TODAY we look back at a Celtic v Motherwell League clash from May 3, 1947. In the old style 16 team First Division Celtic were sitting 7th with 30 points and Motherwell were 8th with 29 points going into the game.

The programme for the afternoon gave the teams as: **Celtic:** Miller, Hogg, Mallon, McPhail, Corbett, Milne, Quinn, McAloon, Rae, Evans, Cannon. **Motherwell:** Johnston, Kilmarnock, Shaw, McLeod, Paton, Redpath, McRoberts, Watson, Humphries, Bremner, Barclay.

Celtic collected two points on the day with a 3-2 scoreline. Jimmy Scirrell, Jerry McAloon and a Joe Rae penalty provided Celtic's goals.

It's a fact ...

- ◆ **CELTIC** and Motherwell first met on league duty in **1903-04** when we won 6-0 at home and 2-1 away.
- ◆ **OUR** biggest win over Motherwell at Celtic Park is the above 6-0 victory whilst Motherwell's biggest win here is 4-0 in 1929-30.
- ◆ **AT Fir Park** our biggest win is 7-0 in 1982-83 and Motherwells is 8-0 in 1936-37. This is our heaviest every defeat in a competitive match.
- ◆ **THIS** is the 151st league meeting between the two sides. Celtic have won 91, drawn 29 and lost 30, scoring 346 goals and conceding 181.
- ◆ **ONLY Aberdeen** have won more Premier League games at Celtic Park than Motherwell. The Dons have won seven and the 'Well four.
- ◆ **ON** Motherwell's last visit here two seasons ago, Murdo MacLeod scored our 100th goal of the season in our 4-2 win. Their last win here was in 1978-79 when they won 2-1.
- ◆ **MOTHERWELL'S** biggest ever win is 12-1 against Dundee United in a Division 2 match in 1953-54.

Our visitors at a glance . . .

JOHN GARDINER (Goalkeeper): John came to Motherwell from Dundee United in 1984. The big keeper moved to Dundee United from Aberdeen in 1980 but the form of both Jim Leighton and Hamish McAlpine had John confined to reserve football. Now John is number one at Fir Park and proving he was too good for reserve football.

IAN McLEOD (Full back): Arrived at Fir Park in 1977 from Clarendon Amateurs in 1977. Ian is now the longest serving player at Motherwell. He is very strong in a tackle and is capable of turning out anywhere in the back four or in midfield.

DEREK MURRAY (Full back): Derek was one of manager Tommy McLean's first signings when he brought him from Dundee United for £5000. The big strong defender was Motherwell's penalty expert last season netting six times from the spot.

TOM BOYD (Defender): Signed from Motherwell Boys' Club in 1983. Tom who prefers to play as sweeper, has represented Scotland at Youth level. Has been Motherwell's Player of the Year in the past.

ALEX KENNEDY (Defender): Tall red headed defender who broke through into the first team last season. Alex joined Motherwell in 1982 from Craigmark Boys' Club. Good in the air and strong in the tackle.

JIM CLARK (Midfield): Signed during the close season from Kilmarnock. Manager Tommy McLean will be looking to the hard working midfielder to hel the youngsters in the side. Made his debut last Saturday against Clydebank.

ANDY WALKER (Forward): Joined Motherwell in 1984 from Baillieston

Juniors. He has been pushing hard for a regular first team place and has shown good pace.

JAMIE DOYLE (Midfield): Former Under 21 Internationalist joined Motherwell in 1984 from Partick Thistle. Being a hard and tricky midfielder who likes to be involved all the time, Jamie seems to pick up a lot of injuries.

ANDY HARROW (Forward): Arrived at Fir Park in 1982 via Raith Rovers, Luton Town and Aberdeen. Andy is a hard working striker and finishes as Motherwell's joint top scorer in the league with nine league goals last season.

RAB STEWART (Forward): Rab joined Motherwell last season from Dunfermline for £8000. He might lack height but makes up for it in his pace and bravery. Rab's first appearance in the Premier League was as a substitute last week.

RAYMOND BLAIR (Forward): Signed for Motherwell in 1984 from St. Johnstone. In an exchange deal which took Kenny Lyall to Perth. He is a skillful player who likes to attack the full back whenever he can.

JOHN GAHAGAN (Forward): Tricky winger with a good turn of speed who has the ability to turn a game. John signed for Motherwell from Shettleston Juniors in 1979.

ROBERT CLARK (Midfield): Arrived at Fir Park in 1984 from Kilmarnock as part of a player swap deal. Robert prefers to play sweeper but can operate in midfield.

With the departure of skipper Ally Mauchlen and Garry McAllister to Leicester City for £250,000 last week there could be places in the first team squad for youngsters like Danny Diver, Paul McFadden, John McStay,

Having only managed 19 league games for Celtic last season I obviously want to improve on that this term and hope the Scottish Cup final can be used as a springboard for success for myself and the club.



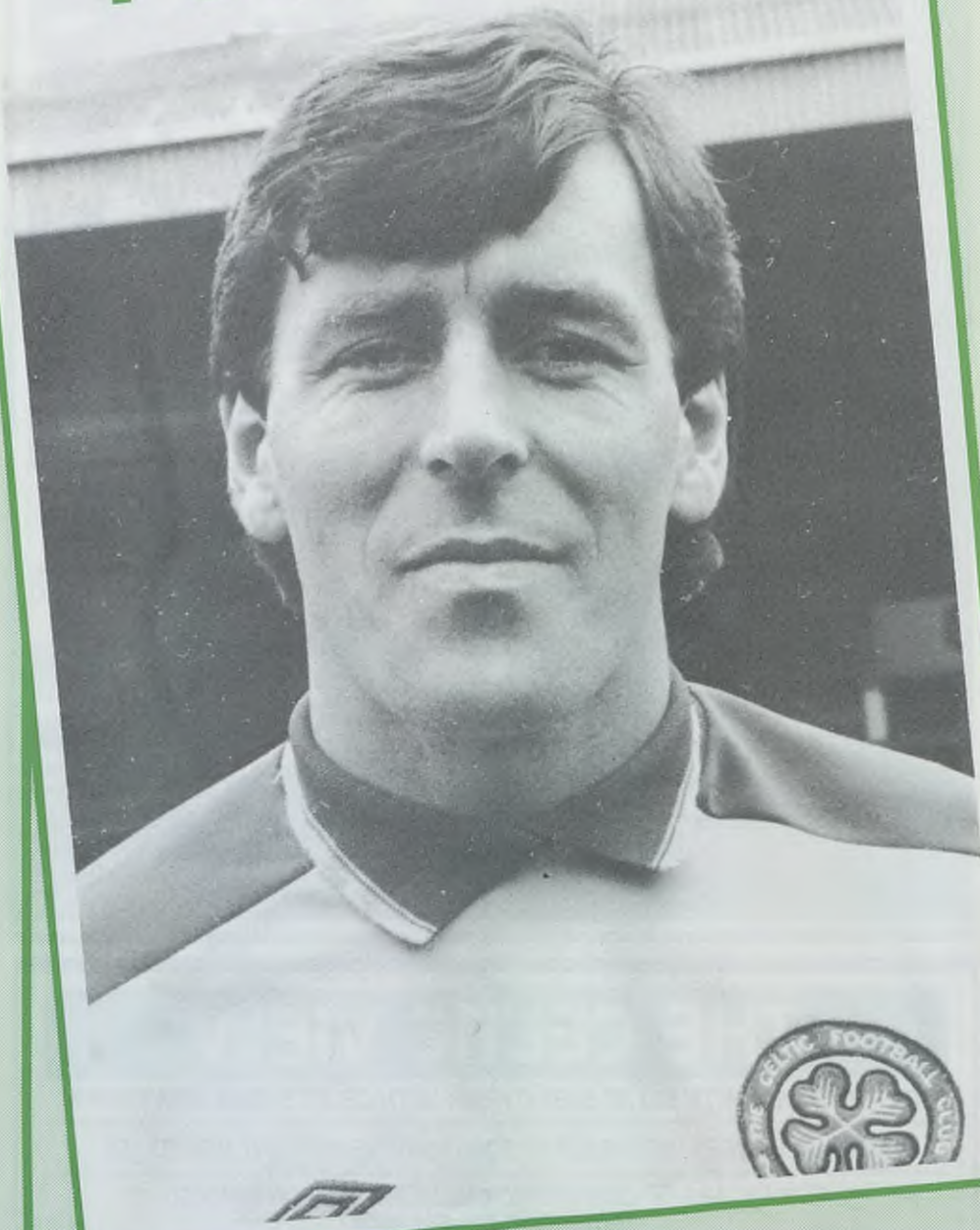

International Caps — 5 (Scotland)

RONNIE Simpson's goalkeeping career was launched as the Second World War was drawing to a close. At the tender age of 14 and while still a schoolboy he played for the amateurs of Queens Park.

Three years later he represented Britain in the London Olympic Games of 1948 before embarking on a lengthy professional career which saw him serve Third Lanark, Newcastle Utd. and Hibernian before enjoying a successful 'Indian Summer' with Celtic.

Ronnie is one of only nine players who have worn both Scottish and English FA Cup Winners medals since the war but is the only one to have gained his Winners medal at Wembley before emulating the feat at Hampden. While with Newcastle Ronnie won two FA Cup Winners medals in 1951-52 and 1954-55 playing in the same side as the famous English centre forward Jackie Milburn.

As a Celtic player these medals were augmented by League Championship, League and Scottish Cup medals as well as a European Cup medal from the

unforgettable triumph at Lisbon; undoubtedly the pinnacle of his career. His success with Celtic was rewarded with five Scottish caps at the age of 36 and he returned to Wembley in 1967 to play in the memorable 3-2 defeat of world champions England.

The role of the Celtic goalkeeper can be the most difficult in which to succeed due to the long periods of inactivity experienced so it is a credit to Ronnie Simpson that he had 95 clear sheets during his career at Celtic Park; a fact often easily forgotten due to the firing power of the Celtic forward line.

In 1969 Ronnie's career came to a sudden end through injury in a League Cup semi final against Ayr Utd. at Hampden; the ground where it had begun almost a quarter of a century earlier. After his retirement from the game he ran a sports shop and became a local councillor in Edinburgh. Today he is a publican in the same city and still has an involvement in football as a member of the Pools Panel.

This time last year ...

CELTIC 1, DUNDEE UTD 1 (Attendance 19,000)

... Dundee United were the first visitors to Celtic Park and little did we know then that they would be our last opponents of the 1984-85 season.

Celtic started the match looking for their first league win having drawn at Easter Road the previous week, and immediately put the United defence under pressure. However in the 7th minute neat one touch play at the edge of the penalty area gave Tannadice new boy Stuart Beedie the chance to shoot under Pat Bonner. For the remainder of the first half Celtic were always on top but failed where it matters most — in front of goal.

The second period started as the first ended but this time Celtic got the vital breakthrough and what a goal it was. In the 61st minute Brian McClair collected the ball just outside the Celtic 18 yard box and carried it all the way across the park until 25 yards away from the United goal he let fly with a low right foot to give the Bhoys a share of the points.

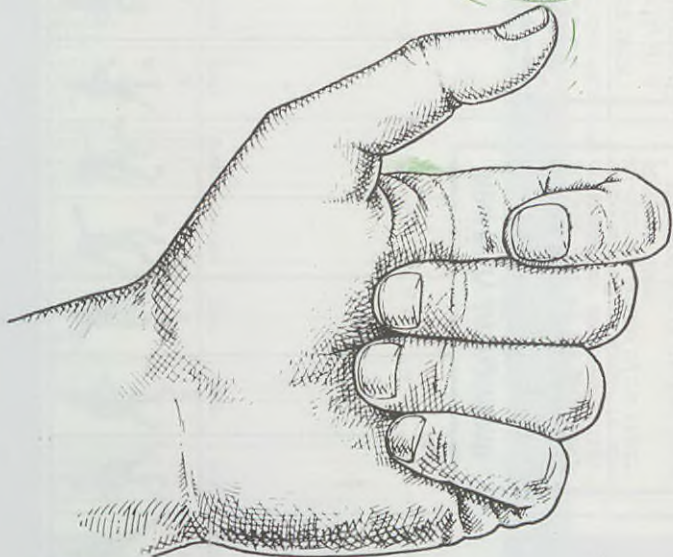

New entry arrangements at Celtic Park

NEW fencing in the East Terracing at Celtic Park for the segregation of supporters means that Celtic supporters will no longer be able to enter the ground by the Kinloch Street turnstiles.

The stand side of the East Terracing will be reserved for visiting supporters. Celtic fans who wish to watch the match from the East Terracing, should enter by the turnstiles at the east end of Jane-field Street. Once inside the ground, they will not be able to move into the Enclosure or the West Terracing.

Fans who want to watch the match from the West Terracing (Celtic end) or Enclosure (the 'Jungle'), should use the turnstiles at the West side of the Park on London Road and Jamefield Street.

Tickets — The Only Way In

Due to Police instructions there will be no cash turnstiles at the Celtic v Rangers match on Saturday/August 31. Strathclyde Police have insisted that no cash turnstiles are in operation at this match and that Celtic do not sell tickets in the vicinity of the ground on the day of the match. That means that if you want to see the match — you must buy a ticket in advance. Tickets for this game are currently on sale at 146 West Nile Street.

Looking back . . .

FIVE YEARS AGO

Date: AUGUST 16, 1980

CELTIC gained another two championship points with a display that had the big Celtic support singing with joy. Right from the start Celtic attacked the Kilmarnock goal and it was only some fine goalkeeping from McCulloch that prevented Celtic taking an early lead. However, Celtic continued to press forward and it was no surprise when they opened the scoring in the 28th minute. It was a goal worth waiting for. Tom McAdam started the move deep in his own half with a pass to Tommy Burns. Tommy fought off a challenge from a Killie defender and slipped a beautiful ball to George McCluskey, who split the Rugby Park defence with a simple ball to Dom Sullivan who hit it first time past McCulloch.

Straight from the kick-off Murdo MacLeod won the ball and passed to Dom Sullivan. Dom sent a long searching ball over the Killie defence and Frank McGarvey burst through, drew McCulloch from his goal and shrewdly slipped the ball into the net.

It came as no surprise when Frank McGarvey hammered home Celtic's third goal in the 35th minute. Five minutes into the second half the big Celtic support were given a fright as they saw Frank McGarvey being helped from the pitch with a chest injury.

TEN YEARS AGO

Date: AUGUST 16, 1975

CELTIC were at home to Dumbarton and the team lined up as: Latchford; McGrain and Lynch; McCluskey, McDonald and Edvaldsson; McNamara and Dalglish; Wilson; Glavin and Lennox. Subs. Hood (McNamara) and Callaghan.

Tom McAdam was in the visiting side and scored, but Celtic answered it three times through Wilson, Lennox and Edvaldsson. Dalglish laid on the first for Paul Wilson. Paul returned the compliment when he gave Bobby Lennox a chance which was converted. Icelandic star Johannes Edvaldsson concluded the scoring with a blockbuster. Jackie McNamara got a nasty ankle injury in the second half and had to be carried from the field.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Date: AUGUST 15, 1970

CELTIC met Dundee United in the League Cup. Full details for the match were as follows: Celtic 2, Dundee United 2. Team was: Fallon; Craig and Gemmell; Hay, McNeill and Brogan; Callaghan and Hood; Connelly; Lennox and Hughes. Sub. Wallace (Craig).

An injury to Jim Craig forced Celtic to bring on substitute Willie Wallace after only 25 minutes. This move upset the rhythm of the side but they still managed a 2-2 draw thanks to goals from Tommy Callaghan and Bobby Lennox.

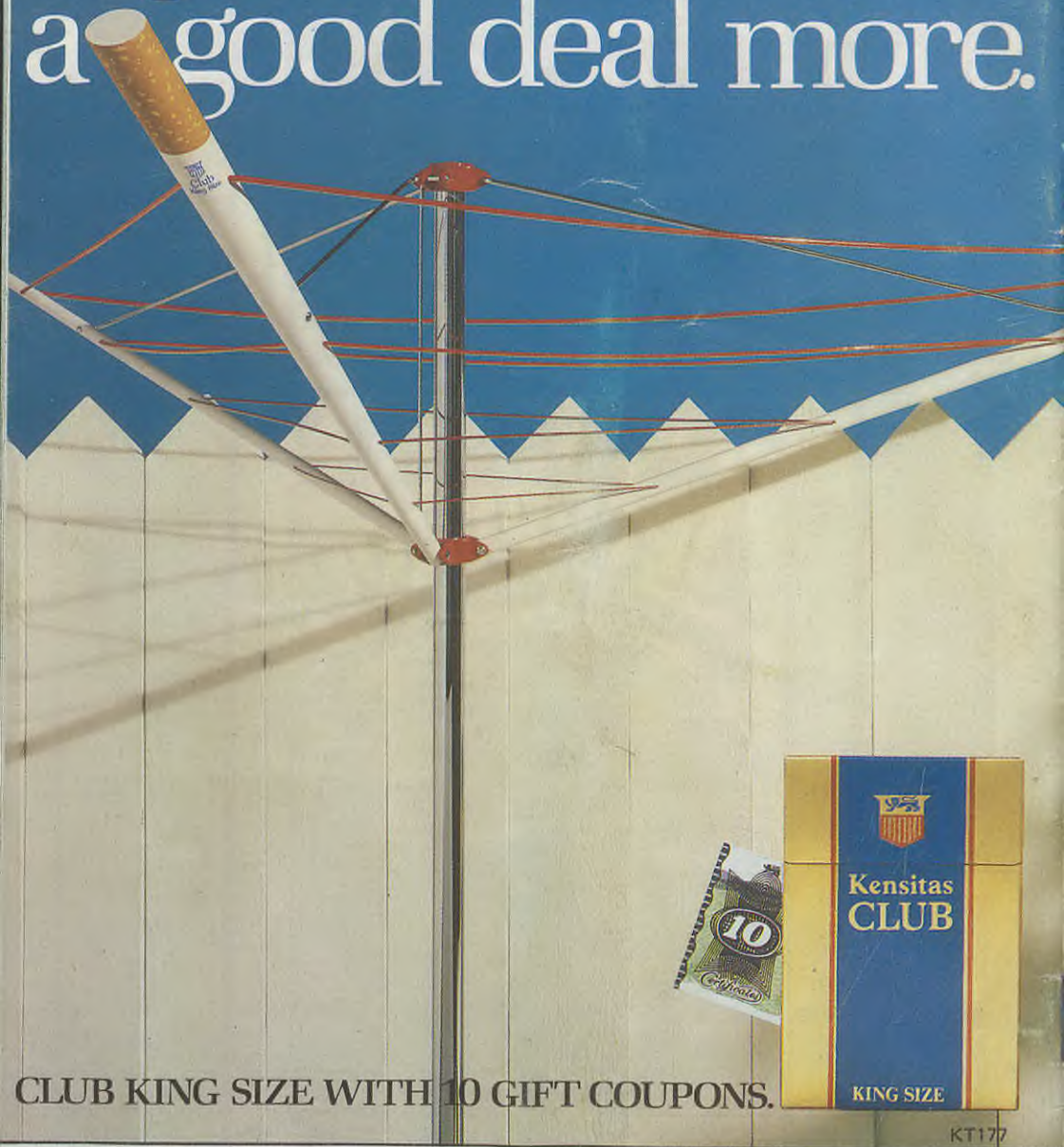
