CELTIC LEAD THE CUP RACE

Celtic have the proud distinction of having won the Scottish Cup more times than any other club. They edged in front of Rangers last season when, with the teams deadlocked with 19 Cup final wins apiece, Celtic beat their old rivals by 4-0 at Hampden Park to get their name on the trophy for the 20th time.

Now they head for their 21st . . . and warm favourites to do so. But Dundee, to-day's semi-final opponents, are confident they can stop Celtic reaching another Cup final objective.

Dundee's last Cup final appearance was against Rangers at Hampden Park in 1964. It shows the vast change in personnel at Dundee since then that only Doug Houston survives from the first team player pool at Dens Park at that time. And, at that, he didn't play then.

Dundee put up a commendable fight against Rangers that day . . . but collapsed completely in the final minutes when Rangers scored twice to win 3-1.

Jimmy Millar put Rangers ahead in the 69th minute, after a goalless first-half, but just over a minute later Kenny Cameron scored the equaliser. Then, with only two minutes left for play, Jimmy Millar scored from a Willie Henderson cross and a minute later Ralph Brand got the third from a Davie Wilson cross.

The teams then were:

Rangers—Ritchie; Shearer and Provan; Greig, McKinnon and Baxter; Henderson, McLean, Millar, Brand and Wilson.

Dundee—Slater; Hamilton and Cox; Seith, Ryden and Stuart; Penman, Cousin, Cameron, Gilzean and Robertson.

In the semi-final that year Dundee met one of to-day's Cup semi-final four, Kilmarnock, and they beat the Rugby Park side with a comfortable 4-0 win to meet Rangers in the final.

Although Celtic have dominated the trophy since Jock Stein took over as manager, and have won it three times out of the last five years, the achievement of winning it twice in succession has eluded them since away back early in the century when they won it in 1911 by beating Hamilton Acas 2-0 at Ibrox after a no-scoring draw and then Clyde in 1912 by the same score at the same venue.

Now they aim to make it a double this year. Last season they got revenge over Rangers when they beat them 4-0 in the final after Rangers had stopped their two-years-in-succession bid to take the Cup three years previously.

Celtic had beaten Dunfermline in season 1964-65 and were out to succeed again the following year when they met Rangers in the final. Their plans were shattered by a shock Kai Johansen goal in the replay after the teams had drawn 0-0 in the first match.

Last year's final between the Old Firm, however, had a completely different complexion. A Billy McNeill goal in only two minutes set Celtic on the road to victory.

By half-time the game was virtually over when Celtic struck twice again to go in with a 3-0 lead. Bobby Lennox first took advantage of a poor pass by Orjan Persson to intercept and go on and score the second. Then, after John Greig failed to gather a clearance by goalkeeper Norrie Martin, he was dispossessed by George Connelly who went through to score.

Three up at half time against the dispirited Rangers side, Celtic were well on top and 15 minutes from time Steve Chalmers added to the Ibrox misery by scoring a fourth.

Now that Celtic are in the semi-final, they could again achieve the grand slam by winning everything—including the European Cup—as they did in 1966-67. They are favourably placed now to do so.

Yet they could have a fight on their hands to-day. The teams have met only once this season . . . in the league at Celtic Park and Celtic only managed to win by a solitary goal, scored from the penalty spot by Tommy Gemmell.

The Parkhead club, however, invariably have the superiority over their Dundee rivals. As the record books show over the past few years.

Two years ago when the clubs met in the League Cup final, Celtic set up yet another record when they beat Dundee 5-3 to win the Cup three times in a row. Since then, however, Celtic have made it five in a row.

If the goals and thrills served up in that final tie are repeated to-day there should be no complaints.

Celtic appeared as if their third successive final win would be a formality when they stormed into a two goal lead in the first 11 minutes. A Steve Chalmers header and a John Hughes shot gave Celtic a victory look. They sat back complacently, however, and were shaken when George McLean knocked one off in the 24th minute. Overcoming that shock, they went on to take a 3-1 lead 17 minutes from the end after a rather ragged second-half. George McLean made it 3-2 a few minutes later but the anticipated thrilling finish didn't materialise. Celtic, always in front, made it 4-2 when Bobby Lennox scored and although Jim McLean knocked the lead back to 4-3, Celtic had the final say when Willie Wallace ended the scoring almost on the whistle.

STEVE MURRAY (Dundee)
