HIS FIRST CUP FINAL

BOB Valentine, Dundee compositor and father of two sons, Patrick and Andrew, is the man with the major responsibility this afternoon.

Bob, a Grade 1 referee for almost six years is not on the F.I.F.A. list, and his choice for today's final came as a surprise to many football people.

Valentine, at 36, must be one of the youngest referees to handle a Scottish Cup final in recent years, but that will not worry him. His reports this season have clearly marked him down as a referee of the future, and certainly the most consistent at present.

CELTIC'S OWN JUBILEE YEAR

JOCK Stein has always been a man to do it in style. In the art of silverware collection, he rules supreme. Cups have arrived at Parkhead over the past twelve years with such monotonous regularity that it might seem to some that there was little thrill left in winning. But in this Jubilee year, Stein has a special reason for wanting to add this season's Scottish Cup to his impressive collection.

Statistics show that Celtic have already won the Scottish Cup 24 times . . . seven of them under Jock Stein's control . . . and of course, a win this time would complete a neat Jubilee of triumphs in that line.

Nor does it end there. Since Jock Stein arrived at Parkhead as the boss man in 1965, Celtic have won 24 major trophies for him . . . 10 league championships, 7 Scottish Cups, 6 League Cups, and of course, the never-to-be-forgotten European Cup. Yet another private jubilee coming up for Jock Stein personally if Celtic pull it off this afternoon.

COLLECTS WINS

For many managers, the first trophy they ever win is the most prized. In Jock Stein's case, he got into the business before he arrived at Parkhead, having won the Scottish Cup with Dunfermline Athletic, and the Summer Cup with Hibernian. And of course, he was a collector as a player. In fact, his Scottish Cup win for Celtic as manager in 1965 was their first in that tournament since they acquired it in 1954 . . . with Jock Stein as captain of the team.

But as the man who came back, after being written off by many after his serious car crash in 1975, a wasted year spent on the side-lines, I have a feeling that Stein's ambition to emerge as a winner this afternoon is as keen as any bid he made in the past, including that triumph with Dunfermline Athletic, and maybe even the European Cup.

In his year at the helm since he returned to duty, this time as supremo with Dave McParland taking over the

coaching and training side, he has had to rebuild a team.

Sean Fallon carried out a holding operation for a season, and did it remarkably well, unfortunate to have nothing to show for it at the end. But that barren year rekindled enthusiasm and ambition. The team now looks as if it could be on the threshold of great accomplishments again, maybe even in Europe, given a little more experience.

The Lisbon Lions were created rather than built. Most of them came through the Parkhead youth process, coached and coaxed, a position adjusted here and there, and welded into a team of unlimited promise on an American tour in 1966.

The new team has been largely bought and built. Some of the bright young Parkhead youngsters have made it all the way to the top . . . Kenny Dalglish . . . Danny McGrain and Roy Aitken.

But gaps had to be plugged urgently, and Jock Stein filled them imaginatively. The three men who have moved in this season, Pat Stanton, Joe Craig and Johnny Doyle have provided the balance to fill the future with promise.

The pay-off began at Easter Road three weeks ago when they confirmed their right to be known as the Champions. It could continue this afternoon, but even if it does not, the team is on the threshold, ready to bring back the great years.

Why this T.V. Final is Vital to Rangers

YOU may call it trial by television, but whatever the Scottish Cup final offers Rangers at Hampden Park this afternoon it certainly offers them the opportunity of winning back the 150,000 fans they lost during their Premier Division Championship matches this season.

For the first time in 20 years the final is being televised live on both our T.V. channels, so the eyes of well over a million viewers will examine the credentials of Rangers against their greatest rivals, and decide whether a place on the Ibrox terracing is something to reconsider in the season ahead.

Rangers must turn on the style today—and win. They must prove before the most critical audience in the world that they still have what it takes to win Scotland's major trophies and compete with the best of Europe. Live television of a Scottish Cup final has provided a lot of controversy over the past few weeks, but Rangers can have no complaints. They have the platform they want to prove once and for all that they can give the public the football action they want and value for their 70 pence at the gate.

A year ago Wallace achieved what few managers ever achieve—the grand slam of the Scottish League Cup, the League Championship and the Cup they defend today.

The future exactly one year ago looked nothing short of terrific, but this game of football can be capricious and cruel.

The League Cup is now at Pittodrie, the Championship at Parkhead. One to go . . . Rangers have successfully defended the Scottish Cup on seven occasions

during their 104 years history, so there is no reason why they should not even up the figure this afternoon.

They have won the Scottish Cup on 21 previous occasions and most of their players at Hampden today have seen it all before. Indeed most of them were handling a winners' medal a year ago.

SEEKS SIXTH MEDAL

Skipper John Greig, for instance, will be making his 67th Scottish Cup appearance and will be seeking his sixth winners' medal. Kenny Watson, bought from Montrose two years ago, will be making his fifth appearance in our premier knock-out competition and, of course, playing in his first final.

One player in the twilight of an incredible career, the other on the threshold. Their ambition is the same, to finish the season with a major win and take gold at the end of 90 minutes. Keeper Stewart Kennedy will be seeking his first winners' medal in only his seventh Scottish Cup tie and there's a chance that young Chris Robertson could be given a piece of the action and win a medal in only his second tie.

The Scottish Cup final is like that. It offers a life-time memory and a springboard to football immortality, as no one forgets the player who wins a final or dominates one.

Rangers, always great competitors, will fight this final until the final minute. It's their last chance to salvage something from an indifferent season and a wonderful opportunity to prove to the Scottish public at large that they will be a power in Scottish football once more.
