EURO SPOTLIGHT

Rinat Dasayev

FOR any goalkeeper who plays for the Soviet Union the reputation of Lev Yashin always lurks in the background.

The former European Player of the Year and arguably the worlds finest keeper, he provided the yardstick by which present Russian goalkeepers are judged and few compare favourably.

In the last decade Rinat Dasayev has proved the exception to the rule. In his eight years as his country's last line of defence he has continually enhanced his reputation to the extent that throughout Europe he is now regarded as the best.

Dasayev was born in Southern Russia on July 13, 1957 and was introduced to football by his father. Initially the youngster was a forward learning to beat goalkeepers rather than being one himself.

At the age of 12 he substituted between the posts when his teams goalkeeper didn't arrive and to his own surprise enjoyed the experience. He remained in that position and progressed to senior football with local side Volgar.

Such was his reputation that when he moved to Moscow to become a physical education student he was signed by the Spartak club making his debut in 1978. Today he can look back on nearly 300 league matches for the

club having kept a clean sheet in more than half of these games.

A little more than a year after his league debut he won his first cap in Athens in a European Championship tie with Greece. The youngster was far from convincing and a 1-0 victory for the home side prevented the Soviets competing in the Finals of that competition in Italy.

Dasayev for World Record number of caps?

The qualifying matches for the 1982 World Cup Finals though saw him transfer his club form to the international arena and he only conceded two goals in eight games.

In Spain his safe handling, agility and impeccable positioning soon caught the eye as he proved himself to be an extremely effective goalkeeper.

Although the Soviet Union narrowly failed to reach the semi finals Dasayev had the satisfaction of knowing he had been voted the goalkeeper of the tournament.

In the Mexican World Cup Finals of 1986 and the European Championships



of last summer he added to his reputation as well as his total of international appearances. The holder of 90 caps, which surpasses the 75 of his illustrious predecessor Yashin, Dasayev could emulate the achievements of Pat Jennings, Dino Zoff and Peter Shilton by making 100 appearances for his country.

When it is remembered that Zoff became a World Cup winner at the age of 40 it is obvious that for 31 year old Dasayev the opportunity to establish a world record number of international appearances is not beyond him.

Although in recent seasons the top long serving Soviet footballers have been rewarded with lucrative transfers to Western Europe, Dasayev despite a £650,000 bid by Seville has given no indication that he wants to follow that particular trail.

His form with Spartak Moscow remains consistent and as his club prepares for the second round of the European Cup and his country play in World Cup qualifying matches.

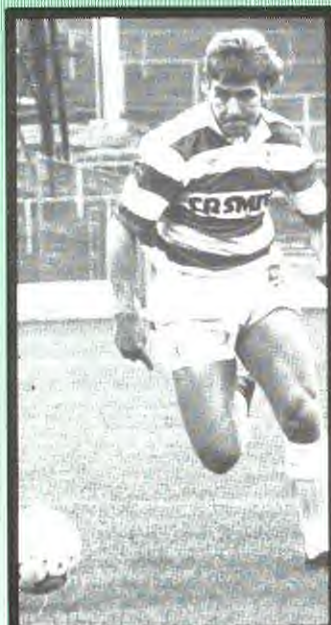
ITS becoming a habit of Mark McGhee this. The script this time around is identical to that of last season.

Veteran striker, trying to re-capture lost glory, shunned by the fans, few first team prospects, then scores a series of tremendous goals and becomes one of the unlikely heroes of the season.

McGhee has seen it all before but few could have foreseen his dramatic impact on the Celtic first team this season.

Amid rumours of a transfer it seemed that McGhee was right out of favour in the Celtic Park scheme of things this season right up until three weeks ago when he appeared as a substitute in the match against Honved. Minutes after coming on he had scored Celtic's fourth goal in that match.

In he went again to face St. Mirren three days later as the Celtic fans asked if the momentum could be kept going and the former Scotland international striker replied in the best way possible. He almost single-handedly destroyed St Mirren scoring a splendid hat trick and laying on two of the other goals. McGhee kept his place in the team for the match against Dundee Utd and once more starred. In fact he was desperately unlucky not to get on the

score-sheet that night too.

And last Saturday both he and Frank McAvennie netted the goals that saw Celtic defeat Hearts in Edinburgh for the first time in three and a half years.

Just as last season McGhee has shown that

he is the type of player any manager would love to have in his squad. Most of his goals have been scored in vital matches and certainly his goals this season have helped to spark off a major Celtic revival after a horrendous start to the season. McGhee has managed to score goals wherever he's played. Morton, Newcastle, Aberdeen, Hamburg and now Celtic have benefitted from his goals and close control.

"I realise I may not at this stage in my career be considered as a first choice striker in everyone's eyes. But if you take a look at last season I played at some stage in almost every match. The same this season would do nicely. I feel I have still a great deal to contribute to this level. Its only in the last couple of seasons I have been relatively injury free for the first time since leaving Aberdeen in 1984 and I'm desperate to make up for what I consider to be lost time," says the rejuvenated striker.

Already this season McGhee has made a telling contribution to the Celtic cause and before the term is closed many Celtic minded people will have cause again to be grateful to the man.

FOR a side expected to struggle this season Dundee have made not a bad start to their league campaign at all.

Local legend Dave Smith, their unexpected choice of manager arrived during the summer to discover a club not so much in transition but in turmoil.

Managerial duo Jocky Scott and Drew Jarvie had been whisked off to Pittodrie as part of Aberdeen's own managerial revolution. And as bemused Dens Park fans looked on some of them could recall a time when their club would have been far more likely to have poached the Dons boss than the other way about. But as the game in the east of Scotland has boomed in the last decade Dundee have only been able to fulfil the odd walk-on part in the east coast drama.

Yet there had been signs last season that they were about to emerge from the shadow of near neighbours Dundee United.

In fact for much of the season they were favourites to fill the last European spot in the Premier League table until they started giving away points like confetti during the crucial last quarter. Eventually they were pipped by United once more despite having outplayed them in the early part of that season.

Of course Dundee had to cope with the loss of skipper Jim Duffy, one of the most influential defenders in the Premier League until his untimely retreat from the game after an injury sustained at Ibrox. But worse was to follow as his replacement as club captain Gordon Chisholm was also sidelined for a great deal of the season.

The turning point in Dundee's fight for Europe came with the sale of John Brown to Rangers at one of the most vital stages of the season. No-one can say exactly what behind the scenes dramas were unfolding in connection with this event but there can be little doubt that Dundee really began to struggle when he departed.

No doubt Dave Smith will have been told this sorry tale by the existing personnel at the club but he has worked hard to keep spirits up at Dens.

Thus far into the season Dundee sit with nine points from ten games with a game in hand over Aberdeen and the rest of their competitors. The two low points in their campaign have been a 3-0 defeat by Dundee United at Dens followed the following week by a shocking 1-0 defeat at Hamilton Accies. These though have been compensated by a fine 1-0 home win over Celtic courtesy of a Tommy Coyne goal and a 2-1 win against Hibs that didn't quite result in a stock market collapse for the high flying Edinburgh side. Dundee kicked off the campaign with a 1-1 draw at home to Aberdeen when for the umpteenth time they seemed to be in the driving seat only to succumb to the psychological pressures which come into play when any Dundee side is in that position against an Aberdeen team.

ACCOMPLISHED

Tommy Coyne has given recent notice that he has shrugged off the uncertainty surrounding his future at the club by showing glimpses of the form that made him Scotland's top striker last season. Keith Wright too has turned in a series of accomplished displays while Englishman Wes Saunders at the heart of the defence and in midfield has been one of the most influential players of the season to date. With players of genuine ability such as McKinlay, Angus, Chisholm and Rafferty in the side Dundee can build on their solid start to the season. But if they are to harbour ambitions recalling former glories they could start by trying to plug the exit door by which such as Ferguson, Fraser, Connor and Brown have departed from Dens.

Writing in this season's League Review Chairman Angus Cook commented: "With the club now being in an economically viable position, funds will be at the disposal of the new manager to strengthen the club's playing resources in our determined onslaught to have us regain our rightful place in the highest echelons of the game in Scotland, and indeed in Europe."

Well said that man. ...

CELTIC started this match at the top of the league having won all four previous league matches, but Dundee were in no mood to stand back and admire their visitors.

Celtic opened the scoring in the 12th minute when Tommy Burns ran through and shot high into the net from 20 yards with his trusty left foot. Dundee though equalised seven minutes later when Iain Ferguson converted a controversial penalty. Eight minutes before half-time Brian McClair put Celtic back in front and started what was to be a personal triumph for him.

The second period was just seven minutes old when McClair made it 3-1 and only minutes later Cammy Fraser was ordered off after another crude foul. Celtic took full advantage of the extra man and McClair completed his hat-trick in the 72nd minute to make it 4-1. A minute later Brian incredibly scored his fourth and Celtic's fifth and ten minutes from time Jim Melrose chipped in number six. Only a minute after that Dundee were awarded another penalty which Ferguson scored from to the sarcastic cheers of the Celtic support, to make the final score 6-2.

After scoring four goals in this match, McClair was then dropped for the next match away to Aarhus of Denmark in the UEFA Cup.

1000 REASONS TO BE CHEERFUL



Frank's Tynecastle clincher is a Celtic Milestone

Last Saturday's match against Hearts at Tynecastle was remarkable for a number of reasons. It marked the return to first team action of Irish Internationalist goalkeeper Pat Bonner. It was Celtic's 300th Premier League victory; it saw Celtic's 1,000th Premier League goal and it was also our first victory at the Hearts ground for a number of seasons.

Bonner's unexpected return was greeted by loud cheering from the Celtic fans and his display gave those same fans even more reasons to cheer as he slotted in behind the defence as if he had never been away.

Celtic's 1,000th Premier goal was scored when McAvennie (top) latched on to a Morris pass and, outrunning the Hearts defence, placed the ball behind Henry Smith to give the Celts a deserved 2-0 victory.

It was a superb counter attacking effort of the kind manager *Billy McNeill* warned against before the match."

5 YEARS AGO

**October 29th 1983, Premier League
Celtic 5 Hibs 1**

THIS was Celtic's first league win in five matches and the lads achieved it with some style completely putting behind them what had been a dismal October.

Brian McClair opened the scoring in only eight minutes with the first of a double but it wasn't until the second half that Celtic started motoring. In 48 minutes Provan grabbed the second a rare goal by Whittaker made it three in 60 minutes before Thomson notched Hibs solitary goal in 77 minutes. McLeod in 78 minutes and McClair in 86 minutes completed the rout in a match watched by a paltry 13,777.

10 YEARS AGO

**October 28th 1978, Premier League
Hearts 2 Celtic 0**

THIS match was more noted by Celtic manager *Billy McNeill's* comments after the game rather than anything that happened during it.

Celtic were absolutely woeful against a side destined to be relegated just six months later.

Busby did the damage with goals in 53 minutes and 68 minutes and Hearts could even afford the luxury of playing with ten men after Robertson was sent off. After the match *McNeill* said: "This is an extraordinary club which demands extraordinary standards. Today too many players fell short of those standards."

15 YEARS AGO

**October 27th, 1973, Scottish League
1st Division
Hearts 1 Celtic 3**

THIS match was all over as a contest in the first half as Celtic without playing to anything like their top form were still too much for a sad Hearts side. *George Connelly* opened the scoring in seven minutes and *Dalglish* added a double in 29 minutes and 44 minutes. Hearts woke up in the second half and the tireless *Donald Ford* grabbed a consolation goal in 56 minutes. The win took Celtic to the top of the table in a match watched by 33,000.



HELPING THE GAME

There is an organisation which receives £9 million annually from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettlers and spends it all on projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.

It pays £4.5 million to the Football Grounds Improvement Trust to help League clubs meet the demands of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act and improve their stadia.

It has set aside £2.3 million to ensure that all grounds in Scotland and England are covered by closed circuit television systems. It has allocated over £1 million to fund Football and the Community schemes at clubs throughout the UK.

The organisation is also injecting £1.25 million to assist 'non-League' clubs with essential safety work, paying over £1.3 million every year towards policing costs at League matches and investing £750,000 to improve transport facilities for football supporters.

The name of this organisation is THE FOOTBALL TRUST.

By the end of the year Spotting-the-Ball will have generated almost £70 million for The Football Trust and its sister organisation the Football Grounds Improvement Trust.

The body uniquely brings together representatives from all areas of the game and draws its membership from the Scottish Football League, the Scottish Football Association, the game in England, the PFA, local authorities, the police and pools firms.

The Football Trust's annual income of £9 million is in addition to the £6.5 million the Pool Promoters Association pay to the football authorities for the reproduction of the copyrighted fixtures on the pools coupons, thus making them the game's largest benefactor by far.

SUPPORTING SCOTTISH FOOTBALL

During the past year The Football Trust has been committed to developing Scottish football at every level. Its initiatives range from supporting an educational trust for Scotland's professional footballers to providing kit for unemployed teams; new terracing at Kirkintilloch Rob Roy to a new artificial pitch for community use at Stirling Albion; the UK's most extensive closed circuit television system at Hampden Park to portacabins at the Hill of Beath Ramblers; developing football in the Scottish Isles to a £250,000 safety programme at the national stadium; new coach park at Ibrox to covering 35% of policing costs at B&Q League matches.

The Football Trust works closely with the Scottish Football League, Scottish Football Association and the Scottish Sports Council.

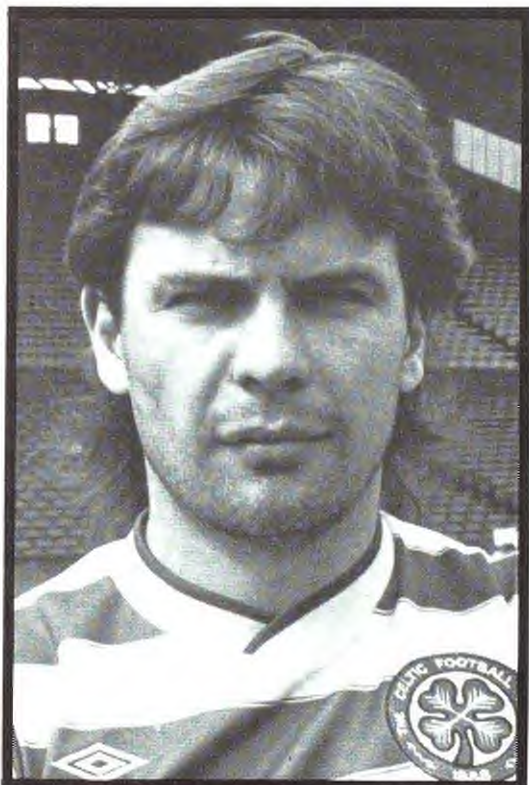

In the Premier League Hearts troubles continued with a 2-0 defeat by Celtic at Tynecastle. Despite the fact that Celtic have played better and lost Hearts were unable to take advantage and need someone quick who can score goals.

Ironically enough Wayne Foster was playing for Hearts reserves against Celtic reserves at Celtic Park and scored two splendid goals while his first team colleagues' nightmare continued.

Celtic on the other hand won comfortably without exerting themselves and were glad to see Pat Bonner back in goal after a back operation which everyone thought would keep him out until at least Christmas.

It seems that the best thing to have happened to St Mirren was their 7-1 defeat at the hands of Celtic three weeks ago. Since then they've taken a point from Aberdeen and on Saturday travelled to face Jim McLean's Dundee United in the Premier League at Tannadice. An early goal by Mark McWalter gave Saints a fighting 1-0 win and strengthened managerial duo Fitzpatrick and McGarvey's claims that

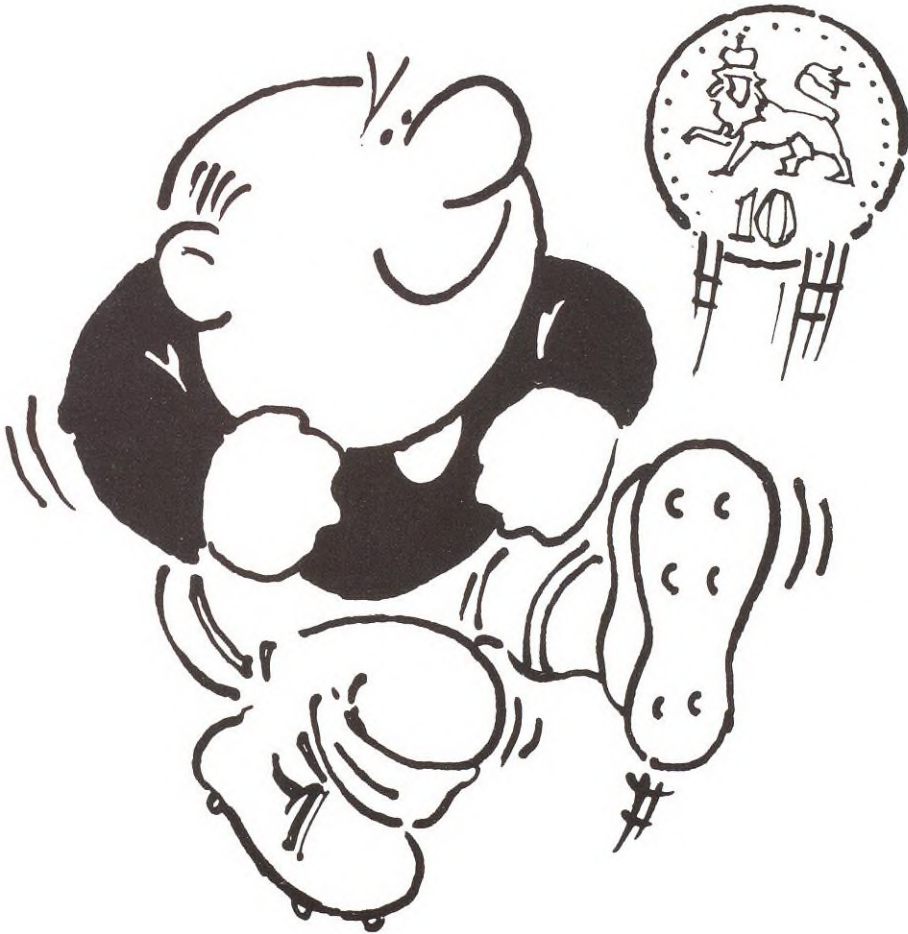
they are not far away from being a side which can genuinely challenge for a place in Europe once more.
