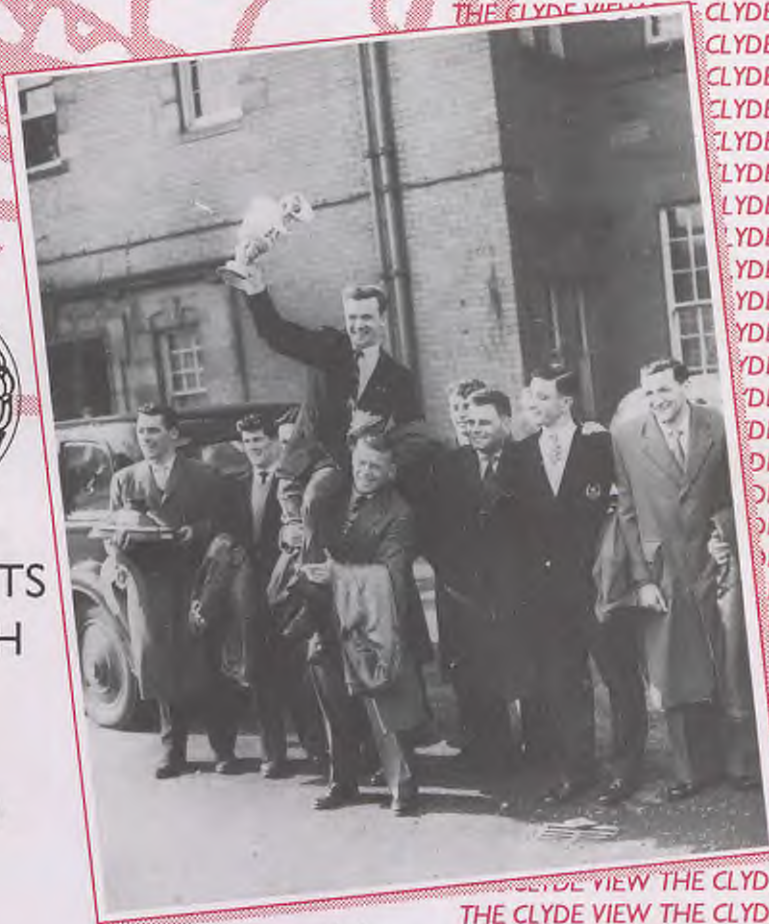

Not so long ago we used to welcome our East End neighbours to Shawfield. We used to share a league with them. Alas, the last 20 years has seen the Bully Wee's fortunes decline. The very name Glasgow Celtic, conjures up a genuine world force in football, and surely it will not be too long before Liam Brady, one of the most gifted footballers himself in world football, achieves the success that his brand of football philosophy deserves.

I can only agree with Jim Farry when he said recently that we in Scottish Football have to put a lot more into the entertainment value of the sport. That's where Glasgow Celtic and Clyde, despite their vastly different resource bases and reputation in football, have much in common. We have both always tried to play football in the way intended - on the deck; emphasis on skill, attack and passing; and on thrilling our respective fans whenever possible with the touch of genius.

As long as both clubs refuse to compromise on these standards, despite often negative media comments and emphasis on the mundane matters of football finance and administration, I believe Scottish Football will prosper and retrieve its position amongst the world's elite. If only the energy devoted to negative criticism went instead into commitment to nurturing our young talent we would have no reason to doubt Scottish Football's ability to regain a respected place in world football.

Over the years, Glasgow Celtic and Clyde have had a close association, although this has declined recently as the Bully Wee suffered first of all under league reconstruction and subsequently from a chronic case of homelessness.

We've have players, directors and officials for both clubs. How about this line up.

I have to admit apart from Jimmy Quinn this side would have been far from the most pacey of teams, but all were stalwarts, and Sullivan, Hood and McGarvey would rank amongst the best ever in

Let us hope that before too long the Clyde earn the right to share a league with Glasgow Celtic again, to match the quality of our new home. Whatever the outcome of today's game, we will continue to admire Celtic's commitment to entertaining, attacking football. The two, after all, are synonymous.

NEWS ON TWO

Brechin's Sandy Ross kept us his prolific scoring rate when he knocked in the two goals which dumped Montrose at Links Park last Saturday. The Glebe Park striker maintained his side's five point lead with a goal in each half to take his tally for the season to 17.

Second placed Stranraer lost valuable ground when they went down 2-0 at Palmerston and it was ex-Clyde player Darren Henderson who paved the way with a goal just sixty second after the restart. Jim McGuire sealed victory with a second goal just seventeen minutes from time to allow Clyde to move within one point of Stranraer with a 5-1 home victory over East Stirling.

Terry Christie's Stenhousemuir had to settle for a point for the second successive Saturday as Berwick held them to a 1-1 draw at Sheilfield. Both goals came within a sixty second spell, Haddow putting the Warriors ahead and Irvine equalising just one minute later. East Fife shrugged off

the disappointment of last week's home reverse to Stranraer by beating Alloa 2-0 at Recreation Park. Brown and Allan scored the goals that mattered, one in each half.

Queen's Park hauled themselves off the bottom spot last Saturday when they beat fellow strugglers Albion Rovers 1-0 at Hampden. Ross Caven got the goal after only 13 minutes and Eddie Hunter's men can now pull themselves clear of what was a false position at the bottom of the table.

looking back on last Saturday, only two of the top six clubs, Brechin and Clyde, recorded wins with Brechin maintaining their tremendous run of results. The 'Bully Wee' are just one point behind second placed Stranraer with a game in hand.

There are, of course, no Second Division fixtures today but Clyde made the journey to Berwick next Saturday aiming to continue their recent League form with a win.

OCTOBER 1955

"This afternoon we again review our old rivalry with our East End neighbours, Celtic. The "Boys" like ourselves have been badly hit with a heavy injury list. With players of the calibre of Stein, Fernie, Fallon, Haughney and Walsh all off in recent weeks their team selectors have never had to look for their troubles. They have produced a few shocks in their recent teams and last week they again pulled one out of the hat by playing their regular forward Neil Mochan at left back. He more than held his own in their 2-2 draw with Motherwell. Today, however, they have listed some of their injured players as probables and so like ourselves will make no team selection until the eleventh hour.

The interesting point about today's game is that we have still to record our first home victory in the League and Celtic have still to win away from home".

JANUARY 1966

"Celtic found us a tough nut to crack when we met them at Parkhead last September. They beat us by 2-1. Can our boys surprise them today just as we sprang a shock on Rangers here at Shawfield two weeks ago? The stage is certainly set for a thriller. There is no doubt whatsoever that Celtic are in excellent form these days. They played champagne

football against Morton to chalk up their biggest victory of the season. And when did our First Division side last score seven goals against another in the first half?"

JANUARY 1986

"Tonight we hope to rectify our old problem in front of goal and progress into the next round of the cup where a visit from Aberdeen awaits the winners. We certainly created enough chances to win a few games and we just can't go on like this,

LEAGUE REVIEW

After the pudding and turkey another winter tradition is usually aired at this time. That is the annual demand for Highland League clubs to be entered into the Scottish League. No one has any real arguments about enlarging the League but many clubs do have misgivings with the one sentence solution of relegation from the Second. This is regularly touted as the answer to many failings in the lower divisions. But despite all its callings year after year, we're still waiting for one pundit actually pointing out what happens to the relegated clubs. Where for example would clubs like Albion Rovers play if they were taken out of Division 2. The argument of widening the franchise is a good one as the lack of players from the Highlands and Borders is evidence of the damaging effect of not having a local club. Fans of the Second Division are not 'anti change' but would rather see development for the whole of the Scottish game with a pyramid structure as in England incorporating Junior and Highland League teams. Change from the bottom up not the top down. An independent body is essential in encouraging this, not an organisation driven by M and M: more money. So that all areas of football benefit not just those who have the biggest overdraft facilities.

MILESTONE

Today is another milestone in the rebuilding of Clyde. No matter the result the prelude to this game has allowed the name of Clyde to once again be known. People are beginning to know our name no longer are we confused with Clydebank fans, frustrated by the looks of disbelief. Although the classic questions still remain: Clyde? You must know John then. He goes to every game.

Clyde? Oh right: My dad used to support them. Do you know him?

These are followed by the constant reply: "I'll know his face!"

SPOTLIGHT

There he stood with a mop of hair which from a distance gave him a resemblance to a microphone. A haggard face confirmed that this was no young trialist. The match was 90 seconds old when the No.9 limped off injured, climbed the stairs at lesser Hampden, a quick hello to the fans and straight to the dressing room. That was the debut of McGarvey. His arrival in the first team happened at Berwick on New Year's Day he missed a sitter and was written off as too old. Yet gradually the McGarvey factor has taken effect. The moaning the waving of his arms, and of course the holding of his head when caught offside are all features of his play. Included in his game is the ability to get goals and evidence of that is the fact that he is close to doubling last season's tally.

Best goal: Half volley against Alloa this season.

Best Moment: Player of the Year dance, not just his football work but that silvery suit it

brought a highlight to a dull season.

DAVID VERSUS GOLIATH

Much of the coverage of this game has been centred on the cup comparison David v Goliath. This is true to an extent but Celtic and Clyde do have some similarities. Style of football, East End roots and an uncanny knack of grabbing defeat from the jaws of victory. To trash a side 1-0 in the first half only to lose silly goals later is not uncommon. And of course the ability to fall flat on our faces when many expect. What will come true today? Who knows but here's hoping football is played.

TERRACING TORMENTS

Dundee United's decision to leave the development of their own fans favourite part of the ground to last is a welcome example of directors listening to fans. People in glass boxes just do not appreciate the added enjoyment of standing. At Clyde we're moving to an all seater stadium in Cumbernauld a move which all fans appreciate as being necessary in order for the Clyde to grow but as articles in Clyde View have pointed out many supporters will miss the various aspects of standing. Parent/Children gates in all areas and the ability to sit where you want ie not separate stands for season tickets in the run up to Broadwood. But socially all seater grounds do lack the means for supporters to act out all the traditions of match day ie. at half-time walking round to meet different friends and of course the last 10 minutes of nervous pacing up and down the terracing are all habits which we'll have to adapt to in Cumbernauld.

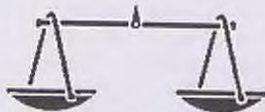
