EDITORIAL

TOP ATTRACTION

For the first time in five years Hearts are at home in the quarter-finals of the Scottish Cup. No club could ask for a bigger attraction than the visit of the Cup-holders and it has been necessary to impose an all-ticket limit of 47,000 for this game.

Though Hearts have a good

record against Celtic in League football at Tynecastle, our Glasgow rivals won when they last came here on Cup business in 1962.

Now that we are out of the Inter Cities Fairs Cup, our players are determined to do their best to reach the "Scottish" semi-finals, but a great effort will be needed.

END OF A RUN

All good things come to an end... and our long unbeaten run was checked at last when Real Zaragoza qualified for the quarter-finals of the Inter Cities Fairs Cup by winning their play-off by the only goal in Spain on Wednesday night.

Though we make no secret of our dissatisfaction with the refereeing of this game, the players merit praise for their performance.

They share the disappointment that there is not to be an all-Scottish Fairs Cup quarter-final against Dunfermline, and take this opportunity of wishing the Fifers all success.

Before playing in Spain, Hearts had been unbeaten since Rangers won 2-1 at Tynecastle on 13th November, 1965. Of the 16 intervening games in the Scottish League, Scottish Cup and Fairs Cup, 11 had been won and five drawn.

No other First Division club in Scotland remained unbeaten during that period, though Celtic enjoyed an even longer undefeated run until they lost at Aberdeen on 15th January this year.

It remains to be seen how long Hearts can maintain their unbeaten sequence in Scottish football. We are in the midst of a testing period, for this afternoon's Cup tie will be followed by a midweek game against Dundee United (unless there is a replay) and a visit next Saturday to Rangers, who are sure to go all out in the hope of completing a double at Hearts' expense.

Tough Luck

Much to his regret, John Cumming is on the sidelines today as result of a serious injury sustained in Spain. John had hoped to play in his fourth post-war Scottish Cup tie against Celtic. He would have been the only "survivor" from the 1956 Final, in which he was

at left half in the team which beat Celtic, and also played in 1962 and 1963.

Century

Alan Anderson played his 100th game for Hearts in Wednesday night's Fairs Cup play-off—and he did his best to celebrate the century by scoring against Real Zaragoza for the third time. Alan was unlucky to have a "goal" chalked off for an alleged infringement which mystified the Tynecastle party.

Since joining Hearts in 1963, Alan has proved a valuable acquisition and no one would dispute that our captain and centre half has been an outstanding success in both capacities this season.

Opponents have now scored four of our goals in League matches this season, and on three occasions—against Morton at Tynecastle, Hibernian at Easter Road and Aberdeen at Pittodrie, Hearts have won by the odd goal.

Don's Double

Donald Ford scored both goals for amateur Scotland when Wales were beaten 2-0 at Muirton Park, Perth, last week.

This was Scotland's first qualifying match in the new European Nations Amateur Cup tournament. Scotland, Wales and the Republic of Ireland form one of the qualifying groups.

The following tribute to the late Mr Alexander Irvine, J.P., is paid by the Heart of Midlothian chairman, Mr A. Wilson Strachan, on behalf of all connected with the club:—

“The death of Mr Irvine was a great loss to the club he served for so long. Even before he acquired shares at an early age, Sandy Irvine was a staunch Hearts' man.

“Apart from one year, he served on the Board of Directors for a period of 40 years and was Chairman for 13 years in all.

“During his long connection with football, Mr Irvine also served as Vice-President of the Scottish F.A.; Chairman of the International Selection Committee, and President of the East of Scotland F.A.

“All my colleagues on the present Board of Directors learned a great deal from Sandy Irvine, who was able to give us the benefit of his wide experience, in spite of failing health, until he had to enter hospital late in December.

“In his younger days Mr Irvine was associated with the signing of many famous players, including our present manager, Mr Tommy Walker.

“Always an active and enthusiastic director, he was able to ‘see in the new era’ by accompanying the team on its earlier trips abroad in the new Continental tournaments.

“I speak for all at Tynecastle in saying that the passing of a well-loved veteran was a sad loss to Scottish football.”

EYES ON A TREBLE!

Celtic, Scottish Cup holders, have exacted revenge since we beat them at Hampden ten years ago to win the national trophy. Our supporters still remember their exciting 4-3 victory at Tynecastle in 1962, when a crowd of over 35,000 saw an astonishing finish in a third-round tie.

That was the famous occasion on which a twice-taken penalty by Pat Crerand ensured victory in the last few minutes.

It was a close struggle when we pulled through 3-2 in our last clash in Edinburgh on January 29th, in a ten-men victory achieved after losing George Miller very early in the game.

Celtic have hit such consistently good form that we are anticipating another tough task. They disposed confidently of Dundee at Dens Park in the second round and League results speak for themselves.

The team is playing with great spirit and, of the players signed by Jock Stein for his first season at Celtic Park, none has done better than that man of many clubs, Joe McBride.

The Celtic leader, who has a rare eye for a chance, could finish as the leading scorer in the First Division this season.

He would be the first to acknowledge the great help given by a forward line

which carries plenty of fire-power all round. On the wings, John Hughes and Jimmy Johnstone, the long and the short of it, provide a great contrast in build and style, while Mr Stein can call upon experienced Steve Chalmers—a notable marksman in his own right—Bobby Lennox and Charlie Gallagher as his inside forwards as the occasion demands.

There are plenty of famous names in defence. On their last visit, after a tiring trip to Russia, Celtic proved the versatility of international centre half Billy McNeill by fielding him at right back. With John Cushley making his mark in McNeill's old place, Celtic are fortunate in possessing two strapping defenders of this calibre.

Right half Bobby Murdoch, an instant success when he was promoted to Scotland's team towards the end of last year, seems certain to play against England at Hampden in April.

Like left back Tommy Gemmill, he is a strong defender with a flair for scoring goals in the fluid system operated at Celtic Park.

Dependable John Clark is a regular choice at left half and a comparative newcomer who has shown unmistakable signs of class is right back Ian Craig, who brings height as well as intelligence to the rear lines.

Despite the challenge of a younger school reinforced by a promising Dane, Bent Martin, veteran Ronnie Simpson has been holding his place in goal and can claim already to have had an outstanding comeback to top-class football.
