From the Manager...

ANY football story this week has been overshadowed by the tragic death on Tuesday night of Scotland manager Jock Stein.

We all knew him as "The Big Man" and he was big in a far greater way than physical stature. Many saw him as the father figure in Scottish football and that reputation was earned through work he did as the Celtic manager.

A former player, he took over the manager's job at Celtic Park in 1965 and turned the club into one of the most feared in European soccer. He led his team to a European Cup triumph in 1967 and took them back to the final in 1970.

Under his management Celtic won 10 League Championships, including that world record nine-in-a-row run, eight Scottish Cup and six Scottish League Cup victories.

During his time Celtic won the treble of Scottish domestic honours twice. This record of success is hard to match, by any football personality in the world.

I was a player under Mr Stein's management and I learned much from him. His enthusiasm for the game and for entertaining football was outstanding.

It is hard now to think about football at a time of such loss, but Aberdeen are our visitors today and with both teams so near the top of the table the points will be very valuable.

THERE will be a minute's silence before the kick-off today and the players will wear black armbands as a sign of respect to Jock Stein.

A Previous Highlight

THE subject of our trip down memory lane today is a Celtic home match against Aberdeen on Saturday, October 12, 1963.

A Scottish League Division One match, both teams had played six matches already and each had been beaten three times, drawn twice and won once. By virtue of having conceded one goal less, Celtic were in front, in 11th place.

The game ended in Celtic's favour with a Duncan McKay penalty and two Stevie Chalmers goals giving them a 3-0 victory.



It's a fact ...

■ IN the 10 years of the Premier League, up until the start of this season Celtic had won a total of 502 points which is more than any other club. Aberdeen are second with 489 points and Rangers third with 444.

■ ABERDEEN are the only Scottish side to have won the Super Cup. They beat Hamburg 2-0 on aggregate in 1983.

■ CELTIC are only one win short of 50 League wins over Aberdeen at Celtic Park.

■ ROY AITKEN'S goal at Pittodrie last April was our 50th Premier League goal against the "Dons".

■ ABERDEEN only ever won the old style First Division once and that was in 1954-55.

■ IN the first season of the Premier League Aberdeen escaped relegation only by goal difference as did Dundee United. Dundee were the unlucky side to go down.

■ CELTIC have never lost to Aberdeen at home since David Hay became manager.

Our visitors at a glance . . .

JIM LEIGHTON (Goalkeeper): Currently Scotland's top choice International goalkeeper, he failed to return for the second half of Tuesday night's international match in Cardiff. He only missed two League matches last season, when his jersey was worn by **BRYAN GUNN**, a 21-year-old former Youth Internationalist and Under-21 cap.

STEWART MCKIMMIE (Defender): Another Don who missed only two League games last term. He joined Aberdeen from Dundee in 1983, although he is a native of the Granite City.

BRIAN MITCHELL (Defender): Has played in both full-back positions, appearing from the start seven times last year and appearing as substitute on the same number of occasions in last season's League campaign. He recently turned 22 and stands six feet one inch tall.

ALEX MCLEISH (Defender): Another regular in the Scottish side, Alex appeared 30 times for Aberdeen in last season's campaign. A tall commanding defender, he has a great understanding with his club and country partner, Willie Miller.

WILLIE MILLER (Defender): Aberdeen's club captain, he took over the captain's role for Scotland in the absence of Graeme Souness on Tuesday evening. He missed only two games in Aberdeen's League winning campaign last season.

BILLY STARK (Midfielder): Signed from St Mirren in 1983, he appeared in 30 League games last season, and as substitute twice, scoring 15 goals in the League.

JIM BETT (Midfielder): Signed by Aberdeen during the build-up to the close season, he is one of the Don's quartet who ap-

peared at Cardiff on Tuesday night. Having returned to Scotland from Belgian side Lokeren, he has visited Celtic Park in the past as a Rangers player.

NEIL SIMPSON (Midfielder): In 33 League games last season he scored four times. Born in London, Neil has been on Aberdeen's books since 1978 when he signed from Middlefield Wasps at the age of 16.

ERIC BLACK (Forward): Scored 17 times in 27 League matches last term. A dangerous striker, particularly in the air, Eric has been with Aberdeen since he was 16, signing in 1980.

JOHN HEWITT (Forward): Started 11 League matches last season and appeared as substitute 10 times, scoring three goals.

FRANK McDOUGALL (Forward): The Don's top League goalscorer netting 22 times. He was signed from St Mirren in 1984 and quickly established himself as a favourite with the Pittodrie fans.

NEALE COOPER (Midfielder/Defender): Started 17 times in last season's League campaign and was substitute three times. An enthusiastic player, he can operate in defence or in the middle of the park.

PAUL WRIGHT (Midfielder): An 18-year-old who has been on Aberdeen's books for two years and hit the headlines with his performance last weekend when he scored on his Premier League debut. This is his first season as a first team player.

Ten years at the top for Roy Aitken

ALTHOUGH it's hard to believe, last week was a personal milestone for me as it was ten years since I first wore the Celtic Jersey. The venue was Ochilview Park, Stenhousemuir when I appeared as a substitute for Roddie MacDonald in a quarter-final League Cup tie and played for the last ten minutes alongside Johannes Edvaldsson at centre-half.

A fortnight later the second leg of this tie at Celtic Park provided the occasion for my full debut, this time at right-back as Danny McGrain was injured. At that time I was still a schoolboy and my promotion to the first team was unexpected, although I would not figure in the senior side again until five months later when I was recalled for a league match at Pittodrie. Since then I've been fortunate enough to remain in the Celtic first team and have played in all back four and midfield positions for the club.

Looking back, my ten years with Celtic have provided highlights and low points as well as unusual and humorous moments. The two matches that I remember with greatest affection are the 4-2 league decider against Rangers at Celtic Park in 1979 and last season's Scottish Cup final victory over Dundee United. Nothing for me can surpass these matches for sheer excitement and drama although our victory over Ajax in Amsterdam is not too far behind.

One of my greatest ambitions is to help Celtic enjoy a successful run in Europe especially in view of the unfortunate events of last season. One unusual European memory is of our trip to Albania to play Partizani Tirana. Nobody knew what to expect although the country was not as bad as some people feared. The major pastime of the people seemed to be walking and there was little evidence of any western style luxury in their life.

Over ten years, in goalscoring terms my favourite efforts have been against city rivals Rangers. A double at Ibrox in my first full season is a pleasant memory as is a goal at Celtic Park in 1981 when I played an unintentional one-two with Collin Jackson before shooting past Peter McCloy in our 3-1 victory.



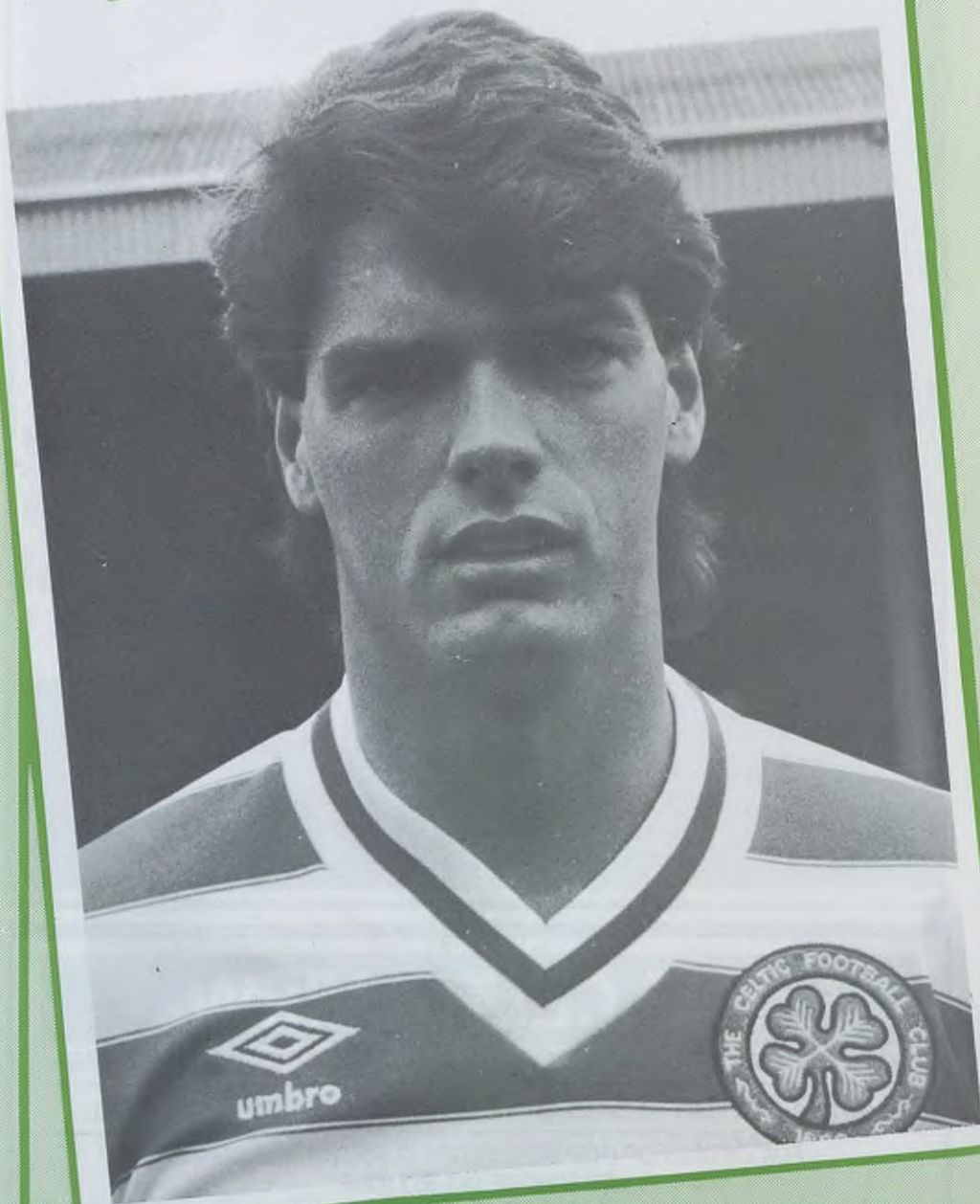

The Old Bhoys . . .

JIMMY JOHNSTONE



A LOOK at his physical appearance would show that Jimmy Johnstone was never destined to be one of the game's anonymous players and of all the Usbon Lions he gained a greater diversity of headlines in the sporting press than any other. The combination of his size, red hair and slight temper endeared him to the Celtic supporters as the type of player they could associate with.

As a youngster Jimmy modelled himself on the legendary Stanley Matthews and although people often talk of his 'natural ability' it is sometimes overlooked that as a youngster he spent many hours perfecting the skills that took him to Old Trafford as a youngster but he signed for Celtic in 1961 and made his debut against Rangers in no less than a Scottish Cup final two years later.

Jimmy contributed much to Celtic's great run of success in the late sixties and early seventies. His ability to beat a man with either footwork or speed helped win many matches for Celtic. For a player of his height he scored many goals with his head and seemed to revel in doing so against Rangers. His popularity was apparent as the Celtic fans would

criticise players with lesser skill for trivial errors whereas Jimmy even when not on form was beyond censure.

While at Celtic Park Jimmy had two great and well publicised problems to surmount. One was his thoroughly unreliable temperament which led to many differences with Jock Stein not to mention the SFA. The second of these, which he has now conquered, was his fear of flying. It is well known how Jock Stein used this to great advantage before a European Cup tie with Red Star Belgrade when he promised to excuse the winger from the second leg if he helped create enough of a lead in Glasgow.

Jimmy gave a masterly performance scoring twice and making three of the goals that were to render his trip unnecessary.

Jimmy and Celtic parted company in 1975 but today the popular winger is still connected with the club as he helps Frank Connor and Bobby Lennox coach the S-form youngsters. Now a grandfather he gets invited to many supporters' functions and is still as popular with the fans as he was at the height of his career.

This time last year ...

HEARTS were our visitors to Celtic Park and though Celtic only won 1-0 our superiority is not properly reflected in the scoreline.

In the first half, Hearts 'keeper Henry Smith kept the scoresheet blank with fine saves from Mark Reid, Paul McStay, Frank McGarvey and Tommy Burns. It was John Colquhoun, now with Hearts, who was the real menace to the Tynecastle side.

At the start of the second period Hearts brought on Brian Whittaker and within a minute he was booked for a wild tackle on the Celtic winger. When the full-back repeated the dose seconds later the referee had no option but to send him off the field without having kicked the ball. Within 15 minutes three more Hearts players were booked, MacKay and Cowie for fouls on the unfortunate Colquhoun and Robertson for a tackle on Burns.

The only goal of the match came in the 58th minute when a well-placed Colquhoun corner was headed home by McGarvey and two points were safely in the bag.

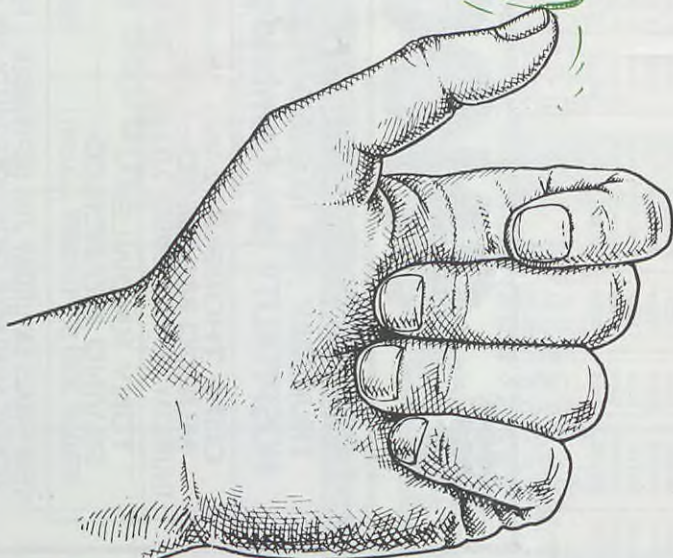

Looking back . . .

FIVE YEARS AGO

DATE: SEPTEMBER 13, 1980

A CROWD of 17,000 turned out at Tynecastle to watch Celtic play Hearts. Celtic started the game by pressing the Tynecastle side deep into their own half and everyone in the ground knew that it was only a matter of time before Celtic scored.

Despite all the pressure it took Celtic 32 minutes to break through the Hearts defence but it was a goal worth waiting for. The move began with some fine work between George McCluskey and Tommy Burns with George finally passing to David Provan who crashed the ball past Brough in the Hearts goal with a first time shot from just inside the box.

Celtic should have increased their lead only minutes later, but substitute Mike Conroy, who had replaced the injured Murdo MacLeod, blasted the ball wide of the Hearts goal from 12 yards.

Celtic increased their lead in the 53rd minute. Tommy Burns cut the Hearts defence into shreds with a great run down the left and despite the attention of two Tynecastle defenders he still managed to send over a superb cross that left Charlie Nicholas with the easiest of chances to head Celtic's second goal.

In the 70th minute Roy Aitken was sent off, but such was Celtic's dominance in this game you wouldn't have known that Hearts had a one-man advantage for the last 20 minutes.



TEN YEARS AGO

DATE: SEPTEMBER 13, 1975

PREMIER LEAGUE duty took Celtic to Fir Park in Motherwell and despite having most of the play, Celtic missed too many chances, including a Tommy Callaghan penalty, and could only secure one point in a 1-1 draw. The full Celtic line-up that day was: Latchford, McGrain, Lynch, Connelly, MacDonald, Edvaldsson, Wilson, McNamara, Dalglish, Callaghan, Lennox. Substitutes: Hood (Wilson) and Glavin.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

DATE: SEPTEMBER 12, 1970

CELTIC played Rangers at Celtic Park. The result of the match was CELTIC 2 (Hughes, Murdoch), RANGERS 0. CELTIC: Williams, McGrain, Hay, Murdoch, McNeill and Brogan, Johnstone, Connelly, Hood, Lennox, Hughes. Substitute: Davidson. This meant that Celtic had won five and drawn one of the last six Old Firm matches.

The side didn't make the job easy for themselves and Jim Brogan missed a penalty in the opening minutes. However, Bobby Murdoch showed the form that made him one of the best midfield players in Europe, and this inspired his team-mates to outplay Rangers.
