THE last time Celtic faced Motherwell was at Fir Park on January 15 and no one need remind you that the home side won 2-1 that afternoon.

Avenging that result will give extra relevance to this afternoon's performance by Celtic. We must also use today's match to get ourselves back on the right tracks as we aim for our third successive Premier League title.

Last Saturday was the end of a terrible eight day period that saw us lose four points in three games. This was the worst week of my managerial career.

We had played very badly at Dens Park and lost both points but when we faced Rangers at Celtic Park on the Wednesday evening many of our players showed a renewed determination and appetite for the game. The overall performance, although neither team managed to score and we shared the

points, was very encouraging.

The following Saturday, though, our match against St Mirren was very disappointing and our players only seemed concerned with winning when they went a goal behind.

Today I will be looking for the appetite and application our players showed at the start of the season. The fans, too, can play their part at this time. It has been traditional that when the going gets difficult Celtic supporters get right behind the team. That is what you can do to help just now. Show the real spirit of Celtic.

An influence we have missed recently, although it is by no means the only reason for our slump, is that of midfielder Tommy Burns. Tommy played in the reserves last Saturday and again on Thursday and is making good progress with his injury. It will still be some time, however, before he is fit for first team action.

LOOKING BACK

AGO

ON Wednesday March 29, 1978, Celtic travelled across the city to play Partick Thistle in a Premier League match at Firhill.

Celtic fielded the team that had beaten Rangers so convincingly the previous Saturday as they set out to avenge the defeat by Partick Thistle earlier in the season.

However before the half hour mark was reached Celtic had scored twice and virtually sewn the game up. Both goals followed Ronnie Glavin free kicks and both were scored by Tommy Burns, the first with his left foot and the second a scorching right foot grounder which simply flashed into the corner of the net.

Shortly afterwards Tommy Burns got ordered off after a clash with Thistle's McAdam and soon thereafter Bobby Houston was ordered off after running foul of the referee twice in a few minutes. In the second half Roddy McDonald and Tom McAdam added two further goals for a most convincing win.

ON April 4, 1973, this story appeared on the front page of "THE CELTIC VIEW", written by John McPhail.

Celtic look set to win the Scottish League and Cup double again and if they do an extra medal should be struck for Bobby Lennox.

What a wonderful servant the Saltcoats boy has been. The vital goals scored by Lennox in the League Championship campaigns over the past few years are countless and he was a great player in the club's finest hour — the European Cup victory over Inter Milan.

Now in the veteran stage, Bobby is having one of his most profitable seasons, I trace our return to form to the two golden goals he scored against Dundee United.

I shudder to think what Celtic would have been like without Lennox that day. Since then Celtic have not looked back with great games against Aberdeen, Hearts and Falkirk.

CELTIC went on a five day scoring spree as they kept close on the heels of Rangers in the run-in for the championship.

On Monday March 25, 1968, they travelled through to Perth to play St. Johnstone and the full details of that encounter were: St. Johnstone 1 (McPhee); Celtic 6 (Lennox 4, Johnstone, Wallace).

Celtic: Simpson; Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeil and Brogan; Johnstone and Lennox; Wallace, Gallagher and Hughes. (Twelfth man McBride).

Five days later on Saturday March 30 they took the Perth road again this time on the way to Tannadice Park to play 'bogey' team Dundee United in a vitally important league encounter.

The full particulars of that match were as follows:

Dundee United 0; Celtic 5 (Lennox 2, Johnstone, Wallace, Cattanach).

Celtic: Simpson; Craig and Gemmell; Murdoch, McNeil and Brogan; Johnstone and Lennox; Wallace; Gallagher and Hughes. Twelfth man: Cattanach.
