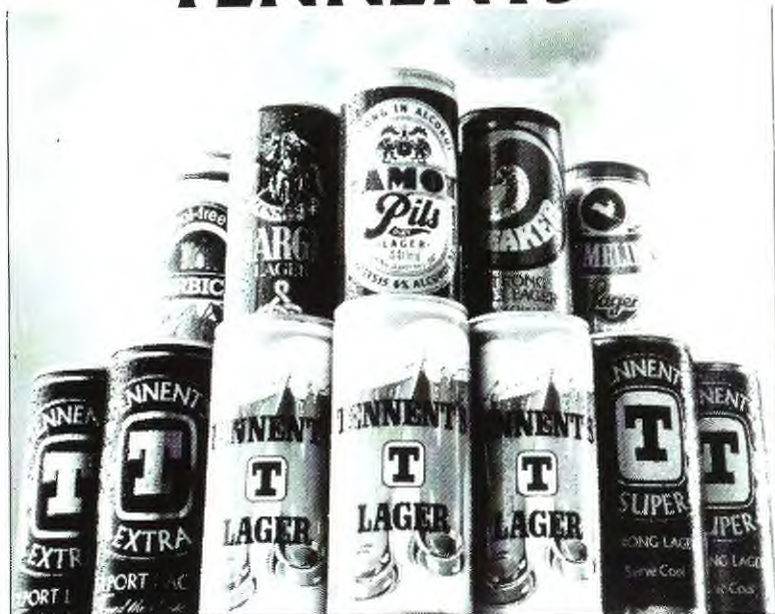

CELTIC travelled to Edinburgh to play a Hearts side going through an impressive unbeaten run, but at the end of the day Celtic's superiority was clearly shown in the scoreline.

There was only one goal in the first half and it came from Maurice Johnston who the Wednesday before had scored two World Cup goals for Scotland against Spain. Davie Provan swung over a cross from the right and Johnston rose above the defence to head us into the lead.

In the second half two early goals sealed the points for Celtic and both came from Brian McClair. His first was a brilliant diving header and the second from a rebound after Frank McGarvey had headed against the bar. Number four came from Tommy Burns after a great run from Roy Aitken. Then Brian McClair completed a memorable hat-trick with a header from a short corner. Hearts pulled one back in the last minute through Willie Johnston.

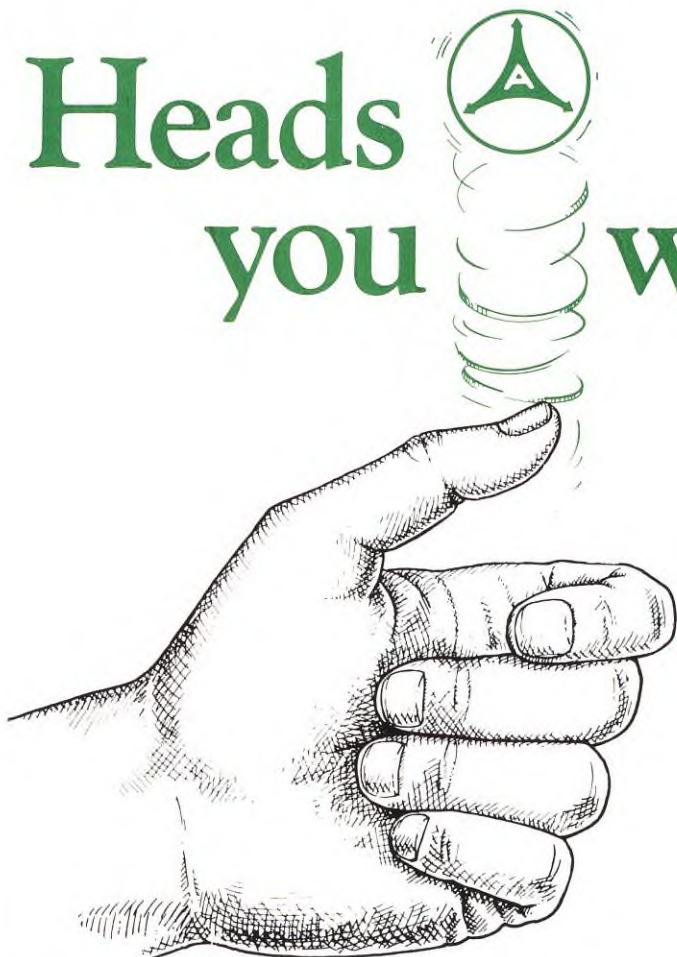

Reserve Talk . . .



WE played two games during the last seven days, against Rangers in the league last Saturday and Aberdeen in the Reserve League Cup.

On Saturday we faced a very experienced Rangers side, but we were always on top and won the points through a Paul Chalmers goal.

Tuesday night's match was a real thriller — our best victory of the season.

At one stage we were 3-1 down but that really was a joke score. We were always on top, but a few slack moments had caused us to lose goals.

Owen Archdeacon was in magnificent form and opened the scoring after 20 minutes. The ball was pushed to him for an indirect free-kick inside the box and he blasted it past the wall into the goal.

In the 25th minute Celtic scored a third. This time Charlie Nicholas was the marksman when he connected with a Danny McGrain cross to slide the ball into the Airdrie goal.

In the second half Airdrie tried to make a comeback but the Celtic defence was not in a generous mood. With only a few minutes of the match remaining Tom McAdam slid home Celtic's fourth goal. McGuire scored a consolation goal for Airdrie in the final minute.

After this match Celtic manager Jock Stein was convinced the team was back to their best form. He said, "This was more like the right blend. We were firing on all cylinders — smooth and efficient in defence with lots of power in midfield".

Two days later on Monday, November 16, Celtic went to London to play West Ham in a testimonial match for England and West Ham captain Bobby Moore. The match ended in a 3-3 draw.

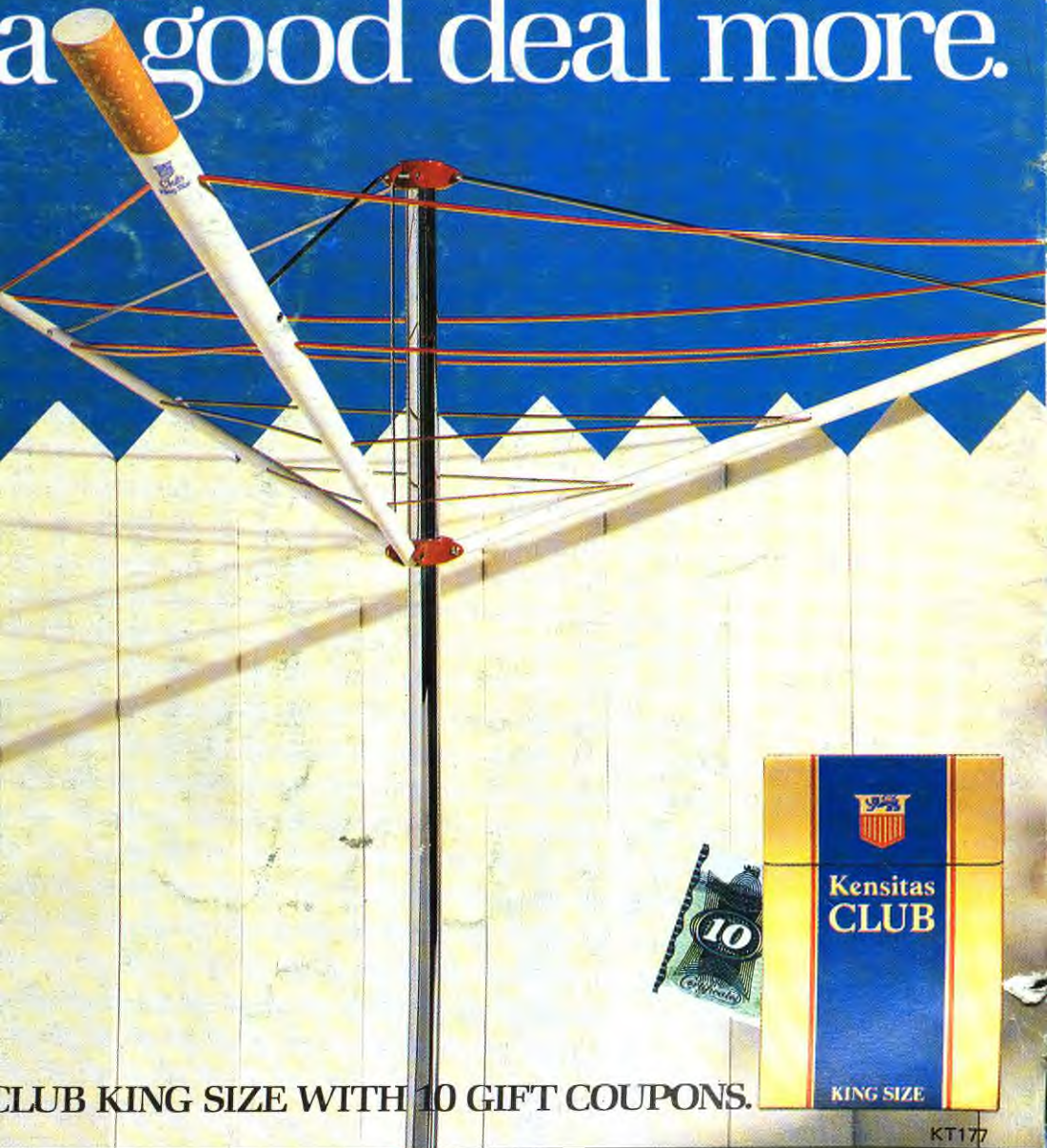
