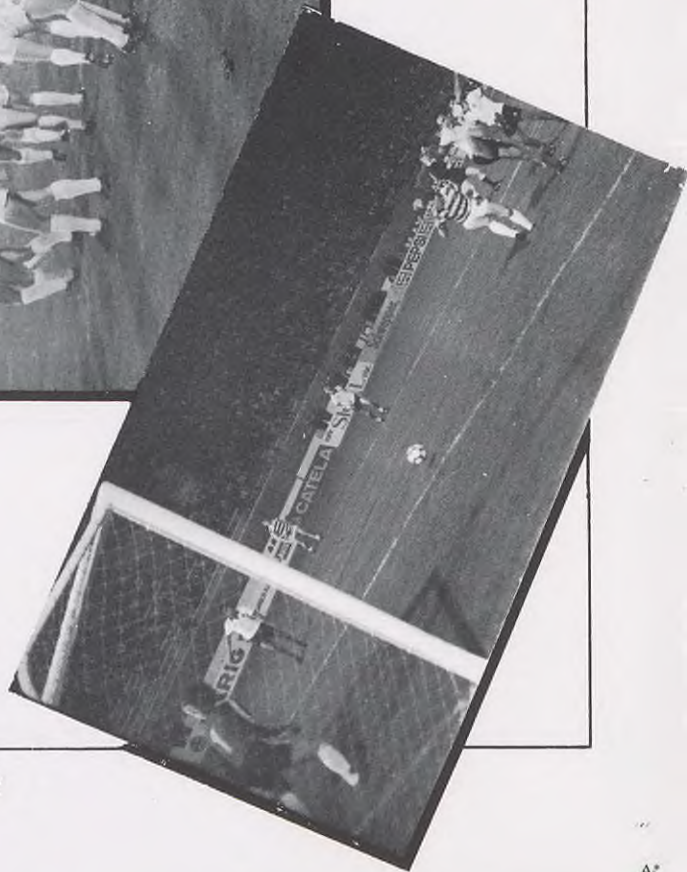
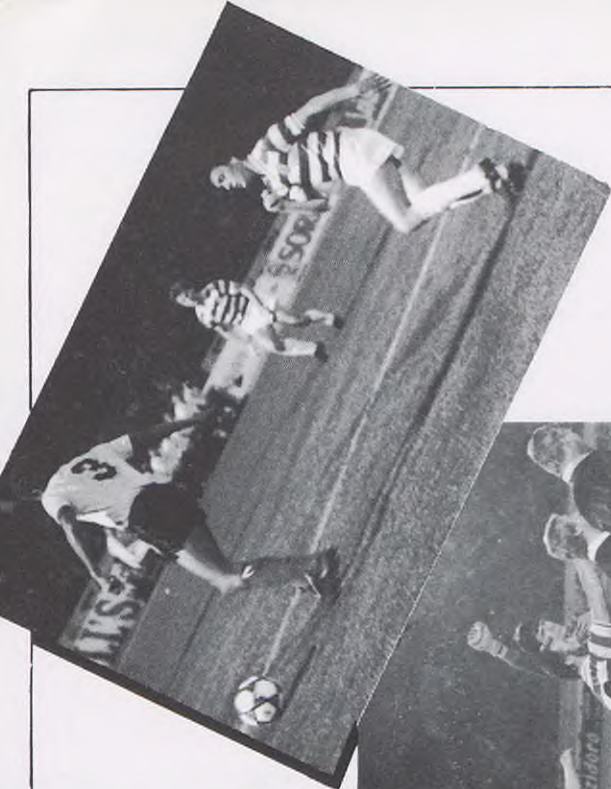

Chairman's Welcome



WHEN Celtic Football Club visited the city of Lisbon in Portugal two weeks ago, it was not only a chance to take a trip down memory lane, but also gave us the chance to make new friends among the officials of Sporting Lisbon. Apart from the very important and disappointing fact that we lost by two goals to nil, it was a memorable trip and one which our hosts made sure we enjoyed.

With this in mind I extend a most sincere welcome to the directors, officials and players of Sporting Lisbon on behalf of the directors, management and playing staff of Celtic.

Following our fine away win over Aarhus in Denmark in the first round, only three weeks passed before we found ourselves facing tonight's visitors on their home territory. We have been going through a sticky spell recently, but it is at times like these that the true Celtic spirit comes to the fore and we all get together with one aim in mind - victory.

Sporting Lisbon are undoubtedly a good football team and our players must rise to this challenge and put recent poor results into the background. During the first leg in Lisbon, we held our own for a long time and had our chances to threaten the home side's goal. Towards the end of the first half however, we conceded a goal and during the second half we lost our grip completely and at times it looked as though we might lose by a greater margin than 2-0.

Our first round away victory over Aarhus of Denmark demonstrated that the team is capable of a top-class performance.

So a convincing win is what is needed from the team tonight. While hoping we can get a favourable result, I also hope that the match provides the kind of attacking football that Celtic crowds have grown to appreciate and that you all go home with something to celebrate.

1967 AND ALL THAT



THE medals pictured on this page make a fine collection. Any team would be proud to have won these within a decade. Any player would be overjoyed to think that he would own them at the end of his career.

All these do belong to one man, but amazingly he won them all in one season as part of that incredible team who became known as the "Lisbon Lions".

That nickname that conjures up so much romance in the hearts of Celtic supporters every time they hear it was coined because on May 25, 1967 at the National Stadium in Lisbon Celtic made history by becoming the first British club ever to win the European Cup.

To claim victory in that final, Celtic beat Inter Milan by two goals to one. These medals are the property of the man who scored the winning goal six minutes from the end of play, Stevie Chalmers.

We also have pictured here, the Scottish Cup, Scottish League Cup, Scottish League Championship and Glasgow Cup winners'

medals. The other is a medal specially made to mark a season when Celtic came out winners in every competition they entered.

The Scottish League Championship was won by playing 36 games, winning 26, losing only two, and drawing six, with the goals totals of 111 for, 33 against, and a points total of 58.

In the Scottish Cup, victories over Arbroath, Elgin City, Queen's Park and Clyde saw Celtic face Aberdeen in the final at Hampden Park. They won 2-0.

The Scottish League Cup saw victories over Hearts, Clyde, St Mirren, Dunfermline and Airdrie, before a meeting with Rangers at Hampden for the final, which Celtic won 1-0.

The Glasgow Cup was won through three 4-0 victories over Rangers, Queen's Park and Partick Thistle.

During the year that made Lisbon so dear to Celtic fans, Celtic were only defeated on three occasions, once in the European Cup (1-0) by Vojvodina of Yugoslavia and twice in the League (3-2 on each occasion) by Dundee United.
