HELPING THE GAME

There is an organisation which receives £9 million annually from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zettlers and spends it all on projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.

It pays £4.5 million to the Football Grounds Improvement Trust to help League clubs meet the demands of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act and improve their stadia.

It has set aside £2.3 million to ensure that all grounds in Scotland and England are covered by closed circuit television systems. It has allocated over £1 million to fund Football and the Community schemes at clubs throughout the UK.

The organisation is also injecting £1.25 million to assist 'non-League' clubs with essential safety work, paying over £1.3 million every year towards policing costs at League matches and investing £750,000 to improve transport facilities for football supporters.

The name of this organisation is THE FOOTBALL TRUST.

By the end of the year Spotting-the-Ball will have generated almost £70 million for The Football Trust and its sister organisation the Football Grounds Improvement Trust.

The body uniquely brings together representatives from all areas of the game and draws its membership from the Scottish Football League, the Scottish Football Association, the game in England, the PFA, local authorities, the police and pools firms.

The Football Trust's annual income of £9 million is in addition to the £6.5 million the Pool Promoters Association pay to the football authorities for the reproduction of the copyrighted fixtures on the pools coupons, thus making them the game's largest benefactor by far.

SUPPORTING SCOTTISH FOOTBALL

During the past year The Football Trust has been committed to developing Scottish football at every level. Its initiatives range from supporting an educational trust for Scotland's professional footballers to providing kit for unemployed teams; new terracing at Kirkintilloch Rob Roy to a new artificial pitch for community use at Stirling Albion; the UK's most extensive closed circuit television system at Hampden Park to portacabins at the Hill of Beath Ramblers; developing football in the Scottish Isles to a £250,000 safety programme at the national stadium; new coach park at Ibrox to covering 35% of policing costs at B&Q League matches.

The Football Trust works closely with the Scottish Football League, Scottish Football Association and the Scottish Sports Council.

WARNING

At the beginning of the season more than 110 League grounds in Scotland and England will be equipped with CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION which has been funded by The Football Trust.

It is there to increase crowd safety and to help the police. Recording facilities enable film and photographs to be taken of disorder, which may subsequently be used in a court of law.

SAFETY FIRST

Football grounds in Scotland have reached their highest ever level of safety thanks to the £7.5 million invested by the Football Grounds Improvement Trust since 1976.

Almost every League club has been assisted with essential safety work and further substantial sums have been invested to enable them to improve facilities.

In the past year alone FGIT grants to Scottish clubs totalled:

In addition to its safety programme, FGIT has also allocated £1 million to build or improve family and disabled facilities at League grounds during 1988.

Celtic

This afternoon we welcome Celtic who have only recently recaptured the form which earned them a sensational League and Cup double last season in their Centenary Year. The Parkhead team, which only lost three matches as they stormed to the title in 1987-88, have already been defeated in five matches of the current League campaign. Accordingly, they find themselves an uncomfortable seven points behind pacemakers Rangers, after ten matches. In addition, Celtic were knocked out of the Skol Cup by Dundee United during their uncertain start. However, despite having Burns, Grant and Bonnar sidelined for a long period, our visitors have roared back into top form during the month of October to the great relief of their vast and loyal support. Celtic's fortunes turned with a superb 4-0 victory over Honved Budapest in the European Cup which was quickly followed by a 7-1 demolition of St. Mirren. Confidence returned to the Parkhead players and they readily overcame the difficult challenge presented by Dundee United in the last round of League matches.

With these three results, Celtic appear to be moving back into top gear and even though they have been handicapped by a poor start in the League Championship, few would bet against them being the principal challengers to the title favourites from Ibrox.

ALAN ROUGH: Goalkeeper. Age 36. Height 6'1". Born in Glasgow. Scotland's most capped goalkeeper joined Celtic at the start of the season after a spell in the USA with Orlando Lions. Injuries have given the ever-dependable keeper the chance to continue his career at the top level and he has done a splendid job for Celtic. Alan, of course, previously played for Partick Thistle (1969-82) and Hibs (1982-88).

CHRIS MORRIS: Defender. Age 24. Height 5'11". Born in Newquay. Signed in 1987 from Sheffield Wednesday for £125,000. Chris was outstanding for Celtic last season and merited his inclusion in Ireland's side in the recent European Championships. Being an ex-winger, Chris is particularly effective coming forward.

ANTON ROGAN: Defender. Age 22. Height 5'11". Born in Belfast. A tireless, hard working player who is a tenacious tackler and regularly turns defence into attack with long powerful runs. Anton joined Celtic in 1986 from Belfast Distillery and broke into the first team in 1987. He is now a regular in the No. 3 shirt and a member of the Northern Ireland International squad.

ROY AITKEN: Midfield. Age 29. Height 6'. Born in Irvine. Whether in defence or midfield, Roy is an inspiring captain and the backbone of the Celtic side. He has given the Glasgow side superb service since being included in the first-team squad at the age of 16 after stepping up from Celtic Boys' Club. Roy is a great competitor and is always a key player for both Celtic and Scotland.

MICK MCCARTHY: Defender. Age 29. Height 6'2". Born in Barnsley. Republic of

Ireland International centre-half who was outstanding in the recent European Championship Finals. The strong and powerful stopper began his senior career with Barnsley, moving to Manchester City in 1983 for £200,000. Mick was transferred from City to Celtic for £500,000 at the start of last season.

DEREK WHYTE: Defender. Age 20. Height 5'11". Born in Glasgow. Strong, skilful and composed defender who stepped-up from Celtic Boys Club in 1985. Has all the qualities of an International player and indeed, won his first Full cap last season. Derek is currently a key member of the Scotland Under-21 side.

BILLY STARK: Midfield. Age 31. Height 6'1". Born in Glasgow. A creative midfielder player who has the uncanny ability to snatch goals. Last season he made an invaluable contribution towards the Championship success with 8 goals and this term, Billy has scored in all the major competitions. Was a bargain £75,000 signing from Aberdeen in the summer of 1987.

PAUL McSTAY: Midfield. Age 24. Height 5'10". Born in Hamilton. Scotland's most creative midfielder player who brings out the best in his team-mates and who is so often the match-winner for the Parkhead club. The former Celtic Boys Club midfielder is almost an automatic selection for the Full International side. A regular goalscorer.

FRANK McAVENNIE: Forward. Age 28. Height 5'9". Born in Glasgow. Sharp and incisive striker who scored 15 League goals last season and has netted 5 in the Championship so far this term. The former International striker joined Celtic for £725,000 last September from West Ham



United and prior to this he played for St. Mirren.

MARK MCGHEE: Forward. Age 31. Height 5'10½". Born in Glasgow. A former International striker who has seen service with Bristol City, Morton, Newcastle, Aberdeen and Hamburg prior to joining Celtic in 1985 from the German club. An aggressive, bustling forward who is also an excellent dribbler and often the scorer of vital goals. 3 League goals so far this season.

JOE MILLER: Forward. Age 20. Height 5'8". Born in Glasgow. Signed by Aberdeen in 1984, Joe quickly earned a place on the wing with his impressive pace and dribbling skills. He gained Under-21 honours prior to joining Celtic in November 1987 for £650,000. In addition to creating chances, he is a regular scorer and has netted 4 in the League this season.

OWEN ARCHDEACON: Forward. Age 22. Height 5'9". Born in Greenock. A natural left-winger who was signed from Gourock United in 1982 and has won honours at Youth International level. Owen has been a valuable member of the Celtic squad for three seasons, although he has yet to establish himself in the side. He made 10 League appearances last season, scoring once.

JOHN TRAYNOR: Defender. Age 21. Height 5'10". Born in Glasgow. Signed in 1983 from Celtic Boys Club, John has broken into the first-team squad this season following some outstanding reserve performances.

LEX BAILLIE: Defender. Age 22. Height 6'2". Born in Hamilton. Signed from Bumbank Boys Club in 1982, Lex broke into the squad last season and made 13 League appearances. A determined and strong tackler who is waiting for the opportunity to establish himself.

ANDY WALKER: Forward. Age 23. Height 5'8". Born in Glasgow. Signed from Motherwell in July 1987 for £350,000, Andy had an exceptional first season at Parkhead. The fast and energetic striker was Celtic's top scorer with 26 League goals

The classy organiser of Hearts midfield and one of Scotland's most creative footballers, Gary can turn any game in Hearts favour through his passing ability, penetrating runs and shooting skills.

Gary signed an 'S' Form for the club in 1979 while a pupil at Tynecastle School. He then played in the juvenile grades with Salvesen Boys Club until he was called up in July 1980. Gary made his debut two months later at the age of 16 and even then, it was clear that he would develop into one of the country's most skilful players.

He was a member of the Scotland side which won the European Youth Championship in 1983 by which time he was a Tynecastle regular. During Hearts return to top class football during the eighties, Gary has been the team's principal playmaker. Accordingly, it was a proud moment for the club when in November 1987 he came on at half time during Scotland's 1-0 victory over Bulgaria in Sofia. Not only did he become Hearts first Full-Internationalist since 1975, but he also hit the winning goal - the first Hearts player to score for Scotland since 1960. He has subsequently won two further caps. Being a life-long Hearts supporter, Gary always gives 100%.

Walter's Corner

With no fixture last Saturday, the players should be refreshed and raring to go and a cracking game against Celtic is anticipated.

The statistics for the first quarter of the Championship makes dismal reading for Hearts and Celtic fans alike. Our figures of 6 points from 9 games, is a very poor return, when you consider the efforts of the players. I'm sure Celtic who have done marginally better, feel the same way. Both teams have started the second quarter with convincing wins so today's game becomes all the more important as we strive to keep the momentum going.

Our under 18's haven't had as many games as I would have liked. Injuries to a number of

players make it difficult to field a team and the recent legislation not allowing juvenile players or trialists only complicates matters. We did manage a game on Sunday against Mill United without Alan MacLaren and Craig Martin (both have groin strains). We won comfortably 4-0. Our goalscorers Michael Mellon (2) Maxi Christie and Andy Paterson.

We are drawn to play Ross County away in the B.P. Cup but so far a date has not been arranged.

This week's school holidays have meant an influx of young talent from the central belt. Our scouts do a good job in recruiting the players so it is important that we do a good job and impress them when



they are here. The players ages vary between 12 and 16 and the general format is to train in the morning and play games against local opposition in the afternoon.

A Record of Players who have made 50 or more Competitive Appearances for Hearts

No. 105 — ROY KAY

A very able and versatile defender who made 240 appearances (143 League) for Hearts between 1967 and 1977. Roy stood 5' 10" and despite being slimly-built, he was a tenacious tackler and very good in the air. An Edinburgh boy, he signed from United Crossroads Boys Club in 1967, at the age of 18. In 1970-71 season, Roy broke into the first-team, showing his adaptability by playing in either full-back position, in midfield or as sweeper. He was a member of the team which reached the Texaco Cup Final in 1971 and one of Hearts most consistent performers in 1974-75 season when the club qualified for the new Premier Division. Roy suffered the disappointment of playing in the losing Cup Final team against Rangers in 1976 and the following year he was surprisingly freed after Hearts were relegated for the first time in their history. He went on to play a season for Celtic and then joined York City for whom he appeared until he retired in 1982. Roy was never a noted goalscorer and netted only 4 times during his Tynecastle career. One of these was memorable, however, being the opening goal in Hearts brilliant 5-1 win over Lokomotiv Leipzig in the European Cup Winners Cup-tie in 1976.

No. 106 — ARCHIE KELLY

A fearless and deadly striker whose record of 108 goals in 155 senior competitive matches, places him among Hearts greatest goalscorers. Archie was signed from Arthurlie Juniors (Barrhead) in December 1942 as a teenager. The 5' 9" centre-forward became a regular in the side during 1943-44 season, when his devastating pace and power-shooting earned him 15 League goals in 23 games. 1944-45 was even better and Archie hit a spectacular 33 goals in 27 matches, this despite a chipped fibula which sidelined him for five weeks. His most effective performance that season came at Cliftonhill Park when he destroyed Albion Rovers with 7 goals in Hearts 10-3 victory. In 1946-47, Archie remained the club's leading marksman with 12 goals in 22 league matches. This would have been more, but for a memorable accident which sidelined him for a long period. It occurred on 14 September 1946 against Kilmarnock when, after two minutes, Archie jumped at a cross ball and collided with the goalpost, breaking his collar bone and the upright. Hearts were re-building the side at this time and in December 1947 he fell foul of the new policy of Manager, Davie McLean. He was swapped for George Hamilton of Aberdeen plus £8000 for the Pittodrie club. The explosive striker — who later won honours with Motherwell — was one of a select few to have scored 100 competitive goals for Hearts.

No. 107 — PETER KERR

The superbly-fit Peter Kerr, made his final appearance for Hearts in August 1930 at the age of 39 years 57 days and is probably the oldest player ever to turn out for the club. He was born in Prestonpans in 1891 and began his senior career with Hibs in 1910. Although only 5' 8½" tall, he was solidly-built and tireless, constantly breaking up moves in midfield and feeding his forwards with accurate passes. Peter played in three Cup Finals, won a Full International cap and a Scottish League cap during his time at Easter Road. Although many felt he should have been appointed Hibs Manager, he was freed in 1926 and Hearts brought the 35 year old right-half to Tynecastle to captain the side and encourage the many young players. Even at this age, Peter played for the Scottish League against the Irish League in October 1926, however, major domestic success eluded him with Hearts. Nevertheless, he must take great credit for assisting and motivating the club's many young players at the time. He was phased out of the side during 1929-30 season, but retained the following term to coach and play in the reserves. After 132 competitive games for Hearts, he joined Leith Athletic in 1931 and eventually became their Manager.

SATURDAY 1st OCTOBER: The Reserves go down 1-2 against Dundee United in a controversial League match at Tynecastle.

MONDAY 3rd: No injuries are reported from the weekend match at

Tannadice. Wayne Foster, out with a calf muscle injury may be fit for the U.E.F.A. match. Co-Manager Sandy Jardine watches Manchester United beat Hibs 3-0 in the Gordon Rae Testimonial match at Easter Road.

TUESDAY 4th: Wayne Foster is fit and is included in a squad of 19 players for the match against St Patrick's. The Irish side train under the lights in an evening work out at Tynecastle.

WEDNESDAY 5th: An unchanged team from Saturday with Wayne Foster on the bench are too strong for a St Patrick's side. However the performance in a 2-0 win (4-0 on aggregate) is disappointing and costly with injuries to Eamonn Bannon (hamstring), Dave McPherson (toe) and Mike Galloway (ribs).

In other European games, Celtic beat Honved 4-0 (4-1) in the Cup Winners Cup while Rangers join us in the next round of the U.E.F.A. Cup with an excellent 4-2 (5-2) away win against Katowice in Poland. Unfortunately Aberdeen lose 0-2 on the night and on aggregate away to Dynamo Dresden in a U.E.F.A. match.

THURSDAY 6th: Dave McPherson has an x-ray which reveals only bad bruising on a toe which shows no break but Eamonn Bannon will be out for two weeks with his pulled hamstring. Mike Galloway has bruised ribs which may not be enough to keep him out of action. Club Secretary Les Porteous flies to Zurich for tomorrow's U.E.F.A. Cup draw.

FRIDAY 7th: In the U.E.F.A. Cup draw we are paired with Austria Vienna or the unknown Russian side Zhalgiris Vilnius, who are playing the second leg of their tie later this evening. Secretary Les Porteous is coming home but the Club's travel agent and tour organiser Ian Dunwoodie flies to Austria to watch the match hoping to obtain a video of the match the Austrians won 5-2 (5-4 on aggregate). Co-Manager Sandy Jardine unfortunately could not arrange a flight.

SATURDAY 8th: Dave McPherson and Mike Galloway are fit and a side showing two changes from Wednesday feature in a disappointing 2-2 draw with Motherwell at Tynecastle. In other Premier action leaders Rangers, 1-2 at Aberdeen and Hibs, 1-2 at Dundee, both lose their unbeaten records. Celtic beat St Mirren 7-1 at Celtic Park while Dundee United beat Hamilton 4-0 at Douglas Park. The Reserves draw 0-0 in a League match at Motherwell.

Factfile

Celtic

Celtic are presently celebrating their Centenary year, for it was on 28 May 1888 that the famous Glasgow club played its first match — a 5-2 victory over Rangers in a friendly at the original Celtic Park. To celebrate 100 years of football, a special challenge match was played on 7 August 1988 against Cruzeiro from Brazil which Celtic won 4-2 before 41,659 fans.

Celtic's most prestigious honour was gained on 25 May 1967 in Lisbon, when Internazionale Milan were beaten 2-1 (Gemmell and Chalmers) and the Glasgow club became the first British side to win the European Champions Cup. Our visitors have a distinguished record in European competitions and accordingly are ranked 16th among European clubs by the authoritative "World Soccer" magazine.

The Parkhead club were founder members of the Scottish League in 1890 and were Hearts first-ever visitors in the Championship (Celtic won 5-0 on 23 August 1890). They have been Scottish League Champions on 35 occasions, 3 less than their greatest rivals, Rangers. Celtic have, however, won the Scottish Cup 28 times as against 24 by the Ibrox men. In the League Cup, Celtic have 9 victories.

Celtic have the best record of any club in the Premier Division. Since the Leagues were re-organised in 1975-76 season they have won the title on six occasions — 1976-77; 1978-79; 1980-81; 1981-82; 1985-86; and 1987-88. Their overall record now reads:

Last season, Celtic won the League with a record 72 points, together with the Scottish Cup. In the Championship, Chris Morris and Paul McStay appeared in every match and the leading scorers were: Andy Walker 26, Frank McAvennie 15, Billy Stark 8, Mark McGhee 6 and Paul McStay 5.

Jimmy McGrory has scored the most individual League goals in a season for Celtic, hitting 50 in 1935-36. His career total of 397 is also a club record. The most a Celtic team has managed in a season is 116 in the 1915-16 League campaign.

Celtic Park was opened in 1892 and was developed over the years into a multi-purpose stadium which once saw sports such as cycling and speedway. The present main stand was opened in 1929 against Hearts, although it was substantially redeveloped in 1971. The record attendance is 92,000 versus Rangers in the League on 1 January 1938, however, some records quote this gate at 83,500. The current capacity of Celtic Park is 61,800 of which 60,000 are under cover and 9,000 seated. The floodlights were opened in 1959 against Wolves, the 'Jingle' side cover was refurbished in 1966, the east terrace was covered for the first time in 1968 and the west terracing was re-roofed in 1986. Celtic's pitch measures 114 x 75 yards.

Celtic's record is 11-0 versus Dundee in the League in October 1895. Their record defeat is 8-0 versus Motherwell in the League in April 1937.

Danny McGrain with 62 caps, is Celtic's most honoured player at International level.

Match Reviews

The Papers

WEDNESDAY 5th OCTOBER — U.E.F.A. CUP 1st ROUND 2nd LEG HEARTS 2 (Black; Galloway); ST PATRICK'S ATHLETIC 0

Despite qualifying for the next round comfortably we struggled in this match against the plucky Irishmen. O'Driscoll was first to show for St Pat's, heading wide off the target, Kenny Black and Iain Ferguson both having shots off target in reply. In 22 mins we should have scored after Byrne had skied a clearance towards his own net. Eamonn Bannon beat the 'keeper to the ball but from almost on the line amazingly headed wide. Sixty seconds later however, we did take the lead, an Eamonn Bannon throw in being knocked on by John Colquhoun to Kenny Black who scored with a strong left foot shot. Bannon came close again in 37 mins with a right foot shot but St Pat's finished the half stronger, Ketch firing a free kick over the bar and Walter Kidd mopping up a dangerous move on half time. Early in the second half Bannon provided left wing crosses for Ferguson and Mike Galloway but both headers missed the target. Shortly after both teams had used a substitute Mike Galloway scored a second who left footed home a shot following a Foster run. Byrne was cautioned following a tough spell of play and Ferguson fired over the bar from 25 yards and at the other Ennis had an effort chalked off for an infringement. Wayne Foster also had a late shot brilliantly saved by the 'keeper.

Four minutes later, a defender handled in the box but Kirk saved Wayne Foster's spot kick. Two minutes into the second half Kenny Black had a free kick deflected just over the bar but two minutes later a John Colquhoun cross was knocked down by Neil Berry for Allan Moore to net from six yards. Walter Kidd put a shot high over the bar as we remained on top but on the hour came an incident that was to change the game. A short Gary Mackay pass back was headed against the crossbar by Steve Cowan and Ray Farningham netted the rebound. Encouraged by this goal Motherwell came more into the game and ten minutes later Craig Paterson headed home a Paul Kinnaird free-kick with our defence watching, and the game became untidy resulting in five of our players being booked in a bizarre incident in 73 mins. While John Colquhoun was being cautioned for dissent, Ian Jardine and Iain Ferguson, substituted Gary Mackay and Wayne Foster without the referee's permission, the four players names ended up in the book. In the closing stages of a match best forgotten, Steve Cowan at one end and Ian Jardine at the other, had shots saved. Mike Galloway, Dave McPherson and 'Well's McCart and Farningham were also booked.

Both teams came close to scoring many times in the first half when we had two strong penalty claims turned down but we were pinned back in our own half during the second period despite a late fightback which almost saw Willie Johnston grab an equaliser.

This was a comfortable victory against a struggling Greenock side who had Martin Doak sent off for a dreadful tackle on Ian Jardine who was carried off on a stretcher suffering from a broken ankle and ligament damage. We played really well in the first half hour scoring in eight minutes, 'keeper Wylie dropping a Hugh Burns cross, John Robertson knocking the loose ball back to Gary Mackay who scored from eight yards. Kenny Black headed home a second in 34 minutes following a Gary Mackay, John Colquhoun, Hugh Burns move. Unfortunately we shaded off after the second goal although scoring again in 54 minutes, Kenny Black blasting home a shot via the crossbar after a John Colquhoun cross was not properly cleared. Following the unlucky Ian Jardine incident in 75 minutes Jim Boag missed a couple of snips following mistakes by our defence. Crowd 11,516.

Hearts Record — 1909-10

This season was dominated by off-field events which eventually led to a managerial change and Hearts almost losing their star player, Bobby Walker.

Manager, James McGhee, had problems from the start and suspended international full-back Tom Collins for "misconduct and missing pre-season training". In addition, he had to fine Bobby Walker for failing to turn-up for the first match of the season. Difficulties continued between the two players and McGhee for several weeks, with both Walker and Collins eventually being suspended for the rest of the season.

There was consternation among the supporters at this action and when pressure was brought to bear, both players were re-instated. Mr McGhee decided that he had had enough and resigned in December. He was replaced by the St. Mirren Manager, John McCartney, a move which appeared to have been very popular.

Not surprisingly, disharmony off the pitch affected the team's performances, although the new half-back line of Frank McLaren, Bob Mercer and Peter Nellies looked promising. Hearts inconsistent form saw them finish 12th in the League table, 23 points behind Champions, Celtic. The team's top scorer was George Buchanan who hit 12 goals in 11 League games following his £150 transfer from St. Mirren in February.

In the Scottish Cup, Hearts won comfortably in the First Round on a treacherous pitch at Bathgate. The "Maroons" travelled to St. Mirren in the Second Round and fought out a 2-2 draw. After a 0-0 draw in the Replay at Tynecastle, the teams played a third game at Ibrox. Richard Harker scored a hat-trick as Hearts won 4-0 before 10,000 fans.

In the Third Round, Hearts had to visit Easter Road to play Hibs and there was concern that their ground was inadequate for the crowd which would attend. The inevitable happened, and with Hearts 1-0 up, fencing gave way and some of the 24,000 fans spilled on to the pitch, forcing the abandonment of the match. Hearts might have claimed the tie, but agreed to Replay at Tynecastle, and as luck would have it, the "Maroons" lost by the only goal before 22,000.

During the season, George Sinclair earned his first full International cap against Ireland. In the local competitions during 1909-10, Hearts won the North Eastern Cup and the Shield. The latter trophy was won 11-2 on corners after a 1-1 draw with St. Bernards. The average League attendance at Tynecastle was 7853.
