THE most disappointing aspect of Saturday's performance for me was the fact that our performances came nowhere near the standards we have achieved in recent weeks.

Bullied

We never, at any stage, got our passing game going and allowed ourselves to be bullied out of the match by a Hearts side which, it must be conceded, played very well.

Having said all that, we must be careful not to overstress the importance of a defeat against, after all, the league leaders.

Certainly it is irritating that, after closing the gap on the sides at the top of the table, we now find ourselves back in the pack again but, with a new look defence and youngsters still learning their trade, such results are always possible.

The main thing is that we get the Tynecastle result out of our system by returning to winning ways immediately with a victory over our opponents tonight,

Motherwell.

It is nice to have this opportunity only four days after the Hearts match and, to achieve the result we desire, it will be necessary to get back to playing in the manner we did against Aberdeen ten days ago.

Equally I would like to think we could give a repeat of the quality performance which brought us a 2-0 win over Motherwell in our last meeting, at Fir Park in October, which I said at the time was one of our best displays of the season.

Pressure

Tonight's match will be one we are expected to win and, as such, there will be a wee bit of pressure us.

However, I am confident that we can cope with it and, if we play as we can, we will record the desired victory.

BOOK REVIEW

The Official History of the Football Association by Bryon Butler. Published by Macdonald, Queen Anne Press. £16.95.

HARDLY likely to be on the 'must read' list of many Scots, this book basically chronicles the history of the English game from 1863 to the present day.

Celtic rate two mentions — one of these coming soon after the English World Cup victory. The paragraph reads: 'Scotland immediately ruffled England hair by winning 3-2 at Wembley in April 1967, after Jack Charlton had been reduced to a limping passenger for most of the game; and when Celtic won the European Cup by beating Inter Milan in Lisbon five weeks later there was at least one country that believed Glasgow was the heart of the universe.'

Really, this is a book for the true football historian but at nearly £17 a throw maybe a trip to the local library is more in order than actually coughing up the shekels.

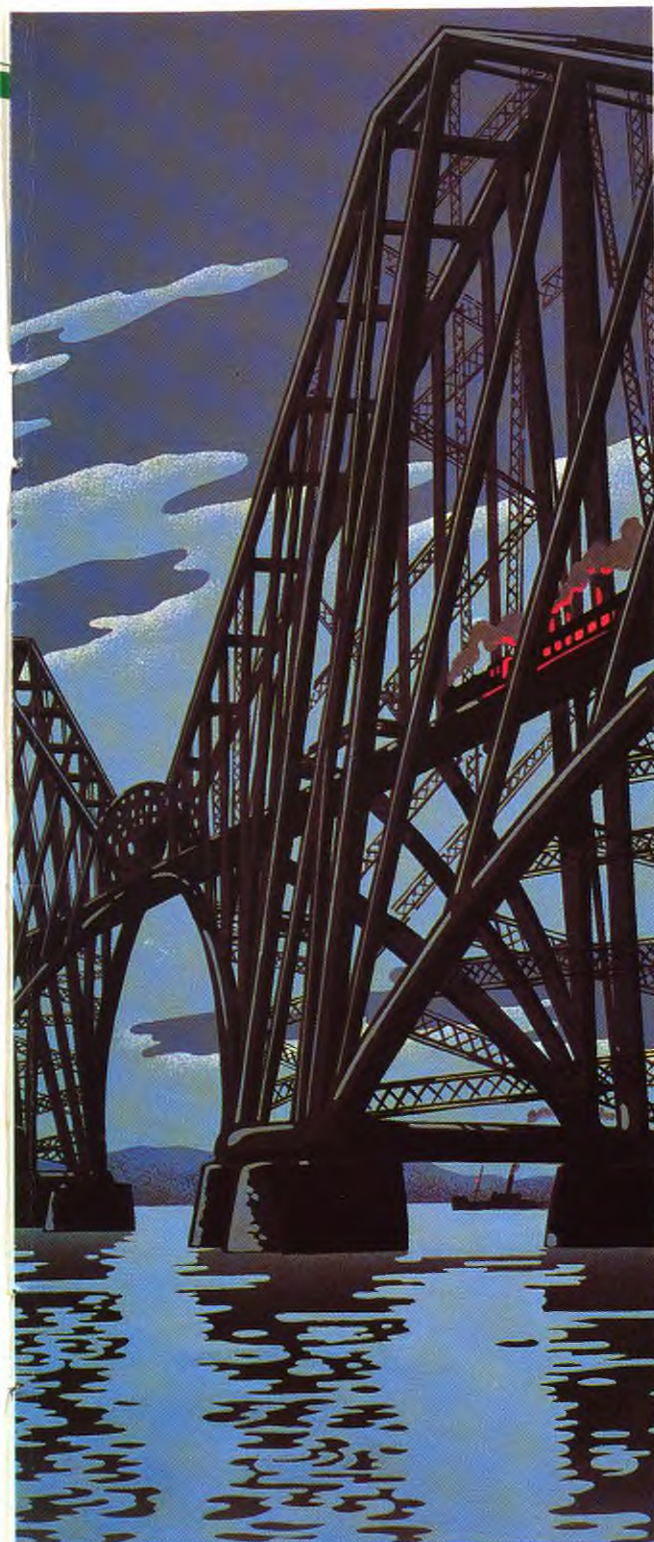

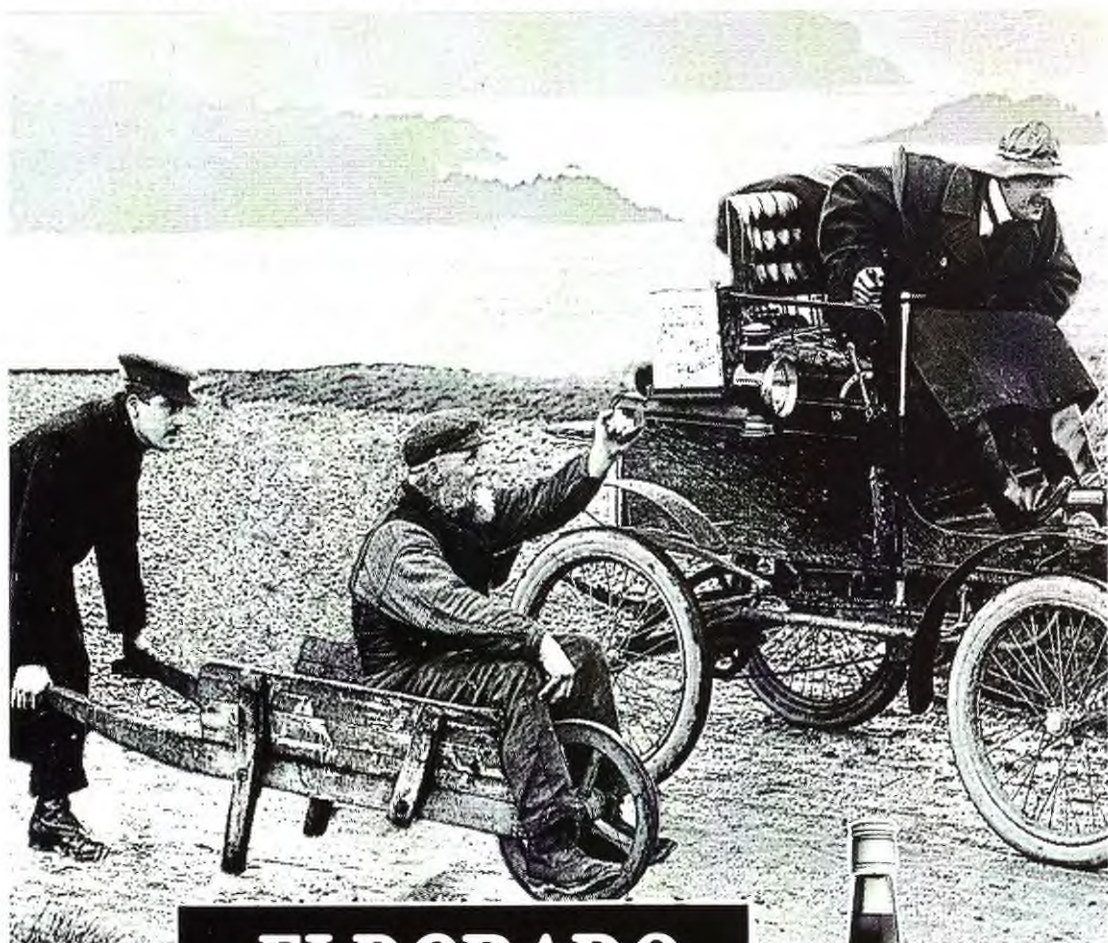

Remember when...

ON this day in 1915 Celtic played Kilmarnock at Parkhead in fog, before a paltry crowd, and won 2-0 with goals from Joe Dodds and Sniper Jimmy McColl.

The Celts line-up was: Charlie Shaw, Alec McNair and Tom McGregor; John McMaster, Peter Johnstone and Joe Dodds; Andy McAtee and Patsy Gallacher; Jimmy McColl; Jimmy McMenemy and Johnny Browning.

Skipper Sunny Jim Young had damaged his hand at war work but McMaster played despite a poisoned hand.

The park was playable yet snowbound. A problem was full employment; there just was no casual labour available in Glasgow. Men were in the factories, down the mines or in Flanders fighting the Kaiser.

Jobs for the boys! Maley sent out an SOS and the pitch was swept clear by the lads of Parkhead Reformatory, Celts to the last one.

Alec McNair was struggling not so much with the loss of form as with the recent death of his wife.

Once his 12-hour dawn shift was over he was totally occupied with bringing-up his young family. There was little time for training and Alec had surrendered three soft goals in as many weeks.

One man seldom short of puff was Dodds of Carluke. When Alec was beaten in an emergency he knew the Fearless Joe was in the offing somewhere, pounding in to the rescue.

The Seventh Cavalry never

galloped harder.

The previous week against Hearts, the Icicle had had a melting time when confronted by Private Willie Wilson.

Joe moved from left-half to right for the second 45 of the match and snuffed the menace out by matching the 'sojer sprinter' stride for stride on the Maroons' left.

The defeat of Kilmarnock marked the start of a high period in the Celtic story and its ending, on 21 April 1917, also featured the men from Rugby Park.

As of this snowy day at Paradise, Celtic, led by the great Sunny Jim, were about to set off on a 66-game run without defeat.

The club was approaching the end of its First Spring with success a constant blossom, an Age of Gold it would never know again until 1965 and the Second Coming to Parkhead of Jock Stein.

Also at Celtic Park, but in the early days of 1917, with flowers actually growing again after the Somme, Kilmarnock reversed this day's scoreline and brought the Tin Machine's great run of triumph to a halt.

To close November 1915, a quick visit was made to enemy

territory: Budapest. On 20 May 1914, Celtic played Burnley there for a cup put up by Ferencvaros.

The result was a 1-1 draw but Celtic won the replay at Turf Moor on September 1 of that year when, though the papers did not dare say so, the French and the British armies were retreating fast in France.

At the time, as pundits predicted peace by Christmas, Celtic speculated as to who would liberate the Budapest Cup to them first: the Serbians or the Russians, both allegedly smashing their way into Austria-Hungary.

Alas there was to be no Budapest Cup for the display cabinet. At the end of November 1915 the news broke: Celtic's trophy had been raffled (!) on behalf of the Austrian Red Cross ... and was the property of an unknown wrestler!
