## SOCIAL MISSION STATEMENT

### Introduction

Celtic Football Club is legendary and as with most legends as much myth as fact surrounds its history and what the Club stands for today. The Social Mission Statement aims to simply define what the Club stands for and seeks to promote within society.

### History

Celtic Football Club was founded in 1888. Its principal founder was a Marist Brother named Walfrid. The Club had two principal aims: The first aim was to raise funds to provide food for the poor of the East End of Glasgow, an area of the City that was greatly impoverished and had a high rate of infant mortality. Within the East End was a large Irish community and friction was growing between the native Glaswegians and the new influx of Irish. Brother Walfrid saw the need for social integration and his vision was a football club that Scottish and Irish, Protestants and Catholics alike could support. A new football club would be a vehicle to bring the communities together and this was the second aim. The Marist brother sought for the Club to have both a Scottish and Irish identity and hence, the Club's name "Celtic" came about, representing a bridge of cultures across the Irish Sea.

### Current Positioning of Celtic Football Club

Celtic Football Club is a Scottish football club with proud Irish links. The primary business of Celtic is as a football club. It is run on a professional business basis with no political agenda. However, the Club has a wider role and the responsibility of being a major Scottish social institution promoting health, well-being and social integration.

### Who is Celtic Football Club for?

Celtic Football Club is for people who want to support a football club that strives for excellence in Scotland and in Europe, is proud of its history, supportive of its local community and seeks to support the following aims: "To maximise all opportunities to disassociate the Club from sectarianism and bigotry of any kind. To promote Celtic as a Club for all people, regardless of gender, age, religion, race or ability."

### Summary

Celtic is a club for everyone who believes in football as a medium for healthy pleasure, entertainment and social integration. The Club always has been and always will simply aim to be the team of the people.

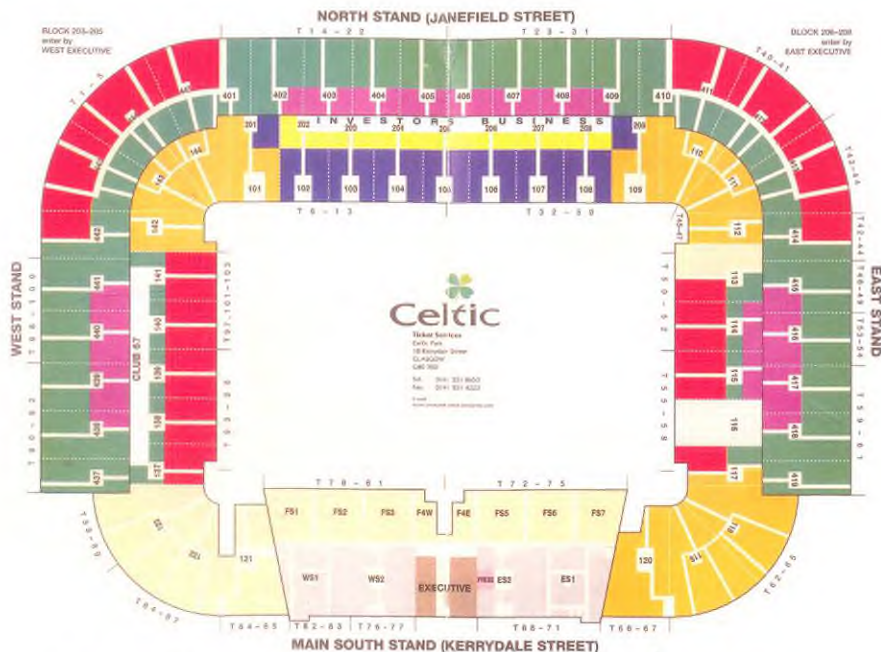
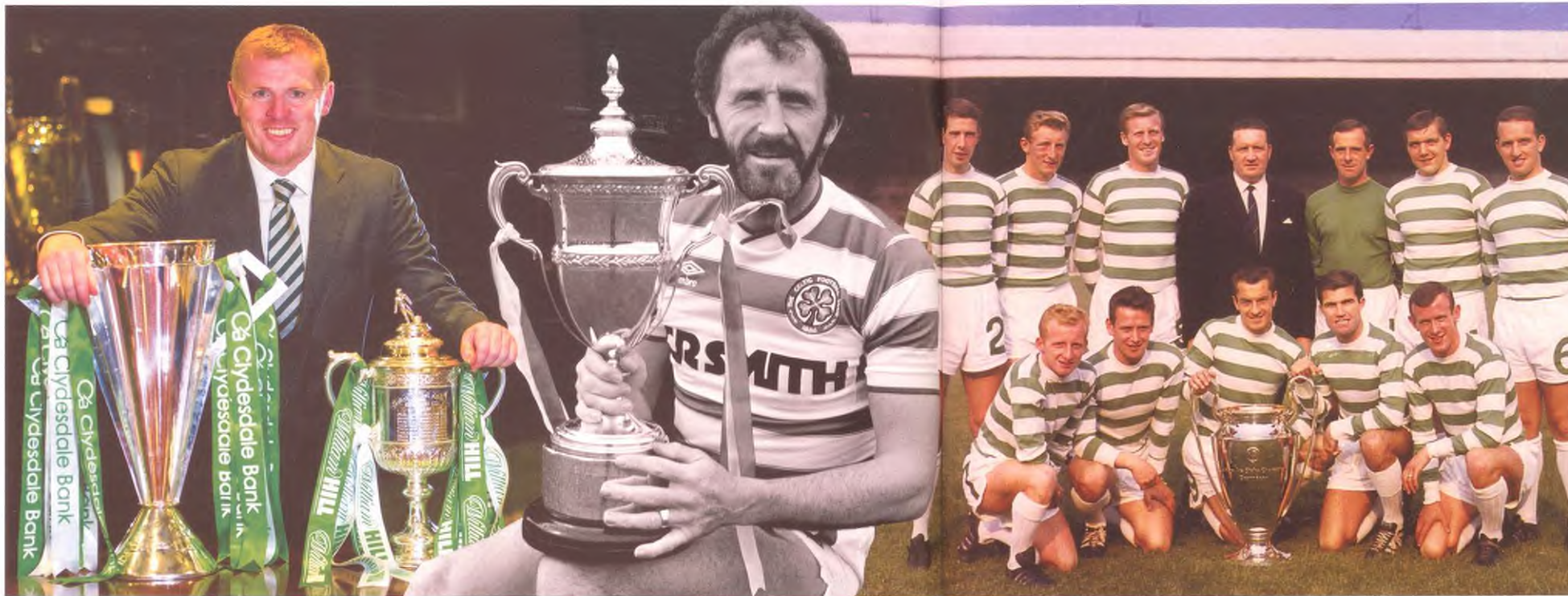
the form of Fraser Forster, who produced a series of stunning saves at the weekend to deny Hibs a goal.

**ALL supporters are reminded that the Ground Regulations insist that spectators remain seated during the match.**

**Please remain seated throughout the match in the interests of your own safety and that of your fellow supporters.**

## UNACCEPTABLE CONDUCT AT CELTIC PARK AND AWAY FOOTBALL STADIA

NEW rules have been introduced by the SFA and SPL in connection with "Unacceptable Conduct" at football stadia. The new rules form part of our Stadium Regulations. It is a condition of entry to stadia that the Stadium Regulations, including these new rules, are followed.

A summary of the new rules is set out below. Full details are available on the Celtic website at [www.celticfc.net](http://www.celticfc.net) or by contacting the Customer Service Manager on 0871 226 1888\*.

### CELTIC FOOTBALL CLUB WILL NOT TOLERATE UNACCEPTABLE CONDUCT AT CELTIC PARK OR AT AWAY FOOTBALL STADIA

- Unacceptable conduct is conduct which is violent or disorderly
- Violent conduct includes any actual, attempted or threatened physical violence against any person, or intentional damage to property

- Disorderly conduct includes conduct which stirs up or sustains, or is likely or is designed to stir up or sustain, hatred or ill will against or towards individuals or groups of people because of:
  - Gender
  - Colour, race, nationality (including citizenship) or ethnic or national origin
  - Membership or presumed membership, of a religious group or of a social or cultural group with perceived religious affiliation
  - Sexual orientation
  - Transgender identity
  - Disability
  - Using threatening, abusive or insulting words or conduct
  - Displaying writing or any other thing which is threatening, abusive or insulting

This list is not exhaustive and must be read in conjunction with the Stadium Regulations.

### ANY PERSON ENGAGING IN UNACCEPTABLE CONDUCT MAY BE SUBJECT TO ANY, OR A COMBINATION OF THE FOLLOWING:

- Removal from the stadium
- Suspension from attending official matches involving Celtic Football Club
- Indefinite ban from attending official matches involving Celtic Football Club
- Report to the police and possible criminal proceedings

## ONES TO WATCH

**IT'S** been a mixed bag of results for Kilmarnock since the start of December, but it's already been an improvement on the opening four months of the season. Up until then they had only picked up nine points - from two wins and three draws.

Since December they have already surpassed double figures with twice as many wins.

On-loan Celt, Jackson Irvine, has been a regular for the Ayrshire side, and has extended his deal until the end of the season, but will sit out this evening's return to Celtic Park.

Allan Johnston still has a pool of talent to choose from, though, and we look at six of his key players who could line up against the Hoops tonight.

## Craig Samson

Despite only being 29-years-old, Craig Samson has a wealth of experience in the Scottish game. The keeper began his career at Kilmarnock but couldn't shift Gordon Marshall or Colin Meldrum from between the sticks. In order to gain more first-team games he went on loan to Queen of the South and St Johnstone. His performances began to catch the eye of other Scottish clubs and he went on to play for Dundee United, Ross County and Dundee for a season each. A short spell down south at Hereford United ended in 2009 and the Irvine-born keeper returned home, signing for Ayr United. It was his next club, though, St Mirren, where he made his name. Some outstanding performances between the sticks made him a fans' favourite during his three years in Paisley but he chose to return to Killie in the summer of 2013 where he went straight into the starting XI.

## Kris Boyd

Kris Boyd has been flying high since his return to Rugby Park in the summer. Picking up where he left off in 2006, when he left the club to join Rangers, Boyd has been knocking the goals in on a regular basis. The 30-year-old striker came through the ranks at Killie before making his debut in 2001 against Celtic. He went on to secure a first-team spot and his consistency began to attract attention both north and south of the border. It was Rangers who won his signature, though, in 2006 and the striker went on to be a prolific goalscorer. Stints at Middlesbrough, Nottingham Forest and Turkish side, Eskisehirspor followed his contract finishing, before he dipped his toe into the MLS with Portland Timbers. His successful return to Scottish football, though, caught the eye of Gordon Strachan and he was awarded a call-up to the Scotland squad in November for the first since 2010.

## Jeroen Tesselaar

Dutch defender, Jeroen Tesselaar, has been a regular at Kilmarnock since joining the club in the summer of 2012. He already had a grasp of the Scottish game by then, though, having spent a season at St Mirren prior to his Ayrshire move. He was a regular under Danny Lennon and continued to play regularly after the switch. His debut for Killie came in a goal-less draw against Dundee on the opening day of the season and has so far racked up over 20 appearances in the current campaign. The 25-year-old began his career at HVV Hollandia before moving to AZ Alkmaar where he broke into the first-team squad in 2008. Failing to make any appearances, though, he went on loan to Dutch side, Telstar, for three years.

## Sammy Clingan

Sammy Clingan has been an invaluable addition to the Killie squad since joining in January 2013. The 30-year-old signed from Doncaster Rovers, his sixth club south of the border, since becoming a senior professional in 2003. It was then he broke through from Wolves' youth academy but failing to make a mark in the first team, he went on loan to Chesterfield. Two seasons at Nottingham Forest was followed by a year at Norwich City and three at Coventry City. He was made captain there in 2011. Clingan plays in defensive midfield, but is lethal from the free-kick position, a trait Celtic's youth and senior sides were made aware of when he scored against both earlier this season. He had a run out for Killie's Under-20s when he was returning from injury but has since slotted into the side, often forcing on-loan Celt, Jackson Irvine, into the central-defence role.

## Michael Gardyne

On-loan from Dundee United for the season, Michael Gardyne has made a difference to the Kilmarnock midfield. The former Celtic youngster was set to return to Tannadice this month but his performances earned him a loan extension at Rugby Park. The 27-year-old left the Hoops in 2007, after a loan spell at Ross County. He went to Morton but it was only a short stay, before returning to the Highlands to sign a permanent deal with the Dingwall club. He helped his side win the Second Division title and was nominated for the First Division Player of the Year award the following season. He played against the Hoops in Ross County's shock semi-final victory in the Scottish Cup four years ago and gained a runner's-up medal from the final. He did, however, get his hands on silverware when he won the Challenge Cup with County a year later, the club's second win in five seasons.

## Sean Clohessy

Kilmarnock's summer signing, Sean Clohessy, had been a regular for the Ayrshire club since making the move from south of the border. The 27-year-old from Croydon in London has played his entire career in England before Allan Johnston swooped for him. Starting his career at Arsenal, Clohessy progressed through the youth system before making the move to Gillingham's senior side in 2005. The right-back was loaned out to Salisbury City three years later and impressed so much during his time there he was signed on a permanent basis the following year. A short spell at Bath City was abruptly ended after a fortnight because Southend, who he had signed a pre-contract with, had their transfer embargo lifted and they were able to sign him before the 2010/11 season got underway. He turned down a contract extension with the Shrimps last summer, though, and moved to Scotland. Clohessy scored Kilmarnock's second goal against Celtic last time the sides met, but it wasn't enough to help claw back a result, with Killie going on to lose 5-2.

## PREVIOUS MEETINGS v KILMARNOCK



**IN the last four meetings between Celtic and Kilmarnock there have been goals galore for both sides, with the Hoops bagging 12 to Killie's six.**

Neil Lennon's side have secured three wins out of the last four clashes, with their only defeat coming last season just days after losing to Barcelona in the UEFA Champions League.

Kilmarnock have been scoring almost as many goals as they've been letting in this season, setting this one up to be another high-scoring clash, but with Celtic out to continue their good defensive record, the Hoops will be strong favourites for the match.

Ahead of today's game we take a look back at the three meetings between the sides from last season.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 30, 2013  
CELTIC 4-1 KILMARNOCK

Celtic responded to their disappointing League Cup semi-final defeat to St Mirren with a 4-1 win over Kilmarnock just three days later. Kris Commons rattled the bar twice in the first half as the home side showed they meant business and eventually Joe Ledley opened the scoring four minutes from the break with a long-range effort. But shortly after the restart, Killie levelled through a Cillian Sheridan tap-in at the back post. Anthony Stokes added a close-range shot on either side of two strikes by Adam Matthews - one being a long-range screamer to match Ledley's first-half strike. And it showed the form the Welshman was hitting after he had previously opened his scoring account for the Hoops away to Arbroath the previous month.

KILMARNOCK 1-3 CELTIC

Fresh from their dramatic 2-1 win at home to Spartak Moscow, and progression to the last 16 of the UEFA Champions League, Celtic went into the league meeting with Kilmarnock at Rugby Park and produced a classy second-half display to finish 3-1 winners. The Hoops were without Kris Commons who had picked up an injury after he converted the winning penalty in midweek, and it was Scott Brown who put his side into the lead. It was a well-worked goal down the right wing after 27 minutes, with the captain side-footing Adam Matthews' cut-back into the net. Joe Ledley then slid in to convert Brown's pass for the Hoops' second after the break, before substitute Georgios Samaras sealed the points in style. Brown was the playmaker again, lofting the ball in for the Greek who dramatically headed it in off the crossbar. Cillian Sheridan pulled one back for the home side when he volleyed Jeroen Tesselaar's cross past Fraser Forster, but it was little more than a late consolation for the Ayrshire side.

CELTIC 0-2 KILMARNOCK

Just days after Celtic slumped to a heartbreaking 2-1 defeat in the Nou Camp, conceding a goal in the fourth minute of stoppage time, they welcomed Kilmarnock to Glasgow. But despite their outstanding performance in Catalonia, the Hoops were unable to replicate it in the SPL and suffered a rare home defeat. It was a disappointing 90 minutes at home as Celtic lost 2-0 to Kilmarnock, conceding goals from former Celt, Cillian Sheridan and Liam Kelly. The Irish striker took advantage of a defensive mistake two minutes from half-time and Kelly doubled their advantage from the penalty spot just after the hour mark. With Killie lining up a five-man midfield, it negated the danger from Celtic's diamond shape and meant most of the battle was in the centre of the park, with neither side producing meaningful chances on target.

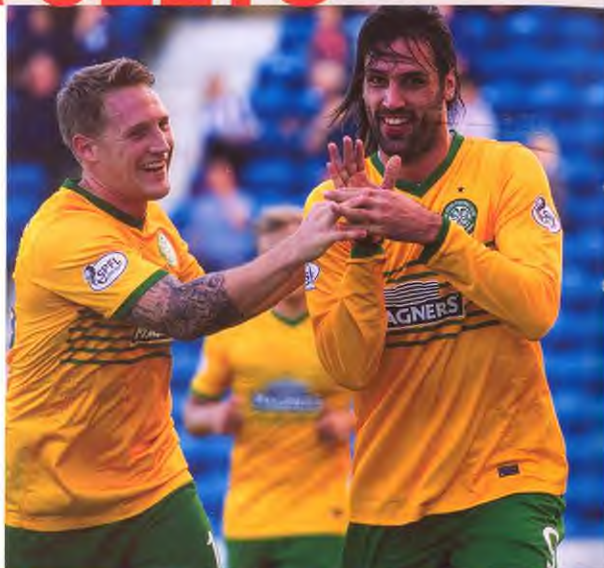
KILMARNOCK 2-5 CELTIC

**In the first meeting between the two sides this season, Celtic won at Rugby Park in a seven-goal thriller. Six minutes of brilliance from Georgios Samaras midway through the first-half sent Celtic on their way as he set up Kris Commons before netting two goals himself.**

Kilmarnock responded with a Sammy Clingan free-kick and a Sean Clohessy strike, sending Killie into the break just a goal behind.

With memories of the game two seasons before, when Celtic came from three goals down to draw 3-3, the home side were hopeful of turning the tables as they went into the second half.

But their dramatic comeback wasn't to be and instead Samaras sealed his hat-trick with a header in the closing stages, before substitute Amido Balde rounded off the win with his first competitive goal for the Hoops.







# DAVIE PROVAN ON THE WING

A sparkling performance for Kilmarnock against Celtic eventually led to the winger joining the Hoops

**THE 1977/78 season was an unmitigated disaster for Celtic. Fifth place in the league and no trophies won meant no European place for the first time since 1961, but perhaps the biggest debacle was the defeat to Kilmarnock in a Scottish Cup replay at Rugby Park.**

Celtic were actually lucky to survive the first game and only a late Roddy MacDonald goal had saved the Celts' blushes against the part-time Ayrshire men from the First Division.

Killie deservedly won the replay and the gloomy mood of the huge number of Celtic fans who left Rugby Park on that dark February night and travelled back over the Fenwick Moors was compared by one scribe as akin to 'Napoleon's retreat from Moscow'.

There was one talking point amongst the Celtic support after the game and that was the performance of the Kilmarnock right-winger, Davie Provan. He had tortured Celtic's left flank in both cup ties, firstly giving Tommy Burns and then John Dowie a torrid time.

The fact that Celtic had played two midfield men out

of position at left-back did not detract in any way from Provan's sparkling performances.

It was with great joy that the Celtic support discovered that Davie Provan had signed for Celtic in September 1978 for a huge fee of £125,000 which, at that time, was by far a record transfer in Scotland.

Provan was an immediate hit at Celtic and was a fans' favourite for the next eight years. He was one of a select band of players who was comfortable playing in a wide position and was a superb crosser of the ball (a dying art in this part of the world) particularly whilst on the run and his entertaining style of play was to create many goals for Celtic in the following years.

His distinctive flowing curly locks (look at him on TV these days and to think we used to presume he had naturally curly hair), jersey hanging over the shorts and socks around the ankles made him a recognisable figure on the field of play.

Unusually for a winger, he was a marvellously consistent player and was a stand-out even in an era when there were many quality wingers in the Scottish



game such as Weir, Cooper, McLean, Milne, Scanlon and Johnny Doyle.

The irony is that Provan's arrival was seen as the end of Johnny Doyle's Celtic career but Doyle was versatile enough to play in a number of positions and the two of them became great friends.

Doyle even invested in a similar permed hair style and from a distance it was often difficult to tell them apart.

Davie Provan was an integral part of two of the finest Celtic forward lines of the modern era in the early 1980s - the first being Provan, Sullivan, McGarvey, Burns and McCluskey and the second was Provan, McStay, McGarvey, Burns and Nicholas.

He had many great games for Celtic although perhaps his finest was the League Cup final in December 1982, when he tore the Rangers defence apart at Hampden, on a day of vile weather.

He created both goals that day in the 2-1 victory and also a hatful of chances that were not taken, making the margin of victory much tighter than it should have been.

By the autumn of the 1985 Davie had returned to form and was giving his best performances for some time.

Unfortunately his health was then badly affected by Myalgic Encephalopathy (ME), better known as post-viral fatigue syndrome. Despite a courageous effort to continue his career he had to retire in 1987 and 42,000 Celtic fans turned out on a bitterly cold night to attend his testimonial against Brian Clough's splendid Nottingham Forest side.

Around the year 2000, I attended a charity night talk show in aid of the Little Sisters of the Poor in a parish hall in Paisley at the back of St Mirren's old ground at Love Street. Brian Dempsey organised it

and had assembled an impressive array of guests.

As well as Dempsey, there was Paul Cooney, Hugh Keevins, Charlie Nicholas, Gerry McNee and Davie Provan in the hall that night to discuss all things Celtic.

The panellists had brought various items with them to auction in the course of the evening in order to help raise funds.

Davie Provan very generously donated his first Scotland cap from 1979 and his 1985 Scottish Cup final jersey, the game in which he had scored such a dramatic equaliser against Dundee United.

Brian Dempsey at first refused to accept them saying that they were of tremendous personal and sentimental value and that Davie may regret this kind act of kindness in later years.

Provan was adamant that Dempsey take them, stating that he had the memories which were priceless and that he was delighted they should go to help assist such a worthy cause in helping the poor of the Third World.

Gerry McNee won the auction with a benevolent bid of £1,000 and he mischievously stated that the 1985 cup final top would go alongside his famous Jimmy McGrory medal.

The elderly Mother Superior in the hall was totally overcome with emotion, never thinking for a minute that such a vast sum of money would have been raised on the night for the Sisters' good deeds.

Davie Provan is currently a newspaper columnist and match summariser on television. As with all pundits you may not necessarily agree with some of his opinions but he is generally regarded as one of the better in that trade.

However, he will always be best remembered as 'Davie Provan on the wing' as the Celtic fans used to fondly sing. I wish him well.



# FOOTBALL FOCUS

**Emilio Izaguirre** is enjoying his football and the run Celtic are on, and he says the secret of the team's success is taking it one game at a time

Exclusive interview: Mark Henderson





EMILIO Izaguirre's natural instinct for adventure has made him more noted as an attacking full-back since joining Celtic three-and-a-half years ago, but the Honduran's defensive qualities have also shone through in the last three months during the Hoops' remarkable run of clean sheets.

Prior to Sunday's game at Easter Road, the Scottish champions had not conceded a goal in nine successive domestic games - a post-war record.

Izaguirre has been a constant in the backline throughout this period and his contribution to this fantastic feat has been considerable.

Naturally it's a source of satisfaction for the 27-year-old, but he was keen to deflect any praise on to his colleagues in the back division and the rest of the side - this has been a colossal collective effort.

"It's very good for the defenders and the goalkeeper as we have worked very hard in all of these games to keep these the clean sheets," he told the matchday programme in an exclusive interview. "It's a good record and it's good for the whole team.

"It's just been down to hard work, whether it's been Fraser, Mikael, Adam, Darnell, Efe, Virgil or me, and sometimes Charlie has been in the defence as well.

"It's not easy to achieve such a record as the Scottish Premiership is a very hard league, particularly away from home as teams play long balls and the back four need to have a high concentration during the 90 minutes.

"But we have been very consistent - the defenders, midfielders and strikers. Everyone has put a lot of effort in to keep the record going and to have so many games unbeaten - all these clean sheets is brilliant."

Celtic's assistant manager Johan Mjallby will take huge personal pride in this defensive dexterity. A superb stopper during his playing days with club and country, the Swede is a significant influence on the current Hoops rearguard.

"The gaffer talks about the clean sheets, and when the defenders are training and warming-up before games with Johan, we always talk about keeping a clean sheet as well, and this is good for us and also for those further forward in the side," said Izaguirre.

"I have been here for four seasons and I have always worked hard with Johan and learned a lot. It's good for Celtic to have someone like Johan at the club."

Shutting out the rest of Scottish football hasn't stemmed Izaguirre's proficiency in supplying his team-mates with chances.

According to the latest statistics, he's Celtic's king of assists in the current campaign, no mean feat for a left-back.

At both ends of the park, Izaguirre has enjoyed a stellar six months and he's determined to maintain his momentum in the second half of the season as Celtic aim to defend the domestic double.

And, despite being bound for this summer's World Cup in Brazil, he won't be distracted from this goal.







## NEW FACES ALWAYS WELCOME AT PARADISE

AS the clock ticks down on the January transfer window, Emilio Izaguirre has insisted that he would welcome any further additions to the Celtic dressing room.

The Hoops had added Holmbert Fridjonsson and Stefan Johansen before the weekend and Neil Lennon is still keen to strengthen his squad further by the end of the month.

"It's good if we have new players coming into the team at Celtic as they will help the team, and we need a big squad for the second half of the season," said Izaguirre.

## PRAISE FOR FELLOW FULL-BACK

EMILIO Izaguirre has been impressed by the confidence shown by fellow full-back Darnell Fisher since the teenager's elevation to the first-team this season.

The English youngster is set to make his 10th appearance for the Scottish champions tonight and has proved an able deputy in the absence of the injured Mikael Lustig and Adam Matthews.

"He is a good player – he has good technique and is fast," said the Honduran. "In one-on-ones he's quick, and it's good for Celtic to have young players coming into the team.

"It's difficult for any young player coming into the first team. But when they have confidence, aren't scared of anything and play well, then they can do well in the games. He is a young player and has played well."





"I am looking at Celtic just now and only when the season is finished will I think about the World Cup," said Izaguirre. "That's what I do every year - I just focus on my fitness every week and look ahead to the next game. I'm happy, have been working hard and I like playing in every game."

"I always try my best every week and every day for my career, Celtic and the fans. I enjoy it when we win and I'm obviously disappointed when we lose."

"Just now I am happy and I will keep trying my best to help us win the championship as early as possible for our confidence and we also have the game against Aberdeen in the cup to look forward to."

"They are a big club and have a good team and they can attack and defend as well so we will need to stay very focused as this is a big game for us and we will be aiming to win."

Whatever the stakes, Izaguirre wants to be involved. His fervour for football means he hates missing any match, and he has started over 30 games for the Scottish champions since the season got underway in July. Remarkably, within that time, he has also starred for his national side several times on the other side of the world without complaint.

Sheer enthusiasm does not solely explain this level of participation, however. A tireless trainer, Izaguirre is a dedicated professional and a familiar presence in the Lennoxtown gym, doing extra work with club's sports scientists, headed up by Bill Styles. It's a fundamental part of his daily schedule. This is an interview had to wait until he was finished.

"After a hard session today, I did some extra running," said the defender. "I like to work hard and

do this every day in the gym. I do a lot of work with Bill and he's a very good person. I always speak with him as he speaks Spanish. It's good for me as when I need help with something I can speak to him and he always helps me out. He is a good man and a good friend."

Barring injuries, Izaguirre will take up his usual berth on the left-hand side of the Bhoys' backline tonight against Kilmarnock.

And he's anticipating a tough test from the Rugby Park side, despite their struggles for consistency this term.

"I respect every team in Scotland and expect a hard game everywhere, from all 11 teams in the league, as all the players want to do well and beat Celtic. But this is good for us as it makes us have a good game," said Izaguirre.

"It's very difficult to play against teams at Celtic Park as teams defend and then counter-attack quickly, but we always try our best."

Having turned in a sparkling showing in the 3-0 victory over Motherwell in their previous home match, Neil Lennon's men are aiming to continue those high standards against the Ayrshire outfit. Izaguirre wants to repay the fans' faithful backing.

"When I hear my song at Celtic Park it makes me very happy and I just thank God for this moment at every game."

"We need to put on a good performance at home. Every player at Celtic loves the fans, we are happy we have these fans and we want to make them happy. All the players have confidence just now and are working hard which is good for the club."



# A CELTIC BOY'S OWN STORY

Martin Kiely remembers the day he was featured in the *View* almost 40 years ago

**IN the late 1960s and early '70s, the *Celtic View* ran a series called 'Celtic Boy'. Throughout the season, a young Celtic fan got the opportunity to come to a home game and meet one of their Hoops heroes before cheering on the team from the luxury of the main stand.**

**One of those lucky enough to be chosen was Martin Kiely who, as an 11-year-old, got to meet Kenny Dalglish in March 1975.**

**Now the Managing Director of Malcol Construction, which is currently undertaking the development work at the front of Celtic Park, Martin has never forgotten that time in 1975...**

"My Dad had a car at the time and we'd parked down in Dalmarnock, and we were walking round to the Celtic End when a guy from the Celtic View stopped us. He spoke to my Dad and then asked me, 'How would you like to be the Celtic Boy?'"

"It was just amazing. In those days, you didn't have the type of football coverage we've got now, and the club didn't have anything like the Young Hoops Club, so this was something really special.

"I went to St Mark's Primary in Fernhill, Rutherglen. I couldn't wait to tell everybody, and even that night after I'd first got picked, all my friends who were living around us, it was great to tell them all that I was the Celtic Boy.

"I was 11. It was just the best thing that had ever happened to me. And I know my Dad was very, very proud of it as well, and he knew that it was so good for me.

"It's a day I've always remembered - it meant a lot to me and to my Dad as well, and he kept the cutting from the *Celtic View* in his wallet. He was a big, big Celtic fan and he kept it in his wallet all his life, he was so proud of it. I didn't know that he'd kept it in his wallet until after he died in 1989.

"The two really popular players were Danny McGrain and Kenny Dalglish, and they were both fantastic players. And, funnily enough, although I picked Kenny back then in 1975, now, probably in my lifetime, being slightly too young for the



Lisbon Lions, although realising how good they were, my greatest ever Celt is Danny McGrain.

"He was a terrific player, an unbelievably good full-back and very faithful to Celtic. And even with the injuries and illness, he came back through everything and continued playing. These guys were your heroes, so to meet them even once was incredible.

"I can still remember everything about when we arrived at Celtic Park. I can still remember being taken in the front entrance of the stadium for the first time in my life.

"It was the old front of the stadium - you never ever got in that way so to walk through those doors was incredible. There were people there to meet you and I think my jaw just about hit the ground when I saw Jock Stein - I can still see it in my head just now - sitting on a big couch against the wall getting interviewed or chatting with a journalist. And I know now that was Alex Cameron. But to be in the bowels of Celtic Park and to see Jock Stein before I'd even met my favourite player was just incredible.

"It didn't matter to me what happened that day (Celtic lost 1-0, with Andy Gray scoring the only goal of the game for Dundee United).

"Just the whole day - being in the stadium, seeing Jock Stein, seeing the inside of Celtic Park that ordinary people never got to see in those days, and then to get a seat in the main stand - that was the first time I'd ever been in the main stand - it was just an incredible day and I can't speak enough about it. I've always remembered it.

"You never got that opportunity when you were young, ever. You never thought you'd walk through those doors - you dreamed about it every night because you wanted to play for Celtic - so that was incredible.

"I think I just stood in awe when I met Kenny - it was one of the best days of my life."

## THAT WAS THE DAY THAT WAS...

MARTIN Kiely and his Dad had come along to Celtic Park on March 1, 1975 for the Glasgow derby, when the Hoops beat Partick Thistle 3-2 thanks to a last-minute Harry Hood winner. It was while heading towards the stadium for the game that Michael was selected as 'Celtic Boy'.



Two weeks later, on March 15, 1975, Martin returned to Paradise and got to meet Kenny Dalglish before watching the Hoops take on Dundee United.

The Celtic team that day was: Latchford, McGrain, MacDonald, McNeill, McCluskey (Wilson), Callaghan (Deans), Glavin, Hood, Johnstone, Dalglish, Lynch.

The match ended in a 1-0 defeat for Celtic, with Andy Gray scoring the only goal of the game after 32 minutes, but it didn't spoil Martin's enjoyment of the day or the special Celtic memories he's cherished ever since.

"I've always come to Celtic Park and I always will," he told the Celtic View, "and that moment when The Celtic Song starts and the players walk out the tunnel - it doesn't matter who we're playing - I still get butterflies at every single game.

"I love it and everybody who knows me knows that's my moment."

# THE A TO Z OF DAVIE HAY



The career of Celtic legend **Davie Hay**

**TODAY, January 29, Celtic legend Davie Hay celebrates his 66th birthday. One of the famous Quality Street Gang, Davie made 193 appearances for the club, scoring 12 goals.**

He later returned as manager, winning the Scottish Cup in 1985 and the league title the following year.

And as we wish Davie a very happy birthday, we also look back on the career of a Celtic great, in his own words.

**A is for Ambition. Growing up, did you always want to be a footballer?**

I think from a very early age, playing out in the back yard and school yard with my pals, that was what I wanted. It wasn't actually until I was in secondary that I started to play in organised teams and I used to play for a team called St Mirin's Boys' Guild. It was a scout called Joe Connor, whose son played with the team, who spotted me. I started training with Celtic when I was about 15 and this was in the pre-youth programme days and we'd train two nights a week, on a Tuesday and Thursday.

**B is for Barrowfield. What are your memories?**

Barrowfield was one of the first places you played when you were a youngster at Celtic. One day I remember in particular was when Jock Stein first came to the club and he held a trial for all the young players. I was fortunate enough that I did well enough to catch his eye. There was actually a bus strike that day and I was late in getting there with my Dad. I missed the beginning of the game, but I must have done alright when I did play, because I was offered a contract.

**C is for Cyprus. Is that your favourite holiday destination?**

Cyprus is a lovely country, but I did have one memorable holiday there in the year I left Celtic for Chelsea and maybe that was an indication of how my luck was going to go! We were caught up in the

troubles in Cyprus that year and as the conflict broke out, we had to get airlifted off the island. It was memorable for the wrong reasons, but I have been back to Cyprus since and it is a lovely island.

**D is for Derby. How did you enjoy the games against Rangers?**

I always looked forward to them, but the pleasure was in winning them. I was fortunate as a player and a manager that, percentage-wise, I came out on top against them. There is no greater feeling than winning these games and as far as derbies go, it's probably up there among the best in the world.

**E is for Europe. What is your favourite European encounter from your playing days?**

My favourite one was the meetings with Leeds United in the semi-finals in 1970. Conversely my biggest disappointment was losing the final. We were up against a great Leeds team and it was viewed as 'the final before the final' and that was part of the problem. We won both games, we played exceptionally well and the attendance for those games set a European record that will never be beaten. All these things say it all about that encounter.

**F is for Feyenoord. How do you look back on that 1970 European Cup final?**

I've only watched it recently, on Celtic TV and I had to overcome the hurt of watching it. Feyenoord deserved to win, but we totally and utterly underestimated them. Due to that, we suffered and lost. I have to say, that out of all my involvement in football, as a player and manager, it has to be the biggest disappointment of my career.

**G is for goals. What was your favourite?**

I wasn't a goalscorer. I did get one memorable one against Rangers though, in a game we won 3-1. It was an extremely muddy day and I hit a belter, funnily



enough, at the Celtic End as well and because I didn't score very often, it was so spectacular. A lot of people still remember it as well.

### **H is Hampden. As a player and manager, the ground holds a few happy memories...**

It does. There were so many games, for Celtic and for Scotland. I have to say that the one that sticks out in my mind was my unexpected first medal when we beat St Johnstone in the League Cup final. It wasn't the most glamorous of games, but it was an unexpected game for me. Tommy Gemmell had been left out of the team and I was called in to play left-back that day. I only found out at 2pm that I was playing and that was my first winner's medal. Strangely enough, it was the League Cup and after that, I didn't have a very good record in the competition.



### **I is for Injury. How do you look back on the injury you suffered at Chelsea that prematurely ended your career at the age of 31?**

It was just unfortunate the way it worked out, because the people at Chelsea were fantastic with me. There were a lot of genuinely good, caring people who worked at the club at that time and were

desperate for you to succeed. Unfortunately that wasn't what happened.

### **J is for Joker. Who was your funniest team-mate?**

There wasn't any one individual. What we had was a great group of friends, all coming through at the one time and getting on so well. Dixie Deans was one who maybe carried out a few pranks more than the others. But I am not specifying!

### **K is for Karaoke. Do you have a party piece?**

No, I am absolutely rubbish. Honestly, I am rank rotten. You wouldn't get me up singing for anything.

### **L is for Leeds United. How good were they at the time of the European Cup semi-final?**

They were a fantastic side and it seemed that every player in the side was a recognised internationalist from the keeper up to the forwards. They were the complete team and we were going to have to be at our best to beat them and we did that in some style over the two legs home and away.

### **M is for Manager. How does being a manager compare to playing?**

It's the next best thing to playing. Playing is better, but managing brings its pleasures and its heartaches as well. But I've been so very fortunate in that I have been able to play for and manage Celtic. I have had the privilege to play for Chelsea and Scotland and I have managed some other good clubs, but not many people can say that they have played for and managed Celtic. That's an achievement in its own.

### **N is for Nemesis. Who was your toughest opponent?**

I jokingly used to say that it was wee Jimmy Johnstone in training, but looking back, that's not far from the truth. It was impossible to get the ball off him and he was brave as well, so you couldn't even outmuscle him either. Obviously you wouldn't be going in with hard challenges in training, but he just had that exceptional talent and bravery. Even in games where he got knocked, he just bounced back up again.

### **O is for Outstanding. What was your best performance?**

I would tend to think, going back, individually and collectively it was the two performances against Leeds United in the European Cup. There were other good games and some fantastic team performances, but that's the one that sticks out for me.

### **P is for Paisley. Are you pleased to see that your supporters' club is still going strong in your home town?**

I am and I was lucky enough to establish a strong friendship with the late Peter Rafferty through that. Peter was the one who started it, way back in the late '60s and we remained close friends up until he sadly passed away. I know that supporters' clubs are not the same today, in terms of the numbers who travel every week to away games, but the fact they are still going strong in Paisley is great. And the fact that I am associated with them is a real honour. But more importantly for me is the friendship I maintained with Peter over the years.

### **Q is for 'Quiet Assassin'. Do you think you deserved the nickname?**

I suppose, looking back, I did. At the time I never gave it much thought, it was Tommy Docherty who gave me it. I suppose I didn't say too much and I suppose I could put in a tackle or two and coming from someone like Tommy Docherty, you see it as a compliment.



### **R is for is for Round. Did you ever get a drink back from Brian Clough or his Nottingham Forest players?**

I did. As the story goes, Brian Clough appeared at my pub in Paisley and ordered a round for him and the Forest players before their European game against Celtic. Then, when it was time to pay, he told them I was paying for it. What people don't realise is that he bought a round that day as well. He was exceptionally kind, he was very good to my wife and family that day. He was one of the greatest managers ever to grace the game and when you look at his achievements, with Derby and Nottingham Forest, you can see that there weren't many who were better.

### **S is for Scotland. You won 27 caps, how do you look back on your international career?**

Growing up you have dreams of playing for your country and I achieved that. The irony is that just after my peak, at the World Cup in 1974, when I played my best football for my country, is that I never played again for Scotland through injury.

### **T is for Title. What are your memories of that incredible day at Love Street in 1986?**

As a manager that ranks among my proudest achievements. We went 16 games without defeat at the end of that season and won eight on the bounce. I firmly believed we were going to do it, because I could see that the pressure was getting to Hearts. The manner in which that final game at Love Street was won, kind of epitomised the Celtic manner of playing.

### **U is for Unbelievable. What is the best goal you have ever seen?**

There are a couple that stick out in my mind. The first is Henrik Larsson's one in the 6-2 win over Rangers, where he still had the wherewithal, in the heat of the match, to lob it over the keeper. There were also Shunsuke Nakamura's goals in the UEFA Champions League against Manchester United. They were wonderful goals.

### **V is for Versatile. You were comfortable almost anywhere in defence or midfield, was there any position you didn't like to play?**

Strangely enough I played in most positions. I even played two games for the reserves up front. Like I said, I wasn't known for my goalscoring feats, but

I think Jock Stein played me there to let me get an understanding of how to play against strikers. If you had played in their position you knew what they were doing and that was the thought process. I did play in most positions, but I suppose you might say that up front was the one I wasn't really comfortable with.

### **W is for West London, did you enjoy your time as a Chelsea player?**

Like I said before, there were some wonderful people at Chelsea at that time, both in the team and behind the scenes. Unfortunately I picked up more operations than medals. Like I said, going back to that holiday in Cyprus, that was probably an indicator of the bad luck that was to follow. But the people there were superb and I have the highest regard in the world for that football club, their fans and the people who worked there.

### **X is for X-Factor. Who is the most naturally gifted player you have worked with?**

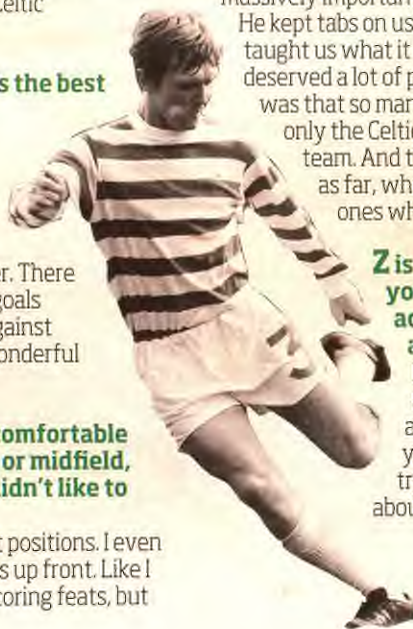
I would say that it had to be wee Jimmy. Without a shadow of a doubt, Jimmy Johnstone was the best and there are no ifs or buts about it.

### **Y is for Youth. Was the Quality Street Gang the best batch of young players you have seen at a club?**

I genuinely think it was and lot of people deserve a lot of credit for the way the system worked at that time. There is one man in particular that played a massively important role and that was Sean Fallon. He kept tabs on us, coached us in the reserves and taught us what it means to be a Celtic player. He deserved a lot of praise and what was incredible was that so many of us went on to play for not only the Celtic first-team, but also the national team. And there were others, who didn't go as far, who were every bit as good as the ones who 'made it'.

### **Z is for Zenith. What would you say was your greatest achievement, as a player and as a manager?**

I think my greatest achievement as a both a player and a manager, and this is how people perceive you, was that they saw you trying to give your best. Forget about ability, people saw that you always tried to give your best, in both positions.

## LOOKING BACK

**5 YEARS AGO**  
CELTIC supporters banded out in force on Saturday, October 15, 1977, to see their team, including Frank Murray on loan from Wolves, and Alfie Conn back after a farewell operation, take on St Mirren.

The 25,000 fans really encouraged the players throughout and even following two St Mirren goals there was never any sign of impatience as they continued to urge the team on to light back.

Celtic started the game with some good play going forward, but a combination of careless final passes and shabby St Mirren defensive play prevented them from scoring. Indeed as the first half progressed it was the Celtic goal which was at greater risk and Peter Latchford had to be on his toes to keep the visitors from taking the lead before the interval.

Ronnie Glavin almost scored in the 57th minute but his shot was cleared off the line. In the 59th minute Frank Munro had the great misfortune to slice an attempted clearance past his own goalkeeper to give St Mirren the lead. Celtic equalised five minutes later when a crashing Ronnie Glavin free kick was only parried by the 'keeper and Alan McQueen ran in to smack a good low shot into the net.

**10 YEARS AGO**  
ON Wednesday, October 18, 1972, the Celtic View carried a story by John McNeil that read like this:

Celtic gave the game a terrific boost last week with sparkling displays against Dundee and Partick Thistle.

Well over 20,000 fans watched both matches and liked what they saw. I forecast last week that the old Celtic magic would return — and return it did at Duns Park. Certainly we did't win, but here were Celtic back with all their familiar drive, fire and skill. The only thing that was missing was a bit of luck around the goal area.

The return of David Hay and Jim Bregan has had a tremendous impact on the team and even though Jim was injured at Firhill you could feel the confidence of the players straight from the whistle.

Bobby Marsch, probably Scotland's top midfielder on form, is back on his game and looking good playing alongside Billy McNeill.

**15 YEARS AGO**  
FIFTEEN years ago Celtic played Morton in the semi-final of the League Cup, winning 7:1. Three nights later they won their League game against Partick Thistle 5:1.

Against Morton, Hughes 2, Craig 2, Johnstone, Wallace and Lennox scored. Against Thistle Bobby Lennox scored four and Billy McNeill the other.

These two games producing 12 goals between them were an indication of the form of the team and manager Jack Stein commented that: "Once again we can make history by becoming the first team in Scotland to win the League Cup three times in succession. The victory over Partick Thistle pleased me particularly because we always expect a hard game there. The 5:1 margin in no way flattered us. We had enough running to take the edge off Partick Thistle and we got our reward with four second half goals."

In the Morton game, full-back Jim Craig, who had never scored until that season, scored five. I report for overseas readers contained the following:

A great many of the fans were proclaiming this as the greatest Celtic display ever, even surpassing the splendour of Lisbon.

WE dropped two points in our first Premier League defeat of the season last week. It was a day of drama in which Danny McEneaney was sent off for the first time in his long career and I, myself, was sent away from the touchline.

I must offer an apology to our fans for this. They have responded well to our recent appeals for good behaviour and thoroughly deserve the good reputation they have earned at grounds both home and abroad.

I know my behaviour will have disappointed you and I would like to take this opportunity to apologise to you all publicly.

On Monday we completed a transfer deal that took Mike Conroy to Hibernian. Michael gave everything to Celtic during his period with us and this made him popular among the fans.

I am sure you all agree when I say I wish Michael all the best in Edinburgh and a long career in the Premier League.

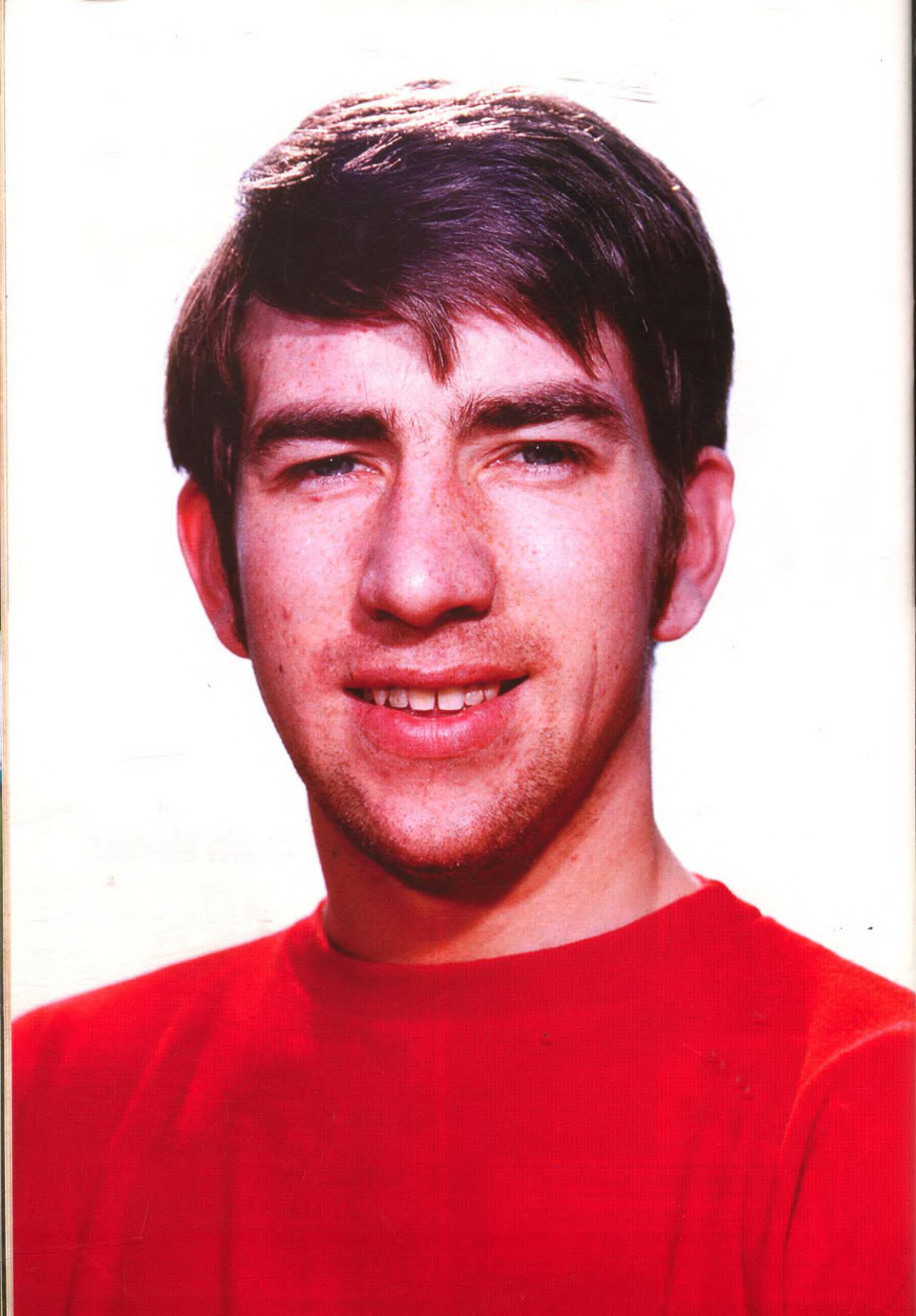

# THE HUNTER & THE PREY

Every player craves success and **Ally Hunter** was only at Celtic a few months when he picked up a championship medal

Exclusive interview: Laura Brannan

**D**ESPITE losing three goals, Ally Hunter's performance in the Scottish Cup semi-final in 1972 impressed Jock Stein enough for him to eventually go on and sign the player as one of his own.

Hunter's Kilmarnock side lost 3-1 to Celtic that afternoon, but what he did between the sticks had already caught the eye of the Hoops' boss. He continued to play well for the Ayrshire club, and eventually, in January 1973, Hunter made the move to Glasgow.

Monday was the 41st anniversary of the keeper's debut for Celtic, as he was named in the starting XI for the first time in a league game against Airdrie. It wasn't the best first impression to make though, as Hunter's new side lost 2-1 in an opening bow he'd rather forget.

But just 10 days later Hunter returned to Rugby Park, this time playing for the away side, and a resounding 4-0 win, clean sheet and good performance set him on his way to a successful Celtic career.

Now a director at his family-run building and plumbing company, we caught up with Hunter to look back on his three years at the club.

**It's been 41 years since you made your debut. Do you remember the occasion well?**

It wasn't the best of starts, put it that way. The team had been struggling a bit but my debut was a game we were expected to win. Things went a bit wrong, though. I can't remember it in too much detail as you might imagine, but it was definitely a disappointing start.

**You hadn't even been at the club a week before you were thrown in at the deep end. Did that make you nervous?**

I'd just signed that week so I was thrown right in, but I wasn't particularly nervous. After training for a couple of days I felt good, but it was just one of these games when things started to go wrong. You're going there full of great hope, thinking it was your big chance to change your life, so it was definitely a great sinking feeling when the two goals went in and you're heading towards the end of the game with defeat a strong possibility.

**When did things start to pick up for you?**

Well we actually played Kilmarnock only a few days later in an away

game on a cold Wednesday night. We had everything, rain, wind, sleet, the lot - it was a miserable night for playing in goal. And needless to say, having just been transferred from there the previous week there was a lot of pressure on me. I seem to remember having a really good game that night, though, and that settled me in. I was quite nervous going into that game because when you're moving away from a club you want to show why you're being transferred. But while the Airdrie game panned out badly, the Kilmarnock game panned out well, and I always liked playing at Rugby Park anyway. It was a good park for keepers to play on.

**So how did the move to Celtic come about?**

It just came out of the blue to be honest. The day before it happened I was asked if I would be interested, so the cat was out the bag when I said yes. The next day I was in Glasgow, and was called down to Kilmarnock. Jock Stein was there and the deal was done.

**Had you grown up a Celtic supporter?**

No I hadn't as I was a Clyde supporter >



> actually. My cousin played for Partick Thistle as well so I used to go there too. I was a great admirer of the Celtic team but when you were that age and you were playing football at every opportunity you wouldn't have time to go and support a team. I was playing twice on a Saturday - I was a lot more interested in playing football than watching it.

**It may have been a bad start but you picked it up quickly. How did you feel the supporters took to you?**

They took to me very well actually. That first season, from January until May I had a great season and a lot of support, the fans definitely made the difference for me. There was a loud support at Kilmarnock but the volume and mass of people at Celtic Park was very different, I was very appreciative.

**In general terms how do you look back on your Celtic days?**

I look back on it as a great time. I was lucky enough to catch the great side, the Lisbon team and there were still about seven or eight of them playing. I really look back and think I was privileged to a certain extent to be able to play with these players. It makes you feel good to think you were part of that side so of course I look back with great memories.

**Do you have a highlight from your time at the club?**

The first league championship I won at Easter Road would be my highlight. Things hadn't been going well up until the turn of the year - I'm not saying I did it myself, but things turned the corner after the

New Year, and after I arrived. We went and won the league on the last day of the season and that was a special moment. Six months earlier we would never have thought we would have been in that position.

**What was it like being in competition with Denis Connaghan?**

It's a funny thing, people think you'd be stabbing each other in the back but it's one of these things you have to be realistic about. If you're playing well you'll be in the team and if you're not playing well you won't be. The other guy isn't in the team to spite you, he wants to be playing as much as you, so you've really got to make sure there's no animosity between keepers. If you're out of form, or injured, you drop down the pecking order and it's a fact of life, personalities don't come into it.

**You left in 1976 to join Motherwell. How did that move come about?**

I'd been injured and then I was out

of form, not playing well. There didn't seem to be much of a future with Peter Latchford arriving and settling in. I decided to ask for a transfer and Motherwell came in but that wasn't a great move for me to be honest. I didn't seem to slot in there the same way, and it's difficult to leave Celtic and go to another club. The club itself doesn't have the same feel about it, so it was difficult to move to a place that wasn't the same size, and didn't have the same buzz about it.

**What about nowadays, do you keep up to date with the team?**

I don't go to football much at all but I still keep up to date with the scores. I was involved with the charity team for 25 years, so that was my contact with a lot of other former players for a while. I'm a director of a building and plumbing company in Glasgow now, it's a family business so I work away there edging closer to retirement. I'm quite busy though and I'm enjoying it.

**Fraser Forster recently beat your run of seven domestic consecutive clean sheets, just how difficult is it to mount such a consistent run of form?**

It's very hard because it doesn't just come down to yourself as it's a team game. I had a run, not as much as Fraser just now, but annoyingly it was broken by a stupid goal. It was actually offside, and hit off a player to go in, so that was frustrating. But it just shows that even when you're playing well you can still let goals in.

# QUINN'S FINAL FLING

The great **Jimmy Quinn's** last game in the Hoops was played 89 years ago this week

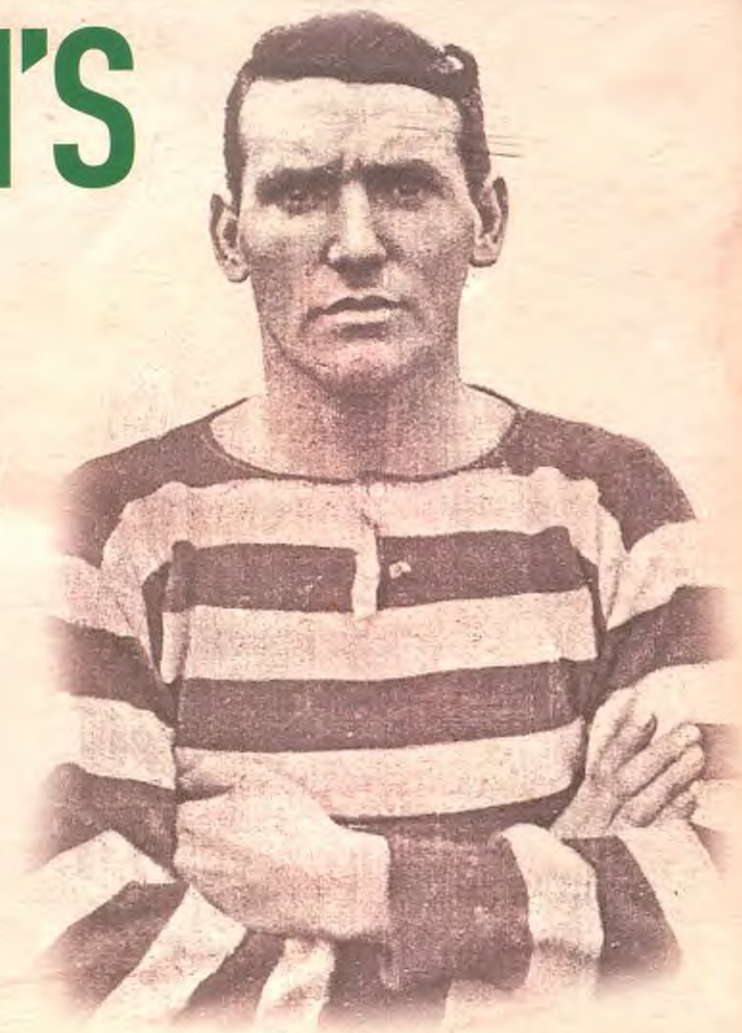
**EVEN today, visitors to Croy are subject to a friendly elbow in the ribs followed by a finger pointing to a row of miners' cottages and the words, 'That's where Jimmy Quinn used to live.'**

This week marks the 89th anniversary of the legendary Celt's final game for the club when he bowed out in a 1-1 home draw with Hearts on January 30, 1915.

The game itself may have been pretty inauspicious but a massive 45,000, Celtic's biggest crowd that year and 10,000 higher than the attendance v Rangers, witnessed the Mighty Quinn's last exit.

He only appeared six times that season, knocking in four goals along the way, and wouldn't have qualified for a league medal in helping Celtic to their 12th Championship...

But he had already picked up six Championship gongs and five Scottish Cup winners' medals so there wasn't exactly a silverware drought in the Quinn household.



For a man whose name became synonymous with Celtic, ironically there was no 'I'd walk barefoot over broken glass to sign for the Bhoys,' quote from Quinn.

In fact, it was quite the opposite as manager Willie Maley had to bide his time in wooing Smithston Albion's 22-year-old star man. It would seem that Quinn was more than content with life down the pits and parading his football skills a couple of rungs down the ladder.

Patience was the key word

though and Maley deployed his persuasive skills in ensuring that Celtic got their man.

Quinn signed provisionally on December 31, 1900 and on January 12, 1901 he put pen to a full contract before scoring seven days later on his debut as the Celts defeated St Mirren 4-3 in Paisley.

That game was Celtic's final league match of the season but there was still the cup to look forward to.

Celtic had disposed of Rangers on the day Quinn signed and also saw off Kilmarnock, Dundee and





St Mirren before meeting Hearts in the final on April 6.

The Boys lost the match 4-3 but just a mere three months after joining Celtic, Quinn had appeared in and scored in a Scottish Cup final. And what a goal it was as he waltzed past **SIX** Hearts men before planting the ball in the net.

For the first few seasons, Quinn was deployed on the left wing and at the end of each term only had a handful of goals to show for his efforts.

Things were to change in season 1903/04 though. Celtic changed the strip from stripes to hoops and by the end of the season Quinn had harnessed the centre-forward spot as his own.

And the switch paid off handsomely in that season's Scottish Cup final when Celtic and Rangers took to the field to contest the trophy.

With just 12 minutes gone

the Ibrox side were already 2-0 ahead, but the battling qualities of the robust Quinn ensured that the team went in at the break on level terms thanks to a double from the newly-posted centre forward.

The stalemate remained in place until seven minutes from the end when Quinn became the first Hoops player to score a hat-trick in the final and Celts everywhere celebrated to 3-2 win.

There would be no more cup final hat-tricks until nearly 60 years later when Dixie Deans repeated the feat in 1972's 6-1 win over Hibernian.

But even then some of the older wisecracks among the crowd were heard to murmur, 'Aye, but he didnae dae it against Rangers when we wur 2-0 doon!'

Quinn's scoring feats at the end of that season were nothing short of devastating when you

consider that he finished as Celtic's top scorer with 15 goals but on the morning of February 6 his tally was **ONE** solitary strike.

He rattled in three against Port Glasgow and followed that up with a single against Dundee in the cup. Another league goal against St Mirren was followed by the deciding counter in the 2-1 semi-final against Third Lanark then came his glorious hat-trick against Rangers which the fans were still talking about when he battered in **FIVE** against Hearts the following week.

Quinn was to be Celtic's top scorer for the next **NINE** seasons and in the first **SIX** of those the Boys lifted **SIX** consecutive Championship titles.

Jimmy Quinn was to score 216 goals in his 331 Celtic appearances and he will forever be remembered as the first Celtic hero of last century - a true 20th Century Boy.

## On This Day

# 1916

Celtic's first game on this date was in 1916 when they hosted Ayr United in the league and goals from Jim McColl (*above*), Andy McAtee and Patsy Gallacher gave the Hoops a 3-1 win watched by a crowd of 12,000. It was Celtic's 12th consecutive unbeaten game - a run that would stretch to 26 by the end of the season. The unbeaten run continued the following season until the second-last game of the campaign. Between losing 2-0 to Hearts at Tynecastle on November 13, 1915 and a 2-0 defeat to Kilmarnock at home on April 21, 1917, Celtic went an amazing 62 games unbeaten. The run featured 49 wins and 13 draws and also included a run of 12 consecutive victories. Those 12 games saw the Celts score 42 goals for the loss of only five.

# 1921

On this day in 1921, a 12,000 crowd saw Celtic beat Aberdeen 3-1 at home in the league. Tommy McInally, Willie McStay and Adam McLean got the goals and McInally exactly mirrored his tally of the previous season by scoring 28 in the league and two in the Scottish Cup. His 30-goal tally made him the club's top scorer for both seasons.

# 1938

On their way to their 19th championship, Celtic made the short trip to Shawfield on this day in 1938 to play Clyde. They returned with a 6-1 win in a game that featured a double from John Divers and singles from Johnny Crum, Frank Murphy, Malcolm MacDonald and Matt Lynch.

# 1948

Davie Hay was born on this day in 1948. He joined the club as a schoolboy in the mid-1960s just as the Hoops were beginning to make inroads on the continent and, by the end of the decade, he was a fixture in the first team and played in the 1970 European Cup final. He had made his debut two years before that final against Feyenoord when, in a league game, he came on as a sub in a 4-1 victory over Aberdeen at Celtic Park and that was the first of 193 games for the Hoops in which he scored 12 goals before moving to Chelsea in 1974. He later returned to the club as manager between 1983-87, winning the Scottish Cup in 1985 and the championship in 1986.

# 1969

On January 25, 1969 in the Scottish Cup first-round, an 89th-minute goal from Jimmy Bone gave Partick Thistle a 3-3 draw in front of 35,867 at Firhill. Just four days later, a crowd of 48,000 turned up at Celtic Park for the replay and goals from Billy McNeill, Jimmy Johnstone and Willie Wallace put Celtic in command before Tommy Gemmill managed to put the ball in his own net to make it 3-1. However, Tommy Callaghan made it 4-1 before the break and the goals kept on coming after the turnaround. Bobby Lennox scored next before Callaghan nabbed his second and John Hughes made it 7-1. Gemmill atoned for his earlier mishap when he made it 8-1 in the 76th minute. The Celts went on to beat Rangers 4-0 in that season's final to round off their second treble in three years.

# 2003

On this day in 2003, Celtic entertained Dundee United in the league and recorded a 2-0 victory. Both goals came in a four-minute period of the first half as John Hartson opened the scoring in the 24th minute and his strike partner, Henrik Larsson, doubled Celtic's advantage in the 29th.

# 2011

Celtic travelled to Hampden on this day in 2011 to take on Aberdeen in the League Cup semi-final and the game was used to give new Bhoy, Kris Commons his debut. And it didn't take long for him to make an impact as after only six minutes he opened with a superb long-range strike. Charlie Mulgrew, Thomas Rogne and Anthony Stokes from the spot, put Celtic 4-0 ahead with only 34 minutes on the clock. Aberdeen pulled one back just after the hour mark but that was the end of the scoring for the day.



# 2012

Two years ago on this day, Celtic returned to Hampden once more on League Cup semi-final duty and this time the opposition was supplied by Falkirk. Scott Brown opened the scoring from the spot in the 27th minute but Jay Fulton equalised five minutes before the break. However, Anthony Stokes, struck twice in the second half to give Celtic a 3-1 win.



## AND ANOTHER THING...

Original Ramones drummer, Tommy Ramone, was born on this day in 1952 in Budapest as Erdélyi Tamás. His name was changed to Thomas Erdelyi when the family moved to America. He grew up in Forest Hills in New York and he became Tommy Ramone as the Ramones evolved in 1974.

## THE CALVIN CLIMB

Young **Calvin Miller** takes another step up the ladder but knows that he has time on his side

Exclusive Interview: **Laura Brannan**

**I**T'S been a busy, and extremely successful, couple of months for young Celt Calvin Miller.

It took a whirlwind turn for the best at the end of November when he enjoyed international glory with Scotland's Under-16s as they won the Victory Shield for the first time since they were named joint champions in 2004. It was the first time in 15 years they were crowned outright winners.

And after basking in international glory, Miller then got to lift more silverware as Celtic's Under-17 squad won the U19 league midway through December.

His hard work evidently paid off at the start of the New Year, when a trip to Turkey with the U17s turned into a call-up to the first-team squad. He played for Neil Lennon's senior side against Galatasaray in the Antalya

Winter Cup, showing just how much progress he has made this season.

The substitute appearance makes him one of the youngest ever Celts, at just 16 years and three days old, to pull on the Hoops, and after his return to league business with the U20s, the official matchday magazine caught up with the teenager.

**How disappointing was the 2-1 defeat to Aberdeen in the league?**

I thought in the first half we were the better team, and created more chances, but in the second half we got a bit sloppy and things didn't really go well. The conditions weren't as good as they should have been in the second half so that didn't help us either. It's harder to create things when the pitch is in that sort of condition, it was



very wet. We thought we could have done better but after the break everyone was trying to do their own individual thing instead of working as a team so it never worked out.

**Aberdeen converted a penalty and Celtic had a 'goal' chalked off for offside within minutes of each other midway through the second half. Was that a major turning point in the game?**

I think so, yes, it was a clear penalty but we were sloppy to give the ball away in the first place. They scored from that and then not long after we had a goal ruled offside. It was a really late flag that went up and we couldn't do much about it, but it was disappointing.

**It wasn't that long ago you were turning out for the first team against Galatasaray in Turkey. Was that a bit of a surprise for you?**

It was amazing. I learned that you can get your opportunity at any time. It just shows that you never know when you're going to get your chance, it can pop

up whenever. It was completely unexpected so it just shows that you have to keep working hard, even when you think it's nowhere near your time. Two boys were injured so four boys from my team were picked - expect the unexpected.

**Did being a late call-up help the nerves or make them worse?**

When I heard about it I didn't know what to do, I was really uptight, but when I got on to the park I got into it. I settled right in and couldn't hear anything around me, I was concentrating so much. The first-team players helped a lot, I've spoken to them before so I know them and they know me. They were talking me through things and making me feel more comfortable, that made it a lot better.

**And as one of the youngest Celtic players to appear for the first-team squad, it must be a huge honour?**

It definitely is. I read it online somewhere that I was





the youngest but I don't know how accurate that was. It feels amazing, though, I still train at Barrowfield with the U17s so it's really pushed me on and motivated me to get into the older squads as soon as possible.

**The fans are starting to pick up your name now, have you had much interaction with them in general?**

The fans have been talking about me a bit more recently but I don't let it get to me. I just keep my head down and carry on with what I'm doing. I'm going to keep working hard, pushing into the U20 squad and doing everything I can to score goals and catch everyone's eye.

**For those supporters who have yet to see you play, can you describe what kind of player you are?**

I like to play on the wing so I think of myself as a quick player who can create things. I don't mind where I play, though, I like playing on the left or right. I don't really have a preference. There's a lot of competition for places in the 20s side just now though, I'm up against players like Patrik Twardzik and John Herron who are experienced. I learn a lot from them though, so it's good being around them.





# LET'S GET BACK TO BUSINESS

Following their winter sojourn, coach **John Kennedy** is aiming to get the Under-20s back on track for their tilt at another title



**THE second half of the SPFL Under-20 season will provide a busy schedule for Celtic as they look to catch up on the six games they have in hand.**

The matches were originally postponed due to their participation in the UEFA Youth League, and coach, John Kennedy is hoping victories in these matches will help catapult them back up the table. The young Hoops are sitting five points from the top spot, which Hibs currently occupy.

A disappointing 2-1 defeat to Aberdeen last week, though, held back their progress, and Kennedy knows they must convert their chances if they are to retain their championship title.

"I thought in the first half we looked good, we had a couple of good chances to go more than one up, but then we conceded a goal from a set-play and that was disappointing," he said.

"That's something we pride ourselves on but in the last couple of games we've lost goals from set-play so we'll have to look at that. In the second half we never got going at all, we never threatened enough and we never made their keeper work enough.

"So for all our good play in the first half and all the chances we were creating, we really lacked it in the second half." Kennedy feels that if his side are to maintain the game plan they executed in the first half of the Aberdeen clash then they will be able to take a hold of the league proceedings once again.

But a penalty conceded, and then a 'goal' ruled offside,

in the space of only a couple of minutes proved to be the turning point in the match last week.

"We were happy with the first half, they looked dangerous on the break and were looking to spring, but we dealt with that well," he continued.

"It looked like a penalty kick, but it was an error leading up to it, a misunderstanding in the middle of the pitch. It puts them through then we raise the leg and give them the penalty so it was disappointing.

"We went into the break at 1-1. It was up to us to take the game to Aberdeen after that but we didn't, we sat back and were too negative at times in our play.

"We were forcing passes when it wasn't on and when it was on to shoot we weren't taking the opportunities, so it's something we need to learn quickly. We can't always walk the ball into the net, we have to be ruthless and if we get space in and around the box we have to take our chances.

"Leo Fasan made some great saves in the second half but it came down to two goals that he could do nothing about."

On the other hand, though, Kennedy was delighted they were able to give Marcus Fraser and Joe Chalmers a run-out as they battle back to full fitness on their return from injury.

"It was good to see them back, they've been looking good in training," he added. "It was good to get them back. Marcus was the captain and led by example. He had the sleeves rolled up and was in and about it, you wouldn't have known he was out for so long."

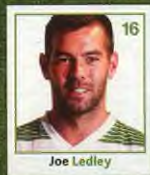

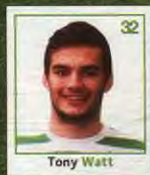

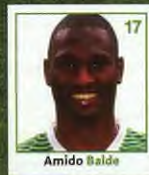
