EDITORIAL

ALL SQUARE

To-night we open our home programme for Season 1964-65 by welcoming Celtic in the only "all square" section of the League Cup.

Like ourselves, Celtic drew their first match and will be very keen to go one better this time. Both our meetings in the Scottish League last season also ended in draws, and the rival supporters at Tynecastle will at least have one wish in common—to see this "all square" situation ended.

Though official figures are not available yet, it appears that in spite of increased admission charges the opening matches were watched by more specta-

tors than on the corresponding day last year—an encouraging start as the 1963 figure was boosted by the large attendance at a meeting of the "Old Firm" in Glasgow.

We hope that the fare offered here, and on all other grounds, will strengthen this trend.

This will be our first appearance at Tynecastle since the New York Tournament—so a big welcome, please, for the men who upheld Scottish prestige across the Atlantic—and for Chris Shevlane, the youngest player ever to captain Hearts.

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TEN YEARS AGO . . .

It is exactly ten years since Hearts, by winning the League Cup, began their successful assault on the major honours in a great spell which brought the Scottish Cup, two League championships and four League Cups to Tynecastle.

It is my sincere hope that the start of this season will prove the prelude to another period of great attainments.

Though football is fighting against many counter-attractions today the rewards have never been greater, and on behalf of my colleagues and the whole staff at Tynecastle, I can assure you that everything possible will be done to ensure that the Heart of Midlothian club answers the challenge of an exciting age in football.

Since the last championship came to Tynecastle in 1960 it has been our good fortune to earn a fair share of what are now known as "incentive rewards."

Our players have kept in the swim, as it were, by gaining experience of the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup and—for the first time this year—the New York International Soccer Tournament.

The honour of representing Scotland in such tournaments is highly prized but it is our determination to strive for even greater rewards in the future.

In these days of rising costs and diminishing attendances, such an ambition could not be attained without additional revenue. In common with all members of the Scottish League, Hearts have been forced to increase admission prices. We are well aware that such a step can achieve its purpose only if the "customer" is given better value for his money in the long run.

Our resolve to meet this demand is greatly encouraged by the success of the Tynecastle Development Fund, which, from now on, will be com-

plemented by the Heart of Midlothian Development Fund.

This year has seen the inception of a new competition, the Scottish Summer Cup. Its undoubted success gives us particular satisfaction as the proposal for the tournament was made by this club. I venture to suggest that the Summer Cup will enjoy even greater success in the future.

In wishing all connected with the club a happy and successful season I would like particularly to congratulate Jim Cruickshank, Davie Holt and Chris Shevlane on their international recognition.

In the legislative field, congratulations and good wishes are due our colleague on the board of directors, Mr N. G. Kilgour, on attaining the dual distinction of presiding over the Scottish League and the International Selection Committee.

Season's Review

Hearts finished better than they started in 1963-64. A somewhat disappointing season was followed by more encouraging form in the so-called close season, in which we topped a strong section in the Scottish Summer Cup and ended as good runners-up in what was acknowledged to be much the more powerful of the two sections in the New York Soccer Tournament.

Yes, our summer performances gave grounds for satisfaction... but we did not get off to a bright start. Failure to qualify for the knock-out stages of the League Cup was followed by a quick exit from the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup.

In the October-November period, too many League points were lost, to leave the team with only the slimmest chance of being in at the finish of the championship race. Further disappointment followed with our exit in the second round of the Scottish Cup, knocked out at home by Motherwell after forcing a draw at Fir Park.

Yet there was a bright side to the story. The acquisition of Tommy White from St Mirren gave us a consistency which had been missing for some time at centreforward and, starting with a memorable "double" in our victory at Ibrox, the popular Musselburgh leader embarked on a highly successful spell which saw him score slightly more than an average of a goal a game until he was injured in a road accident early in March.

White's success also gave our leading scorer, Willie Wallace, more freedom in his role as a marksman and it is worth noting that this profitable partnership realised 52 goals.

Johnny Hamilton, now our longest-serving forward by a matter of six years, had one of his best seasons since joining Hearts and celebrated it by chalking up his 100th goal during the winter.

On the left wing, Tommy Traynor fulfilled the promise he had shown in the previous season and is now established as one of the best outside lefts in the country.

The team owed a great deal to the goalkeeper and backs. Davie Holt recaptured his best form and was deservedly recalled to the international scene.

Jim Cruickshank fully justified his promotion to full international status, and it seems only a matter of time before similar recognition is afforded Chris Shevlane, who has matured into a first-class defender after only one full season in top-class football.

This was probably Willie Polland's best season since joining Hearts. Given

the chance to settle down at right half alongside Roy Barry, this versatile defender responded by making the job his own.

With Billy Higgins, John Cumming, Danny Ferguson challenging for places, a very healthy state of affairs can be reported in defence.

Nor was there any shortage of contenders for places in the attack. With four forwards beginning to wear that "regular" look there were three claimants for the remaining position—Alan Gordon, Jim Murphy and Frank Sandeman, not forgetting that Danny Ferguson and John Cumming have become old hands at operating in the No. 8 jersey when the situation calls for special tactics.

Away again

Eliminated in the first round of the Second XI Cup at Dunfermline last season, our Reserves face another difficult trip this time. They travel to Tannadice to face Dundee United... The winners will be at home to Queen's Park in the second round.

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CELTIC ON THE VERGE

Like ourselves, Celtic were among the principal challengers in the championship race last season and have good grounds for hoping to do better this time.

Youth is on their side and the experience of last season's highly creditable campaign in the European Cup-Winners' Cup, in which they reached the semi-finals, should prove most valuable.

They were the only British club to reach this stage in any of the major Continental tournaments and we take this opportunity of wishing our visitors every success this season in the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup.

Tonight we expect a hard and interesting game from opponents who, except in the matter of goal average, finished all square with Hearts in the League competition. Both our meetings ended in draws, and the two clubs finished level on points.

There is an abundance of personality in the team. Centre half and captain Billy McNeill has gone from strength to strength as an international defender during the past few seasons and seems certain to prove a key figure in Scotland's World Cup side.

For most of last season, Jim Kennedy had the unusual experience of playing left back for his country and left half for the club.

Rapidly establishing himself as one of the best goalkeepers in the First Division is red-headed John Fallon, who reached heights of brilliance in some of the Cup-Winners' Cup ties. A serious injury to former Scotland goalkeeper Frank Haffey gave John his chance and it did not take him long to shed the "deputy" label.

With better-known names stealing the headlines at Celtic Park, the two young backs Ian Young and Tommy Gemmill, and right back John Clark may not be national figures yet... but a glance at Celtic's goals-against column proves that there is not a weak link in this compact defence.

A few years ago it seemed that big John Hughes was destined for major international honours as a centre forward, while Steve Chalmers was on the fringe of recognition in his role as an outside right.

Today Chalmers is a centre forward with a growing reputation as a marksman and Hughes, once leader of

Scotland's Under-23 attack, has moved to Celtic's left wing—and incidentally, earned further recognition in the Scottish Colts' side in this role.

It is generally agreed that a previously promising but erratic Celtic attack began to click with a vengeance last autumn when Chalmers moved into the middle and Hughes began to prove that a man of his giant stature can operate successfully on the wing.

Celtic, in fact, have the honour of supplying Scotland Under-23's with both their wingers as wee Jimmy Johnstone has gained Under-23 ranking in the No. 7 jersey.

Last season, too, saw the emergence of inside right Bobby Murdoch as a regular member of the Celtic attack, and the ability of this strong young forward was deservedly recognised by inclusion in the Scottish team which played England's Under-23's.

It was no coincidence that so many Celtic forwards attracted the selectors' approval, for this attack has the happy knack of getting goals. In these days of "strikers and schemers" the Celtic forward line breaks away from the mould—for it fires on all cylinders.

Chalmers, with 42 goals in all games, was their top scorer last season, but it is worth noting that no fewer than three forwards achieved at least one "hat-trick" each in League matches alone.

With several promising young men knocking at the door, Celtic were able to ring the changes from time to time in choosing their attack, but John Divers' ability to vary the pace made him the favourite choice for inside left.

It seems that Manager Jimmy McGrory faces the season in the happy position of having more good players than he can accommodate in the first team and the competition in several positions is going to be keen.

Celtic, in a nutshell, strike us as a team on the verge of high achievements, and it remains to be seen whether season 1964-65 will witness their "break through."
