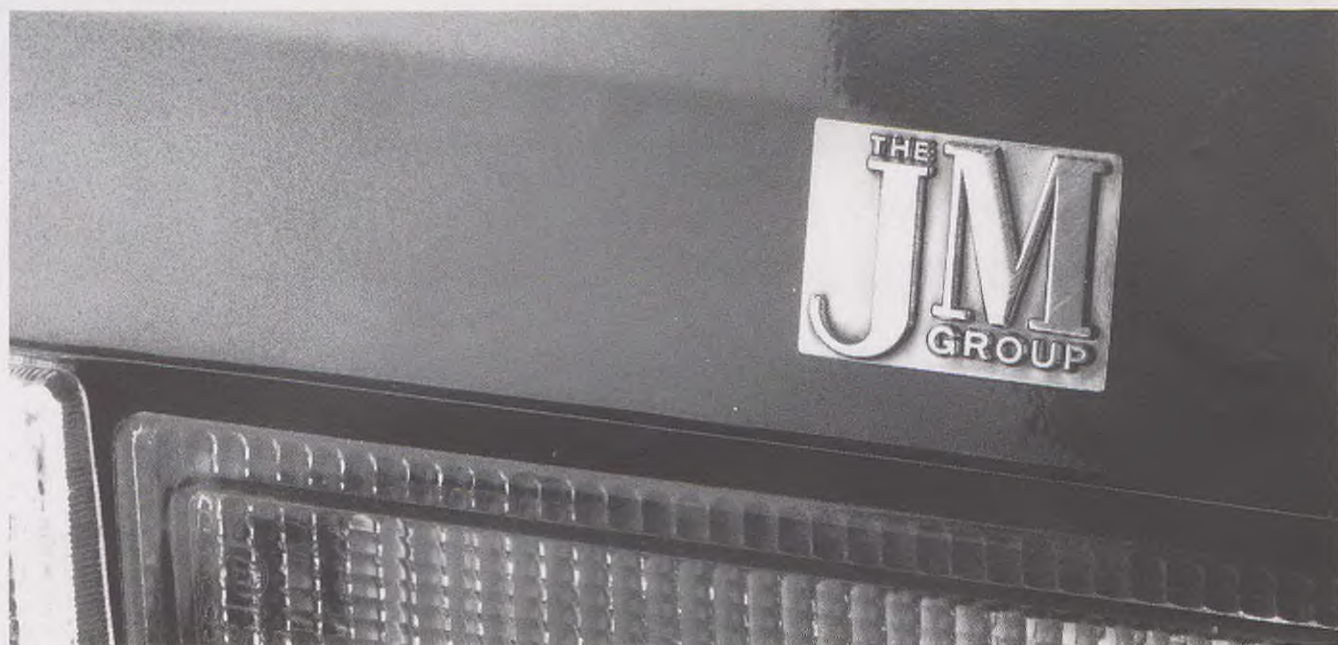

Comment from the **MANAGER**

The game against Dunfermline Athletic last Saturday was a further disappointment for us. I thought that we started the game very well indeed and thoroughly deserved the lead we achieved through John Colquhoun's early goal. Chances were coming along at regular intervals and we could easily have been more goals up by the end of the first half. I thought that we made a reasonable start to the second half but in the last thirty minutes or so we began to get a bit edgy, lost the goal and Dunfermline could easily have sneaked a second towards the end. Over the whole match though it was a game we should have won.

We trained at Tynecastle on Monday morning before leaving for Italy. This gave me the chance to introduce our new Assistant manager FRANK CONNOR to the squad. Frank is well thought of in Scottish Footballing circles and has a wealth of experience in the game. I've known Frank on and off for a number of years. After getting permission from Raith Rovers to speak to Frank we had a long chat and I am delighted to welcome him to Tynecastle. I am sure that he will prove to be a great asset to the Club.

The match in Bologna on Wednesday afternoon was a huge disappointment. Leading by two goals from the first leg we were confident of making further progress. Bologna were a much better team in this game, than the side we played at Tynecastle two weeks ago but more importantly we did not play as well as we did in the home leg. They took heart from their early strike and in the end we could have little complaint at being knocked out of the competition.

Our job is now to find more consistency as a team if we are to get out of the position we are in at present. The more good performances you put behind you, the greater the belief you have in yourself, and once confidence is restored the results will come along.

This afternoon we face Celtic, a fixture in which our record recently has been very poor. Celtic were the team who provided the opposition for my first match as manager - coincidentally again after an away European trip and let's hope we get a better result this afternoon. I know that they will be difficult opponents. They have also had a little rough spell recently although they got back on the rails by defeating Motherwell in a re-arranged match on Tuesday. However we must start collecting the points now to hoist us up the League table.

WELCOME TO FRANK CONNOR

Hearts new manager, Joe Jordan, made the first significant signing last week with the appointment of the much respected Raith Rovers boss Frank Connor as his Assistant.

Like Joe Jordan, 54-year old Frank is a Lanarkshire man, but in his playing days, he prepared to frustrate forwards, being a first-rate goalkeeper with Celtic.

Frank had his first Managerial experience with Cowdenbeath in the late 70s, but built-up his reputation in the game during a subsequent spell on Celtic's coaching staff. His knowledge and enthusiasm for hard work made an impression on many of the Parkhead stars.

Frank then went back into Management in 1981 with Berwick Rangers and a year later he became Assistant Manager at Motherwell. In 1983, the tough and gritty ex-keeper made a further career move by rejoining Celtic as Dave Hay's Assistant and Chief Coach.



Frank helped Celtic to a Scottish Cup victory in 1985, but parted company with the Glasgow side in February 1986, after assisting them - as we know - on their way to a late Championship victory. As an ambitious club, Raith Rovers quickly moved in to acquire Frank's service and after five years at Kirkcaldy, he has taken the Fife team from the Second Division and built up a club which is capable of challenging for a Premier place this season.

Frank is known to be tough on discipline; extremely knowledgeable about the Scottish game; and a great motivator of players. The recent success of Raith Rovers is testimony to these qualities.

"To get a top job at this level with a club like Hearts, is tremendous," admits Frank, "and Tynecastle supporters can be sure that I will spare no effort in trying to assist the club to honours."

Frank's reputation in the game makes this commitment certain.

The first fifteen minutes were fairly even, but during a bout of pressure the visitors scored after 34 minutes when a long pass caught our defence in dis-array and Hunter slotted home the loose ball. We had, by far, the best of the second half but clear cut chances were scarce. However, on 82 minutes **Jason Young** was tripped in the box but **Martin Christie** missed the penalty. Saints' celebrated their escape in scoring a second goal six minutes later, Irvine scoring from the spot after a Craig Martin foul in the box. **Derek Ferguson** was injured and limped off on 16 minutes with a leg injury. The line-up was: **Cairns; Paterson, Martin; Ferguson (D), (McInulty), Kidd, Sandison; Syme, Christie, Donaldson, Young, McArthur;** On the 31st October the Third Team travelled to **Dundee** and recorded a fine 3-2 win. We trailed at half time to a 44th minute goal but equalised after 50 minutes, **Scott Crabbe** scoring from the penalty spot after **Gary Mackay** was tripped in the box. Five minutes later **Crabbe** scored again, latching onto a through ball and rounding the 'keeper. In 75 minutes **Crabbe** completed his hat-trick with a curling 20 yard left foot shot. However, after about 25 minutes we began to settle and our midfield gained the upper hand with **TOMMY HARRISON** and **ANTHONY SMITH** spraying some fine passes which ultimately led to the opening goal in 30 minutes from **ALAN JOHNSTON**. We continued to dominate proceedings but could not increase our lead before the interval.

The same story was true of the opening spell of the second half. We had the advantage territorially but a series of missed chances prevented us from creating a valuable cushion. These chances could have proved crucial as John McCaffrey, who had been booked in the first half, committed a rash tackle and was given his marching orders.

Despite being down to ten men we remained in command and finally got our reward when Trialist **KEVIN THOMAS** added a second goal.

GARY O'CONNOR

Another of the young brigade on the Tynecastle groundstaff is 16 year old **GARY O'CONNOR**. Gary comes from Newtongrange and signed on an "S" form when he was thirteen. "I had been in training for just over a year before that, and was delighted to get the chance to sign. As a juvenile I played for four years with Edina with whom I won a Scottish Cup medal at Under 15 level beating Hutchie Vale in the Final. Last year at Under 16 level I played with Tynecastle Boys Club. Another highlight last season was being chosen for the Scottish Under 16 side and travelling to Norway, Romania and Italy where I made my debut."

Six foot two inch tall, Gary joined the groundstaff after leaving Newbattle High School in the spring.

"I have always been a goalkeeper and had ambitions to play the game at a professional level and it's great to be on the first rung in the ladder. I do like an occasional run around outfield but keeping has always been my game. At school I always looked at Neville Southall as a great example to follow."

This year Gary is playing for Links United at Under 18 to gain further experience, although you will be able to see him in a Hearts jersey in the BP Youth Cup XI. On the groundstaff, apart from ensuring that the away dressing room area is clean, Gary looks after the kit and boots of the other goalkeepers. "I often get their old gloves from them!" he states.

As a goalkeeper he gets specialised training twice a week from **PETER McLOY**. "The work we do is a bit different from the rest of the boys. A goalkeeper needs a different type of training from the others. We have to work hard on agility and concentration and I really enjoy the sessions working with Peter. Henry, Nicky and Mark also give me a lot of advice and help."

Gary also enjoys a game of golf but admits he is not that good. "My main aim at present is to make enough progress to get my contract extended at the end of the current term and finally to make the first team. That has to be the ambition of everybody on the groundstaff but I'm not kidding myself that it's going to be easy. I know that it will need a lot of hard work, patience and a slice of luck if I'm to succeed."

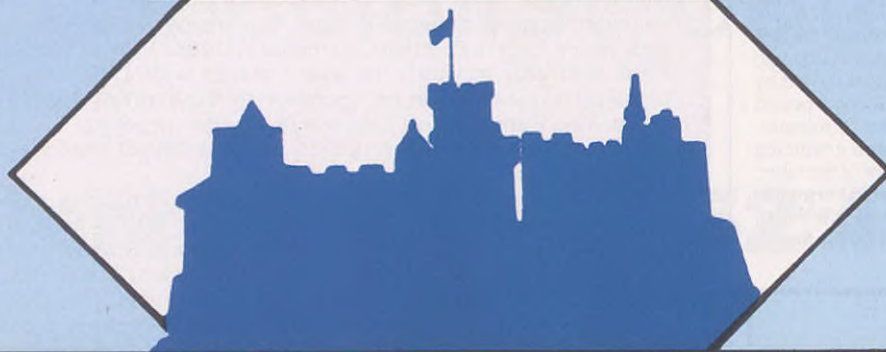

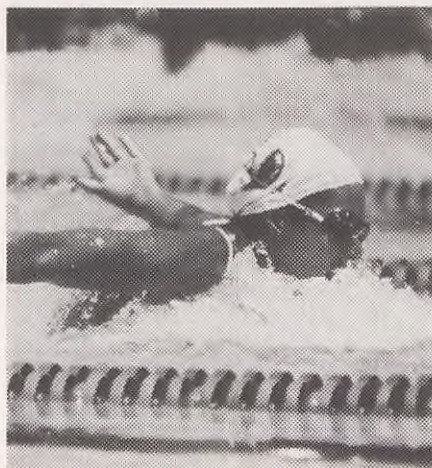

The Hearts Record

SEASON 1955-56

After the success of the previous season, Hearts were hungry for more and at one stage early in 1956, the League and Cup "double" looked possible. However, at the end of the day, only the Scottish Cup came to Tynecastle after a 50-year gap, but this sparked-off scenes of celebration which are remembered to this day by players and fans alike.

Several newcomers established themselves during the season and were to make a significant contribution to the club - Andy Bowman, Bobby Kirk, John Hamilton, and the magnificent, Alex Young, being the main successes. Hearts reserve strength was also tested when Willie Bauld broke an ankle bone and skipper, Bobby Parker had to undergo a cartilage operation. This allowed Tom Mackenzie, Jimmy Milne and Ian Crawford to also prove their ability.

The season began with Hearts defence of the League Cup and the team played reasonably well to reach the Quarter Finals. There they met Champions, Aberdeen, in two superb games. In the First Leg at Pittodrie, the "Maroons" pulled back a 3-0 deficit to 3-3, only to see Kirk and Wardhaugh suffer bad injuries and the "Dons" score two more. Wardhaugh and Bauld missed the return and a weakened Hearts team went down 4-2 to the eventual Cup winners.

In the League, Hearts were brilliant at times, but inconsistent. To be fair, injuries hit the team severely, nevertheless Hearts away form was not good enough to overhaul the eventual

Champions, Rangers, and the "Maroons" finished in 3rd place. Jimmy Wardhaugh was the club's top League scorer with 30 goals and regular fans were treated to some magnificent displays - 5-0 v Stirling; 5-1 v Clyde; 5-0 and 5-1 v Dunfermline; 8-3 v Falkirk, 7-1 v Motherwell and 7-2 v Raith Rovers.

However, the season was all about the Scottish Cup.

Hearts challenge began in the Tynecastle fog against Forfar Athletic, where goals by Conn (2) and Hamilton gave the "Maroons" a sound 3-0 victory before 11,007 fans. Another home tie against Stirling Albion followed, and this proved as easy as the 5-0 scoreline suggests. A crowd of 19,645 enjoyed goals from Bauld, Cumming, Young, Conn and Wardhaugh.

The Quarter-Final convinced Tynecastle followers that this was the club's year. Rangers and their confident followers came through to Gorgie and were well and truly defeated, by 4-0 in front of 47,258 fans. The Glasgow team made an aggressive start but once Dave Mackay and John Cumming took a grip of midfield, there could only be one winner. A glorious header by Ian Crawford opened the scoring after 36 minutes and 60 seconds later Willie Bauld made it 2-0 to the delight of the "Maroons" fans. Goals by Bauld and Conn in the second half sunk the Champions-elect.

The Semi-Final brought Hearts and Raith Rovers together at Easter Road and a magnificent attendance of 58,448 witnessed an exciting 0-0 draw. A crowd of 54,233 saw the midweek replay and this time, goals from Wardhaugh (2) and Crawford took Hearts to the Cup Final.

The largest crowd ever to watch Hearts - 132,840 - assembled at Hampden to watch the Hearts versus Celtic Final. This included the largest ever support for an Edinburgh club with Hearts selling almost 60,000 tickets. They cheered the following Tynecastle team - Duff, Kirk, Mackenzie, Mackay, Glidden, Cumming, Young, Conn, Bauld, Wardhaugh and Crawford.

The "Maroons" played polished football and after 19 minutes, Ian Crawford hit a fine shot from the edge of the penalty box high into the Celtic net. Before half-time John Cumming

suffered a gashed brow, but played on heroically to inspire the team through Celtic's onslaught at the start of the second period. Then after 49 minutes, Bauld produced some magic, sent over a cross, and Alex Young headed down for Crawford to hit home a second goal.

Celtic pulled back a goal when Haughney bundled Hearts keeper Willie Duff over the line, but the "Maroons" did not collapse and clinched a 3-1 win in the 81st minute. Willie Bauld headed a cross down to Alfie Conn and his shot raged into the net.

Edinburgh went wild that night and the "Daily Mail" said - "the will of the nation prevailed."

On the International front, John Cumming played against the Irish League; Jimmy Wardhaugh appeared versus the Danish League and the Football League; Alfie Conn was honoured against the Danish League and Austria while John Hamilton and Alex Young won Under 23 caps versus England.

Hearts

It has not been the best of seasons so far either for the Club or me personally, but on a personal front I am beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel and I am sure that it will not be too long before the Club start to climb up the table.

My own season has been disjointed. Early on I kept picking up little knocks and strains and played my last match in the First Round of the UEFA Cup away to Dnepr as long ago as September 19th. I was forced to quit in that match with what I thought was a groin strain. When we got back to Edinburgh it was decided that I should go and see a specialist, Mr McGregor, who diagnosed the problem with the hernia. Obviously this was something that hadn't just materialised and could well have been behind the little niggling injuries that had been troubling me all season long.

I went into the hospital on the Friday and spent two and a half days there. The operation was a complete success but the recovery period is quite long. I went home to Northumberland and until last week I've not been able to do much in the form of training. Last Friday I started to do a bit of walking and jogging and I'll be going back to see the specialist in a fortnight to get the all clear to increase the amount of work I can do.

Apart from the time during my Newcastle days when I received over 60 stitches in my leg when I missed three months, this is the longest period I've ever been out and it is very frustrating sitting watching the lads play, especially when things aren't going too well. All you want to do is get out there and do your bit to help put things right.

Things haven't been going particularly well for us on the field. We had a lot of injuries earlier in the season which unsettled the side and when you get a few bad results the confidence begins to go a little. Last Saturday against Dunfermline we did really well in the first part of the game but after the equaliser you could see the doubts coming back into the play again. Some players try too hard to put things right and things can often just get worse when you do this. Still at times like this you just have to work hard and roll your

sleeves up and it is amazing what a difference a couple of good results will make. The introduction of Frank Connor will make a difference as well. He will be a new face and by all accounts is very different to the manager in some respects so they should complement each other well on the training pitch and in the dressing room. People often ask whether the travelling and being involved in Europe has an effect on domestic form. Certainly the travelling can be tiring and this has some effect but at the end of the day you have to cope with this if you want to be at the top of your profession.

International duty, as well, is something you have to learn to cope with. Next week Craig, John and Davie will be in Bulgaria with the Scotland squad. That is a long journey but the buzz you get from playing for your country usually counteracts any tiredness. It probably has more effect on the manager's plans as he cannot work on tactics with the players who are away. Still it's a good thing for the Club to have players involved at that level. As for my own international career, the manager Mr Bingham was good enough to call me before he named the squad for the opening European Championship match against Yugoslavia to tell me he had left me out on that occasion and would be

trying younger players. He said the door wasn't closed to me for the future so although it is unlikely I'll be called up again, you never can tell in Football.

Before the operation I had a spell helping out with the third team which I enjoyed and this week, with the Boss and Sandy Clark away to Italy, I've been taking the young lads for their training. It is something I enjoy doing and hope that they enjoy a change of face and voice. It is an area I'd like to work in once my playing career is over but I've no plans for that at present and aim to get my place back in the side once I've fully recovered fitness.

Today's match against Celtic will be hard as it always is, but there is no reason why this cannot be the start of a run for us. The early kick-off in Bologna enabled the lads to get home at a reasonable hour on Wednesday evening and Celtic players also had a midweek game to play.

The one thing the lads need most of all is encouragement and you can play your part in helping us. Never underestimate how important the support can be in lifting a side.

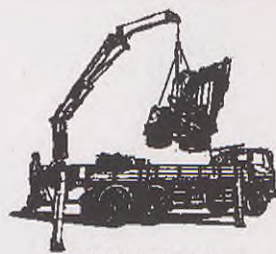

BEHIND THE SCENES

Pride of place in the Tynecastle Boardroom in a case above the fireplace is a book containing telegrams and letters sent to the Club in 1914 congratulating the players for setting 'an example to the youth of the nation' by volunteering to join the forces to fight in the First World War. This act alone guaranteed Hearts primacy amongst the many Clubs in Edinburgh at the time and is primarily responsible for the depth of feeling that exists for the Club amongst the citizens of Edinburgh and the Lothians.

"Edinburgh folks will forget your patriotic action when they agree to root up the Heart of Midlothian in the causeway near St Giles and that is never".

The 1914 season had opened amid great anticipation at Tynecastle.

The new grandstand which had been completed at a cost of £12,000 was in use and after a successful summer tour to Denmark in which the Hearts team defeated the national side, all was set for a major challenge for the title. The season opened with a 2-0 victory against the defending Champions Celtic and a further seven consecutive victories were recorded as the young side went from strength to strength. However more important things were dominating the world stage. In August 1914 that First World War had broken out and the British Expeditionary Force were fully involved in attempting to stop the German advance. The original, small army needed re-enforcement and Lord Kitchener had put out a plea for Volunteers to the nation. Footballers as a whole had been slow to enlist and various derogatory comments were being made in the journals of the day as well as in Parliament. It was in this background, with the great battle at Ypres raging and the Germans racing towards Calais, that the entire first team squad, along with hundreds of Shareholders and Season ticket holders enlisted – the first footballers to do so.

The bulk of these men formed, in a record 8 days, the 'C' Company of the 16th Royal Scots. While other Clubs sheltered their players behind their contracts and reserved occupations, Hearts fame had never been higher. On the field the team continued to perform but with unavailability and the strength of the players sapped by military training only 1 point was gained from the last three matches and Celtic snatched a title which

the nation willed to go to Tynecastle.

In all seven Hearts players made the supreme sacrifice in the bloodiest of all wars.

The Club were also active during the war raising money for army charities and helping wounded servicemen, efforts which were appreciated by the soldiers and those in authority.

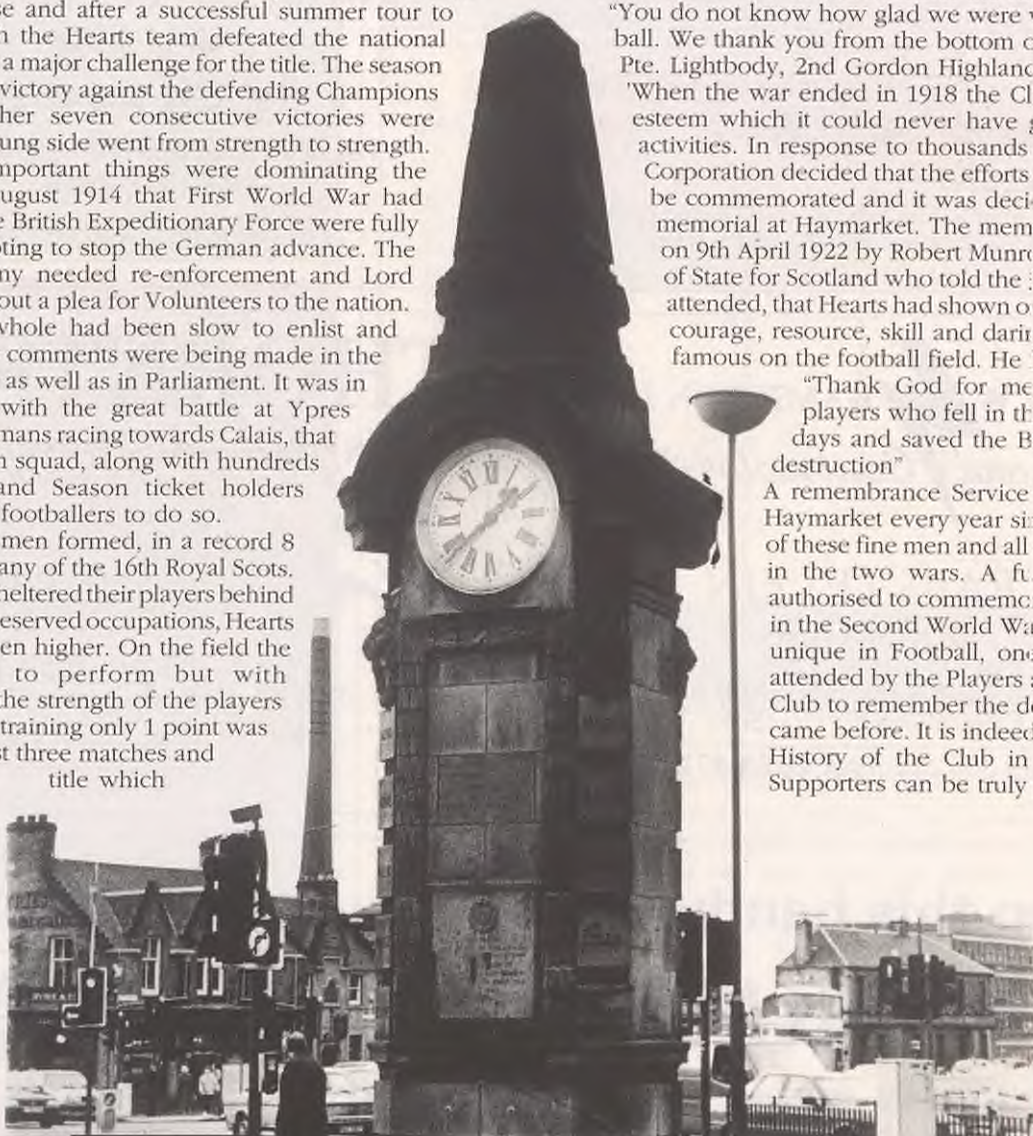

When the war ended in 1918 the Club was held in an esteem which it could never have gained by on-field activities. In response to thousands of letters, the City Corporation decided that the efforts of the Club should be commemorated and it was decided to erect a War memorial at Haymarket. The memorial was unveiled on 9th April 1922 by Robert Munro KC, MP Secretary of State for Scotland who told the 35,000 people who attended, that Hearts had shown on the battlefield the courage, resource, skill and daring that made them famous on the football field. He finished by saying,

"Thank God for men like the Hearts players who fell in the morning of their days and saved the British people from destruction"

A remembrance Service has been held at Haymarket every year since in the memory of these fine men and all others who served in the two wars. A further plaque was authorised to commemorate those who fell in the Second World War. It is a ceremony unique in Football, one which is always attended by the Players and officials of the Club to remember the deeds of those who came before. It is indeed an episode in the History of the Club in which all Hearts Supporters can be truly proud.

CELTIC

To date, it has certainly been a season of mixed fortune for our famous visitors who are desperately keen to secure major honours this term, after 1989-90 proved to be a barren campaign in which even a European place was missed.

When the new season commenced, Celtic supporters were confident that their team would mount a formidable challenge in view of the club's £2 million investment in the creative talents of Charlie Nicholas, John Collins and Martin Hayes. However, the League campaign opened with two defeats - against Motherwell and Aberdeen - which was a major blow to the club's ambitions.

Celtic then beat Hibs in their third League fixture and seemed to recover some form, taking five points from the next three Championship games and storming into the Skol Cup Final. Unfortunately for the Glasgow side, injuries and loss of form began to take their toll during October and at the time of writing, their last four League matches have only brought draws against St. Johnstone, Dunfermline and Dundee United, and a 3-0 reverse at Aberdeen. In addition, Celtic lost the Skol Cup Final to their great rivals from Ibrox.

Prior to this afternoon's match, Celtic had a home midweek fixture against Motherwell which produced a 2-1 win sorted out a few of their problems, and moves them away from the middle of the League table. Hearts versus Celtic is always an exciting fixture and with both sides requiring to put together a run of League successes, today's game should be particularly keen.

THE CELTIC SQUAD

Although Manager, Billy McNeill, is still endeavouring to strengthen certain areas of his team, one position never causes him any concern. That position is goalkeeper, where established Republic of Ireland Internationalist, **PAT BONNER** (30) reigns supreme. The 6'2" keeper from Donegal, dominates his goal area, while his agility and sheer consistency spreads confidence throughout the team. Pat signed from Keadue Rovers in 1978; established himself in 1980-81 season and has rarely played a poor game in 10 years.

In defence, Celtic also have an excellent choice of players, but this could be restricted this afternoon due to Derek Whyte being sidelined with a gashed knee and Chris Morris unsettled at Parkhead. In addition, 26 year old Londoner **PAUL ELLIOT** may be on the injured list after taking a severe ankle knock last Saturday at Aberdeen. Paul will be sorely missed, as the commanding 6'2" Internationalist has a fair bit of experience, having played in the Football League with Charlton Athletic, Luton Town and Aston Villa prior to his move to Italy in 1987. Alongside Elliot in a sweeper role, has been Polish International skipper, **DARIUSZ WDOWCZYK** (28). He is a composed, accomplished defender who has strength, pace and great shot, and looks International-class. Dariusz, who can also play at full-back, was signed last season from Legia Warsaw for a fee of some £400,000. At full-back, Celtic have recently been fielding **PETER GRANT** and **ANTON ROGAN**. Peter (25) is dedicated to the Glasgow club, having stepped-up from Celtic Boys Club in 1982 and proving that he can be relied upon for 100% commitment. He is a tough ball-winner in defence or midfield, and works hard to assist the play makers. Peter has earned two caps for Scotland, while his partner Anton Rogan (24) is now featuring in the Northern Ireland side. The Belfast-born defender was signed from Distillery in 1986 and has established himself in the team through his hard work and driving runs down the left flank.

The Celtic injury situation may present an

opportunity for 19 year old full-back **MARK McNALLY** who signed professionally from the Boys Club in 1987. Also awaiting recall is 6'2" centre-half **LEX BAILLIE** who has been playing in North America during the summer in an effort to improve his fitness following a serious ankle injury last term. Lex has been at Celtic Park since 1982 when he was signed-up from Burnbank Boys Club.

Our visitors might also be tempted to move 20 year old **STEPHEN FULTON** from midfield to defence, because the hard and skilful Under-21 Internationalist has shown great versatility. A natural left-sided player, Stephen established himself in the squad at 18, after stepping-up from Celtic Boys Club.

In midfield, Celtic can choose from the tremendous creative talent of John Collins, Paul McStay and Martin



Hayes, and the power and drive of Mike Galloway. The vision and passing skills of **JOHN COLLINS** (22) from Galashiels are outstanding, and he looks set to add to his five Scottish International caps in the near future. John, of course, started his career with our Easter Road neighbours in 1984 and was in great demand among bigger clubs. A fee of £1 million took the goalscoring midfielder to Celtic Park last summer where he forms one of the most creative partnerships in the country with 26 year old **PAUL McSTAY**. The Celtic captain is the man who has made things happen in midfield for his club and Scotland over many seasons. Paul's immaculate distribution and all-round vision are bound to be enhanced through teaming-up with Collins in the vital midfield area.

25 year old **MIKE GALLOWAY** can be depended upon to win the ball and work tirelessly over 90 minutes. He is also excellent in the air and can make powerful runs from midfield. Mike, of course, went to Celtic in 1989 from Hearts for a fee of £550,000 and he has also had experience with Halifax Town, Mansfield Town and the Scotland Under-21 side. **MARTIN HAYES** (24) was another



summer signing for Celtic, coming from Arsenal for £650,000. The former England Under-21 Internationalist is a positive, right-sided midfielder who is expected to be a tremendous asset to the squad. Martin joined Arsenal straight from school and earned winners medals in the League Championship and the Littlewoods Cup during his time with the London club.

In attack, Celtic are traditionally strong, although injuries have prevented them from establishing a settled front line. **DARIUSZ DZIEKANOWSKI** (28) is currently the top goalscorer with 5 competitive strikes. This brilliant individualist is a great favourite with the fans and is still capable of adding to his collection of over 50 Polish International cups.

When he was signed from Legia Warsaw in 1989, 'Jacki' has also played for Stal PSO, Polonia Warsaw, Guardia Warsaw and Widzew Lodz. Next in Celtic's current scoring list are both **GERRY CREANEY** (26) and **JOE MILLER** (22), who have scored 4 competitive goals each. Gerry, a 5'10" tall striker from Coatbridge, has made a sensational impact this season and fully deserved his representative honour at Under-21 level. He is another product of Celtic Boys Club. Joe Miller on the other hand, cost some £650,000 when he was signed from Aberdeen in 1987. The skilful Glaswegian, who is an Under-21 Internationalist, has great pace and dribbling skill and is a tough handful for any full-back.

Also challenging for inclusion are **ANDY WALKER** (25), **JOHN HEWITT** (27) and **CHARLIE NICHOLAS** (28); players who could command a regular place in many teams. Andy joined Celtic in 1987 for £350,000 from Motherwell, but has suffered a number of injury problems during his time at Parkhead. He is, however, one of the most tenacious strikers in the game and a great man to have in the squad. John Hewitt has also been unlucky with injuries, a ligament problem having affected his career since his £250,000 transfer from Aberdeen in September 1989. The quick and dangerous Aberdonian has a fine reputation as a scorer of vital goals and will be hoping to prove this in due course with a regular run in the side. The unluckiest player at Parkhead, however, must be the highly-skilled and flamboyant Charlie Nicholas, who has been troubled by a hamstring problem since his £450,000 move from Aberdeen in the summer. Charlie was a former idol of the Celtic crowd until his £750,000 transfer to Arsenal in 1983. The International striker moved to Aberdeen in January 1988 and after a successful period up north, has brought his special talent back home to Parkhead.

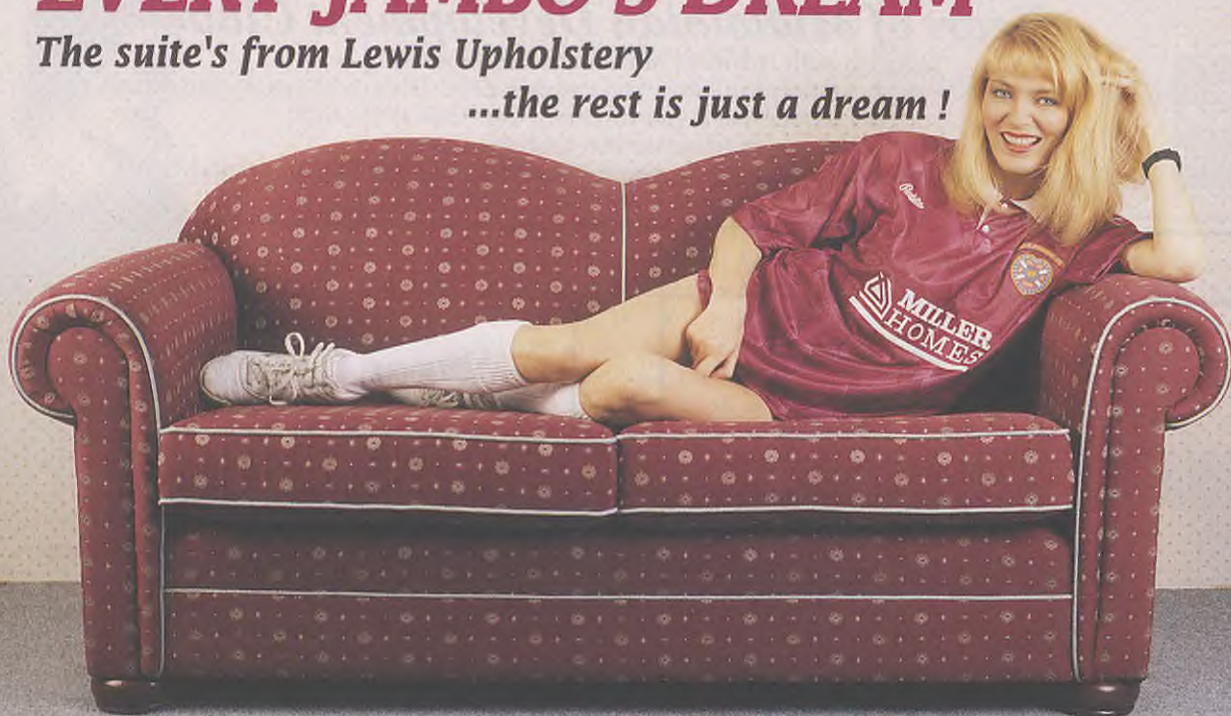

MATCH OF THE DAY

* Celtic were Hearts opponents in the first-ever League match at Tynecastle Park, which took place on 23-8-1890. Edinburgh fans in the crowd of 5,000 streamed out of the ground with 30 minutes left as goals by Madden (2), Groves (2). Groves (2) and Dowds earned the Glasgow team a resounding 5-0 victory. This remains Celtic's biggest victory at Tynecastle.

* Since that first League clash 100 years ago, the two clubs have met 213 times in the Championship and Hearts full record against Celtic now reads:

* Hearts best win over Celtic in the League came in September 1895 when apparently, the "Maroons" physical power shattered the home side and led to a 5-0 victory. Alex King – who later played for Celtic – hit a hat-trick before 18,000 fans, while George Hogg and Bob McLaren completed the scoring. Celtic's biggest home victory over Hearts is 6-0, a result recorded in April 1908 and April 1981. The latter match was also their biggest Premier Division win over the "Maroons" and Celtic's scorers that day were McCluskey (2), Provan, McGarvey and MacLeod (2).

* Hearts biggest victory over Celtic at Tynecastle came in February 1895 when a crowd of 8,000 celebrated a 4-0 result after goals by Tom Chambers, Willie Michael and John Walker (2).

* Since the Premier Division was instituted, Hearts have recorded only one win in Glasgow, with John Robertson scoring the only goal of the game in October 1985. At Tynecastle, Hearts best Premier Division victory came in October 1978 when Drew Busby scored both goals in a 2-0 win.

* Hearts have signed very few players from Celtic over the years as the following comprehensive list reveals – Willie McStay (1929); Tommy Henderson (1960); Bobby Prentice (1973); Roddy MacDonald (1981); Brian Whittaker (1984) and John Colquhoun (1985).

* On 3 September 1938 a crowd of 49,904 saw Celtic defeat Hearts 5-1 at Tynecastle. The attendance is the largest ever to fill this ground for a League match.
