A PROFILE ON TONIGHT'S

TONIGHT'S opponents are, like Celtic, past winners of the European Cup. A mixture of youth and experience has been brought together by manager Brian Clough, and to treat them with anything other than the utmost respect would be very dangerous.

VIV ANDERSON. Born in Nottingham, he joined Forest in 1972 as an apprentice and made his second division debut against Sheffield Wednesday in September 1974.

Viv didn't secure an automatic place in the side until the promotion winning season of 1976-77. Since then he's become a full England International making his debut against Czechoslovakia and was in the England squad for the World Cup in Spain last year.

GARRY BIRTLES. Local born Garry returned to Forest last season two years after his £1 million move to Manchester United. He joined Forest initially from non-league club 'Long Eaton United' and emerged as a highly popular figure and prolific scorer as he graduated to the England squad.

Since returning to the City Ground he has found his goal-scoring touch again.

IAN BOWYER. Born in Ellesmere Port, Cheshire, Ian is also in his second spell at the City Ground, returning to Forest after a short spell with Sunderland. Ian was appointed club captain on the eve of last season. He is one of the games outstanding competitors and scorer of vital goals, including the one against Cologne that took Forest to their first European Cup final in Munich.

Ian started his career with Manchester City and had a spell with Orient before joining Forest for the first time.

PETER DAVENPORT. Signed professional for Forest on 1.1.82, having previously been on Everton's books. Was a prolific goalscorer in the Central League before making his first team debut against Liverpool at Anfield on 1.5.82, finishing the season with four goals in five games.

Was a little unlucky with injury last season, sustaining an ankle injury in a match at Villa Park early in the season which kept him out for several weeks.

Played in the first team in the latter part of the season due to the injury Garry Birtles sustained and netted some very crucial goals including the winning goal against Liverpool at the City Ground on May day.

Made 16 first team appearances last season scoring seven goals.



PAUL HART. 6ft 2in centre half Paul was signed from Leeds United at the end of May. Paul is the son of the former Manchester City player and manager Johnny Hart, and began his league career with Stockport County, playing 88 games for them before a £25,000 transfer to Blackpool in 1973. Paul had a spell in midfield during his five year stay at Bloomfield Road and moved to Leeds in 1978. He made his debut for Leeds at Liverpool in March 1978 and made 191 league appearances for the Yorkshire club where he was club captain towards the end of last season. He is also a member of the PFA committee.

DANGEROUS OPPONENTS

CHRIS FAIRCLOUGH. Centre half, joining Forest at 16 when he left school. Firmly established in the Central League side and made his first team debut as a 17-year-old against Tranmere Rovers in the Milk Cup.

Sustained a wrist injury towards the end of last season.

BRYN GUNN. Born in Corby, Northants. He joined Forest as an apprentice in July 1978 and made his first team debut in 1975-76 when he made 14 appearances. He proved a reliable deputy when he was called on as substitute in the European Cup games including the last ten minutes of the final in Madrid.

Bryn played mostly as left back but seized the opportunity to play sweeper when Einar Aas was injured and has figured in the first team squad since.

HANS VAN BREUKELEN. The 27-year-old goalkeeper, signed for Forest from Dutch club Utrecht at the start of last season, is now established as the Dutch No. 1. A number of English clubs were showing interest in him before Forest moved in to sign him as Peter Shilton's replacement.

Just as he was settling into the side he unfortunately injured his knee before the local derby match with Notts County at the beginning of December and was side-lined until the middle of March making his comeback at Portman Road.

STEPHEN HODGE. Nottingham born Steve was a regular Central League player until he made his first team debut against Ipswich at Portman Road in the last game of the 1981-82 season. Since then he's become a regular first team player, he has pace and a strong left foot and has scored many crucial goals.

Steve gained under 21 international honours, playing the last 15 minutes against Greece in November 1982.

Steve also won the Forest supporters Player of the Year award last season.

COLIN WALSH. Born in Hamilton, this Scottish lad joined Forest as an apprentice in July 1978 and signed professional forms twelve months later. He immediately made a big impression and was an automatic choice for the Scotland Youth team for whom he was often the only 'Anglo' in the squad.

Colin made his first team debut at Coventry in November 1980 when he came on as substitute for the injured John Robertson and up to the end of the 1980-81 season had made 15 full league appearances scoring four goals.

DANNY WILSON. Born in Wigan. He was originally on schoolboy forms with Sunderland before moving to the then non-league club "Wigan Athletic" where he won a Northern Premier League Championship medal. Bury snapped him up for a bargain fee in the summer of 1977 and he became one of the most sought after midfielders in the lower divisions. He signed for Chesterfield for a club record six figure fee in July 1980 and joined Forest in February 1983.

A PFA award winner and twice Player of the Year for Chesterfield.

STEVE SUTTON. Born in Derbyshire, Steve has made a reliable deputy for both Peter Shilton and Hans Van Breukelen.

Steve made his debut at Norwich in October 1980.

KENNY SWAIN. Signed on loan from Aston Villa when Viv Anderson sustained a bad knee injury, but made such an impact that the manager signed him on a permanent transfer. Although Kenny came as a replacement right back he took over the left back spot when Viv recovered from injury.

COLIN TODD. Now under his second spell of Brian Clough's management since his move to Forest from Birmingham City. Colin began his career with Sunderland, he had more than seven seasons at Derby County, one with Everton and three at Birmingham. Colin has been capped 27 times by England.
