Last season we were criticised by a small number of supporters who felt that all we did was ask them to buy/sell tickets. I am very sorry that some people feel that way but unfortunately fundraising is a necessary evil to help raise funds for the Club. I would stress that all monies raised through fundraising goes directly into the Club coffers and is used for various activities, i.e. it helps to buy players, pay rent etc., etc.. Once again, I would ask you to help us by participating in this draw and reiterate that all your support is very necessary. I am most appreciative of everything you do.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those of you who have already purchased Patrons/Season Tickets for the forthcoming season. Those who purchase Season Tickets this season are entitled to attend all league and cup games, along with friendlies and home games in our European campaign. I hope you all enjoy this afternoon's game.

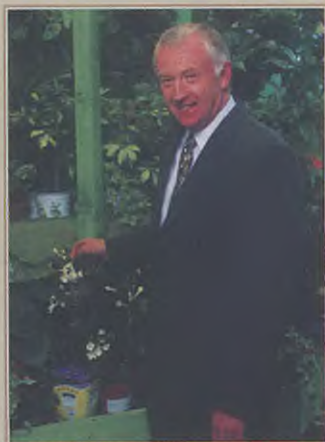

Former Hoops custodian Pat Dunne once again rejoins the club, this time as goalkeeper coach.

A LOOK AT THE CELTIC SQUAD

GOALKEEPER:

20 Robert Douglas

Born: Lanark 26.4.1972

Began his career goalkeeping career with Forth Wanderers before joining Meadowbank Thistle in 1993. Made 77 appearances for Thistle and was involved in their metamorphic transition to Livingston before signing up with Dundee. His outstanding form at Dens Park earned him consideration for the full Scotland squad, an achievement realised in May 2002 under Berti "Mc" Vogts in the Far East tour. "Rab" has also represented Scotland at "B" level. He joined Celtic in 2000 and after a tentative beginning; Rab has settled into the Celtic side and his assured display in Valencia last November, among many others, has assured his place in 'Tic folklore.

1 Jonathan Gould

Born: Paddington 18.7.1968

Signed by Wim Jansen as cover for the injured Gordon Marshall and Stewart Kerr at the beginning of 1997/98 from Bradford City, but quickly established himself as Celtic number one in the League / League Cup double triumph that year. A product of Clevedon Town, Jonathan turned professional with Halifax Town and also played for WBA, Coventry City and Gillingham (on loan) before his spell at Bradford. Signed a contract extension in the last year and more than able competition for Douglas' position.

DEFENCE:

2 Sir Thomas Boyd MBE

Born: Glasgow 24.11.1965

Promoted to club captain in the wake of Paul McStay's retirement, Boyd is the model professional and a valuable member of the defensive unit. Urged by O'Neill to delay his departure for another season, he is an excellent role model for Stephen Craaney, among others. Boyd has been outstanding at sweeper or at full back since joining from Chelsea in February 1992. He also captained Motherwell to a Scottish Cup win in 1991. A member of the SFA Hall of Fame, Boyd has amassed over 70 caps for Scotland. Awarded MBE in 2002 for services to football.

5 Joos Valgaeren

Born: Leuven 3.3.1976

When Martin O'Neill took up the reigns at Celtic Park he was still tied up with punditry for the BBC at Euro 2000 and many thought that would get in the way of his first pre-season with Celtic. However, it was while over in Holland and Belgium that he spotted the talents of FC Roda defender Valgaeren and, for a reported £3.8m, unearthed a bargain. Unfortunate to miss the 2002 World Cup through injury, he has been outstanding at the heart of the Celtic defence and his goals in recent Auld Firm encounters have endeared him to the Parkhead faithful.

6 Dianbobo Balde

Born: Marseille 10.5.1975

The cries of "Bobo's gonnae getcha...Bobo'll bite your bum" echo throughout all SPL grounds now and are almost as familiar as the Magnificent 7 theme-tune. Signed from Toulouse at the beginning of 2001/02. A towering, fearsome and athletic presence, Balde gelled quickly into the Celtic side for a nominal fee, pending arbitration at the French side. League winner and defensive stalwart in season 2001/02. An awesome competitor...

35 Johan Mjallby

Born: Sweden 9.2.1971

A rock for both club and country since joining from AIK Stockholm in November 1998 after an impressive performance against England. Has excelled since O'Neill made him a pivotal figure in the Hoops defence from midfield. Made his full home / Celtic debut in a certain 5-1 pounding of Rangers. Near certain to be named in the FIFA team of the tournament after series of impressive displays in Japan/Korea.

40 Stephen Craaney

Born: Glasgow 22.6.1981

Graduated from the youth ranks at Parkhead. The left-sided defender has been impressive and composed and has staked a claim in the Celtic side particularly over the last term after a string of excellent performances at home and in Europe. A definite for future greatness if he continues to improve at this level. Earned his full Scotland cap with a call-up in the defeat to France in Paris in 2002.

MIDFIELD:

18 Neil Lennon

Born: Lurgan 25.6.1971

Displayed great inner strength after incessant taunts by certain section of the Northern Ireland crowd following his move from Leicester City. Began his career as an apprentice at Motherwell, returned home to play for Glenavon before earning another youth contract with Manchester City. He made the breakthrough with Crewe Alexandra under the shrewd tutelage of Dario Gradi and was recruited by O'Neill at Leicester City in 1996. Reunited with O'Neill in December 2000 after League Cup successes in England, he won back to back league titles as well as a league cup / Scottish cup in 2001/01. A true Celtic legend, he typifies Celtic spirit in high levels of consistency, character and an intense will to win.

14 Paul Lambert

Born: Glasgow 7.8.1969

Lambert is one of European football's greats in the holding role of the defensive side of midfield. European Cup winner with Borussia Dortmund in 1997, he spent his formative years at St. Mirren before winning 11 Scotland under-21 caps. Joined Motherwell and then to Germany before returning home in November 1997. Captains his side at both club and international level and was recently coaxed out of international retirement by Vogts. A determined performer who exudes confidence and an air of defensive authority alongside Lennon, he is truly impregnable...

19 Stilian Petrov

Born: Bulgaria 5.7.1979

One of John Barnes' more astute acquisitions, the Bulgarian has been proclaimed by no higher a rank as fellow countryman Hristo Stoichkov as East European football's finest midfielder. Has already captained his nation and though his move from CSKA Sofia was delayed over his eligibility for a work permit, he has proven time and time again to have been a diamond worth waiting for. Former SPL Young Player of the Year, he has overcome the setback of a broken leg and his performances since, if anything, have ameliorated.

8 Alan Thompson

Born: Newcastle 22.12.1973

A need to strengthen the Celtic midfield saw this ball-winning competitor, with a not to be underestimated eye for goal, saw Thompson's recruitment from Aston Villa in 2000. He was originally on Newcastle United's books, but it was with Bolton Wanderers that he made his name with 33 goals from 157 appearances,

which earned him several England under-21 caps. Overcame setback of being sent off in Old Firm encounter in 2001/01 by clinching the winner in Parkhead to virtually seal one-third of the historic treble. Adept at set pieces and in left wing back / left side of centre midfield.

15 Bobby Petta

Born: Rotterdam 6.8.1974

Petta spent three years at Ipswich Town and signed for Celtic under the Bosman ruling by Barnes. He has been capped at Under-18 and Under-21 for Holland and has had to withdraw from many Dutch squads because of injury. Certain to be capped for Holland this season though. Despite a slow beginning, has been offered a new lease of life under O'Neill in left-wing back position. Just ask Fernando...

4 Jackie McNamara

Born: Glasgow 24.10.1973

A bargain buy from Dunfermline by former boss Tommy Burns, the marauding defender, who can also perform in both centre midfield and wide right, captured the Player's Player of the Year award in the championship winning side of 1997/98. McNamara went from Gairdoch United to Dunfermline in 1991 before making the move to Celtic Park for a fee of £600,000. A current full Scotland international, he is noted for his swift, constructive and skilful play and represented Scotland in France '98.

24 Colin Healy

Born: Cork 14.3.1980

Spotted by scouts in Ballincolligh, Cork, Healy made a swift progression through the youth ranks at Celtic Park and made his first team debut against Dunfermline in May 1999. He netted in a man of the match performance in the CIS League Cup match against Hearts in Tynecastle (5-2) and was an influential component of the side when Celtic beat Kilmarnock 3-0 to lift the trophy. Earned his full international cap this term after under-age success with Brian Kerr. Excelled whilst on-loan at Coventry City last term, he was unlucky to miss out on selection in Ireland's eastern odyssey. As much a victim of McCarthy's loyalty to less capable players as he was to Roy Keane's delayed indecision. An unequivocal star in the making for both club and country.

17 Didier Agathe

Born: Saint Pierre 16.8.1975

Could very well prove to be the best bit of business that Martin O'Neill will ever do. The French midfielder came to Scotland in August 1999 from Montpellier. He joined Raith Rovers and then Hibernian where his impressive form (4 goals in 3 games) saw him move to Celtic for

next to nothing. Impressed in the Champions League and a call-up to the full French squad remains a distinct possibility in the near future. One of the fastest performers in world football with power, persistence and precision also.

FORWARD:

7 Henrik Larsson

Born: Helsingborg 20.9.1971

Take every superlative ever written, add 10 more and then multiply that by 100 and you might come close to describing one of World football's finest strikers. He has firmly established himself as a living legend to the adoring Celtic support thanks to his prolific goal scoring achievements and his incredible work-rate. The Golden Shoe winner (52 goals in 2001/01) with the Midas touch in front of goal, he was signed from Feyenoord by Wim Jansen in July 1997 for a mere £650,000. He became the first player to score 100 goals for Celtic since Kenny Dalglish achieved the same feat in 1976. A proven match-winner who thrives on pressure, like his fellow countryman Mjallby, he represented Sweden with distinction, including 3 goals in the recent World Cup, before announcing his retirement from international football. Disappointing season with a meagre 30-odd last season, he really needs to prove himself this term!

9 Chris Sutton

Born: Nottingham 10.3.1973

One of Celtic's most versatile performers, equally adept in either defence, midfield but especially in attack. An England international, Sutton has excelled since his move from Chelsea in July 2000. He started his career with Norwich City (35 goals in 102 League games) before winning the 1995 Premiership title with Blackburn Rovers as one half of the prolific SAS (Sutton and Shearer) partnership. Though his form last term was again excellent, he was hampered by injury and he will be keen to return to full fitness to help launch Celtic's assault on the Champions League.

10 John Hartson

Born: Swansea 5.4.1975

Wales international Hartson has endeared himself to the Parkhead faithful with a fine run of form on the back of Sutton's injuries last term. The £6m signing from Coventry City has managed to curb his off-field indiscretions and was an influential part of last year's retention of the SPL title. The former Luton Town, Arsenal, West Ham and Wimbledon striker scored more than twenty goals last term and remains one of the most potent finishers in the British game.

12 David Miramontez Fernandez

Born: Spain 20.1.76

O'Neill bought Fernandez in the close season after a long pursuit for a little over £1m on a 4-year deal. Fernandez can operate as part of a front two or just behind the forward line. He was brought over to Scotland by Steve Archibald from Deportivo La Coruna and joined Airdrie before moving to Livingston.

29 Shaun Maloney

Born: Malaysia 24.1.1983

The youngster has kept his place in the first team squad this season and has impressed with his performances on the park and his attitude off it. The 19-year-old made his debut in the 3-0 defeat of Rangers in Ibrox the season before last and has, since then, proved to be an exciting addition to the first team squad. He scored 4 goals in Celtic's 8-0 thrashing of Stirling Albion in the 3rd round of last seasons competition. Despite keen courtship by the English FA, he unhesitatingly declared for Scotland and may well achieve full honours soon.

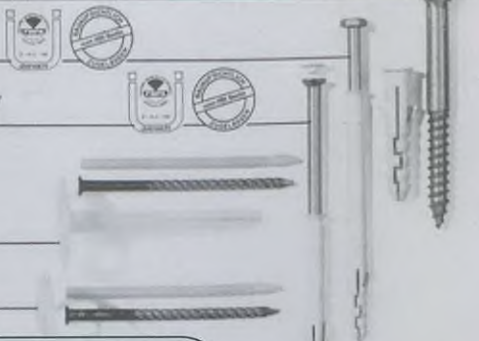
