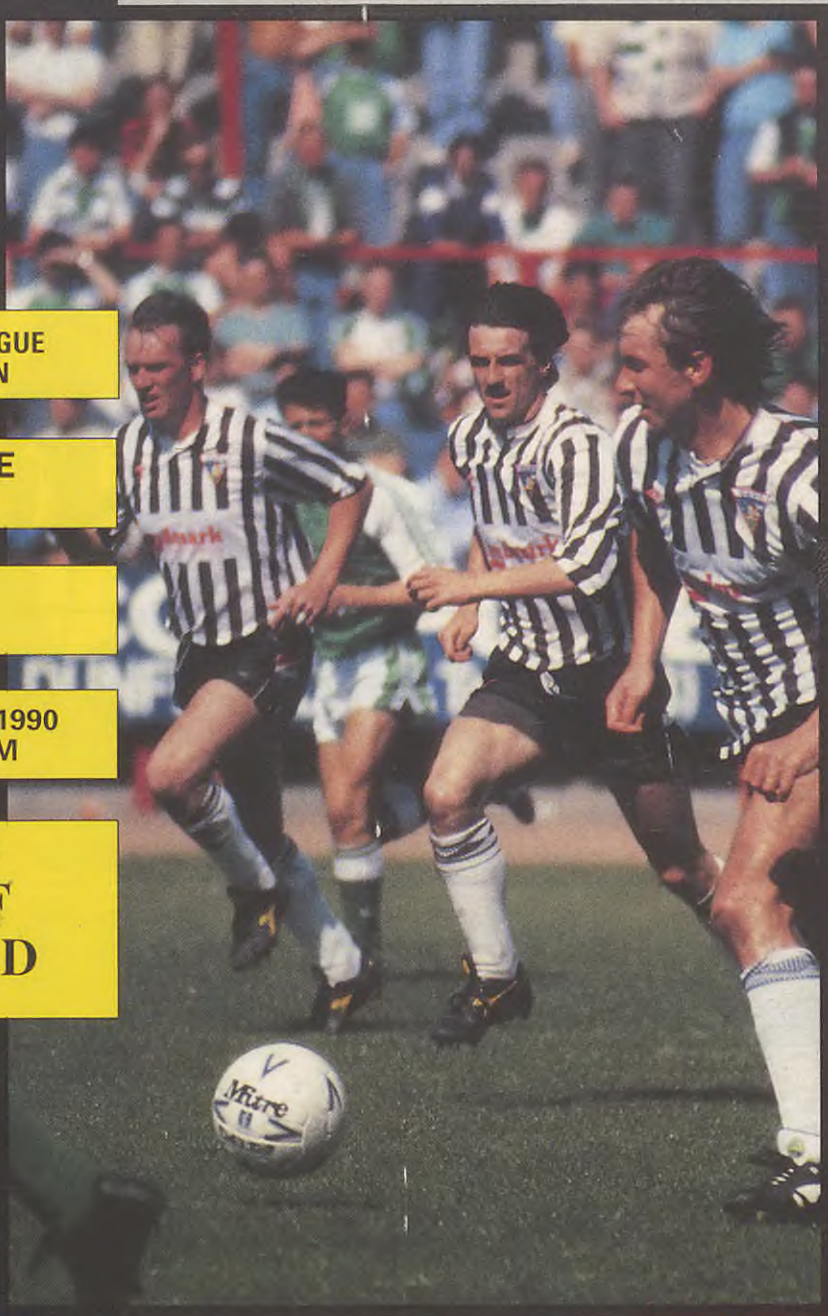

OPENING SHOTS

When was the last time a Dunfermline game was abandoned because of the weather? No prizes for getting this one right, but it is safe to say that it doesn't happen very often. After last week's results became something of a lottery, the debate centred not so much on whether the game at Tannadice should have been called off, but whether or not others should have followed suit.

Our erratic weather makes the Scottish referee's job a particularly difficult one, but one wonders whether we couldn't make their job a little easier if sterner criteria were applied. This would not always go down well with the fans – especially those of us who are like fish out of water when we are forced to do without our weekly dose of football spectating. On the other hand, there are perhaps now far too many reasons why we should only have matches played in reasonable conditions.

For a start, there are the players themselves. Games nowadays are tough enough without increasing the chances of injuries. Aberdeen's goalkeeper Theo Snelders appeared to have been as much a victim of the weather as anything else last Saturday. It was interesting to hear that Players' Union Secretary Tony Higgins intends to have discussions with the football authorities to see what steps can be taken to prevent unnecessary injury in these circumstances. Certainly, Pars fans will have vivid memories of a match here against East Fife in January 1987, when footballers on both sides escaped serious injury by luck alone. The vision of players, hardly able to remain upright on the drenched surface, hacking away to clear the ball from puddles across the field was not a pretty sight.

Secondly, there are the spectators. With increasing emphasis on comfort and on encouraging families along to football matches, it seems to contradict those intentions when fans are left cold, wet and miserable.

All of this, raises the annual question – should Scottish football have a winter break? Those who argue against it say that it is impossible to predict the Scottish climate – the months of, say, January and February might be dry and sunny while the break was happening, but games could easily have to be cancelled at other times. Those who are in favour state that football should be played in the best conditions. Crowds are generally higher in spring, and the FIFA World Under-16 Tournament showed that fans will flock to Summer football – if it is properly marketed. We'd be interested to hear your views on this subject – feel free to drop a note to the Editor.

Dundee United may have been upset that Saturday's game was abandoned when they were leading, but perhaps there is a need for more of the brave decision-making of the type made by referee Brian McGinley last Saturday. In the meantime, spare a thought for Ian McCall – his superb goal, which might yet have sparked a Dunfermline revival, is deleted from the record books as if it never happened.

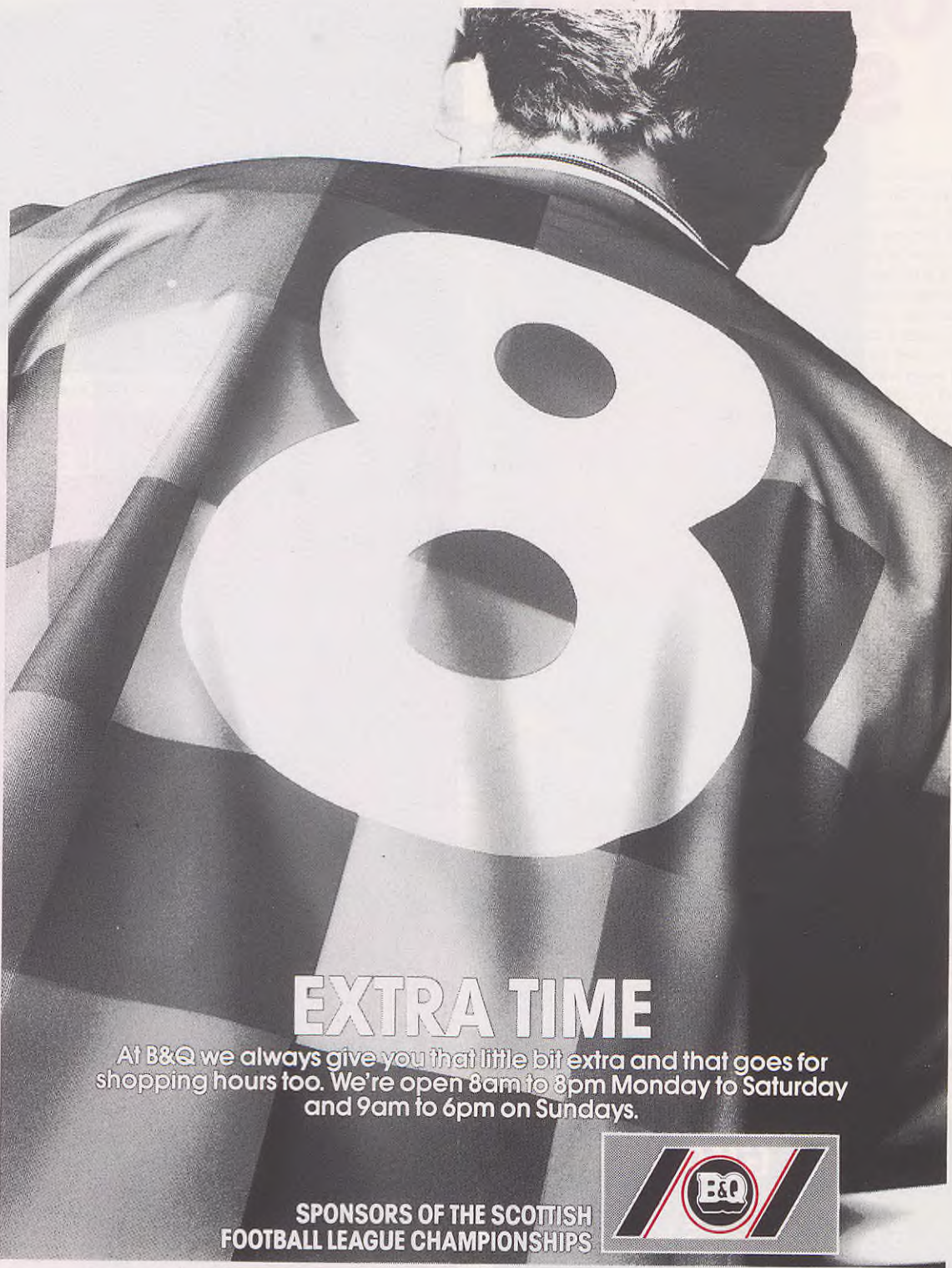

PAR PROFILE

Raymond Sharp

Fans of Dunfermline Athletic have become accustomed to seeing Raymond Sharp take to the field every Saturday, but a mere 18 months or so ago, the young full back wasn't even in the reckoning. If Raymond's rise to a regular first team place has been dramatic, it has also been richly deserved and a confidence-booster to other youngsters in the club who may be wondering whether their time will come.

Signed in 1986 from Gairdoch United, Raymond first came to prominence during Dunfermline's winning run during the BP Cup tournament in 1987/88. The following season, with seemingly no place for him, he was eventually farmed out to Stenhousemuir to gain first team experience. He was an instant hit at Ochilview and, after only a handful of games, was brought back to East End Park and put straight into the team for a tough local derby against Raith Rovers. He performed well and hasn't looked back since.

It was his ability to hold down a first-team place in a Premier side which led to his inclusion in Craig Brown's Scotland Under-21 pool to play Norway last November.

Raymond admits that that was quite an experience for him: "I was surprised to be included and I was very nervous. I thought it would be a great experience, just to sit on the bench, and I was delighted just to win the jersey."

As it turned out, Raymond was given a run for the last 15 minutes of the match when he replaced Aberdeen's David Robertson. It was enough to convince Craig Brown to include him for a second time last month against Rumania.

"This time it wasn't so nerve-racking. I thought I had a better chance of playing from the start this time, and I was pleased to get the chance. I also enjoyed training with the full Scotland squad at Hampden - I didn't realise that's what happened. It was a great experience - I thought the Scotland players would keep themselves to themselves, but they were really good and chatted away to help us."

Back at East End Park, Raymond is aware that the team haven't got off to the greatest of starts.

"The hassle at the start maybe affected the players, but we've also got new players and it takes time to settle in. There's a good atmosphere in the dressing room and everybody's chatting to each other. It might not look it sometimes but we're all giving 100% - I'm sure it's just a matter of time before it comes right."

Raymond will, of course, be back on duty at East End Park on Tuesday and he warns fans that it will be different: "It's a different ball game from the Premier League. We'll be trying to play the ball from the back all the time, with the big kick only used as a last resort. The under-21 team has 18 and 19 year olds with a lot of ability. I hope the fans turn out to see the game - they'll see a lot of good football."

As for Raymond himself, he is not letting all this "stardom" go to his head. He never takes it for granted that he's in the pool and always looks for his name on the list every Friday. His one concern is that, with 50 first team games now under his belt, his first first-team goal has yet to be scored. "I get up the park often enough, but I know that I will have to take more responsibility. The fans will certainly know about it if I ever do get a goal!"

THE FOOTBALL TRUST

Family Enclosures – one of the most successful Trust funded Initiatives at Scottish grounds.

The Football Trust 1990 has been created to help the game at all levels and to assist clubs meet the requirements of Lord Justice Taylor's Final Report.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Scottish Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of junior football, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom

SCOTLAND'S GOALSCORERS

With plenty of midweek games being played, Scotland's top goalscorers have taken the chance over the past fortnight to increase their goal tallies. Amazingly enough, no player in the Premier has yet managed to net four League goals – an indication perhaps of just how tight the Division is. Nevertheless, Rangers players took the opportunity to put a few past some weak European opposition to take them to the top of this week's table. Weak is not how you would describe Soviet side Dnepr, but that didn't prevent Hearts John Robertson from adding considerably to his total and that he'll not give up his title of top Premier goalscorer easily.

In the First Division, Airdrie's Owen Coyle reigns supreme despite a couple of blank returns during the past week. Evergreen strikers Ken Eadie and Gordon Dalziel share second spot, while Kilmarnock's John Sludden follows closely behind – thanks to the first-ever hat-trick in the B&Q Centenary Cup.

Queen's Park striker Mick Hendry leads the Second Division table, but here there are a number of players chasing second-placed Joe Reid of Stirling Albion and Stenhousemuir's Stevie McCormick.

Gary Neile of 96 Knowe Park Avenue, Stanwix, Carlisle, has written to us asking how Dunfermline came to be known as 'The Pars'. The answer is "if only we knew!", but for Gary and any other young supporters who might be interested here are a few of the explanations given:

1. At one time the team were playing so badly they were nicknames the "Paraletics" which was shortened to Pars.
2. In the early part of the century when Rosyth Naval Base opened, sailors from the south came to watch Dunfermline and unfurled a banner reading "Plymouth Argyle (Rosyth) Supporters."
3. When Dunfermline gained League status they were called the Pars because they were now on a Par with other teams.
4. When the team first sported black and white stripes they were called the Pars because their colours resembled the parr, a fish. If you ask me, all of the explanations sound a bit fishy! At least we have an original nickname to be proud of.

WELCOME TO CELTIC

Rangers, Aberdeen, Hearts and Dundee United all finished above Celtic after their league campaign last season. Despite their lack of success, Celtic still attract fans to come and watch them perform – Dunfermline's two highest home attendances of 1989/90 were against Celtic. Not bad for a 'Bhoys' side, who, by their own high standards had a disastrous season during 1989-90. They failed to secure a single trophy, but more importantly failed to qualify for European competition for the first time in over a decade. Out of the 'big five' clubs in the Premier League, the Parkhead outfit was the one against whom 'The Pars' enjoyed the most success. A win and a draw at home, and a handsome 2-0 victory in Glasgow secured a five point haul, only one point less than they had taken from the other four put together.

Celtic's poor season made a summer 'spending spree' inevitable. Not to disappoint both fans and media alike, Billy McNeill began what was to be a £2 million restructure of the Parkhead first eleven during the latter days of May, with the signing of Arsenal's out of favour midfielder Martin Hayes. Perennial favourite with the Celtic Park faithful Charlie Nicholas was quick to follow, and the re-shaping was complete by mid-July when John Collins signed from Hibernian for a club record fee.

However, McNeill's 'multi-millionaires' began in August as nightmarishly as they had finished the previous May. Defeat at Motherwell on the opening day of the season, followed by a 3-0 drubbing at the hands of arch-rivals Aberdeen a week later, left them pointless and propping up the other nine Premier Leagueites. In recent weeks though, the

Parkhead machine has begun to gain momentum, turning the corner at the unlikely of locations – Ibrox! Since that creditable 1-1 draw, they have thrashed Hearts, disposed of Dundee United with ease in the Skol Cup semi-final, and shown tremendous character to come from behind and beat St Mirren 3-2 at Love Street. Their only setback came last Saturday when, without Paul McStay and in atrocious conditions, they could only manage a draw against Premier newcomers St. Johnstone. Celtic nevertheless travel to East End Park in formidable form, and will certainly give Ian Munro's boys their sternest test at home so far this season.

PAT BONNER – GOALKEEPER: In his tenth consecutive season as first choice keeper at Parkhead. Played in all forty-eight competitive first team matches last season. One of the main reasons the Republic of Ireland reached the World Cup quarter-finals, where he won his forty-third international cap in Rome's 'Stadio Olimpico'.

PAUL ELLIOTT – DEFENDER: Began his league career with Charlton Athletic, and was widely tipped for full international honours both before and after his £400,000 move from Aston Villa to Pisa in 1987, although none

were forthcoming. He failed to stop the Italians being relegated in 1989, but his continental exile was ended by Billy McNeill's £650,000 bid.

DEREK WHYTE - DEFENDER: Made a rapid transition from youth to international football in less than four years. Captained Scotland under-15's in 1984. Signed from Celtic Boys Club in 1985, and made his league debut against Hearts seven months later. Began what is likely to be a long international career against Belgium at Hampden Park in the latter part of 1987. Required 18 stitches in a knee injury from last Saturday, so will miss out today.

LEX BAILLIE - DEFENDER: Tall central defender who has made something of a comeback this season after being ruled out completely through injury in 1989/90. Spent the summer in Canada with Toronto Blizzards to get fit. He may replace Derek Whyte today.

CHRIS MORRIS - DEFENDER: Initially signed as a 'squad' player who cost a modest £125,000 from Sheffield Wednesday in July 1987. An attacking full-back whose performances during Celtic's centenary season earned him a call-up into Jack Charlton's Irish squad. Made his international debut during the build-up to the 1988 European Championships, and has been a regular in a green shirt ever since.

ANTON ROGAN - DEFENDER: Resurrected his Celtic career with an outstanding performance against Rangers at Ibrox a few weeks ago, after a summer of uncertainty when it looked as though he would be heading south to either Portsmouth or Bristol City. A Northern Irish international who joined Celtic from Irish League side Distillery in 1986.

DARIUSZ WDOWCZYK - DEFENDER: Sacrificed the captaincy of Poland's national side to sign from Legia Warsaw in October 1989. A typical continental defender who is at ease on the ball. Has a tremendous left-foot shot, although this brought only one goal in twenty-nine appearances last season. An experienced international with in excess of forty caps.

MARTIN HAYES - MIDFIELD: Former Arsenal apprentice who made his league debut against Oxford in November 1985. Established himself as a first team regular the following season, and celebrated by topping their scoring list with 24 goals. Won a First Division Championship medal with the 'Gunners' in 1989. Capped three times for England under-21's.

MIKE GALLOWAY - MIDFIELD: Played for Tynecastle Boys Club while his father was stationed at Edinburgh Castle, although he began his professional career in the lower reaches of the English Football League. Previously with Fourth Division sides Mansfield and Halifax, before a £60,000 move to Hearts brought him a meteoric rise to fame. Spent two seasons at Tynecastle before moving to Celtic Park for £550,000 in 1989.

PETER GRANT - MIDFIELD: The 'ball winner' of the Celtic midfield since Roy Aitken's departure to Newcastle. Had an unhappy start to last season, however, the problems which culminated in a transfer request are now firmly behind him. Peter nearly made the Scotland twenty-two for 'Italia 90', although he is still waiting to increase his tally of two caps.

PAUL McSTAY - MIDFIELD: First came to prominence after his goalscoring exploits against England Schoolboys at Wembley in 1979. Made his league debut against Aberdeen at Pittodrie on 30th January 1982, and has never looked back. Club captain who also

had the honour of leading Scotland to victory over Rumania on his 50th international appearance last month.

JOHN COLLINS - MIDFIELD: Became the Parkhead club's most expensive signing to date when he joined them from Hibernian for £800,000 in July 1990. Ironically John's first steps towards the professional ranks were with Celtic Boys Club, but he eventually moved to Easter Road from Hutcheson Vale BC in 1984. Was a Scottish squad member in Italy during the summer, and looks likely to become a regular in Andy Roxburgh's first eleven in the near future.

STEVE FULTON - MIDFIELD: Inexperience failed to stop Steve turning in two excellent performances against Hibs in the Scottish Cup semi-final, and Liverpool in the Dubai Super Cup during the 1988-89 season. He has yet to establish himself as a first team regular at Parkhead, although it is only a matter of time before he does so. Billy McNeill has described the 19 year old as 'the best passer of a ball at Celtic Park'.

DARIUSZ DZIEKANOWSKI - FORWARD: The Poles are renowned for producing skillful players with a flair for scoring goals, and 'Jackie' is no exception, seemingly from the same mould as previous World Cup stars Lato and Boniek. Signed from Warsaw's Legia club for £600,000 during the close season of 1989. Celtic's most capped player, and winner of three Polish Cup-winners medals.

GERRY CREANEY - FORWARD: Reserve turned goalscoring sensation, that is the remarkable achievement which this 20 years old has compacted into less than two weeks. A goal and an assist after coming on as substitute against Hearts won him a place in the starting line-up for the Skol Cup semi-final. He scored again, and proceeded to net two more against St Mirren the following Saturday. At present he must be considered one of Scottish football's hottest properties. He returns today to East End Park where he made his first team debut last season.

CHARLIE NICHOLAS - FORWARD: After seven years and 239 appearances for Arsenal and Aberdeen, Charlie returned to what he and the Parkhead fans have always regarded as 'home', in a £450,000 deal during the summer. He will be remembered south of the border for his two goal demolition of Liverpool in the 1987 Littlewoods Cup Final. Returned north to Aberdeen for £400,000 in January 1988. Injury has limited him to only two first team appearances so far this season.

JOE MILLER - FORWARD: Joe began his professional career with Aberdeen before returning to his native city for £650,000 in November 1987. Injury curtailed much of his second season at Parkhead, but he recovered in time to score what was to be the winning goal of the 1989 Scottish Cup Final. When he is on form, his skill and pace make him a nightmare to mark, a fact to which Hearts Tosh McKinlay will readily testify after their recent encounter.

JOHN HEWITT - FORWARD: 27 year old left sided attacker who joined Celtic in August 1989, after a long and successful career with Aberdeen. Injuries restricted his appearances last season, but he will be hoping to show his true form to the Parkhead faithful this time around.

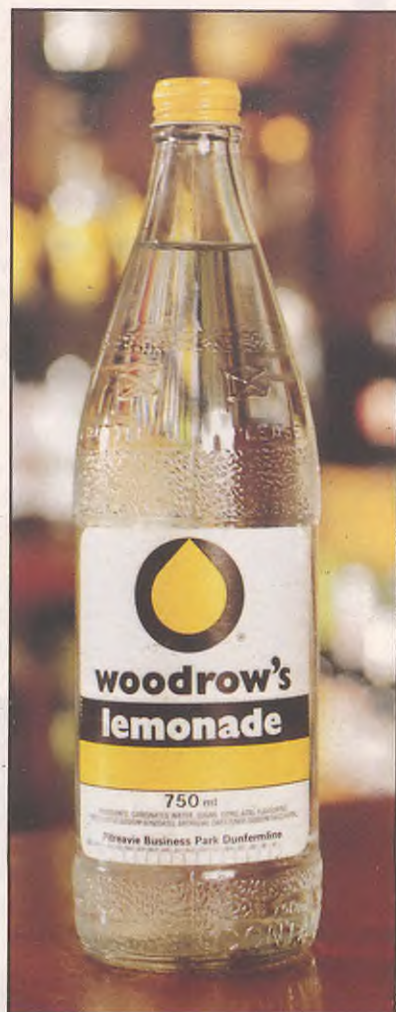

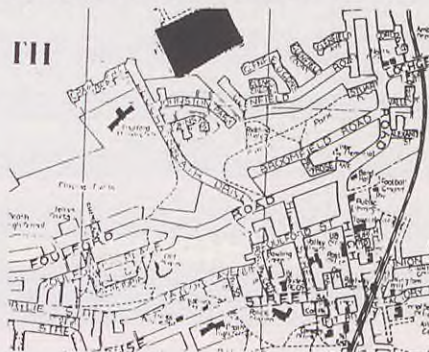

FROM THE PAST

In season 1966/67 a few short weeks after Dunfermline lost the memorable 6-5 match to Hibs, the Pars faced a Celtic team which had already won the League Cup and had dropped only one point from their previous ten League matches.

The scene was set for what looked likely to be an exciting match, but nobody realised just how exhilarating it was to eventually turn out. It took over half an hour for the opening goal to be scored, but once that went in, the floodgates opened.

Hugh Robertson put the Pars 1-0 up after 32 minutes with a terrific 20 yard shot, and two minutes later Pat Delaney made it two after a goalmouth scramble. Celtic, rather fortunately, pulled one back almost immediately, Roy Barry's headed clearance hitting Murdoch and rebounding into the net. Bert Paton restored the two goal lead in the 39th minute, but a minute before half time Eric Martin pushed away a Lennox shot only to see Jimmy Johnstone appear to net the rebound.

Following the well deserved interval, in which the 20,000 crowd had a chance to get their breaths back after seeing five goals in 13 minutes, it was the Pars who scored again, Alex Ferguson grabbing a simple goal in the 48th minute.

Now 4-2 down and their unbeaten record seemingly in tatters, Celtic staged a remarkable fight-back. Auld blasted in a 25 yard shot in the 67th minute, and just after this Joe McBride levelled the scores, easily beating Martin after running onto a Chalmers through ball.

For the remaining twenty minutes there was incident and excitement in both penalty areas as the two teams fought for the winning goal. In the final minute, a Celtic free kick was headed past the post by Chalmers, with Barry right beside him. The referee, Tom Wharton, awarded a goal-kick, but Celtic players drew his attention to the linesmen. After a brief consultation, the referee turned and pointed to the penalty spot. When the uproar died down slightly, McBride smashed the ball into the net for an incredible 5-4 victory.

Although no-one could say for sure, it was believed that the linesman saw the ball hit Barry's hand before going out of play. It was a match Dunfermline didn't deserve to lose, particularly in such a manner.

It was to be the following season, and a famous cup match at Parkhead, before the Pars would get their revenge.

The teams on November 19, 1966 were:-

Celtic- Simpson, Gemmell, O'Neil, Murdoch, McNeill, Clark, Johnstone, Chalmers, McBride, Lennox, Auld.

It may not be often that Dunfermline score four against Celtic, but two seasons earlier, on April 28, 1965, the Pars went one better. It could have been the most famous match in Dunfermline's history, when they clinched the League title too along with their second Scottish Cup success. Sadly, it was not to be. In the space of a week the Pars lost everything - first the League, by only drawing at home to St. Johnstone, and then the Cup, going down 3-2 to Celtic in the final.

When Celtic visited East End Park four days later, all Athletic were playing for was a chance to avenge their Hampden defeat. This they did in some style, recording a magnificent 5-1 victory.

After surviving the initial Celtic onslaught in which Herriot saved a Maxwell penalty after only three minutes, Athletic completely

JIMMY McGRORY



The most prolific goalscorer in Scottish football history was the legendary Jimmy McGrory, who, in a career stretching from 1922 to 1938, scored a total of 550 goals in first class football.

Dunfermline players of the day could testify to his goalscoring prowess more than most. In a famous game at Celtic Park on January 14, 1928, McGrory scored no less than eight goals in Celtic's 9-0 demolition of the Pars.

He also had another two disallowed, and strangely, considering his power in the air, not one of these ten efforts came from his head. It is reckoned that a third of all his goals were from headers, so at least the Pars defence did something right that day!

This wasn't the only occasion that he tormented Dunfermline - on January 21, 1933 he scored a hat-trick in Celtic's 7-1 Scottish Cup victory, and three years later he notched another hat-trick in a league match against the Pars.

Naturally, he had pleasant memories of his games against Athletic, stating, maybe only half jokingly, "Perhaps it's because they were kind enough to allow me to score a lot of goals".

In 408 League matches, McGrory scored an incredible 410 goals, a record which will probably never be equalled.

dominated Celtic and outclassed them in every department. With debutant Jim Fraser staying right on top of Scottish International striker John Hughes, the Pars took the lead in the 40th minute. A McLaughlin shot was deflected past Fallon by John Clark, and three minutes later McLaughlin scored the second after a great run by Ferguson.

Although Hughes pulled one back just before half time, it took Dunfermline only a minute of the second half to restore their two goal lead, Harry Melrose scoring with a 25 yard drive. In 56 minutes, McLaughlin scored the fourth and eight minutes later Ferguson completed the scoring with a header from a Melrose corner.

Despite having 26 minutes left to play, the Pars were unable to score again, but had done enough to devastate Celtic. In a powerful display, no one stood out more than teenager Jim Fraser, promoted from the reserves and marking Hughes out of the game, helping Dunfermline to their record win over the Parkhead club.

Scotland's young soccer strikers were on target in the first round of the BP Scottish Youth Cup.

Motherwell's Alex Burns led the way with four goals against Dalbeattie Star, while William Reid (Clydebank), Gary Bolland (Dundee Utd) and Colin McDonald (Aberdeen) all notched hat-tricks in their games.

Derek Laing

Scotland's European Youth Championship squad departed for Poland last Monday, with Dunfermline's

16 year old striker Derek Laing once again in the party. Derek impressed coach Ross Mathie during a recent Four Nation tournament in Belgium, playing from the start in all three matches. The first saw Scotland draw 1-1 with Holland, but then lost 2-1 to Italy, Derek being involved in the move leading to Scotland's goal. The final game saw the young Scots lost 5-3 to the host nation, despite leading 3-1 at one point, helped by Derek's headed goal.

The youngster from Haddington was selected for the Belgian tournament after playing well in the two day trial at Stirling University. In Belgium, the players from all four countries stayed at a university about ten miles from Liege, with the matches all held at Standard Liege's stadium.

Derek, who signed a full time professional contract with Dunfermline at the start of the year, enjoyed his first experience of playing abroad, and believes that he played quite well – a view obviously shared by the coaching staff.

The Polish match is Scotland's first in the Under 18 youth championship, and the squad is young enough to let it stay together for the duration of the qualifying group, which also includes Northern Ireland the Republic of Ireland.

The squad left from Glasgow airport on Monday night, (taking plenty of their own food!), and Derek, 17 next month, is quietly confident that Scotland can return with two points.

On Tuesday 25th September, Dunfermline's third team took on Stirling Albion in the Reserve League (East), keen to get back on the rails after the defeat at Brechin. Although the team initially struggled on the artificial pitch, the Pars came on to their game but had to settle for a 4-4 draw.

Athletic took the lead courtesy of a spectacular own goal, an Albion defender leaving it over his keeper's head from over 30 yards out. Pars second came from big Yugoslav Milos Drizic, his first for the club. The ball was partially cleared following a free-kick, but Drizic remained in the penalty box to head home Andy Williamson's accurate cross.

Trevor Smith scored the other two goals, his first an accurate side foot shot after cutting across a couple of defenders, the second a penalty after Trevor himself was brought down.

A lack of concentration allowed Stirling to equalise with only five minutes to play, with coach Jimmy Thomson believing that the Pars should have won the game convincingly.

Dunfermline's line up was: Hillcoat, McCaig, (Docherty), Williamson, Haro, Drizic, T. Smith, McAllister, Farningham, O'Brien, S. Gallacher, (Davidson), Cunningham.

On the following Monday, the Pars travelled up to Forfar and recorded a 2-1 victory, their first since the opening match of the season. Dunfermline played some attractive, intelligent football and should have been comfortably in the lead before half time. Forfar's veteran goalkeeper Stewart Kennedy pulled off a couple of fine saves to deny Gallacher and Laing, but these chances should really have been taken. John Hillcoat showed himself to be in equally fine form at the other end, making a superb save shortly before the interval.

Just after this, however, Forfar opened the scoring and it took Dunfermline half an hour of the second half to equalise, Stuart Gallacher cutting across the defence before hitting a low shot into the net.

With only a minute to play, Gallacher scored the winner. He beat the Forfar centre half to a long ball, rounded another defender and then the keeper before scoring from an acute angle.
