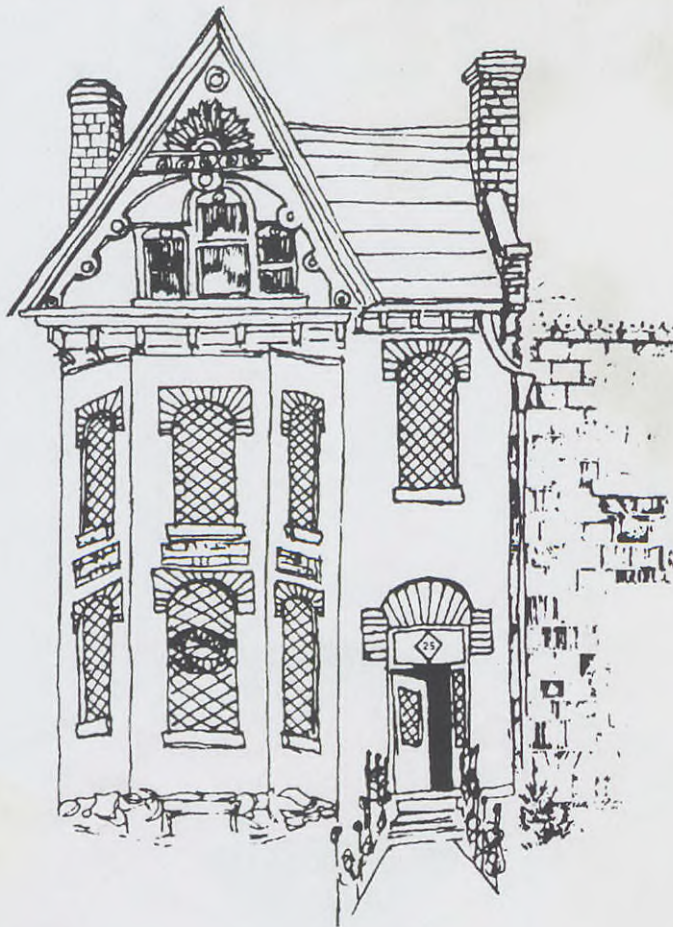

This tournament will be a catalyst for the Hamilton Cup of Soccer for many more years to come.

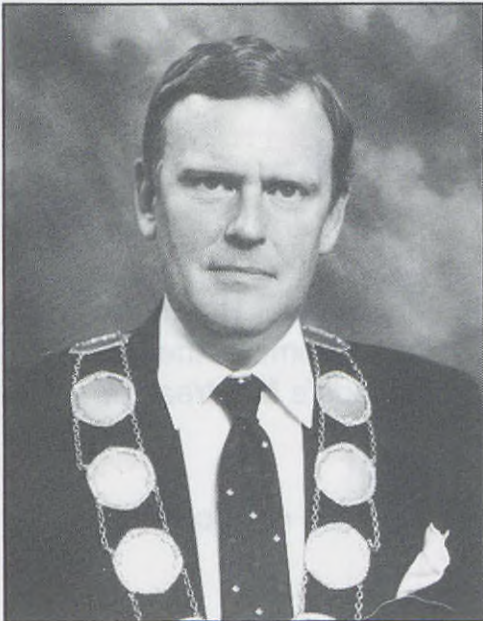

HAMILTON'S SCOTTISH HISTORY

The Scot is a restless breed. He or she cannot be content without improving what is. They must always explore, inventing, investigating something. Luckily Canada has been affected by their restlessness. As well as managing our fur trade, the Scot chartered our waterways and founded our cities. Lord Elgin, Governor General (1847-1854) played a vital role in establishing Responsible Government in Canada. The Scots were the dominating figures in the blending of the Provinces in Confederation, 1867. Canadians are indebted to them for the far-seeing statesmanship that made possible the framing of the British North America Act, making the Dominion of Canada a reality. Drawing on the persistence of Scotsman towards education, we owe to them the founding of such Canadian universities as McGill, Toronto, Queen's, Dalhousie and St.. Francis Xavier.

Inheritors of this same fabric has been the City of Hamilton. Following is a typical list of people prior to fifty years ago who helped to make Hamilton great.

Lord Aberdeen	Edinburgh	He opened Hamilton's first building used as a library.
St. Clair Balfour	Orkneys	His grocery business was the first to operate in the West.
William Bruce	Shetlands	Astronomer, who founded our first art gallery.
Isaac Buchanan	Glasgow	First president of the Board of Trade.
Janet Coupar	Edinburgh	Singularly successful novelist and poet.
John Crerar	Crieff	Founded the first "little theatre" in Canada.
John Cornelius	Edinburgh	Fantastically famous track and field coach.
Colin Ferrie	Glasgow	First elected mayor of the City of Hamilton.
Alexander Gale	Logie	Started the first Church of Scotland congregation.
David Gibson	Dumferline	Formed bricklayer's union, first in an American Union.
George Hamilton	Bolton	The Town of Hamilton named after him.
Archibald Kerr	Paisley	Helped form Canada's first life assurance company.
George Laing	Aberdeen	Landscape gardener for big residences like Dundurn.
Rob Macaulay	Fraserburg	Founded the Sun Life Assurance Company.
Donald MacInnes	Oban	A businessman who founded the Bank of Hamilton.
David McCulloch	Barrhead	Editor-in-chief of The Hamilton Spectator.
Thomas McIlwraith	Newton	Eminent ornithologist, director of Mechanics' Institute.
Robert Milne	unknown	Hamilton's most noted early photographer.
David Newlands	unknown	Contractor responsible of the city's sewer system.
William Ormiston	Symington	Presbyterian minister, first President Ham. Assoc.
John Rae	Foot Dee	Economist, first balloon experiment in Canada.
John Rae	Orkneys	Celebrated Arctic explorer, president of the H.A.
Alexander Ramsay	Edinburgh	Foremost figure in Canadian and U.S. life assurance.
James Russell	Old Monkland	Insane Asylum supt., teaching new methods.
Alexander Stewart	Erskine on Clyde	1894 mayor, died prospecting in the Yukon.
James Wallace	Kirkintilloch	Insane Asylum supt., present at Louis Riel trial.
James Whyte	unknown	First president Gore Bank, built Barton Lodge.
John Young	Galston	Merchant, founded St. Andrew's Pres. Church.



GLASGOW CELTIC Team Biography

Celtic F.C. was one of just five founder member clubs of The Scottish Football League still in existence, along with Dunbarton, Heart of Midlothian, Rangers and St. Mirren, and provided the League's first Secretary in John H. McLaughlin.

The opening round of fixtures on August 16, 1890 saw Celtic lose 4-1 to Renton at Celtic Park before a crowd of 10,000.

The subsequent years have seen Celtic set a host of League records. The six consecutive League titles won from 1904-05 to 1909-10 stood as a record until it was surpassed by the unforgettable nine-in-a-row notched up by the club between 1965-66 and 1973-74.

Their total of 90 goals in 36 league matches in the Premier Division of 1982-83 is a record shared with Dundee United. Four years later, Celtic again hit the 90-mark in a 44-game Premier Division program. though Celtic F.C. has traditionally concentrated more on scoring goals than preventing them, their record of just 14 conceded in 38 League games in 1913-14 is also the best in the League's 100-year history.

The League Cup, though not a source of much joy for the club in the past two decades, saw Celtic set records with five consecutive wins from 1965-66 to 1969-70 and an extraordinary 14 consecutive Final appearances from 1964-65 to 1977-78. Predictably, the club was also involved in the match which produced the biggest attendance in the League's history. A figure of 118,567 is recorded for the Rangers vs Celtic clash on January 2, 1939.

The club has had only six Managers — all of them former players — during its participation in the League. Star players whose performances won admiration throughout its 100-year history are numerous, Alec McNair, whose 583 League appearances is a club record, Patsy Gallagher, John Thomson, Willie and Jimmy McStay, Kenny Dalglish and Paul McStay are some of the club's outstanding players throughout the years.

Peter Grant

Peter is the third longest serving player at Celtic Park with over 10 years service to the club. Promoted from the boys club in 1982, he made his debut in April 1984 as an 18 year old and has rarely been out of the first team ever since. Notched up his 300th appearance for the club last term and he remains a committed Celt despite seeming set for a move south of the border as long ago as March 1992. He is a tenacious midfielder with tidy passing ability but can also deputize at right-back and in central defence.
