From the boardroom



Dear Supporter,
Last Thursday,
during my stay in
Edinburgh, I had
the opportunity of
speaking to the
Federation of
Hearts Supporters
Clubs prior to

their annual general meeting. It was the first time I had met the supporters formally for six months and I felt it was important to bring them up to date on a variety of topics and thank them for their support over the last few months. The question of the Taylor report was the main issue discussed. Supporters are aware of the public debate being carried out in the media which seems to favour the option of ground sharing, but the Federation were clear, once again, in expressing their desire that the club should remain at Tynecastle.

On Saturday morning we held a board meeting at Tynecastle and again, the main issue on the agenda was the topic of meeting our obligations under Taylor. We are fully aware that this issue has to be resolved in the immediate future and we plan to make a further announcement soon, which will clarify our position.

At that meeting I decided that, to avoid any uncertainty in this vital period, I would freeze the situation regarding the sale of my shareholding and not enter into any discussions with interested parties until we have clarified the stadium issue.

Whatever option we choose, and there are several, there will be financial implications and I assure you that as major shareholder I will do what is in the best long term interests of the club and its supporters.

I am delighted to note that our charter flight to Madrid seems to be sold out. Your support justifies the considerable capital commitment the club made in arranging this trip. The Madrid match is one we are all looking forward to, going to face one of Europe's top clubs with a real opportunity to progress to the second round. I wish the players

well and hope that the supporters, who are taking the time and expense to make the trip, enjoy their visit to the Spanish capital.

Today we entertain Celtic, and I welcome their players, officials and supporters to Edinburgh. These matches are always amongst the most exciting of the season and I am sure today will prove to be no exception. Europe is for the future, today's match is a vital one for this club and I urge you, as always, to give your total backing to the players.

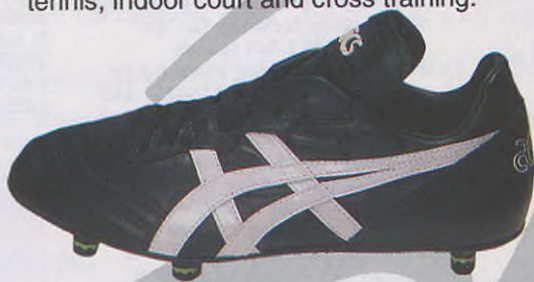

Celtic

Celtic have a very powerful squad this season, particularly strong in midfield and in the more creative aspects of the game. Accordingly, the Parkhead Side will probably be the country's most attractive side once again. Whether they can translate this into honours is the main challenge facing Liam Brady and his restructured backroom staff.

The Celtic management will be particularly anxious to improve their home form where our visitors commitment to attack has left them vulnerable to teams who have expertise in the counter attack. As a result, they are still seeking their first home League win of the season. However, away from home, when opponents open out, Celtic are at their most dangerous and have taken five points from a possible six.

Celtic had a League Cup Semi Final tie against Rangers in midweek, but regardless of the result Hearts face one of their most testing fixtures this afternoon - and one of the most attractive.

- Last season, Celtic finished 3rd in the Premier Division and League matches at Parkhead were watched by an average of 22,683 spectators. Celtic's top scorer in competitive matches was Andy Payton with 15 goals. In the Scottish Cup, our visitors went down 2-0 to Falkirk in the 4th Round, while in the Skol Cup, Celtic were beaten 1-0 by Aberdeen at the Semi-Final stage. The Glasgow club also played in the UEFA Cup, losing to Borussia Dortmund in the Second Round.

- Celtic hold the British record for the longest unbeaten sequence - 62 League matches between November 13th 1915 and April 21st 1917. The "Hoops" have a particularly good record away from home and they recently put together a remarkable undefeated run of 23 games from 17th November 1991 until 19th December 1992.

- Celtic have a superb record in European football having missed

only two seasons (1978-79 and 1990-91) since 1962. The Parkhead team has now played 137 matches; winning 69; drawing 26; and losing 42. In these games, Celtic have scored 244 goals for the loss of 137. Our visitors won the European Cup in 1967; played in the European Cup Final in 1970; and have played in four Semi-Finals - 1964 (Cup Winners Cup) 1966 (Cup Winners Cup) 1972 (European Cup) and 1974 (European Cup).

- Celtic Park was opened in 1892. The main stand of 4,800 seats was built in 1929 and this stand was reconstructed along its current lines in 1971. The "Jungle" side opposite was first covered in 1904, refurbished in 1966 and seated this summer. A cover was placed over the west terracing in 1957 and this was replaced by the present structure in 1986. The east terracing was covered in 1967. The towering Parkhead lights were first officially used in October 1959 against Wolves.

Celtic have played in all 19 Premier Division competitions and have won more points than any other club - 938 from 687 matches. The Glasgow club were Champions in 1976-77; 1978-79; 1980-81; 1981-82; 1985-86; and 1987-88.

The Celtic Squad

PAT BONNER: Goalkeeper. Age 33. Celtic's longest serving player having signed from Donegal-club, Keadue Rovers, in 1978. The confident, commanding keeper has been a regular since 1980 and is also an established internationalist with over 50 caps for Ireland. Pat has won all the domestic honours during his time at Parkhead and his experience is vital to the Celtic rearguard. Height 6'2".

TOM BOYD: Defender. Age 27. Pacy, attack-minded full-back who signed for Celtic in February 1992 from Chelsea, in an exchange deal involving Tony Cascarino. The tall Glaswegian joined Chelsea from Motherwell where he had been club captain and a Scottish Cup winner in 1991. Tom is now a regular in the Scotland squad and has made 17 appearances for his country.

DARIUSZ WDWOCZYK: Age 31. Accomplished and confident full-back or sweeper who builds from the back and is dangerous at free-kicks and corners. Born in Warsaw, Dariusz signed for Celtic in November 1989 from Legia Warsaw for a fee of £400,000. The classy defender has played over 50 international matches for his native, Poland.

MARK McNALLY: Defender. Age 22. Reliable and steady full-back or central defender, Mark was

signed from Celtic Boys Club in May 1987. The Motherwell-born player is a former Under-21 internationalist. Height 5'9".

MIKE GALLOWAY: Defender. Age 28. Mike is able to play in most midfield and defensive positions, but is currently starring at centre-half and could again find himself in the Scottish International side. The tough Oswestry-born defender cost Celtic £550,000 when he was transferred from Hearts in June 1989. Prior to his spell at Tynecastle, Mike played for Mansfield Town and Halifax Town.

GARY GILLESPIE: Defender. Age 33. Signed from Liverpool in August 1991, for a fee of £925,000 Gary is a quality defender and has played 13 times for Scotland. Born in Stirling, he started his senior career with Falkirk, moving to Coventry City in 1981 and Liverpool in 1983. Has been very unfortunate with injuries since his move to Celtic Park. Height 6'2".

TONY MOWBRAY: Defender. Age 29. Comes from Saltburn near Middlesbrough and spent 10 years with his local club, where he gained a reputation as a dependable and uncompromising centre-half. A fee of £1 million took Tony to Celtic in November 1991 where he replaced Paul Elliot in the heart of the Parkhead defence. Another player who has been unlucky with injuries. Height 6'1".

PETER GRANT: Midfield. Age 28. Signed from Celtic Boys Club in July 1982, Peter is the Parkhead club's midfield anchorman and a tireless worker. After considerable speculation about his future, Peter recently won a 3-year contract after working on month to month arrangements for 14 months. This delighted the fans because no-one is more dedicated to the Celtic cause than the former internationalist.

PAT McGINLAY: Midfield. Age 26. One of the country's leading midfield goalscorers, Pat was signed at the start of the season from Hibs for a tribunal-fixed fee of £525,000. The skilful Glaswegian started his senior career with Blackpool whom he joined from Anniesland Waverley. Pat was released by the English club and signed for Hibs in July 1987.

PAUL McSTAY: Midfield. Age 28. Signed from Celtic Boys Club in 1981, Paul has been the Parkhead club's midfield general for many years and his creative talent has earned many domestic honours and 67 caps for Scotland. Although distribution is his strong point, Paul is also a regular goalscorer. Has recently recovered from a serious foot injury. Height 5'10".

BRIAN O'NEILL: Midfield. Age 21. Born in Paisley, Brian was developed by Celtic Boys Club and then loaned to New Zealand side, Parirua Viard United. The tall and powerful midfielder or defender returned to Celtic Park in July 1991 and worked his way into the squad. He is also an Under-21

internationalist. Height 6'1".

STUART SLATER: Midfield. Age 24. England "B" internationalist from Sudbury. Stuart was Celtic's record signing when the Parkhead side paid £1.5 million to West Ham United for his transfer in August 1992. The 5'9" tall midfielder sets up the goals for his striking colleagues.

ANDY PAYTON: Forward. Age 25. Born in Burnley, Andy began his striking career with Hull City, moving from there to Middlesbrough. Celtic paid £600,000 to 'Boro for his transfer in August 1992 and he was the leading scorer at Parkhead last season with 15 competitive goals. Due to a hamstring injury he may miss today's fixture while there is also speculation about a return to England.

GERRY CREANEY: Forward. Age 23. Signed in May 1987 from Celtic Boys Club, the former Under-21 internationalist has recently made his come-back after a hamstring injury suffered in the opening game of the season. The dynamic striker has also had to overcome a broken leg which he suffered in January this year. Despite this he hit 14 goals last term and has a total of 49 for the club.

CHARLIE NICHOLAS: Forward. Age 31. Highly skilled and flamboyant striker who started his career with Celtic and won several winners medals. Before moving to Arsenal in 1983 for £750,000, Charlie won honours and international caps with Arsenal and then further silverware with Aberdeen whom he joined in January 1988. A £450,000 fee brought him home to Parkhead in July 1990.

FRANK McAVENNIE: Forward. Age 33. Sharp, incisive striker who hit 9 goals last season after joining Celtic in January. The former internationalist began his senior career with St Mirren, transferring to West Ham in June 1985 for a fee of £340,000. Frank joined Celtic in October 1987 for £725,000 and after a very successful spell, he returned to West Ham in March 1989 for £1.5 million. His release by the London club last season was a major surprise.

RUDI VATA: Midfield. Age 24. Albanian international midfielder or defender who was signed in August 1992 from Dynamo Tirana for a fee of £200,000. The strapping six-footer actually defected to the West in 1991 and looked set to play in French football. However, his deal fell through allowing Celtic to move in.

GORDON MARSHALL: Goalkeeper. Age 29. Born in Edinburgh and the son of Hearts famous goalkeeper, Gordon, had senior experience with Rangers, East Stirling, East Fife and Falkirk before joining Celtic from the "Bairns" in August 1991 for £270,000. The 6'2" keeper has had spells as number one at Parkhead and has been on the fringe of international honours.

STUART GRAY: Defender. Age 19. Harrogate-born, Stuart is the son of Scottish internationalist, Eddie Gray, and a great prospect. The 5'11" tall defender was signed by Celtic in July 1992 from Giffnock North.

Clarks comment



Very disappointing. That's the only way to sum up the reaction to Saturday's match against Kilmarnock. Admittedly, the goal we lost was worthy of winning any game, in fact I didn't realise how good a goal it was until I saw it later on TV! I felt that we let ourselves down by, in particular, our first half performance. The second half, after more than a few strong words at half-time, was much better and really, had we put Kilmarnock under the type of pressure we exerted in the second period, right

from the start, we would possibly have won the game. I said at the weekend that it is up to the experienced players in the side to set the example to the youngsters and it is important that they do so right from the start of every match

Mind you, the League is so tight, with two points separating eight Clubs, that a win today could see us back up at the top. We have lost two league games in a row and that is not good enough and it is going to be important that we keep our concentration for 100% of the time this afternoon. We know the style Celtic will adopt and we can expect an open game. A good home record is a vital plank in building a successful season, we have had one slip-up last week, and cannot afford another one today. The players have shown at times this season what they are capable of, what we need at present is a greater consistency and if we achieve this we will

start to accumulate the points.

Like ourselves Celtic are involved in Europe next week, but those matches will not have any bearing on today's fixture. The time to think about Europe is after the final whistle today and you can bet that Liam Brady will be saying the same to his players. On the subject of Madrid, I went out last weekend to see them in action at home to Celta Vigo. They played much as I would have expected, started strongly and had a three goal advantage after a few minutes of the second half before being pegged back to 3-2.
