Racing Club, Buenos Aires

Racing Club is one of the most important institutions of the Republic of Argentina and was founded on the 25th of March, 1903, in the city of Avellaneda, in the province of Buenos Aires, Argentina. It became affiliated to the Amateur Football Association in the year 1904 and won its place into the First Division in the year 1910 by winning the match in the finals against Roca Juniors with a score of 2-1. The Club achieved its first championship title in the First Division in the year 1914 and went on to repeat this form in consecutive years, 1914, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 and again won the championship titles in the years 1923 and 1925.

When the League of Professional Football was founded, Racing Club was among the founder members of the league and won the highest recognition and almost every honour to be won in Argentinian football in the years 1949, 50, 51, 58 and 61 and in the present season they are in the position of having every chance of obtaining a new championship title.

Racing Club, over and above its actual football activities, encourages all other types of sporting activities and possesses facilities for skating, handball, enclosed gymnasium, judo, wrestling, pelota, and has also a sports centre with five swimming pools which can accommodate ten thousand people.

The Racing Club Football stadium, inaugurated in the year 1950, has accommodation for 110,000 people and is the largest in the country. Our institution also caters for social and cultural activities and has at the present time a membership of 45,000.

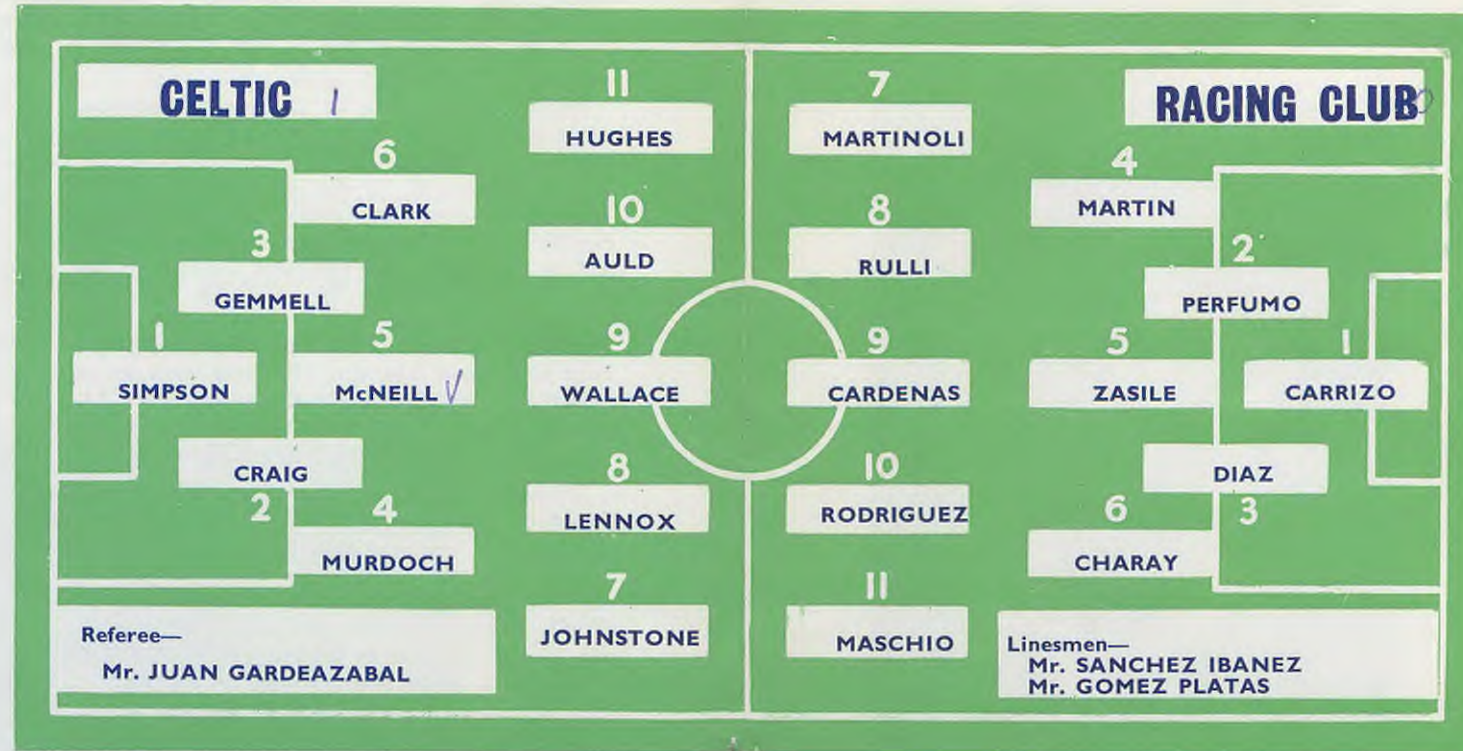
NOTE

A MESSAGE FROM JOCK STEIN

Once again I ask our support to give
 our visitors, Racing Club, a strong Celtic
 welcome but again when the game starts
 I want to hear the Celtic sound behind the
 boys. Tonight we play in the greatest
 club match in the world. Tonight Celtic
 and Scotland can take the first successful
 step in the World Championship.

INTER-CONTINENTAL CUP RULES

The rules of the Intercontinental Cup are
 different from our other competitions. The
 first match of this tournament was firstly
 played in South America in 1960. In 1961 the
 first match was played in Europe with the second
 match, naturally, in South America. The follow-
 ing years the first match is played alternately
 in South America and in Europe. As we are
 in 1967, the first match takes place in Europe,
 in Scotland, and in Glasgow.

Two points are given for a win, one for a
 draw and none for a defeat. The points winner
 over these two matches becomes the holder of
 the Intercontinental Cup. As far as these two
 matches are concerned, goals do not count.
 One team could win 5-0, the other team could
 win 4-3 and the result would be equal pointage.
 There is no extra time in the second match,
 but, if after the statutory playing time of the
 two matches, the number of points of the two
 clubs are equal, a third match will be played.
 This match will be played, if required, in South
 America within seventy-two hours in a neutral
 country. If this third match ends in a draw,
 extra time of thirty minutes will be played. If,
 after this extra time, the result is still a draw,
 the club with the greatest difference in goals
 in the three matches shall be declared the win-
 ner. Should there be no such difference the
 winner shall be declared by lot effected by the
 referee on the actual ground—complicated!

INTER-CONTINENTAL CUP (World Championship)

Racing Club Players

LUIS CARRIZO—Age 31. Member of the team who joined the club in 1963. He is a player whose greatest virtue is the boldness and decision which he brings to meet his opponents' advances.

AUGUSTIN M. CEJAS—Age 21. Was chosen by the international selection panel to play in the Pan-American tournament. Played in San Pablo, Brazil, and also in the Olympics in Tokyo, Japan, in 1964. He rose from the junior ranks of our club.

ROBERTO A. PERFUMO—Age 23. Internationalist. As a member of the National Juvenile Selection in the Pan-American tournament in San Pablo, Brazil, and also in the Olympics in Tokyo, Japan. He was a member of the World Cup team which played in London, England. He came from the junior section of the club.

RUBEN O. DIAZ—Age 20. Member of the team since 1965 and is at present a member of the Argentinian preselection which will soon be making a trip through Europe. One of the greatest discoveries in Argentinian football. He comes from the junior section of the club.

OSCAR R. MARTIN—Age 33. Internationalist. He joined our club in 1963. He was a member of the Argentinian team chosen to play in the South American tournament played in Bolivia and also preselected for the team which played in London in the World Cup. Member of the team since 1964.

MIGUEL A. MORI—Age 23. Internationalist. Member of the Argentine junior selection which took part in the Pan-American Games and the Tokyo Olympics. He was also a member of the independent team, Bi-Campeon de America, in 1964/65. He joined our club this year as a transfer from C.A. Independiente.

ALFIO BASILE—Age 24. Preselected and member in the list of possible players sent to F.I.F.A. for the Argentinian group in the World Cup match in London. He is today a national choice and is considered the best player in his position. He comes from the junior section of the club.

NELSON CHAVAY—Age 26. Uruguayan international. Comes from Racing Club of Montevideo and was one of the most expensive transfers in 1966. At the time of his transfer he was included in the Uruguayan selection which was to play in the World Cup game in London. He is an extraordinary player who can play in any defence position.

UMBERTO MASCHIO—Age 33. Internationalist. A player of extraordinary quality who was an internationalist at the age of 18 in the Pan-American tournament in Mexico. Latterly he made up the famous forward line in the South American tournament in Lima, Peru, where he put everything that he had into these international matches and was the highest goal scorer of the entire championships, then he was transferred to the Bologna Club, in Italy, in one of the most sensational transfer deals ever known in our country. He played for Bologna during several seasons, and wore the famous "Blue" square in the World Championships, held in Chile in 1962. On his return to Argentina he became a member of our team. Due to a F.I.F.A. ruling he was unable to play in the World tournament in London. At the present time he is one of the most brilliant forwards in Argentinian football.

JAIME MARTINOLLI—Age 25. A very versatile player. He became a member of the team in 1965. He is a man of excellent physique, has great skill and dexterity in both legs, is a fast player, and does particularly well in forward line play. At the present time he figures amongst the highest goal scorers in the Argentinian League.

JUAN JOSE RODRIGUEZ—Age 29. Internationalist. This player became a member of the club in 1965. He was included in the Argentinian selection for the South American championships in 1959. At the present time he is one of the highest goalscorers. A player of great skill, he knows exactly when to act. His football career is quite impressive. He was a member of Boca Juniors, Huracan, and Nacional of Montevideo where he was a high goal scorer.

JUAN C. CARDENES—Age 21. Very dangerous and skilful player. He took part in the Argentinian Tournament in 1964. He comes from the interior of the country and was chosen to play for his province at the age of 15 when he took part in the Argentinian Championships. A valued member of the team, he has a good team spirit. A player of great vision, he is always in the right place at the right time.

JUAN C. RULLI—Age 29. Is very adept when using his head to hit the ball. Defender and attacker, he is at the present time one of the best midfield players in the country. He has great staying power, and is as fresh at the end of a game as he was at the beginning. Very skilful, too, when he has the ball at his feet. He began his career in the La Plata student teams and spent two years in Boca Juniors. He was transferred to our team last year.

JUAN C. MESIAS—Age 32. Uruguayan internationalist. Extraordinary marker. Was always chosen as a member of Uruguay's international teams during several seasons. He became a member of our team in 1961 and was a member until 1965 when he dropped out because of injuries from which he is still recovering. Great player and a fine sportsman.

Where our Visitors come from

The Argentine is a large country—a very large country which completely dwarfs our own British Isles—not so long ago it was the homeland of the "gauchos" on their great plains of the "Pampas." They were the men who lived in the saddle herding over these grasslands the millions of head of cattle—the gold of Argentine.

The Argentine is an expansive country which extends from the 22nd parallel, which is inside the tropics, two thousand three hundred miles south to Tierra Del Fuego, the land of fog, storms, ice and snow.

It is a very young country of only 153 years' independent existence and has only 22 million of a population which are basically of white European origin.

Buenos Aires is by far the most important city in the country, with almost six million inhabitants. It is the greatest Spanish speaking city in the world and lies on the southern shore of the widest river in the world, the Rio De La Plata. It is a most prosperous city of strong western influence with imposing skyscrapers, large streets, magnificent avenues and parks which bear, to some travellers, quite a resemblance to Paris.

Although the end of October, we are arriving in Buenos Aires at the very beginning of their summer, and, lying just 35 degrees south of the Equator, is equivalent to us in the Northern Hemisphere playing in North Africa. We will undoubtedly find, sun, heat and blue skies.

We are staying in the Hindu Club, an hour out of the city where, in this luxury hotel, the players will find everything at their disposal—swimming pool, golf course, cinema, gymnasium, bowling alley, etc.

Although the newspapers in Buenos Aires give plenty of international news, it is extremely doubtful if one person in 20 could have answered the question "Which country is Glasgow in?" before Celtic became World title candidates. Some of the more enlightened might have answered "Inglaterra!"

The over one hundred thousand fans at the Avellana stadium will certainly hear a new sound before the match. The local St. Andrew's Society Pipe Band are going to play and we hope that the skirl of the pipes will bring good fortune to our boys that day.

Tartan skirts and jumpers have been extremely popular in the recent years in the Argentine but it is doubtful if all the purchasers of these articles realise the connection with Scotland.

In Argentine, as in Italy, there exists today a very strong defensive pattern of football. If, however, one team was to be exempted from this definition, it certainly would be Racing, who have been described in the South American papers as a very aggressive attacking side.

We ourselves are pleased to hear this as it certainly should add considerable interest to these matches.

* * *

The South American papers are quoted as saying that Racing must win this Cup as they have a very considerable advantage. They believe that Racing should draw in Glasgow and win in Buenos Aires. But even should they be beaten in Glasgow they consider that they must win in Buenos Aires and must win the play-off in which they will have considerable advantage, as they will be playing before South American crowds.

We must congratulate John Coleraine and his team, Glentoran, who went to Lisbon and secured a no-scoring draw. Benfica are rated as one of the top teams in Europe and this was indeed a fantastic result for the North of Ireland Club.

They did, however, lose on aggregate, as you will remember the first match in Glentoran was a 1-1 draw with Eusebio scoring in the last few minutes.

Although out of the competition, as that goal counted double, they certainly must have won the respect of Portugal.

The Manager of the luxury Hindu Club, Mario Livingstone, is very proud of his name and his Scottish descent, and although he does not speak a great deal of English, has promised the boys "real home cooking" during their stay and we certainly will not need to carry steaks to the Argentine.

Jacques Thibert of *France Football*, the celebrated French Sports newspaper, was in Glasgow and in Kiev for our two matches in the European Cup, and we would like to quote from the newspaper: "But everything which happens to Celtic is in our eyes worthy of interest. That is why, in this latest adventure, we wish to draw still further details—the Scottish team has, in defeat, acted in a most dignified manner. One will read of these matters in the exciting report of Jacques Thibert, the only French journalist who attended the two Dinamo v. Celtic matches. We wish to bear witness to this dignity in defeat for it is indeed rare. The European Cup has become so important that one leaves it usually with bad grace. Certainly when one has won the Cup and when one loses in the first round of the following competition by the result of doubtful decisions by the referee. But Celtic know that (c'est le jeu) it is the game that counts and it is not dramatised. That is why we wish the Champions of Europe all the good fortune possible in the Final of the Intercontinental Cup in which they are opposing Racing Club. It seems to us that the honour of European football could not, in spite of Kiev, find itself in better hands."

Although very far travelled, when we start off on our 8,000 mile journey to Buenos Aires on the Rio de la Plata it will be the first time that we have crossed the Equator. The full journey there and back is more than two-thirds the circumference of the globe.

We are leaving Glasgow on Saturday night the 28th October and flying to Paris, Madrid, Dakar, Rio de Janeiro and then on to Buenos Aires where we arrive just after 1 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, about 20 hours after leaving Prestwick. On these long flights there are generally films shown to pass the long hours of travelling.

As far as coming back is concerned nothing, of course, is definitely arranged until it is known whether a play-off is necessary or not.

We understand from James McGinley of Holiday Enterprises, 190 Dumbarton Road, he has still a few places available in his chartered flights to South America. Anybody who is interested should contact him immediately as visas are required for South America and so are smallpox inoculations. We are pleased to hear that there is going to be some support for the boys.

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
