J McN: I don't know as I've never even thought about it and at school I only ever wanted to be a football player, but I suppose I would be doing shifts behind the bar in my dad's pub.

WO: If you hadn't moved from Dunfermline to Celtic, where would you have gone?

J McN: Possibly down south as there were a few clubs mentioned at the time but when Celtic came in there we no doubt about where I was going.

WO: In Paul Lambert's book he names you in his fantasy team of players he has played against, what do you think of that then?

J McN: It's quite flattering but I haven't read it yet as I haven't received my free copy (hint, hint) but maybe one day I might even make the team of

J McN: It was very nerve wracking as I was standing there with somebody else's boots on and someone else's shinpads - we were playing Falkirk and I had just signed that day but my boots went missing so it was all a bit strange for me. The press conference for my signing wasn't held until the

next day so I wasn't even able to pull on the hoops for the cameras before I played in a game.

WO: What page of the Celtic View do you turn to first?

J McN: The contents - just to see if I am in it!

WO: What did it mean to you to play in the World Cup?

J McN: It was a magnificent feeling, especially with my family being over in France but I just wish I had been involved a bit more. Hopefully I will be able to play on that stage again as the opportunity doesn't come along to often.

WO: What sort of TV do you watch?

J McN: Basically it's a big square box that sits in the corner of the room but if you mean programmes I really like comedies, especially Only Fools And Horses as I have them all on video

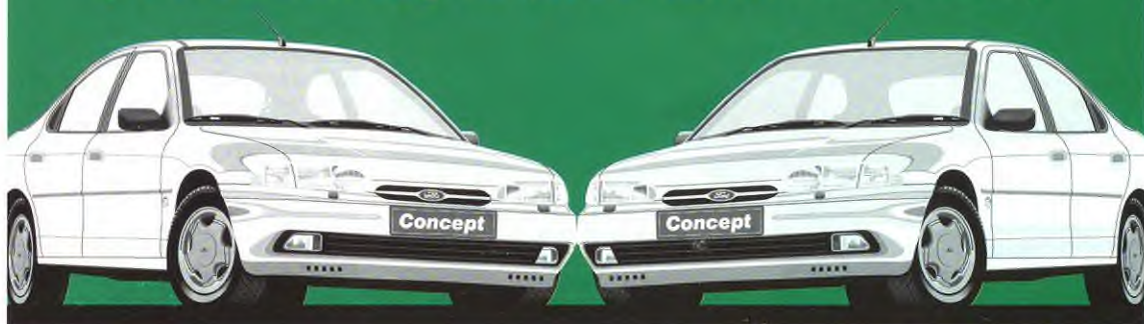
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
