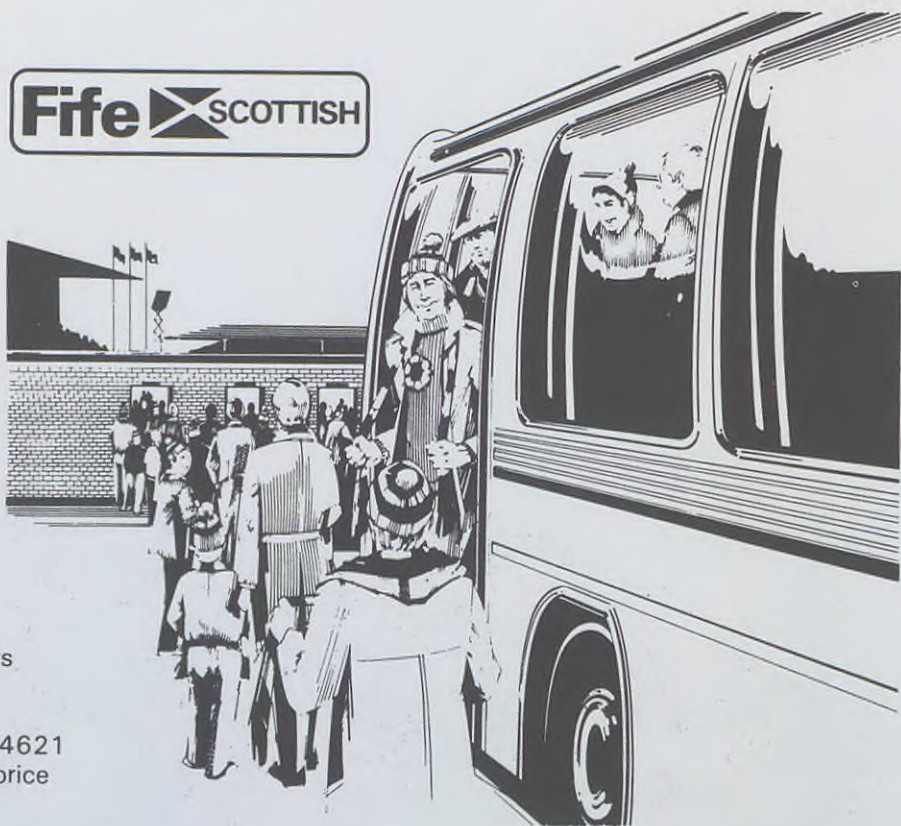

# Opening Shots

Its total cost, when first placed for, was only a club, currently a fixture in second division football, was its first winner. It has broken men's hearts and minds over 117 years, and yet it remains the ultimate accolade for its victors to claim. The Scottish Cup is the one trophy which commands total dedication and aspiration amongst all its competitors, and this afternoon, all other soccer business is put aside whilst the terms on show today battle it out for progress towards the grand show-down at Scotland's national ground at seasons close.

So what makes the cup such a special desire in players and supporters minds alike? There is, in reality, no simple explanation or rational reply. It is, simply, a one-off chance of glory that anyone has the right to, if the gods of fortune and luck smile benignly. It drains together the mighty, not so mighty, and the outsiders into one big melting pot, and provides strange and exotic combinations of fixtures, where the big guns must tilt with the minnows, where like faces like outside of the usual league business. The Cup, above all else, dispenses with pressure, and replaces it with naked fear amongst big and small alike. It is a leveller, and that is what gives it its cloak of magic. Dreams can be woven, and inspiration can be generated just by simply taking part, ninety minutes can be transferred into death or glory, and yet, as they say, "There's always next year!"

There are some remarkable records and achievements to recall over the Scottish Cup's history. Arbroath, of course, hold the record of the biggest score in cup competition - 36-0 against the unfortunate Bon Accord way back in 1886. The individual scoring record was held in the same match by a certain John Petrie, who bagged 13 of the 36 goals. Recent history has shown Stirling Albion putting 20 in without reply against Selkirk. History does not record whether the respective goalkeepers had to undergo therapy for depression afterwards!

had to settle for second best - Frank Haffey, Alan Gilzean, Jim Cruickshank, Alex Ferguson, John Blackley, Andy Gray, Colin Stein and Des Bremner - all great players who played at the very pinnacle of the game, but missed out on the domestic cup competition. Even Graeme Souness, for all his enviable achievements as a player and manager, does not possess a first prize ticket from a final finale.

Glory is not exclusive to the final tie, however. Who can forget that momentous January in 1967 when the mighty Rangers from Glasgow were sent packing out of the competition by the lowly Rangers from Berwick. The win was achieved by a single goal from Sammy Reid, who lives on in folklore to this day. Twenty years later, Rangers were sent packing again - the multi-million pound Souness brigade were dumped by relegation certain ties Hamilton - a single Adrian Sprott goal was enough to guarantee his name in the football annuals of glory.

The Cup, of course, was the cornerstone of the great success enjoyed by Dunfermline, masterminded and sustained by the great Jock Stein. The great success at home and abroad was built around a memorable

Hampden victory against Celtic in 1961. It could not, therefore, be more fitting that, in a year in which Dunfermline have aspired to turn back the clock to those 'Good Old Days', our visitors are that same Celtic - the most successful team in the history of the Scottish Cup. We hope you enjoy one of the outstanding ties of this year's competition.

# Present Pars

## Trevor Smith

Perhaps its the nature of the game today, but somehow footballers seem to be liable to quite awful injuries nowadays. Our featured player is one who has suffered more than his share of troubles, and he will be hoping that today's game will provide him with the chance to resume his career properly after a lay-off of more than a year.



In February of last year, Trevor Smith was enjoying his most consistent spell with Dunfermline since making his first team debut as a 17 year old against Partick Thistle in 1982. Trevor joined the Pars from Sauchie Juveniles and was always considered to have great potential, especially as father George had always been considered a more than useful player with the afore-mentioned Maryhill mob. Although frequently included in the pool, Trevor had to spend much of his time on the substitute's bench, but, to his credit, he stuck it out and last season was rewarded with regular inclusion in the side. He repaid the manager's faith in him with some great performances and eight goals. It was all looking good for the young striker but, with only three minutes of a league match against St. Johnstone still to be played, Trevor crumpled in a heap and was stretchered away. "I'd like to see it again on TV," Trevor explained, "I just remember that I was about to cross the ball when I was pulled back. My stud stuck but my body went forward and my knee twisted. The doctors agreed it was my cartilage and I was operated on ten days later." That exploratory operation revealed just how badly the knee was damaged and that the whole cartilage would have to be removed. Under normal circumstances, recuperation after cartilage removal can be quite quick, but perhaps being aware of this made Trevor too anxious to get back to playing again. His first attempts were disastrous - he was still in pain, his knee was swollen and full mobility just wasn't there. He was recommended to rest over the summer, but double sessions during pre-season training confirmed Trevor's worst fears - the swelling was continuing. At this stage the surgeon decided to have another look and it was discovered that the cruciate ligament had been stretched and was the likely major cause of the problem. After a period of total rest, Trevor was ready to start back again at the turn of the year. There was only one problem - there were no reserve games being played in which to get match fit! A solution was found when Trevor got the chance to go on loan to Hamilton Accies and it was an experience he enjoyed:

"It was really strange going to another club for the first time, but everyone was really friendly. They're a full-time club, so I was able to train with them."

He made his debut for Hamilton against league leaders Airdrie, and helped the Accies to a satisfying 3-2 win, thanks to his late winner. Against Meadowbank he "missed a chance or two", before scoring his second against Forfar a week later. The chances are that Trevor would have spent the remainder of the season at Douglas Park, had it not been for George O'Boyle's injury. And now, with Eddie Gallagher's sending off last Saturday, the chances are that Trevor will make a dramatic comeback to first team football today. Trevor himself is quite clear about what he might contribute, if selected:

"I reckon I'll be fit enough for today's game. Even if I'd been out for two years, the atmosphere, adrenalin and excitement would be enough - the Cup is a one-off after all. I've never actually started a game against Celtic but it's certainly a game to look forward to. I've scored in the past two seasons in the Scottish Cup, so I'd like to keep that record going! We have every chance of winning - let's face it, there's no point in playing at all if you think someone else is going to win."

Celtic return to East End Park today a much stronger side, both on the playing front and, more importantly, psychologically, than on their last visit. The Roy Aitken episode is now history, and manager Billy McNeill seems, at last, to have found the kind of combination he is looking for.

It has been a very difficult season for Celtic and even at this stage there is no guarantee that the club will win one of those coveted places in Europe next season. But the evidence of the last few weeks bears out that oft-quoted maxim: "Never write off Celtic, especially when they are down." Celtic's new lease of life stems from that magnificent Tennents Scottish Cup victory over Rangers a few weeks ago when the 'prophets of doom' had written them off in precisely the kind of manner that Celtic players love to respond to. The League title is most certainly beyond them - and everybody else for that matter - but that has only served to make the club more determined than ever that they will return to Celtic Park with the Scottish Cup trophy.

Celtic have a record in the Scottish Cup which is second to none - they have won it 27 times, and this season are going for a hat-trick of consecutive wins. They will undoubtedly enter today's game as favourites, not to mention being favourites for the competition itself. Furthermore, they have a few matters to sort out with Dunfermline who, despite their lowly League position, have been a positive thorn in Celtic's flesh this season, having won two out of the three games played so far. It all adds up to a fascinating Cup-tie - the kind which make this competition the wonderful tournament it is!

Manager Billy McNeill will select from a squad which has tremendous Scottish Cup experience. It includes: Reliable and dependable **Pat Bonner** will be in goal and he is now Celtic's longest serving player. He made his cup debut at Berwick in January 1981 and has two Scottish Cup winners medals and a runners-up medal in his collection. Injury denied him another winners medal when he had to pull out of the 1988 final at the last minute with a back injury.

# CELTIC

**Chris Morris**, like Bonner, is looking forward to going to Italy to play for the Republic of Ireland in the World Cup this summer, though Chris hails from Newquay in Cornwall. He made his cup debut against Stranraer in 87-88, his first at Parkhead, and is already the proud possessor of two winners medals. Scored his first goal in the cup at Forfar in the third round.

**Dariusz Wdowczyk** joined up with former Legia Warsaw team-mate, Jacki Dziekanowski, towards the end of last year. He made his cup debut at Station Park and has only experienced two Scottish Cup, though one of those did include the old firm clash in the last round.

**Anton Rogan**, the Northern Ireland Internationalist has been on the bench recently but the suspension of Mike Galloway may see him gain a place in the starting line-up. Anton made his cup debut in the live televised third round tie at Pittodrie in 86-87. The former Cliftonville full-back has figured in Celtic's two recent cup wins.

Paul Elliot couldn't have had a fiery nor dramatic baptism to the Scottish Cup than the old firm tie in the last round. The former Aston Villa and Pisa central defender took it all in his stride though and was voted 'Man of the Match'.

**Derek Whyte**: It is hard to believe that the cultured central defender is still only 21. Derek has 3 full caps and like Anton Rogan, made his cup debut against Aberdeen at Pittodrie in 86/7 and has gone on to appear in both Celtic's Hampden successes of the past two seasons.

**Peter Grant** could be the man to take over the inspiration role of the departed Roy Aitken. Made his Scottish Cup debut against Inverness Thistle in 84/85, but only appeared in his first final last season, after missing out on the 1988 victory through injury.

**Paul McStay** is the man Celtic fans hope will hold aloft the Scottish Cup at the end of the season, took over the captaincy from Roy Aitken. The talented midfielder first appeared in the Scottish Cup against Queen of the South in season 81/82. He has three Scottish Cup winners medals and a runners-up medal amongst his medal collection.

**Jackie Dziekanowski**: Having signed from Legia Warsaw in the summer, this is obviously his first campaign in the cup and it got off to a scoring start in the Third Round at Forfar.

**Tommy Coyne**: Another who made his Scottish Cup debut against Rangers and, of course, it was his goal that enabled Celtic to overcome their great rivals. That was Tommy's ninth goal in the cup, having scored twice for Dundee United and six times for Dundee.

**Joe Miller** was Celtic's matchwinner in last year's final, but that was the winger's third winner's medal, having come on as a substitute for Aberdeen in the 1986 final against Hearts. Made his Celtic cup debut against Stranraer in 87/8, and has appeared in both the 1988 and 1989 finals.

**Steve Fulton** made a surprise cup debut in last season's semi-final with Hibs, the left sided midfielder played a starring role, but had to watch the final from the bench. His only other Cup appearance was at Forfar in the third round.

**Andy Walker**: The third member of the current side to make his cup debut against Stranraer in 87/88. Won a winner's medal in the 1988 final but didn't figure in last season's final, has scored four Scottish Cup goals in Celtic's colours.

# Cup Memories

There are few games which will evoke greater emotions among Dunfermline's older supporters than those incredible Cup ties played against Celtic between 1961 and 1971. In all, eight Scottish Cup matches were played during that ten year period and every one of them produced the kind of raw excitement that can only be associated with the national cup competition.

To start at the beginning, we have to go back to 27th January 1912. Dunfermline had reached the first round of the Cup proper for only the second time in the club's history, thanks to their victory in the Scottish qualifying Cup. Celtic were cup holders and had been League Champions in 6 out of the 7 previous seasons under the managership of the legendary Willie Maley. If this was expected to be a mismatch, that's not the way it turned out. Dunfermline compered throughout and it took a very controversial goal to decide the tie. Andy McAtee ran down the Celtic right but appeared to send the ball out of play. There was no signal from the linesman (who in those days was allowed to be a club official) and McAtee was allowed to cross for John Brown to score the winner.

The teams that day were:

Celtic: Mulrooney, McNair, Dodds, Young, Loney, Johnstone, McAtee, McMenemy, Quinn, Travers, Brown.

Dunfermline: Slavin, Newlands, Thomson, McLaughlan, Brown, Crichton, Cooper, Ronaldson, Wyllie, Liddle, Gibson.

If Dunfermline gave Celtic a fright in that first match there was to be no repeat in their next Cup encounter in 1933. Jimmy McGrory, another Celtic legend who had shown his ability to take on Dunfermline single-handed on previous occasions, was at it again. Although the Pars were pressing hard for promotion and had scored a lot of goals that season, they just could not cope with the Celtic forwards and ran out losers by 7 goals to 1.

The teams in 1933 were:

Dunfermline: Steele, Rodgers, McKendrick, Rarity, Reid, Currie, Dobson, Paterson, Weir, Laidlaw, Garland.

Celtic: Kennaway, Hogg, McGonagle, Wilson, McStay, Geatons, R. Thomson, A. Thomson, McGrory, Napier, O'Donnell.

In both 1912 and 1933, Celtic went on to win the competition, against Clyde and Motherwell respectively in the finals. No doubt when the teams next met in 1961 they were expected to do so again - especially as their surprise opponents in the final were in fact Dunfermline. After a 0-0 draw, they were to be denied by a brilliant team performance in which goalkeeper Eddie Connachan was outstanding, and by the tactics of a manager who was destined to become the greatest manager in the modern Scottish game - Jock Stein.

By 1965, Celtic were out to avenge that 2-0 defeat in 1961 and by then, they had Jock Stein back on their side. Despite that, Dunfermline were, if anything, being regarded perhaps as favourites to win and after twice taking the lead looked as if they might take the Cup back to Dunfermline for a second time in four years. Celtic weren't having any of it, however, and levelled the scores. With the minutes ticking away, Billy McNeill rose magnificently to nod a Charlie Gallacher corner into the net, to herald a great new era for the Parkhead club. The following season the sides met in the semi-final - it was Dunfermline's fourth such appearance in 6 seasons - but it was probably the poorest of all the cup games played between the sides. Strong wind and rain spoiled the flow of the game

and Dunfermline without tonsillitis-suffering Alex Edwards were no match for Celtic. Amazingly enough, only two seasons later, the teams were drawn to face each other again - this time in the First Round at Parkhead. In January 1968, Celtic were the best club side in Europe. The previous season they had won everything in sight, including the European Cup. In one of the major upsets, Dunfermline won by 2 goals to nil and Jock Stein was quick to praise them for a well-deserved victory. The confidence gained that day was enough to help them win the Cup later that season against Hearts.

By 1970, Dunfermline's long run among the top clubs was beginning to falter, while Celtic were still very much at their peak. 18 year old Dave McNicholl, Dunfermline's youngest-ever captain, led his players out in front of 50,000 fans at Parkhead and for Celtic supporters it must have seemed like a nightmare all over again when Jim Gillespie fired Dunfermline into the lead. Hughes eventually equalised, and, not for the first time, Celtic scored the winner in the final minute with a Harry Hood goal.

The following year it was a former Celt Joe McBride who gave Dunfermline cause for hope when he equalised Wallace's earlier strike but in the replay at East End Park - the most recent and only the second of the eleven Cup games to be played in Dunfermline - Hood again foiled the Pars hopes with the only goal.

The most recent meeting between the sides occurred on 19th February 1983. Dunfermline had already lost a League Cup tie to Celtic earlier in the season by the embarrassing aggregate of 13-1. But it wasn't just Dunfermline who had to suffer - the Celtic goal machine, with Charlie Nicholas at the peak of his form, were unstoppable. Although it should have simply been a question of 'how many?', Dunfermline again defied their critics and the Celtic forward line before eventually conceding the opener to Frank McGarvey in 66 minutes. McGarvey again and McCluskey in the final minute eventually gave Celtic a comfortable win.

It's fair to say that meeting number 12 has a lot to live up to!

# Potential Pars

## Scott Pettigrew

Scott Pettigrew is the latest 'Potential Par' to play for Central League team Livingston United. Scott, who has just turned 17, has been on the Youth Training Scheme at Dunfermline for about four months now, and greatly enjoys the full time training. Having four players at East End Park has been advantageous for Livingston. In their first season at Under 18 level, they are currently second top of the 2nd Division, and Scott is confident of promotion, if not the Championship itself. Livingston are still in the running for one of the local cups, but were knocked out of the Scottish Cup at the quarter-final stage.

The Pars played a friendly match against Valleyfield, prior to the BP Cup match, which they won and played well together, but against Dundee Scott feels the team played well below their capabilities. Scott had been hoping to play in a later round, but had to settle for next season's competition. He's looking forward to it (if, as he wryly states, he's not injured) and thinks that Dunfermline could have a strong team, as a lot of the lads will have been playing together for two years.

Although he's not yet played for the reserve team, Scott has played in a few friendly matches for the youth team this season, most notably a recent 2-2 draw with Dundee Utd, in which he scored. He doesn't score many goals, despite having a powerful shot which he likes to use at free-kicks. Scott believes that he still has to work on certain aspects of his game, particularly close control and heading, and is hoping to improve enough to earn a place in the BP Cup team and reserves next season - injuries permitting, of course!

# RESERVES

On February 28th, Dunfermline reserves travelled to Parkhead for the quarter-final of the Reserve League Cup. In what was probably the teams worst performance of the season, Celtic won comfortably, 6-0. Although it's not the first time this season that the reserves have gone down heavily, coach Phil Bonnyman has previously been pleased with some aspect of the game. This time, however, there was nothing commendable as Celtic scored five second half goals to emphasise their superiority. The Pars team was: Hillcoat, Wilson, Robertson, (Docherty), Feenie, Rougvie, Williamson, Burns, Farningham, E. Gallagher, S. Gallacher, Cunningham.

The following Saturday saw the Pars take the long road north to Aberdeen and gain a creditable 2-2 draw. Dunfermline fought back from a 2-0 half time deficit, but the Pars were the better team and deserved to take both points. Slack passes gifted Aberdeen both their goals, with their opener looking distinctly offside. Dunfermline were more positive

after the interval, and when Rougvie headed a corner kick back across the goalmouth, Strang appeared to knock the ball into the net. Hugh Burns scored the equaliser from the penalty spot.

Despite taking only one point from their two matches at Pittodrie this season, the Pars should really have won both times. The team at Pittodrie was:- Hillcoat, Burns, Robertson, Feenie, Haro, Rougvie, Docherty, (Sinclair), Farningham, S. Gallacher, Strang, Cunningham.

A further improvement came with the visit of Rangers to East End Park on March 6th. In winning 3-1, Dunfermline played some attractive and positive football with good performances all round. They took the lead after 21 minutes with a superb goal by David Irons, who beat four players before coolly drawing the keeper and slotting the ball into the net. Within ten minutes, the Pars went two up when Martin Feenie scored easily at the back post following a Smith cross.

With Dunfermline leading comfortably, the second half saw action of a different kind as two Rangers players were sent off. In the 62nd minute Howard pulled down Smith as he raced towards goal, only three minutes after being booked for the same offence. Neale Cooper was booked for protesting about the ordering off, and after a success of fouls was himself shown the red card. A dubious penalty, converted by Durrant, put Rangers briefly back in the game, but with five minutes remaining a long throw-in from Haro again caused havoc in the Rangers six yard box. Nisbet foolishly tried to back heel the ball to his keeper from only two yards out, and the trialist centre forward nipped in to touch the ball over the line.

Phil Bonnyman was pleased with the result, despite feeling that the team has played better before and lost. All the youngsters played well, particularly centre half Mark Haro, who constantly troubled the Rangers defence with his throw-ins.

# PAST PARS

## Jock Stein

When Jock Stein died suddenly at Cardiff on 10th September 1985 the shockwaves which were sent through the football world were felt particularly here at East End Park and at Parkhead for it was with Dunfermline Athletic that Jock made his breakthrough as a club manager when he came from Celtic in 1960; and when he subsequently returned to the Glasgow side, after a brief interlude with Hibernian, Jock led his team to 10 League titles (including 9 in a row), 8 Scottish Cup wins, 6 League Cup successes and 1 European Champions Cup victory.

The man who was destined to become someone acknowledged as a football genius without equal was born in the Burnbank area of Hamilton on 5th October, 1922. His father was a miner and Jock followed him into that industry after working for a few months in a carpet factory on leaving school.

Jock's early involvement with organised football, after leaving school, was in the amateur and juvenile grades with McDonald's Barrows Amateurs. Late he was to play with Blantyre Victoria in the junior grade having previously turned out with Burnbank Athletic. He was not particularly young when he moved to Blantyre and indeed he was in his late twenties when he eventually became a full-time professional footballer.

His senior chance came with Albion Rovers. Jock played three 'trial' games at centre-half with the Coatbridge side before signing on 3rd December 1942. Two coincidences attached to this move are worth noting; the first of these 'trials' was against Celtic and the Rovers' manager at the time was Webber Lees who later moved to Dunfermline. Jock served Albion Rovers well for almost eight years and became a natural dressing-room leader. He was a player who could read the game well and had the ability to note weaknesses in the opposition. In these years he was referred to as John Stein and in a souvenir pictorial publication issued by the Cliftonhill side in 1948, to mark the achievement of winning promotion from the Second Division that year, he was described as "the best capture the club ever made; strong, fearless, dependable, John gives little rope to opposing centre-forwards and his all-round ability and enthusiasm acts as a tonic to his mates. He acts as captain of the side - an honour richly deserved."

In his time at Coatbridge Jock made 236 appearances (all but one at centre-half) for the Rovers and scored 9 goals. He was sent-off once - against Cowdenbeath on 1st September 1945.

In his last season with Albion Rovers Jock was in dispute over wages and after an offer from Killmarnock was turned down he eventually went to the Welsh non-league side Llanelly at the beginning of the 1950-51 season.

Jock was well received in the Welsh town and he was responsible for a renewed interest in the fortunes of the local association football side which had had to play second fiddle to the local rugby football club. Unfortunately, Jock was homesick and he was delighted when Celtic came for him at the end of 1951.



## The Player

The Parkhead side paid £1,200 for his services on 4th December and the signing was looked upon as short-term cover. However by mid-February 1952 Jock was a regular first-team player and from then until he stopped playing four years later he made the centre-half position his own.

It is worth noting at this point that it was on the recommendation of the Celtic reserve team trainer, Jimmy Gribben, that the Glasgow side signed him. Jimmy had watched Jock often with Albion Rovers and he recalled "something" about the player.

Jock made his debut for Celtic on 8th December 1951 in a 2-1 victory over St. Mirren at Parkhead. He proved to be a

sound defender although he occasionally caused hearts to flutter with his habit of kneeing the ball clear. Such was the impact made by him that Jock was eventually made team captain and he led his side to victory over Hibs in the Coronation Cup Final at Hampden on 20th May, 1953 by two goals to nil.

Season 1953/54 was Celtic's most successful campaign for 40 years and the Parkhead side ended up winning both the League Championship and the Scottish Cup (their fourth such double).

Jock's only representative honour came four days after he captained Celtic to victory over Aberdeen in the Final of the Scottish. He played for the Scottish League against their English counterparts at Stamford Bridge on 28th April 1954. The Scots lost 0-4.

Nineteen fifty-five was both a disappointing and tragic year for Jock. In the April Celtic lost the replayed final of the Scottish Cup to Clyde and then almost exactly four months later Jock sustained a very severe ankle injury in a League Cup match at Parkhead against Rangers. Jock spent many long and painful months attempting to recover from this injury but he finally had to admit defeat and on 29th January 1957 he announced his retirement from the playing side of the game. He accepted the offer of a coaching position at Parkhead. Jock's last league game was on 17th March 1956 (exactly 34 years to the day set for this Scottish Cup-tie!) when Celtic defeated Dundee 1-0 in Glasgow. Jock had made a total of 150 League and Cup appearances for Celtic and although he scored only twice these goals earned three points for his team.

Jock's coaching responsibilities were confined to the reserve side and very quickly a new attitude was noted amongst the young Parkhead players. His ability to keep things simple and easily understood was appreciated by youngsters such as Billy McNeill, John Clark, Steve Chalmers and Bertie Auld who of course made their mark a few years later - not only on the domestic scene but also in the European arena.

Jock had great confidence in his own ideas but when it became clear that he would not get an opportunity to put them into practice at the highest level at Parkhead he decided it was time to try his luck elsewhere.

During his 18 years or so as a senior player Jock had learnt much about the game; he had had the opportunity to study players and clubs at the very top; he had watched how others dealt with situations and had promised himself that he would try and avoid making the same mistakes if he ever became a manager; he would ensure that his terms were well prepared and no detail would be overlooked.

# Fans Eye View

24 year old **James Henderson** from Harley Street in Rosyth has a job with Store Design at Hillend which can take him all over the country, but that rarely prevents him from attending the football matches of his favourite team. He's been supporting the Pars for many years now, and, apart from a couple of seasons, has been virtually ever-present. James was our observer



at last Saturday's Premier League fixture at Dens Park, Dundee and this is what he had to say about the game:

"It was, as the old cliché goes, a game of two halves. The wind gave Dundee a strong advantage in the first-half and Dunfermline the same in the second. I must admit that I thought Dundee just about deserved to win - they played more of a passing game and played more to feet. We seemed to play high balls too far ahead of our own players. We were maybe a little unlucky with the goal they scored, although it was certainly well struck. I wasn't too impressed with the ref and I don't know yet what our goal was disallowed for. I felt we could have played the subs earlier, especially as we had nothing going down the left side. The Dundee right-back could have been cutting the grass for all he had to do!

I don't think anybody particularly stood out, but for me Grant Tierney was probably our best player. He's been slugged a bit this season, but I thought he won a lot at the back.

Overall, I still think we're doing quite well and really only need a few points to make sure we're safe."

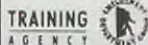
