A PREVIOUS MEETING

WHEN Dundee visited Celtic Park on league duty on February 20, 1954 the teams lined up as follows: **CELTIC:** Bell, Haughney, Meehan, Evans, Stein, Peacock, Higgins, Fernie, Walsh, Tully, Mochan. **DUNDEE:** Brown, Fallon, Frew, Zeising, Malloy, Cowie, Carmichael, Gallacher, Merchant, Steel, Flavell.

Celtic started the match in third place on the league table with 25 points from 21 games, having won 11 and drawn three.

Dundee were only one place behind on the same points total having played one game more. Celtic had a far healthier goal difference having scored 40 and conceded 25 while Dundee had scored only 32 and conceded 34.

By the final whistle Celtic had added two points and five goals to their total, while the visitors from Dens Park had only found the net once. Celtic's scorers were Higgins, Fernie, Walsh and Mochan (2), while Merchant had scored for Dundee.

From the Manager...

TODAY we welcome Dundee to Celtic Park for our last home match of the season and a win is vitally important to both sides.

We must follow on from our five victories in a row to keep up our pressure on league leaders Hearts. Dundee are chasing points to give them a place as one of Scotland's representatives in next season's U.E.F.A. Cup competition.

From previous matches both here and at Dens Park we know that Dundee give nothing away without a fight. With a real prize in sight, they will make our task today a difficult one as we look for full points.

Today as I said sees our last home league match of the season and although we have been inconsistent over the season, at home as well as away, it would be nice to close with a victory. Even better would be to finish with a thrilling performance in real Celtic fashion.

At the time of writing we still do not have a definite date for the match at Fir Park, but it is likely to take place in the middle of the coming weeks.

WE would ask supporters who are sitting at the very back of the upper stand to leave via the exits at the top of the stand and thereby lessen the number of people leaving through the mid-stand exits.

Dundee's season so far

DUNDEE got off to the best possible start this season, beating St. Mirren 2-1 at home on August 10, thanks to two goals by Robert Connor, one from the penalty spot. Seven days later, however, things didn't look so bright when they travelled from Dens Park to Kilbowie Park and slumped to a 4-0 defeat at the hands of Clydebank.

They found their winning touch again on Wednesday August 21 when they narrowly beat Stranraer 3-2 away from home in the League Cup, but the following Saturday they were defeated again, losing 2-0 this time in a league match with local rivals Dundee United at Tannadice.

Then seven days after that victory at Stranraer, they went out of the League Cup, losing 2-1 to Hamilton Accies at Douglas Park.

August ended and September began with two league matches that threw up 3-1 results, but with exact opposite consequences for Dundee. August 31 they lost 3-1 to Aberdeen at home, then on September 7 goals by Brown, McCormack and Harvey gave the two points over Motherwell at Fir Park.

They collected two points again, this time at home, the following week when a John Brown goal was the only score in a visit by Hibs. This was followed by an away 1-0 victory over Rangers then a 2-0 defeat on Celtic's first visit of the season to Dens Park on September 28.

From four matches in October, Dundee picked up five of the eight points available, drawing 1-1 with Hearts in Edinburgh, losing 1-0 to St. Mirren in Paisley then beating Clydebank (2-0) and Motherwell (3-1) at Dens

Park in consecutive weeks.

November wasn't nearly as successful for the Dens Park men. They only collected two out of eight points in that month and those came in the last of the four matches when a John Brown hat-trick gave them a 3-2 victory over Rangers in Dundee. Before then, they had lost 2-1 to Hibs away from home, 4-1 to Aberdeen at Pittodrie, then 3-0 to Dundee United at home.

John Brown was the sole Dundee marksman for the second week in a row when he scored against Hearts at Dens Park on December 7, but this time he was joined on the list by team mates Harvey and Stephen as St. Mirren went down 3-1 at Dens Park.

In their next three matches, Dundee picked up three points without scoring a goal, drawing 0-0 with Clydebank away, Dundee United away then Aberdeen at home. Three days after that third draw, however, on January 4 Dundee suffered their worst defeat of the season going down 5-0 to Rangers to Ibrox. They recovered quickly for their next match and picked up two points with a 3-1 win over Hibs at Dens Park on January 11.

A 2-2 draw with Motherwell at Fir Park was followed by Dundee's first match in the season's Scottish Cup competition. They travelled away from home to play Nairn County and scored seven times to no reply. Their goals on that occasion were netted by Harvey (3), Shannon (2), Rafferty and Hendry.

On February 1, Ray Stephen scored from the penalty spot in a league match against Celtic at Dens Park, but the visitors netted three to claim full

points. A week later Dundee lost two points again this time at the hands of Hearts and again by a score of 3-1 with Vince Mennie scoring his first goal for the club.

February 19 saw Mennie score his second goal for Dundee, this time in a 2-0 Scottish Cup win over Airdrie at Dens Park. Three days later Ray Stephen scored both goals as Dundee travelled to Paisley to take two points from St. Mirren with a 2-1 win. Then it was back home to Dens and two more points with a 4-0 win over Clydebank.

The Scottish Cup had drawn Dundee against Aberdeen and on March 8 they drew 2-2 at Dens Park, but the Dens Park men went out four days later

going down 2-1 at Pittodrie.

A 2-1 home victory over Rangers followed in the league before Dundee shared the points with Aberdeen in a no-scoring draw at Pittodrie on March 22. Dundee United visited Dens Park on March 29 and collected full points with a victory due to the game's only goal, then Dundee went down 2-1 in a visit to Celtic Park on April 2.

In their bid to secure a place in Europe next season Dundee have played two league matches since that visit to Celtic Park. They lost 1-0 at Easter Road on April 12 then lost week goals by Glennie, Rafferty, Forsyth and Brown gave them a 4-0 victory over Motherwell at Dens Park.

Focus on ...

Eleven years of 'The Top Ten'

NEXT season the Premier League will take on a new look when two teams are promoted from the First Division and none are relegated from the top flight. This will make it a 12 team division after 11 seasons as Scotland's Top Ten.

In those seasons, apart from Celtic, 16 teams have played at Celtic Park on league duty. Only Celtic, Aberdeen, Dundee United and Rangers have been ever present in the Top Ten.

Hibs have missed only one season and St. Mirren have been out for only two seasons since the inception of the Premier League.

Today's visitors, Dundee, are one of the three teams who have competed in the Premier Division seven times, current leaders Hearts, and Motherwell are the other two.

Partick Thistle with six seasons out of eleven at the top are the only other side to have taken their total of visits to Celtic Park in the competition into double figures.

A quick glance at the tables on the facing page will show you that while Rangers have suffered the most defeats at Celtic Park in the Premier League, 12 out of 22 visits, Clydebank, Dumbarton and St. Johnstone have the worst success rate here, none of them having yet won a point.

In the case of Dumbarton that is from two visits while St. Johnstone and Clydebank have each visited on four occasions.

Aberdeen have the best record of all visitors here, having won seven times, drawn seven times and been beaten only eight times out of 22 visits.

Away from home, Celtic have only managed to beat one team, Airdrie, on every visit, winning four out of four. The least successful ground for Celtic in the league over the past 11 seasons has been Pittodrie, the home of Aberdeen, where they have only managed to win seven times and have shared the points four times, going down in 11 games.

Ibrox and Tannadice are the only other grounds where Celtic have failed to pick up more than 60 per cent of the honours available.

At Ibrox, seven wins and six draws have brought 45.45 per cent of the joy to Celtic fans while at Tannadice, the success rate stands at 47.73 per cent through nine victories and three draws.

At Celtic Park, Hibs have conceded most goals. The two on their visit last Saturday took that total to 51 in 20 games. Aberdeen have scored most of the 16 visitors here, netting 29 goals, one more in fact than Celtic have scored against them in Premier League confrontations in Glasgow.

In total to date Celtic have scored 437 goals at home in the Premier League and conceded 176, collecting 304 points.

Away from home, Celtic's happiest hunting ground for goals has been Fir Park where they have netted 34 times in 13 visits and have only conceded 20 goals to Motherwell.

In collecting 242 points away from home in the ten team league Celtic have scored 366 goals and conceded 239. That gives them goals totals of 803 for, 415 against and a points total of 546 from 786 so far available.
