HOME . . . AT LAST!

We trust supporters have recovered from the shock of learning that, at long last, Hearts are to play at home in the first round proper of the Scottish Cup next week.

Clyde's visit will be the first by any club at this stage of the tournament since the non-league team, Tarff Rovers, came to Tynecastle in season 1960-61—and this, of course, will be our first home game in the Scottish Cup in any round, apart from two replays, in four seasons!

Though the two clubs have met from time to time in the League Cup, this will be Hearts' first Scottish Cup tie against Clyde since 1926, when the "Bully Wee" won in Glasgow.

A Protest

An official protest has been sent to the Scottish League regarding the "on-off" decision affecting our fixture at Dundee last week.

Hearts agree with the decision with the match referee that Dens Park was not playable when inspected on his arrival, but find it hard to understand why it was regarded as playable by another referee several hours earlier.

This decision involved the club in an unnecessary journey and we greatly regret the inconvenience caused to supporters who travelled to Dundee.

Still Ever-present

The Dundee postponement enabled Willie Wallace to preserve his 100 per cent. record of appearance in competitive games this season. Willie, who was recovering from an ankle injury sustained in the last home game, could not have been risked in treacherous conditions, but was found fit to play against Real Zaragoza on Wednesday.

Hard Luck, Davie

An attack of tonsillitis which confined him to bed last week cost Davie Holt a trip to Spain. His place in the party was taken by Derek Rutherford, who, like George Peden, John Calder and Bobby Aitchison, was making his first trip abroad with Hearts.

As we travelled by charter aircraft, it was decided to take an unusually large party of 21 players to give members of the younger school an opportunity to sample the atmosphere and conditions of football in Europe.

Behind Schedule

Hearts, in common with several other First Division clubs, are now two League fixtures behind schedule. In addition to last week's postponement, we had an idle Saturday on December 4th last year, as the visit to Kilmarnock was postponed in view of special preparations for the World Cup tie in Naples the following week.

This is not a serious "backlog," though we hope to have further fixtures postponed as the result of a good run in the Cup!

AS WE SEE IT . . .

" INCENTIVE SCHEME "

The Scottish League has rounded off the "incentive scheme" by deciding that future winners of the League Cup will automatically qualify for a place in the Inter Cities Fairs Cup in the following season.

This innovation will be welcomed generally and will lend additional interest to an autumn tournament which, by virtue of its timing, tends to be forgotten when the honours list is completed at the end of the season.

From now on each of our major tournaments will carry an extra incentive... the European Cup for the League champions; the European Cup-Winners' Cup the Scottish Cup winners, and one "Fairs" place for the League Cup holders.

Two places still remain for clubs which finish the championship programme among the leaders and, of course, if the League Cup winners finish at

the top, or win the Scottish Cup as well, there will be a place in the "Fairs" for another club which earns its chance on merit.

Cup tournaments, whether at home or abroad, can be something of a gamble depending on the luck of the draw, and in the case of the Continental competitions particularly, a place among the contenders is no guarantee of financial benefit.

Experience has proved that it is necessary to have reserves in hand to meet the heavy costs which are involved—and any club which wins the League Cup should be in a position to stand a possible loss when the Fairs Cup comes around.

BID FOR TREBLE?

Scottish Cup-holders, Scottish League leaders and semi-finalists in the European Cup-Winners' Cup after knocking out Kiev Dynamo, Celtic are on the crest of the wave.

Monday, 3rd January, was a decisive day for their championship hopes this year when they thrashed Rangers 5-1 at Celtic Park and the team has now remained unbeaten since losing the first "Old Firm" game at Ibrox in September.

Since moving to Glasgow, Manager Jock Stein has infused great spirit into his players, and his fondness for using defenders like Bobby Murdoch and Tommy Gemmell as marksmen when the occasion arises supplements the power of a forward line which can call on strikers of the calibre of centre forward Joe McBride, versatile John Hughes, now playing on the left wing after making a name for himself earlier as a centre, and Steve Chalmers, who celebrated his comeback midway through the campaign with five goals in two

games against Celtic's leading challengers, Rangers and Dunfermline.

Celtic struck hard in beating Hearts in Glasgow, when McBride and Bobby Lennox shared four goals, with Hughes scoring their fifth.

Since then changes have been made from an already strong team and two of the younger defenders, centre half John Cushley and right back Jim Craig, have been keeping experienced men like former Scotland captain Billy McNeill and Ian Young out of the team.

With occasional changes at inside forward, where Mr Stein can call on Chalmers, Lennox and Charlie Gallagher, Celtic's team has begun to wear a settled look. Probably the most improved player today is outside right Jimmy Johnstone, a clever little ball player who is now making better use of his chances.

Though Celtic have five goalkeepers on their books, veteran Ronnie Simpson, signed from Hibernian, has made a notable comeback this season to fight off the challenge from his younger rivals.

All in all, Celtic are in the happy position of being strong in all departments and are attracting admirers wherever they go.
