GLASGOW CELTIC



PAUL BYRNE (Midfielder) — Born: 8/6/72 in Dublin. **Height:** 5' 9". **Weight:** 11st 6lb. **Signed:** May 1993. **Previous Club:** Bangor.

Talented Dubliner who was signed by Celtic having caught the eye with some outstanding displays for Irish League club Bangor. Skilful performer equally at home in midfield or up front. Joined Oxford United aged just 14 and made several reserve team appearances before being released. Joined Bangor at the start of the '91/92 season. Was tremendously influential, netting 25 goals and guiding them to unbeaten run which ended with Irish and League Cup successes as well as third spot in the table. Won all four major Northern Irish player of the year awards at end of campaign.

GLASGOW CELTIC

PAT BONNER

(Goalkeeper)

Born: 25/5/60 in Donegal.

Height: 6' 2". **Weight:** 13st 11lb.

Signed: July 1978.

Previous Club: Keadue Rovers.

The Republic of Ireland 'keeper is the longest serving Celtic player in the squad. Had been transferred at his own request at the end of the '91/'92 season but no move materialised. Returned to the first team in remarkable 5-4 away win over Falkirk and notched his 400th League appearance in the process. Now the Republic of Ireland's most capped player he looked set to leave Celtic at the end of last season but with the arrival of Tommy Burns he has remained at Parkhead.

GORDON MARSHALL

(Goalkeeper)

Born: 19/4/64 in Edinburgh.

Height: 6' 2". **Weight:** 12st.

Signed: August 1991.

Previous Club: Falkirk.

Lost his top team spot Packie Bonner, having ousted the Republic of Ireland keeper in November 1991. Started senior career with Rangers before joining East Stirling on loan and eventually East Fife on permanent basis. Moved to Falkirk for £65,000 in 1987 and was a Celtic target a year later but he remained at Brockville until August 1991 when he joined Celtic for £270,000. Former Scotland Youth international whose father also kept goal for Celtic in the early 1970s, he made his Scotland senior debut against Canada.

TOM BOYD

(Defender)

Born: 24/11/65 in Glasgow.

Height: 5' 11". **Weight:** 12st 8lb.

Signed: February 1992.

Previous Club: Chelsea.

Powerhouse attacking full-back with the versatility

to play either flank as well as in central defence or midfield. Played for Celtic Boys' club as a teenager but joined Motherwell on YTS in 1983. Made his debut the same season and turned out 252 times in League games for the Fir Park Club. Captained Motherwell to 1991 Scottish Cup triumph but then joined Chelsea in £800,000 deal. Played 23 league games for the English club before heading back north to Celtic in a swap deal involving Tony Cascarino. Debuted against Airdrie and quickly became a firm favourite with fans for his reliability and stamina. Didn't miss a single first team game from February '92 until a red card collected at Fir Park in April '93 resulted in an automatic ban. Became a Scotland regular in '92/'93, missing only the 5-0 defeat by Portugal through injury.

TONY MOWBRAY

(Defender)

Born: 22/11/63 in Saltburn.

Height: 6' 1". **Weight:** 13st.

Signed: November 1991.

Previous Club: Middlesbrough.

Towering no-nonsense centre-half who suffered desperately frustrating 1992/'93 season, making only a couple of fleeting appearances after injuring his right thigh in the Old Firm game at Ibrox on January 2. Before then he had missed only one game, the Skol Cup semi-final defeat by Aberdeen, through suspension. It was the second successive season he had been sidelined for a long spell through injury since signing for £1 million in November 1991. Made his debut in a 2-1 victory over Aberdeen and became an instant hit with the Celtic fans. Played his first full season for Middlesbrough in 1982/'83 at left-back but then switched to centre-half and was club captain during the traumatic but exciting times as a club facing extinction in the third division was transformed and earned promotion in successive seasons. Scored 26 goals in 348 League appearances for 'Boro who provided him with a testimonial against new club Celtic in August 1992..

MARK McNALLY

(Defender)

Born: 10/3/71 in Bellshill.

Height: 5' 9". **Weight:** 10st 7lb.

Signed: July 1988.

Previous Club: Celtic Boys' Club.

Solid defender who made rapid strides in central defence last term having generally been fielded at right-back in first team outings before then. Formed sound partnership with Mike Galloway as Celtic enjoyed their most consistent run of the season. Made the step from Celtic Old Boys' Club in 1987 and contributed to victories in BP Scottish Youth Cup, Glasgow Cup, Reserve League Cup before receiving a surprise call-up to the first team in November 1990. Went on to make another 21 first team appearances and was called-up for Scotland under-21s. Missed spells of each of the past two seasons through injury but clearly has a part to play in the season ahead.

MIKE GALLOWAY

(Defender)

Born: 30/5/65 in Oswestry.

Height: 6'. **Weight:** 13st.

Signed: June 1989.

Previous Club: Heart of Midlothian.

Tough and reliable competitor who established himself as a regular in central defence last term after a season spent filling a variety of roles. Only missed teams through suspension or injury and made a determined effort to cut down on the avoidable bookings which have marred his disciplinary record over previous seasons. Made 54 league appearances with Mansfield Town and 79 with Halifax Town before joining Hearts in 1987. Scored eight goals in 56 Premier Division outings then signed for Celtic for £500,000 in 1989. Made his full international debut against Romania in October 1991.

JOHN COLLINS

(Midfielder)

Born: 31/1/68 in Galashiels.

Height: 5' 7". **Weight:** 9st 10lb.

Signed: July 1990.

Previous Club: Hibernian.

Undoubted player of the year last season when he missed only one game at club level and established himself in the Scottish international side. One of few Celtic players who significantly enhanced his reputation in a disappointing term for the club. Celtic Boys' Club player as a teenager, he switched to Hutchison Vale in Edinburgh when father broke a leg and could no longer drive him from Galashiels home to Glasgow for games. Joined Hibernian in 1984 and made 163 League appearances, scoring 16 goals, between 1985 and '90 before becoming Celtic's record signing at £925,000. Has missed very few games in his spell at Parkhead, demonstrating his versatility by filling in at left-back when required as well as performing with composure either in central midfield or on the left.

PAT MCGINLAY

(Midfielder)

Born: 30/5/67 in Glasgow.

Height: 5' 10". **Weight:** 11st 10lb.

Signed: July 1993.

Previous Club: Hibernian.

Classy midfielder who made no secret of his ambition to join Celtic and finally had his wish when Liam Brady signed him on July 30, 1993. Came on as a sub the following day against Sheffield Wednesday, did likewise three days later against Manchester United and his competitive debut was also as a sub against Motherwell at Fir Park. Scored his first goal for Celtic nine minutes after coming on a sub against Stirling Albion at Firhill in the League Cup. Freed by Blackpool in 1988 but made the grade with Hibs.

PAUL McSTAY

(Midfielder)

Born: 22/10/64 in Hamilton.

Height: 5' 10". **Weight:** 10st 7lb.

Signed: July 1981.

Previous Club: Celtic Boys' Club.

Club captain and second longest-serving player

GLASGOW CELTIC

who still remains undoubtedly one of the best midfielders in Scotland. Graduated from Celtic Boys' Club in 1981 and made his first team debut the following January. An ever-present from the start of the '82/'83 term and has missed only a handful of games apart from the beginning of the '91/'92 campaign when sidelined by a serious knee injury. Was appointed club captain in January 1990 but has yet to lead the side to a trophy. Made his Scotland senior debut in 1983 and has been a regular ever since.

PETER GRANT
(Midfielder)

Born: 30/8/65 in Bellshill.

Height: 5' 9". **Weight:** 10st 3lb.

Signed: July 1982.

Previous Club: Celtic Boys' Club.

One of the longest serving players at Celtic Park with over 12 years' service to the club. Promoted from the boys' club in 1982, made his debut in April 1984 as a 19-year-old and has rarely been out of the first team ever since. Notched up his 300th appearance for the club last term and remains a committed Celtic player despite seeming set for a move south of the border as long ago as March 1992. Tenacious midfielder with tidy passing ability but can also deputise at right-back and in central defence.

BRIAN O'NEILL
(Midfielder)

Born: 6/9/72 in Dublin.

Height: 6'. **Weight:** 12st 4lb.

Signed: October 1989.

Previous Club: Celtic Boys' Club.

Gifted midfielder who can also play in central defence and is sure to make a major impact in the years ahead. Vision and physique beyond his years, he has looked very much at home alongside such as McStay in the engine room. Graduated from Celtic Boys' Club and hit the headlines during Scotland's impressive run to the final of the under-16 World Youth Cup in June 1989. Spent two seasons in the

reserves then established himself in the first team squad in '91/'92, earning a call-up to the Scotland under-21 side.

CHARLIE NICHOLAS
(Forward)

Born: 30/12/61 in Glasgow.

Height: 5' 9". **Weight:** 11st.

Signed: July 1994.

Outstandingly gifted striker who joined Celtic from the boys' club in 1980 and made the first team breakthrough the following season in spectacular fashion. Missed much of the following term with a broken leg but then scored 48 goals in the '82/'83 term to become the most-sought after player in Britain. Joined Arsenal for £750,000 but never reproduced the sparking form despite enjoying modest success at Highbury. Returned to Scotland after four and a half years when he signed for Aberdeen for £500,000 in December 1987 and was the country's leading scorer in 1988/'89. Rejoined Celtic for £500,000 in July 1990 where he collected a Scottish Cup and Skol Cup winners medal. Last season he was again on his travels but recently signed for Celtic for a third time when Tommy Burns brought him back to Parkhead.

EAMON DONNELLY
(Forward)

Born: 1/12/74 in Glasgow.

Height: 5' 7". **Weight:** 10st.

Signed: July 1992.

Previous Club: Queen's Park.

Confident striker with a great eye for goal and rapidly improving all-round ability. While playing schools football he was given his chance by Queen's Park and then, recommended by Eddie Hunter, impressed as a trialist in pre-season under-20 tournament, with Celtic in Geneva in 1992 and joined the groundstaff. Ability to hit the target at youth and, in limited appearances for the reserve team quickly marked him down as one to watch. Progress during term earned him a two-year professional contract.

THE DATE THAT BELONGS TO **CELTIC**

On an unforgettable night in Lisbon, Celtic climaxed an astonishing season by becoming the first club from Britain to win the European Cup.

There have been many proud, wonderful, glorious and memorable days and dates in the long and glowing history of Celtic since the club, then a modest undertaking, was formed under the imposing title of the Glasgow Football and Athletic Club. That was away back in 1888 and the club came into existence with a primary objective of providing funds and food for the needy poor of Glasgow's East End.

But the day and date now enshrined in the great history is, unquestionably, Thursday, May 25th, 1967.

On an unforgettable night in Lisbon, Celtic climaxed an astonishing season by becoming the first club from Britain to win the European Cup ... or as the late and beloved Jock Stein, who managed Celtic that night, always liked to say ... "The European Champion Club Cup" and as he put it: "This is the name that matters ... the big one ... this is only for the best, for champions".

In that 1966-'67 season Celtic were at their greatest. In the League they lost only two games, both to Dundee United and scored 111 goals in 34 matches ... in the Cup they scored 18 goals in reaching the final and in this with two goals from Willie Wallace, they took the trophy against Aberdeen ... in the League Cup final they beat Rangers 1-0 and in the Glasgow Cup they won with win over Rangers, Partick Thistle and Queen's Park.

But those honours, great though they were, were to be surpassed on the superb night in Lisbon...

In the preliminary round of the European Cup, Celtic beat FC Zurich by 2-0 and 3-0 and in

the first round they eliminated FC Nantes on a 6-2 aggregate score.

In the second round, however, Celtic ran into a small bit of bother, losing by 1-0 in the first game against Vojvodina but in the second leg Steve Chalmers and Billy McNeill got the goals that put Celtic into the semi-finals against the famous Dukla of Czechoslovakia.

In the first game at home Celtic swept to a 3-1 win with two goals from Willie Wallace and one from Jimmy Johnstone and qualified comfortably for the final against Inter-Milan with a second leg win by 1-0 in Prague.

And so the scene was set for the Final on Thursday, May 25th, 1967... And that was the night that was to take Ronnie Simpson, Jim Craig, Tommie Gemmill, Bobby Murdoch, Billy McNeill, John Clark, Jimmy Johnstone, Willie Wallace, Steve Chalmers, Bertie Auld and Bobby Lennox into the folklore of Scottish football.

The stories, still told today, about Celtic's support that night in Lisbon are legend ... a British Embassy official was later quoted as saying: "For days after Celtic's victory, it seemed that everytime we opened a cupboard a Celtic supporter would fall out" ... it took many days to get all the fans back to Glasgow, money was spent, passports were lost ... it was an incredible celebration.

But for the Celtic supporters, the troubles, the pains, perhaps the headaches were all worth it ... it was a night to be relished and remembered ... and of course it was a special triumph for "The Big Man" — Jock Stein.

Mazzola put Inter-Milan into the lead with a

penalty after eight minutes ... but from there on they were under tremendous pressure from Celtic who came forward in a succession of attacks.

And Celtic's relentless drive forward eventually paid off in the second half when Tommie Gemmill drove in a shot that Inter's goalkeeper Sarti never had a chance of stopping.

And then in a dramatic grandstand finish Celtic took the Cup. Bobby Murdoch broke through with just five minutes to go and sent in a shot which was delicately deflected by Steve Chalmers and for the second time Sarti was left without a chance of

saving. It is on record now that the moat around the pitch and the armed police cordons failed lamely to mount any form of obstacle in the way of Celtic's supporters and within minutes of the finish the ground had become a joyous mass of green-and-white.

And Celtic had achieved the supreme "first" of British football ... after 12 years of domination by Spain, Portugal and Italy, the European Cup, for the first time, was on its way from the mainland of Europe and on the way to the trophy room of Celtic.

A day and a date to be remembered with pride.

SOMETHING MYSTIC **FLAMENGO**

that it ends up becoming the 12th player of the team.

In 1895, 99 years ago, Flamengo Regatta Club (Clube de Regatas do Flamengo) was already born a winner. The victories happened then in the smooth waters of Guanabara Bay. Football didn't exist in the red and black colours and the most popular sport of that time was rowing. Only in 1911 did Flamengo's football team start playing. In less than 3 years it was organised and got its first title. Besides being considered one of the great clubs of the country and having the greatest number of fans, Flamengo is also proud of its sport complex. Its headquarters with 70,000 square metres, are located in the noblest area of Rio de Janeiro. Its premises are composed of gyms, swimming pools and a football field, besides tennis courts and some other areas. All of them are prepared for the best performance of its athletes. Flamengo members have, nowadays, modern headquarters located across from one of the most beautiful post-

cards of the city — "Rodrigo de Freitas Lagoon". It was built to offer its members new leisure options. Besides the headquarters Flamengo is already constructing its future. Honouring its slogan "Flamengo makes its own cracks", building work of the "Integrated Training Centre" is almost finished. Its a 52,000m2 area exclusively for football practice. It will be the most complete football athletes formation centre in the world with sufficient infrastructure to room professionals and young prospects. This is Flamengo Regatta Club (Clube de Regatas do Flamengo).

Through its president, Luiz Augusto Veloso, the club has been trying to take more dynamic actions. Investing in formation of new athletes, in marketing and in a solid administration, Flamengo searches for modernity. It aims to be even greater.

In 1995 Flamengo will complete 100 years of titles and victories. Can you imagine what the celebration will be like?
