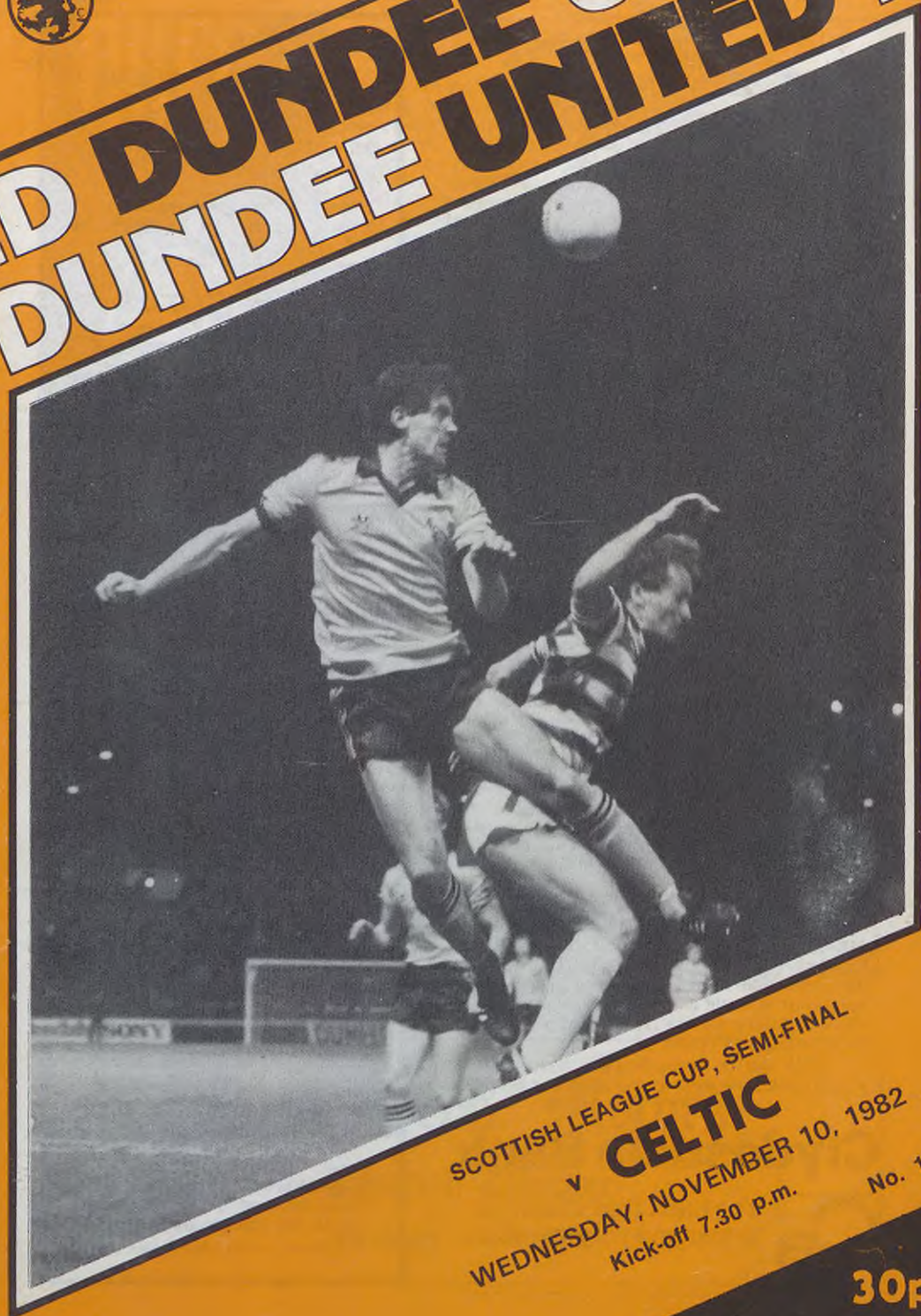

Jim's Spot

It goes without saying that I am extremely disappointed at Saturday's result though not with your support. Once again, your encouragement of the side was magnificent. The result was highly unusual and as you'll appreciate, no one at Tannadice is happy following our heaviest defeat for six years.

In fact, we have let the fans down in our outings against Viking and Aberdeen but tonight provides a great chance to repay your support with our tie against Celtic. However if we are to have any chance of success it will require peak performances from every player. For too long this season we have had to tolerate too few players on top form. Even though we managed an unbeaten run of 19 games from the opening of the season, I can't, in all honesty, say our form has been out of the ordinary. Only the 2-0 win in Eindhoven, the 3-1 first leg at Pittodrie and the six-goal romp against Morton can be categorised as exceptional performances.

We still have a lot of work to do but it is very difficult to unearth the exceptional players we require to strengthen the squad.

Returning to this evening's tie, it is essential we score first but, to be frank, our task is enormous, but the fact that we can even contemplate victory illustrates the strides we have made at the club. Last year we faced a similar situation against Borussia when we knew that an early goal was a must, but this will be a tall order against one of the best sides in Scotland.

Eamonn Bannon returned to the side last Saturday but clearly lacked match fitness. Hopefully Paul Sturrock will have received the all clear to play tonight. However, even his return won't solve all our problems. Earlier in the season Paul's and Ralph Milne's form left us relying heavily on Davie Dodds and he is now in need of a rest. He must play tonight and again on Saturday but perhaps he can be rested against Hibs.

I would not have expected to lose by that 5-1 scoreline last Saturday but tonight is different. We must have a go at Celtic. I'd prefer to make an exit in style rather than sit back to steal a couple of goals. Remember in our recent league meeting we wiped out a two-goal deficit in the last 14 minutes. Tonight we have 90 minutes to achieve the same target.

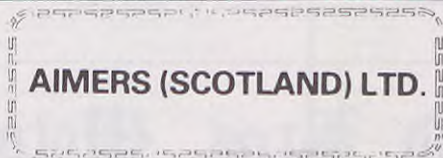

A FAMOUS VICTORY

Second Division Berwick Rangers provided one of Scotland's greatest soccer shocks when they sent Rangers tumbling out of the Scottish Cup in 1967. Yet 33 years ago, United themselves recorded a result that was almost equally as sensational. Celtic were the visitors to Tannadice in a 1st round tie in January, 1949.

On a heavy Tannadice surface the Parkhead side were marginally the more dangerous in the opening exchanges but in 15 minutes only an obscure infringement against United prevented them taking the lead after Peter McKay had scrambled the ball home.

A goal wasn't long delayed, however, because just seven minutes later full back Alex Boden palmed away Peter McKay's certain scoring effort. United's centre forward converted the penalty himself to give the home side a shock lead. Celtic were clearly rattled and fell further behind in 28 minutes. Ex-Celt Frank Quinn's low cross was cracked home by Dickson to put United two up.

Celtic pulled one back just three minutes later when Charlie Tully swept the ball past Edmiston from 10 yards.

Before half-time United again had the ball in the net but an off-side decision prevented United extending their lead. Nine minutes after the break Celtic drew level when John Gallagher tapped in a Charlie Tully free-kick.

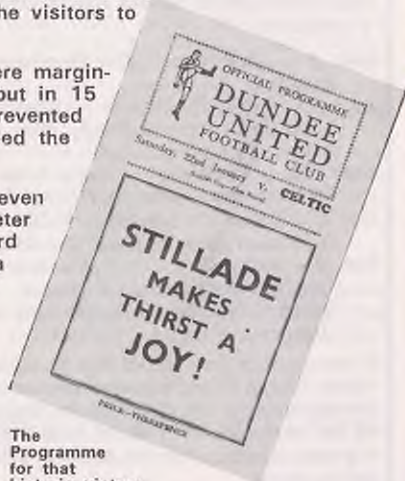

In 62 minutes United had a third "goal" chalked off but 12 minutes later Tannadice erupted as United regained their lead. Once again Peter McKay was the hero when he hit home a Cruickshank cross. United supporters' cheers turned to anguish five minutes later, however, when a defensive error let John Gallagher in to equalise for a second time. Jubilation in the Parkhead side was shortlived though. Miller in the visitors' goal failed to hold a Dickson shot and George Cruickshank eventually scrambled the ball over the line to secure a famous victory. A crowd of 25,000 witnessed that historic contest between these 22:—

CLUB NEWS

SCANT PRAISE

The November edition of World Soccer carries an article by their Dutch correspondent, Jan Herman De Bruijn. After reviewing the Dutch international side's recent performance, he turned his attention to the demise of PSV and Ajax at the hands of United and Celtic. "And then came September 30; a disaster day. PSV Eindhoven started it all with an off-day against Dundee United. They lost 0-2 after, probably, their worst match in the club's history. Not one man played up to his normal form and all the Dundee players must have been astonished by the time and space they got during the game. The fact that the score wasn't even higher than 0-2 was very much the result of inaccurate shooting by the Scottish players." Hardly the most complimentary of comments on one of United's best European performances. Obviously the Dutch scribe hasn't heard the football adage that you can only play as well as the other team lets you.

LEAGUE CUP FINAL DATE

The League Cup final will take place at Hampden Park. As yet the exact date has not been finalised but at a League management committee meeting tomorrow will decide whether the final is to take place on November 27 or December 4. Incidentally, United are due at Parkhead on the latter date.

TONIGHT'S MASCOT

Leading out the United side tonight is Marc Milne, aged 8. Marc attends Eastern Primary School, Dundee.

UEFA DRAW

Last Friday's draw in Zurich paired United with the German side Werder Bremen. The first leg is scheduled for Tannadice on Wednesday, November 24 with the return due a fortnight later in Germany on December 8. Incidentally, for the second year running, United have emerged as Britain's longest survivors in the UEFA Cup following Ranger's elimination at the hands of Cologne.



TONIGHT'S REFEREE

Brian McGinley is making his first visit of the season to Tannadice, in fact, this is the first time he has handled a match involving United since our visit to Ibrox last April. Brian is currently on the FIFA and UEFA list. He has a host of refereeing honours to his name both at home and abroad. Although only in his early thirties he has officiated at three Scottish Cup finals including last season's encounter between Aberdeen and Rangers. This season he has again been involved in European ties when he was in the middle for the UEFA tie between Athletic Bilbao and Ferencvaros.

IN RETROSPECT

Tonight's clash is the 18th between the two clubs in the League Cup and if United are to progress they will require to emulate their best ever result which came at Parkhead at the same stage of the competition two years ago. On that occasion Jim McLean's men travelled to Parkhead for the second leg of the semi-final, having been hed to a 1-1 draw at Tannadice. United proceeded to make light of that apparently formidable task and ran out worthy 3-0 winners in what probably ranks as the club's best performance at Celtic Park. Willie Pettigrew, Paul Sturrock and Davie Dodds were the goalscorers who took United through to their second successive League Cup final.

That victory was in fact United's first in Glasgow in this competition and added to the one previous success at Tannadice in August 1965. Celtic opened the new season in front of a packed Tannadice crowd of 25,000 who saw United take the lead through ex-Celt Bobby Carroll. Bertie Auld equalised but Dennis Gillespie collected United's winner in the second half.

Two years later Celtic and United again heralded the opening of a new season and no less than 54,000 turned up at Parkhead to see the new European Cup holders only just pip United with a Jimmy Johnstone header in the very last minute.

Talking of last minute goals, comments were made on how unusual United's recent last minute winning double at Fir Park was. Well, the final sectional tie between the pair here in 1970 produced an even more sensational scoring finale.

Just a minute was left on the clock and United led thanks to a Davie Wilson counter. Davie Hay then equalised and apparently saved a point, but Alan Gordon put United

ahead again before the end before Lou Macari amazingly levelled matters once again with a third goal in the space of a couple of fantastic minutes. That result incidentally preserved United's unbeaten record in the section but even that wasn't enough to prevent Celtic progressing to the quarter-final stage.
